

LLOYD GEORGE DEEPLY AFFECTED BY RESIGNATION

London, March 17.—The announcement of Bonar Law's retirement was made in the House of Commons by Lloyd George, who was so deeply affected that he could hardly finish his statement.

The premier said he had received a letter from Mr. Law this morning stating he had been warned by his physicians that if he continued he would run the danger of a complete breakdown.

Mr. Law had been absent from the house the whole of this week, but he was reported to be improving in health, and his resignation of the leadership of the house came as a complete surprise.

START NEW SECT. Use \$35,000 Legacy to Found Union of Believers.

By the will of John Farren, deceased, late of the city of Montreal, in the county of Montreal, Eng., most of his estate of \$37,874 is left to found a "Believers' Union."

He bequeathed Smithwick Gospel Hall, Stratford Hall, and other property to his executors as trustees for the Believers' Union, and directed them to use Stratford Hall as headquarters and have a "brother" devote his whole time to the union work.

Membership of the union, he wrote, should be free to all who hold and seek to carry out:

1. The old Gospel.

2. Sound doctrine.

3. Scriptural precepts.

4. The will concludes: "Brethren, put your hand to this work, and may the Lord give us guidance and wisdom richly in this matter."

CASES AGAINST ALL BUT GANDILL ARE DROPPED

Chicago, March 17.—The state today dropped the cases against all of the Chicago White Sox baseball players, except Chick Gandill, indicting for the alleged throwing of the 1919 world's series.

The action was taken after Judge William E. Dever had refused to grant a continuance of more than sixty days in the case.

Robert E. Crowe, state's attorney, announced that an attempt would be made to gather new evidence, and that new indictments would be sought against the men.

Separate National Organization. There might be some difficulty as to the jurisdiction of the international board, and as to the powers of the different national bodies. There was opposition to this scheme in Great Britain. There they objected to being reduced to a mere district.

THE LEGISLATURE. What promises to be a rather quiet but very interesting session of the provincial legislature opens today. The elections were held since the house last met, and there will be many new faces, while some that had grown familiar will be absent. There are changes on both sides of the house, and the farmer members will introduce a new and interesting feature. The government majority is not large, but there does not seem to be any outstanding issue in controversy that would be at all likely to jeopardize the administration. There will be no disposition on the part of anybody to attempt to force another appeal to the people. The people think well of the Foster government and its progressive policies, and are especially interested in its hydro-electric programme; and we may fairly look for a business-like and not too long session of the house.

WHERE IS HE AT? The Standard organ describes the Conservative party in this province as one in search of a Moses who may give it leadership. It says: "At the present time there is no recognized leader, and without one it is idle to expect to get very far. The first thing to do therefore is to find a leader, and frankly it is not going to be a particularly easy job. Able men, capable leaders, are not picked up as easily as daisies on a lawn. There are suitable men available, but whether they could be induced to take hold of the situation is another matter. Anyone who does, will want to be satisfied that he can rely upon the loyal and unswerving support of the rank and file, otherwise little progress is likely to be made."

THE CASE RE-OPENED. The railway bridge matter is not yet settled. Something is not going to be put over on St. John just because the Canadian Pacific wants to put it over, and some people such as are always to be found in this city are willing to agree that anything is good enough for St. John. Apparently the railway company was raising its own way, but the visit of Mayor Schofield, Mr. George S. Cushing and Mr. F. C. Beattie to Ottawa has changed the aspect of affairs. They were able to show the minister of public works that the matter had not been fairly presented, and he has ordered a new survey and a further investigation of the conditions. Is it not time the Board of Trade and Commercial Club took an active interest in this question? It means much to St. John to keep the navigation of the falls as clear as possible. The fight for justice in this matter has fallen on the shoulders of a few, and now that the whole case has been re-opened there should be no doubt about the feeling of the whole community. Those who have been active in this matter have rendered a public service. They should now receive such support as will safeguard the city's interests and secure the measure of justice which it should never have been necessary to plead for at Ottawa.

THE ROTARIANS. What is the significance of this two days' conference in St. John of business and professional men from Halifax, Sydney, Charlottetown, Moncton and St. Stephen, who have come here in the name of Rotary? They do not represent any secret society. They have no gobbies. They draw no sectarian lines. They are not after anything for themselves. They speak in terms of the golden rule in relation to business, social relations, community welfare, and national and international concerns. They are not supermen, but just plain fellows who have a vision and an ideal, dimly or clearly apprehended according to their temperament and the extent to which they have studied and applied Rotary principles. They are learning as they go, and the learning broadens their sympathies, enlarges their understanding and gives them a common inspiration. There is a very real and valuable significance in such a conference. It breaks down prejudice and tends to unity of purpose along right lines. The men and women who go back to their homes with a larger vision and a warmer feeling of friendship will be better citizens and more eager to have done with the local prejudices which keep people apart. There is a deep spiritual meaning in such a meeting that has been said at these meetings of earnest men who have no selfish interest to serve. Rotary may be made a great unifying and uplifting force in these provinces. It meets a need in human life and experience which no other organization has so well met. There can be no doubt that the local club will get a new and nobler viewpoint and inspiration from this conference, and its members feel a deeper obligation so to interpret Rotary that its influence will spread far beyond the bounds of membership.

WANDERER SAYS HE SEES MURDERED WIFE EVERY NIGHT. Chicago, March 17.—Every night since he killed his wife and their unborn child last June, Carl Wanderer has talked with her spirit, according to testimony given yesterday by Dr. Harold D. Singer, state alienist at Wanderer's trial on charges of murdering the "ragged" stranger alleged to have been paid to stage a fake hold-up. Dr. Singer said that Wanderer had told him that Mrs. Wanderer had come to him nightly in her wedding gown and holding a child in her arms. The witness said he considered Wanderer sane. Two other alienists also testified yesterday to Wanderer's sanity, their appearance being the end of the state's case in rebuttal.

Progress Along Many Lines Indicated In Speech From Throne

(Continued from page 1.) The establishment of one of the most up-to-date plants for the crushing of lime rock and the distribution of one of our natural resources as an aid to fertilizing the soil has been energetically and successfully carried on. The large demand for this product fully justifies the expectations, which would meet with the approval of agriculturists generally. In further assistance to agriculture, my government proposes to encourage the flax industry and to supply flax seed to those interested in its full production. You will be asked to make an appropriation for this purpose.

Hydro and Highways. I am happy to state that during the year very satisfactory progress has been made toward developing the water power on the Musquash River, where upwards of 9,000 horse power will in the very near future be available for industrial and domestic purposes. The New Brunswick Electrical Power Commission has been organized, and plans to meet the wishes of the people for water power development in the full production where it is most needed are under consideration.

The improvement of the highways was completed last year. Taking advantage of the federal aid programme, contracts were awarded for reconstruction of the main trunk roads in various sections of the province. This work was up to the standard approved by the council of the federal aid board and was subject to inspection by engineers of that board, who expressed themselves well satisfied with the work being carried on. A certain portion of the main trunk roads, subject to federal aid, was carried on under the organization of the department of public works, which received the commendation of the federal engineers. Owing to the federal grant under the trunk road programme, the public works was enabled to inaugurate the policy referred to at the last session of the legislature, having in view the expenditure of funded automobile fees on the principal branch roads leading to the main trunk roads, and in view of the agricultural purposes. Very marked improvements were carried out on roads of this class, that will be of great benefit to ordinary grants for roads, as well as the road tax money collected, to be expended on the by-roads or local important market roads. It is hoped to be able to continue this class of work until the four years programme is carried out.

The ever increasing automobile traffic has put to a very severe test the maintenance of ordinary wooden bridges. So, great has been the necessity for replacement of bridges of this class that it has been found necessary, wherever possible, to do so, to the extent of the available structures of a permanent character. Many structures of this class were erected during the past season and the government is hopeful of being able to carry on this programme during the present year. A patrol system for newly constructed highways is being gradually brought up to a standard of efficiency and last year this policy was particularly successful for which a special appropriation for this purpose will be required.

Public Health. All citizens keeping in active touch with government and the public health movement have received a very marked impetus during the last few years and that it has been placed among the first in importance of government services, because it is destined to relieve and correct the unfortunate conditions of unnecessary suffering and death brought about through the want of knowledge and application of its principles in practice. In this connection I am glad to be able to say that New Brunswick has kept in the forefront of the times. The department of health has been carried on with assiduity during the year. The general services of the department have been conducted with that measurable degree of success incident to an almost completely new department as far as this province is concerned; prejudices and misconceptions are necessary incidents in all countries to such a service in its early stages, such prejudices and misconceptions are dispelled, however, by education and publicity. The institution of the department will, it is hoped, prove to be one of the most usefully forward steps ever undertaken. Certain amendments of the act under which the department operates, looking forward to greater efficiency, will be laid before you for your careful consideration.

Educational. It has been the policy of my government to make the educational provision more attractive to persons of suitable capacity and attainments. Much difficulty has been experienced in carrying out this policy, owing to the increase in the cost of living, which prevents many who are desirous of entering the teaching profession from doing so. In order to overcome this obstacle in the way of the recruiting of the teaching profession in the province the government has had under its consideration a plan for the making of loans of suitable amounts to these students in attendance at the Provincial Normal School who may require assistance. An act has been prepared to give effect to this plan and will be submitted to you for your approval.

During the recess there was a conference of representatives of the provincial governments of the maritime provinces, and plans were formulated for the pressing of all claims of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island against the dominion. My ministers are convinced of the justice of our demands and it is sincerely to be hoped that at an early date a decision will be reached between the governments concerned with regard to more equitable financial arrangements between the dominion and the maritime provinces.

Representation at Ottawa. Recent occurrences make it my duty to say to you, as the guardians of the interests of the people of New Brunswick, that our provincial government is vigilantly guarded and upheld, and any attempt to tamper with either the letter or the spirit of the British North America Act, particularly with regard to representation in the senate and commons, must be viewed with the gravest apprehension and should be resisted to the utmost. The terms of Confederation, being the compact of the union, should never be disregarded and should only be varied with the approval of all the provinces interested.

HON. M. W. DOHERTY TO SAIL FOR HOME TOMORROW. London, March 17.—(Canadian Associated Press)—Hon. Manning W. Doherty, minister of agriculture for Ontario, will sail for home on Saturday on the Canadian Pacific liner Minnesota.

HON. A. A. DYSART, New Speaker of the New Brunswick Legislature. ing, was brought to the attention of the government during the recess and a representative has been in attendance at several conferences, obtaining much information and preparing such arguments as may assist to safeguard the interests of business and the people of New Brunswick generally when this question comes up for final decision before the Board of Railway Commissioners.

When authority was given in 1912 for the guaranteeing of Bonds to the amount of \$4,250,000 for the construction of the Valley Railway and when further authority for the issuing of the bonds of the province was given from time to time for the same purpose, it was understood that the railway would be a part of the Transcontinental system and it was anticipated that the revenue therefrom, under the agreement with the federal government, would be sufficient to pay the interest upon the bonds and establish a sinking fund.

The expectation that export traffic would find an outlet through the Port of St. John by passing over this line has not materialized. Consequently the estimated receipts have fallen far short of the requirements to pay the interest. The province has, as a result of this, been unable to pay large sums of interest for which no provision has been made. I have therefore to advise you that a message will be introduced to meet the amounts already advanced to meet the interest upon the bonds issued in connection with the construction of this railway. My government will ask you to consider how best to make the necessary provision for this expenditure in the future.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 202 of the Intoxicating Liquor Act of 1916, "each of the provinces were given an opportunity to express their opinion for or against the retention of this measure. The result of the Referendum which was held on July 10, 1920, will be laid upon the table of the House.

Territorial revenues during the last year were exceptionally good and are further evidence of the vigilance and administration of the crown lands of the province. Stumpage rates have been increased and a revenue of about a million and a half of dollars from the crown assets of the province is something that even the most sanguine public man of New Brunswick never anticipated.

QUEBEC'S BILL FOR REVENUE FROM AMUSEMENTS

Quebec, March 17.—The new license bill sponsored by Provincial Treasurer Mitchell provides for a tax of \$200 on film exchanges; \$10 a day for each race meeting within a radius of thirty miles of Montreal, and \$5 a day in Quebec, but if there is any betting, the license fee shall be \$1,200 a day on one-mile tracks, \$800 a day on half-mile tracks, and \$800 a day for other tracks, with double these fees if the pari-mutuel system of betting is not used.

Every person betting at a pari-mutuel meeting must pay a duty equal to ten per cent. of the amount deposited. No betting may be carried on outside the pari-mutuel method, unless special license is issued on payment of a duty of \$1,000 a day.

JAPANESE DEMAND THAT PEERS SUPPORT DISARMAMENT CAUSE

Resolution Adopted by Two Mass Meetings Held in Osaka—Budget Declared Against Public Opinion.

Osaka, Japan, March 17.—At two mass meetings held here recently, attended by thousands of persons, resolutions were adopted declaring that the budget gives preponderant importance to armaments, which places an unbearable burden on the nation and is contrary to public opinion. It was decided to send a message to the members of the House of Peers, asking their support in the disarmament movement.

Speeches favoring disarmament were made by prominent business leaders. Professor Suichiro, of Kyoto University, declared that Japan should take the lead in an international discussion on disarmament. If this were done, he said, all questions which have been the subject of discussion between Japan and the United States would rapidly be solved.



BRIDGE MATTER IS REOPENED

Mayor Schofield, George Cushing and F. C. Beatty, who went to Ottawa on Saturday, returned yesterday, and Mr. Cushing made it known that as a result of their visit the Dominion Department of Public Works has ordered that work on the new C. P. R. bridge at the Reservoir Falls shall not be proceeded with, pending a new survey and a further investigation of conditions to determine whether the bridge shall be raised to the height deemed necessary by those interested in the free navigation of the river.

Mr. Cushing and Mr. Beatty took with them to Ottawa drawings, tables and figures, prepared by R. H. Cushing, C. E., and affidavits from men using the bridge, and personally acquainted with all the conditions bearing upon the question of the height of the bridge.

On Monday, accompanied by Hon. Mr. Wigmore and Stanley E. Elkin, M. P., they and the Mayor had a conference with the Minister of Public Works. The deputy minister and the chief engineer of the department were also present, and the whole thing was gone into at some length. In view of the facts

and arguments presented Hon. Mr. McCurdy, Minister of Public Works, decided that work should be held up pending a further survey and investigation, as stated. Mr. Cushing said yesterday that they had a courteous reception from the minister, and that Messrs. Elkin and Wigmore had given them active and energetic assistance. It is thought a new survey will be made by the resident engineer of the Department of Public Works and that there may be another hearing on the matter. The delegation was evidently very successful, as many here had taken it for granted that the case was already closed. It has been reopened, with good prospects.

MONTREAL DEFECTIVES.

To the Editor of the Times:—
Sir,—Speaking of the statement of Dr. G. M. Hincks, Toronto, I would say that his estimate, 100,000 mentally defective persons in the Dominion of Canada seems to err, if at all, on the side of conservatism, especially when we consider the frequency with which one meets with some form of feeble-mindedness in our every day work.

A considerable number of terms are employed to designate this group, but the term "feeble minded" must be a compromise because there has not grown up, as in the case of the insane and the criminal, a social concept and a method of procedure for labelling.

In general this group called feeble-minded includes those individuals who are mentally deficient—that is inadequate at the social and psychological

levels of re-action—and whose defect is due rather to an arrest of development than to any destructive process of later life as so often thought. While this definition is necessarily very crude, we apply it in the broadest general way. The concept of the arrest of development is not a simple one. The arrest may be due to inherent defect (hereditary); to injury of the brain, disease before birth (congenital), to injury to brain in early years of life, to extraneous factors—intoxicated, deaf-mutism may cause feeble-mindedness if not corrected by special education; a high degree of myopia (short-sightedness), adenoids, and many other causes may operate. So it is seen that we are not dealing with a unitary concept in any sense, and if we will survey the social problems into which feeble-mindedness projects itself as an important factor this is the further emphasized. These problems include not only those of the idiot, imbecile, and feeble-minded as ordinarily understood and as found in institutions, but the problems of the juvenile delinquent, the

criminal and the prostitute. Of these two latter classes recent surveys seem to indicate that conservatively fifty per cent, could be included in the feeble minded group. In addition to these groups there are the "backward" and a typical children—for the most part at present problems in our schools—a large percentage, no one knows how large, of the vagabond, unemployed and pauper classes. Add to these a large number of the "epileptics," and some slight idea may be obtained of the complexity of the problem, or one phase of the complexity of the problem that is included



COWLESS MILK IS LATEST FIND Boston, March 17—Henry Ford's dream of a cowless milk has come true. An absolutely pure cowless milk, or in other words, a synthetic milk, is being made. It can be made by anyone at home for a few cents a quart, according to the expert who discloses all this. He is Dr. Earl B. Carr of the New England Sanitarium at Melrose.

This synthetic milk is made of the following surprising ingredients. Ordinary oats, ordinary peanuts, pure water, a dash of salt, Dr. Carr and Dr. G. E. Comforth, the food expert and dietist at the institute, demonstrated how the cowless milk is made. It took them about five minutes to produce a quantity.

They used a little machine, not unlike a sausage grinder. A handful of raw peanuts was dropped in. Under the spout was spread a piece of cheese-cloth. These were ground, a pulpy mess coming out. Next was produced a quantity of steel cut oats known as "Scotch oatmeal." This was run through the grinder, coming out a fine white powder. This was mixed with the peanut pulp and the whole was wrapped into the cheese-cloth and placed in a bowl. Over this they poured a few cupfuls of water. The water began to thicken and turn white. The mixture in the cloth was

kneaded, keeping it in the water. This complete, there remained in the cloth a pulpy lump, which, it was explained, was the cellulose or woody portion, indigestible, rejected by the cow. The rest is declared to be a pure milk, which thrives upon the cowless product.

WIFE OF ONTARIO BANKER IS KILLED BY TRAIN



MOSHER ON PAY OF RAILWAY MEN

Declares Higher Wages Not Cause of Financial Position of Roads

Wrong, He Says, to Start Pruning in United States, With Lower Pay Employees—Says Canadian Workers Will Resist Reducing Living Standard.

Ottawa, March 17—"Untrue and absolutely absurd" are some of the emphatic terms used in a lengthy statement issued by A. R. Mosher, grand president of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railroad Employees, last night, in reply to assertions that the embarrassing financial position of several railroads, notably the Canadian Government Railways, is due to the increased wages paid railroad employees.

Mr. Mosher cited figures with a view of showing that the average wage paid railroad employees in Canada is low. He further emphasized that for years previous to the war, wages paid railroad employees were notoriously low, and that it was only by persistent efforts on the part of the railroad brotherhoods and organizations that wages have been brought on a level with wages paid in other trades.

As a stop toward the solution of the railway problem, Mr. Mosher reiterated the railway brotherhoods' request that the employees be given a directing vote in the conduct of railway operations.

In the course of a lengthy statement Mr. Mosher criticized the proposed wages pruning in the United States by starting with the man of the small pay envelope. He said those who are advocating wage reductions are doing the very thing that will destroy any chance of co-operation between employee and employer.

The great mass of workers in Canada today are sane and desire amicable relations with employers, but they will emphatically resist any effort to reduce the present standard of living.

Mr. Mosher criticized the proposed wages pruning in the United States by starting with the man of the small pay envelope. He said those who are advocating wage reductions are doing the very thing that will destroy any chance of co-operation between employee and employer.

The Rotary dinner in the evening was a splendid function. The Rotarians, their wives and friends to the number of about 300 sat down to an excellent banquet, for which Rotarian John Bond was caterer. A carnival spirit of revelry prevailed, borne out by the Rotary songs, under the leadership of Dr. Spangler. A toast list was then honored. The toast to Canada was responded to by the singing of "O Canada" and an address by L. P. D. Tilley. The toast to Rotary was responded to by Canon R. A. Armstrong, the toast to "headquarters" by

AFFECT WAGES OF MILLION MEN

Negotiations in London Relative to Pay of Miners and Seamen.

London, March 17.—A million miners and seamen are concerned in wages negotiations with employers which will open in London today.

In a wide range of industries a readjustment of wages is being considered. Already a million and a half workers have accepted reductions, mostly by sliding scale agreements, and an equal number will be affected by proposals now under consideration.

The parliamentary committee of the trade union congress decided yesterday that the most satisfactory way of dealing with the matter would be for the unions affected to meet in conference by trade groups and try to reach a common understanding.

Machinery already exists in the wages arbitration department of the ministry of labor for dealing with matters of this kind.

SEES THE HAND OF HON. ROBT. ROGERS

Manitoba's Attorney-General on Matter of Control Over Railway Freight Rates.

Winnipeg, March 17—Criticism of the Manitoba government over its alleged neglect to enforce its right to control over railway freight rates on the Canadian National Railway in Manitoba and to the head of the latter was answered in the legislature yesterday by Hon. Thomas Johnson, attorney general.

J. Thalg, Conservative leader, moved a resolution censuring the administration in this connection. Mr. Johnson contended that "validating legislation" enacted in the federal parliament in 1901, supposed to affirm the rights given the province in their agreement with the Canadian National Railway signed early in the same year, was in reality "invalidating" legislation.

Reservations were made, he said, which took away control over rates from the provincial authorities, and because of them, the present government of Manitoba had been unable to reap the full benefit to which it was entitled under the agreement.

Mr. Johnson declared that Hon. Robert Rogers was at the bottom of the present "agitation" against the government in this matter.

The attorney-general said it was "quite within range of possibility" that the dominion government "might be called upon to make good any loss that the province may have suffered in consequence of their interference with our contractual right."





COUNSEL FOR ST. PIERRE IS HEARD TODAY

(Special to The Times.)
Edmundston, N. B., March 17.—The defence opened its appeal to the jury this morning, when A. T. LeBlanc, counsel for William St. Pierre, commenced summing up the grounds on which the prisoner sought to be acquitted of the charge of murdering Miss Minnie Stevens on the night of October 11, 1920. Considerable excitement was occasioned this morning when efforts were made by the crowd to storm the court house and gain entrance before the court was opened. The excitement quickly subsided, only one getting past the constable on the door and he was later ejected.

The prisoner seemed to show the strain somewhat more than he had previously done and looked as though he had passed a restless night. Mr. LeBlanc expressed his regret at not being able to address the jury in the French language. He outlined the case for the crown, and in an eloquent appeal set out what he said were weak spots. He said the crown showed that St. Pierre was at the top of a hill on Canada street at 8.55. The crown next showed him at the brick school house in all its theories. Council contended that the testimony of Miss Cyr, Miss Stonge and Frank Carrier refuted the testimony of Charles Magoon, who said he saw the accused near the scene of the crime. Mr. LeBlanc made it strong attack on the evidence of Magoon and quoted alleged discrepancies between his evidence at the trial and the preliminary hearing. Council contended that the body had remained on the bank the best part of the night and had been thrown in the river the next morning. He said that according to crown evidence, the girl was alive after nine o'clock; she could not have reached the scene of the crime before 9:05; Magoon saw the accused at 9:10, thus giving the murderer only five minutes in which to do the deed. If St. Pierre had killed the girl, he would also have murdered Magoon to hide the crime. Council contended that more than one man did the deed.

MANSLAUGHTER CONVICTION IN AUTOMOBILE CASE

Port Arthur, Ont., March 17.—Louis Koller was yesterday convicted of manslaughter as driver of a car which on Christmas day ran onto a sidewalk and fatally injured Anzelle Laiviere, a five-year-old girl. Justice Orde deferred sentence.

LOCAL EVENTS OF ST. PATRICK'S DAY

Dominican Father Preacher at Cathedral Mass

Speaks of Irish People's Retention of the Catholic Faith—The Shamrock in Evidence.

Today, March 17, Irishmen and the sons of Irishmen all over the world are celebrating the feast of the patron saint of the Emerald Isle, St. Patrick, the apostle of Ireland. And today it is with pride that men of Irish ancestry wear in their hats a sprig of shamrock, the plant taken by St. Patrick to denigrate the Trinity. It is worthy of note that only on this date is a British soldier allowed to wear any "unregimental" decoration, it being laid down in the army regulations that on March 17 soldiers of Irish descent will be permitted to carry a piece of shamrock on the left side of their caps.

Many of the business houses in the city today carried on which the green ensign with the golden harp was conspicuous. In all the Catholic churches the life of Ireland's patron saint was celebrated in honor of the occasion.

Dominican Preacher.
In the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception at ten o'clock high mass was celebrated by one of the Dominican fathers who are in the city on missionary work. Rev. Father Shiel was celebrant; Rev. Father Mackin, deacon, and Rev. Father Peckey, sub-deacon. His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc, Rev. Wm. M. Duke, Rev. H. Ramage and Rev. Abbe Caspary were in the sanctuary. The mass was sung by the male choir, under the direction of Rev. A. P. Allen, with A. S. Gougeon as organist, who also played the airs during the service.

A sermon appropriate to the day was given by Father Mackin. He first sketched the life of Ireland's patron saint and related the events leading up to his mission with the Irish people.

St. Patrick, he said, led his people into the light of God's faith, put it down deep into the hearts of Ireland's loving children where it is today after 1,600 years, and it is safe to say that it will remain there until the end of time. We should honor this saint today. We should rejoice in and cherish the faith which teaches whence we came and where we are going. The faith which St. Patrick placed in the hearts of our forefathers taught these truths.

Ireland, he said, has stood out as an example to the world. Her universities have invited people to come from all over the world in spite of the persecutions that have been carried on against her. From the sixteenth to the nineteenth century the people of Ireland were persecuted, but it is to their honor that they did not lose their faith. They had taken from them their language and their church, but the faith that God gave them could not be crushed out today. A people of clean mind and clean heart, with the example of St. Patrick leading them on, they remained staunch and steadfast throughout their tribulations.

MORE ABOUT HOTEL PROJECT FOR ST. JOHN

That general interest has been manifested in the possibility of St. John as a large hotel centre is shown by communications to the St. John Board of Trade recently received from several corporations in the United States interested in hotel promotion. One of these corporations has asked for detailed information with regard to the hotel situation in general, such as possible sites and other information in connection with such a proposition. In furnishing such information a suggestion was made that those interested confer with hotel organizations and transportation interests that have been looking into the matter of building a hotel in this city.

An invitation was extended to them to pay St. John a visit and get a personal idea of the situation. A reply yesterday thanked the board of trade for the information and said they would carry out the suggestion offered and hope to visit St. John very soon.

WOODEN PISTOL SCARES GIRL; THIEF LOOTS BAKE SHOP

Boston, March 17.—While Miss Annie Porter was at work in a Back Bay bake shop last night, a masked man entered the premises and pointed at the girl what she supposed was a pistol. As she fled he looted the cash drawer. In escaping the man dropped the weapon. It was made of wood.

MONTREAL STOCK EXCHANGE.
Montreal, March 17.—The local stock exchange was very quiet during the early trading this morning, and only four of the leaders put in an appearance until the first half hour. 
