# "On Eve of Tremendous Developments In Balkans"

New York Herald's London Correspondent Says Big Things Pending — Declares Belief of Military Experts That **Enemy Has Failed Once More** 

New York, Dec. 6—The Herald's London correspondent cables: Though the attitude of Greek still is a subject of solicitude to the entente powers, I am informed that the negotiations have reached in one respect at least, a satisfactory end. This is evidenced by Greece permitting elements of the Serbian army to form a junction with the Anglo-French. Further I am told that despite all reports to the contrary the Serbian northern and southern armies, nearly intact, have retired into Albania, where, when they are succored

and re-equipped by France and Great Britain they will strike again.

The newspapers this morning, emphatically endorsing the expeditions to Saloniki and Gallipoli, demand that the government shall send at least half a million men to this theatre of war in order to insure the adherence of Rou-

Despite the maundering of the pessimists, there is an ineradicable belief that, though Serbia is overrun, the Central Powers have dismally failed in the Balkans as well as on the eastern and western fronts. No doubt we are on the eve of tremendous developments. All the military experts, including those who have been the most pessimistic, agree that the forces of the Central Empires are beginning to crumble up, despite their ephemeral triumphs.

## All In The Air Yet

No Solution Of Balkan Affairs Yet Reached

Russians Have Not Crossed Border Into Roumania—Something Depends On Decisions of War Council in Paris

London, Dec. 6—No solution of affairs in the Balkans has yet been reached.

Russian troops, though long poised for action near the frontier of Roumania, have not yet, so far as is known, left their own territory. Roumania's policy still is one of wavering and the Greek situation, despite diplomatic parleys and all sorts of reports of a successful settlement, remains undeveloped. According to the latest reports from Athens, both the Entente group of powers and the Greek government are holding their ground; the Entente reiterating its demands and Greece refusing to make concessions inconsistent with her sovereign rights.

An official communication has been issued at Athens to the effect that the Greek press does not represent the views of the Hellenic government, which is said to be optimistic regarding a successful settlement, but the ground for this optimism, which has failed to impress the newspapers and public either in Athens or in London, is not given.





THE RECRUITING CAMPAIGN

With large numbers of men to be recruited before spring the local recruiting committee has done little more than mark time of late, while it waited for the military authorities to do what should have been done many weeks ago. Over and over again since the committee was organized the need of a central military authority for this province has been demonstrated. There is no reasonable excuse for a condition which makes necessary appeals to Halifax and then to Ottawa, with inaction and delay when there is urgent need for prompt decision. So far as can be gathered from information available, St. John appears to have been set down at first as having about enough accommodation for one battalion. Later it seems to have been done done many weeks ago.

There is no reason whatever to fear that Sir Sam Hughes will not do the thing that is necessary to boost recruiting in this city and province. The immediate meed is to have quarters fitted up so that every man who enlists may be taken care of at once. If proper representations are made at Ottawa the matter will be at-

The more energy we put into the recruiting campaign, and the more men we train and send to the front the sooner the war will end. It is a business proposition and every man's duty is to lend a hand. Whatever difficulties appear must be brushed aside and the work go on. New Brunswick needs more direct connection with the department at Ottawa, and there is no ground for the belief that it cannot be secured. This is war-time, and whatever changes are necessary will be made by Sir Sam Hughes the moment it is made clear to him that they ought to be made. It will require our best efforts under the most favorable conditions to perform the task that lies at our hand, and the minister who is calling for men may be relied on to do all in his power to facilitate the work. Let the situation be placed clearly before him, and without delay.
