Valley Railway Matter Awaits Return of Emissaries Sent By Premier Flemming to Ottawa

Many M. P.'s Now Believed Against Aid Unless Certain Conditions Met

Want Accounting of Money Already Spent, Time Guarantee and Through Connection With G. T. P.—Mayor Home But Silent as to Negotiations—Hydro-Electric Bill is Killed

(Special to Times) Fredericton, March 31—Premier Flemming, has sent I. P. D. Tilley and Hon. Jas. A. Murray to Ottawa to take a few more soundings in regard to the Valley Railway trouble. Nothing will be done here until they return and report. Lieutenant Governor Wood was in Ottawa not long ago, and it is reported that what he learned there was by no means likely to cause him to favor the "frenzied finance" proposal which his government is now trying to make the legislature swallow. When Messrs. Tilley and Murray return there will be another caucus and Mr. Flemming will be able to count the insurgents and the faithful. It is believed that many members of the legislature are stoutly opposed to any further bond guarantee unless the money already spent is accounted for properly, and unless it is shown that the railway can be finished within a reasonable time and that it will be used by the Grand Trunk Pacific to carry through traffic. The attitude of the St. John members, Messrs. Baxter, Lockhart, Tilley and Granman, as well as the members from Kings and Queens, is being watched carefully, as these men may be called upon to choose between the interests of the province on the one hand and Mr. Flemming on the other. No doubt they have been hearing from their constituents. Whatever happens here it is the intention to make every member of the legislature stand on his feet and say where he stands on the proposal to guarantee more bonds for Mr. Gould. Hydro-Electric Bill Killed. The St. John River Hydro-Electric Company's bill was defeated in the commonsense committee today by a vote of twelve to nine. This company, which was promoted by Max McCarty, was incorporated two years ago, but was held up twice—once for a decision at Ottawa and again for a decision of the Waterways Commission. Both decisions were in its favor, but there was, of course, a good deal of delay. The time in which the company should begin operations for the development of power at Medville will expire in April, and they applied for an extension of time. This has been refused. W. H. Harrison, W. A. Ewing and R. B. Hanson appear for the company, whose appeal was successfully opposed by the lumbering and fishing interests and others. Mayor Frank returned at noon today from Fredericton where he went last evening to interview the provincial government regarding the Valley Railway and to present the protest of this city against the granting of additional aid until further information has been given about past expenditures and about the future arrangements. His Worship said that he had nothing to say regarding the negotiations pending something more definite. J. M. Robinson, president of the Board of Trade and D. F. Pidgeon, who were in Fredericton on the same mission, will not return until this evening.

THEY HOPE TO REACH THE SUM THAT WAS AIMED AT Metropole Fund is Now Nearly Up to \$19,000. Committee members are still engaged in collecting for the Metropole fund. T. D. SULLIVAN DEAD

Noted Irishman Who Wrote "God Save Ireland"

M. P. For Years, Lord Mayor of Dublin For Two Terms, Passes Away as Home Rule Hopes Seem About to be Realized

(Canadian Press) Dublin, Ireland, March 31—Timothy Sullivan, Irish patriot and author of "God Save Ireland" died here today, in his 87th year. Timothy D. Sullivan, who was a newspaper man by profession, was a native of Bantley, County Cork. He was one of the most prominent agitators in favor of home rule for Ireland at the time when the late Charles Stewart Parnell was in his prime. For twenty years he was a Nationalist member of the House of Commons, and for two years in succession—1886 and 1887—was Lord Mayor of Dublin.

MAN OF THE ANTARCTIC WEDES IN AUSTRALIA

Mawson and Sweetheart Had Carried on Correspondence by Wireless

(Canadian Press) New York, March 31—A cable to the Sun from Melbourne says: "Doctor Douglas Mawson, Antarctic explorer, who has just returned after a trip during which his two companions lost their lives, and made his way back to the base after thirty days of suffering in the Antarctic, was married today to Miss Debra, daughter of a mine owner. "They became engaged in 1911, when Miss Debra was nineteen years old, before Doctor Mawson started on his expedition. They exchanged love messages by wireless while the doctor was in the Antarctic. Doctor Mawson was born in Bradford England in 1862. He holds the position of lecturer in geology in the University of Adelaide.

HANNA KILLS TEMPERANCE BILL IN ONTARIO HOUSE

Provincial Treasurer Puts Veto on The Woman's Vote Measure

Toronto, March 31—Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary, killed the second reading of a bill introduced in the Ontario legislature last night by W. McDonald of Centre Brant, to close the bars on Saturday afternoons and all legal holidays. The provincial secretary declared the government was keeping pace with the minds of the people on Temperance legislation. The bill introduced some time ago by J. C. Elliott of West Middlesex, to extend the municipal franchise to married women possessing the necessary property qualifications, was "scotched" by the provincial treasurer. He said he believed the majority of women in this province did not want the franchise.

STOLE TO HELP PREACHER WHO WAS UNDERPAID

Edmonton Girl Remanded For Sentence After Plea of Guilty

Edmonton, March 31—Lula Chamberlain, charged with stealing a check for \$119 and \$80 in cash, declared in court that it was her love for an underpaid minister of the gospel, who was in need of money, that led her to commit theft. She pleaded guilty to the charge and Judge Taylor remanded her for sentence. She alleges she gave \$26 to the minister to assist him in his financial difficulties and later gave him \$25 more. The balance she said she tendered to the Beulah Mission.

ATHENA IN PORT

The steamer Athena, of the Donaldson Line, arrived in port this morning about nine o'clock from Glasgow and docked soon after noon at No. 3 berth, Sand Point. The Athena left Glasgow on March 21 and experienced only the ordinary spring weather, with the exception of a few days in the early part of the trip. There were 117 cabin and 154 steerage passengers and a full cargo of general freight, including about 1,000 tons of hard coal and four horses, four stallions and one filly. Among the cabin passengers were Dr. W. Thomas, of the Donaldson Line, who was accompanied by Mrs. Thomas and son, D. F. Thomas, and Mrs. Charles Williamson, daughter of Sir Charles Crawford. The passengers will leave by special train this afternoon. They are nearly all destined for the west and are a sturdy looking lot of settlers.

Ready To See Empire Wrecked

Dr. Roberts Will Not Run; Mr. Pidgeon's Decision is Deferred

The choice for mayor for the next term is narrowing down. Dr. W. F. Roberts announced today that he would not be a candidate for the office despite the urgent solicitation of many friends who have called upon him with the request that he should offer. He said this afternoon that, although he was willing to do his share if his friends thought he was the man for the position, he felt that he could not give the work the time that its importance demands, and that, under the circumstances, he did not feel justified in standing for election. D. F. Pidgeon is in Fredericton today and will not announce his decision until tomorrow.

Fight To The Last Is Huerta's Order To Torreon Defender

Armistice Arranged to Discuss Surrender is One Story Today—Another is That Federal Commander Was For Time Driven Insane

(Canadian Press) Mexico City, March 31—An armistice has halted the bloody battle of Torreon, according to reports current at Constitutional headquarters early today. General Carranza, the federal commander in the beleaguered city, is said to be negotiating with Villa for surrender of the town. Both reports were partially confirmed by officers close to Provisional President Carranza, who said that Carranza had received a dispatch from Villa late last night, in which the rebel commander-in-chief, had put the entire matter up to his superior, to decide whether the terms suggested by Villa should be granted or not. Carranza sent a long reply to Villa this morning, but the instructions that he received from the Provisional President, while holding the greater part of Torreon, has been unable to penetrate into the main plaza, where Velasco had gathered his best troops and concentrated his artillery to sweep every avenue of approach. Another strong point held by the rebels were two curbs in the western part of the city. These lie in a basin which is of great strategic advantage, the only entrance being easily defended by machine guns. Villa suffered serious losses in an attempt to capture this strategic point on Monday. The federal allowed the rebels to penetrate the entrance in large numbers before the artillery fire opened.

EXPECT VICTORY FOR WILSON TODAY BY SEVENTY-FIVE VOTES

Washington, D. C., March 31—As the hour approached today for the taking of the final vote upon the Sims bill, providing for the repeal of the provision of the Panama Canal Act exempting American coastwise vessels from payment of tolls, the administration leaders in the house were more confident than ever of victory by a substantial margin. They declared every indication pointed to show the bill would pass by a majority of at least seventy-five. The greatest source of disappointment has been in recent years jammed the gates to hear the final debate. People had been waiting in line for hours. Speaker Clark, closing the debate against the repeal disappointed those who expected him to attack President Wilson. He declined any personal issue with the president and declared he believed Mr. Wilson actuated by the highest patriotic motives and said that there was no breach in the Democratic party.

THINK POISON IN COLORING OF CANDY KILLED CHILD

David William, Ont., March 31—Thelma Davidson, seven-year-old daughter of Andrew Davidson, a C. P. R. blacksmith, died last night from effects of eating candy thought to have been colored with poisonous substance. The girl was taken sick in school and lived only four days. Rev. Louis Duval of this city, who has been engaged in mission work for the Baptist Church in Africa and who has been home on furlough for the last year, will leave this week to return to his mission field. He will sail on Thursday on the Donaldson line steamer Saturnia for Glasgow and thence to Africa. He will be accompanied by Mrs. Duval. During the last few months Mr. Duval has been in the southern states lecturing on missions.

STEAMER ASHORE

Hamburg, March 31—The German Lloyd's office today received a dispatch saying that the Levant Liner Tenebris has gone ashore near Euboea on the Grecian Peninsula. The position of the ship is dangerous and a big hole has been cut in her side.

STRIKE OF NEARLY MILLION MEN THREATENS ENGLAND; MANY NOW OUT

London, March 31—England now faces a strike of almost a million workmen. A great strike of cotton and 150,000 more declare they will strike this week, unless their demand for a scale of minimum wages is granted. A great strike of workers on the London subway and street cars, many of them skilled electricians, is fixed for Wednesday, unless an agreement is reached. In any event, it is believed, the city's lighting is not endangered. A great strike of 4,000 mill employees in 1911 will expire soon and their leader swears that certain grievances must be remedied. Ten thousand more men are to be called out in the building trade strike.

Astounding Statement By Lieutenant of Carson

ANYTHING RATHER THAN HOME RULE

F. E. Smith Goes Furthest Yet in Declaration in Commons—Sir Edward Grey Leading The House—Talk of Resignation of Paget

(Canadian Press) London, Eng., March 30—In the House of Commons last night, F. E. Smith, one of the chief supporters of Sir Edward Carson, endeavored to take up the pre-arranged plan of the opposition to attack the government on the army question, but the speech fell flat under the new conditions. The only striking sentence declared that the Unionists were prepared to go to all lengths, even the dismemberment of the empire, rather than see home rule forced on Ulster. He said: "Whatever the consequences, Civil War, or any other catastrophe that might befall the Empire, the Unionists would support Ulster, whatever the consequences might be." This is the first time anyone has gone to such lengths, and the government papers seized the opportunity for long articles. "The Evening News" even goes to the length of saying that the cry of "the army or the people" is raised to hide the failure of the insurance act. "The Radicals, however, refused to be turned aside and 'The Star' yesterday, taking on the text of the most imprudent article of the Conservative 'Sunday Times' alleging to give the details of the interference of the king, has a column editorial denouncing the alleged action. It seems impossible that the government can hold on much longer, but it seems equally certain that the opposition will fall in the pit that they dugged for themselves, and that the campaign will be chiefly fought on the question of whether parliament, the king, or the army is to rule, with the election outlook much better for the government than a fortnight ago. Grey Leads The House. London, March 31—In the most momentous political struggle that England has known in a century, the Liberal government today resumed its fight for home rule, when the bill granting autonomy to Ireland, was called up in the House of Commons for its second reading. The firm hand of Mr. Asquith was missing but Sir Edward Grey was in charge of the government's affairs. Mr. Asquith called at the War Office during the morning, and held a conference of several hours with Colonel Seely. Later the premier conferred with Sir Edward Grey on the course to be pursued in parliament. The latest resignation expected in the complicated political situation is that of Viscount Morley, Lord President of the Council, who will probably be forced from public life as a result of the army matter. Lord Morley is accused of misrepresenting the cabinet's policy in regard to army officers in Ireland, although he is not accused of doing so with irregular intent. It was reported that Sir Arthur Paget, commander-in-chief in Ireland, resigned declarations of the Liberals in regard to the controversy over the "people versus the army," has either resigned or is contemplating resignation. The resignations of French and Ewart are still in the hands of the cabinet. Although the illness of Hon. David Lloyd George is reported to be a serious nature, a London specialist named Doctor Walton has been called in to attend him. It is said that the chancellor has completely lost his voice. He has postponed his immediate engagements. Anti-Home Rule Fund. London, March 31—Hon. Herbert C. Gibbs, a partner in the firm of Antony Gibbs & Sons, appealed through the Times on March 29, for subscriptions for an Ulster defence fund as an offset to the Bradford speech of Hon. Winston Churchill. Mr. Gibbs now announces that he has received more than \$500,000 and says: "The active sympathy thus shown has done much to counteract the provocative effect of the deeds and speeches of cabinet ministers." THE STEAMERS

Last Midnight the Donaldson steamer Cassandria was reported 80 miles east of Cape Race on her way from St. John to Glasgow. Allan Liner Alsatian, from Halifax to Liverpool, was moving at 230 o'clock. The Bray Head is out twenty-one days from Ardrossan and the Manchester Mariner is already sixteen days on her voyage from Manchester. Furness Liner Shenandoah, from London for St. John, is due at Halifax. R. M. S. Virginian, of the Allan Line, is due to sail tomorrow afternoon about 3 o'clock with passengers, mail and cargo. Allan Liner Corinthian left Havre for St. John on last Friday night. C. P. R. steamer Empress of Asia arrived at Yokohama today.

TURBINE INSTALLED

Work has been about completed on the installation of a big new high pressure steam turbine which has been placed in the power house of the St. John Railway Company in Union street. The turbine will be a valuable addition for power purposes, being capable of between 2,000 and 4,000 horse power. The turbine has been installed by the Canadian General Electric Co.

Sponge Cake

One cup sugar, 2 eggs, beaten until cream-colored, cream, salt, and 4 tablespoons (not teaspoons) cold water; beat again; sift together 1 1/2 cups flour (I use bread flour) and two teaspoons baking powder. Beat well; add 1 teaspoon vanilla.

Lemon Pie

The grated rind and juice of one lemon, the yolks of two eggs, three heaping tablespoons cornstarch and one cup each of sugar and water. Stir all together, then boil in a double boiler until it thickens. Line a pie plate with paste and bake. Then pour in the above mixture. Beat the two whites until stiff adding a little sugar. Spread over the pie, set in the oven a few minutes to brown.

SHOW ANIMOSITY TO MISS DOROTHY MacVANE

St. John Has Interest in Case Being Heard in Italian Court

Says a despatch from the Taranto Italy—Innocent Ciccia, a newspaper writer, who is accused of trying to blackmail Dorothy MacVane, an American singer, who is a daughter of the late President Marcus MacVane, of Harvard, was placed on trial here today. Ciccia was defended by three prominent lawyers and had twenty-six witnesses in the court, which was crowded with sympathizers with the prisoner. These people demonstrated their animosity to Miss MacVane by shaking their fists at her and making other demonstrations.

Miss MacVane was closely cross-examined especially in regard to her alleged spying on Italian fortifications. At the conclusion of her cross-examination, Miss MacVane asked for an adjournment to enable her to engage a lawyer and to summon witnesses on her behalf. The judge refused to adjourn the case.

Several witnesses testified in favor of Ciccia, after which the hearing was adjourned until tomorrow. Miss MacVane says she will not attend tomorrow's session unless she is represented by her lawyers. She declares the evidence presented is a slanderous "frame-up." She

FATHER OF 35 CHILDREN.

German Tailor Has Six of His Sons in the Kaiser's Service.

Berlin, March 31.—Ferdinand Egliniski, aged 33, a tailor in the village of Ahlbeck, on the Baltic, says he is Germany's champion father. The Tageblatt is publishing a story of his life. It relates his successive marriages with two sisters resulting in the birth of thirty-five children—nineteen boys and seven girls. Last year six of Egliniski's sons were serving simultaneously in the army.

The tailor married when he was twenty years old. His first wife, who died in 1867, bore him twenty-four children. In 1868 he married his deceased wife's sister, who has borne him eleven off-

spring during the intervening six years.

Triplets came on one occasion and twins were born twice. On the occasion of the entry of his sixth son in the army in 1912 Egliniski received a private audience with the Kaiser, who ordered him to be entertained in Berlin at His Majesty's expense for a week and gave him a fifty mark note.

Egliniski has become a celebrity and adds handsomely to the income from his tailor shop by selling picture post cards of himself.

FROM BONEYARD OF C.P.R. TO BE I.C.R. MANAGER

F. B. Carvell, in Commons, Gives Sketch of Career of 800,000 Mr. Gutelius

In his address in parliament the other day, Mr. F. B. Carvell gave the following instructive sketch of the career of Mr. F. P. Gutelius:—

He is an engineer who was, I understand, originally a United States citizen. I am not saying anything against the patriotism of his citizenship, because if he possesses the proper engineering qualities, he is qualified to pass judgment on the work of the late government and the late commission. He came to this country ten or twelve years ago, and shortly after coming here was employed by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company to do a certain amount of work in the West. When that work was finished, this gentleman was taken to the head office in Montreal and placed in a position of some responsibility, I admit. I understand he was assistant to the chief engineer. That chief engineer resigned and went back to the United States, but Mr. Gutelius was not promoted to the vacancy. Another man was appointed, and Mr. Gutelius still remained in his old position. That man retired, and still Mr. Gutelius was not promoted. After remaining in the office in Montreal for some time, with no experience whatever in field work, classification or construction work, he was sent to North Bay in the operating department, and made division superintendent in a road which was completed twenty-five years ago. All he had to do was to report on what went on from day to day, and month to month, a position which has frequently been referred to as the bone-yard by engineers and railway employees of that great company. For some strange reason not made public, this is the gentleman whom my hon. friend the Minister of Railways took up out of the woods around North Bay and brought down here, not only to blacken, if possible, the character of the late government, but to make a report which has done Canada more harm and will do Canada more harm than this government could do good in ten years.

WHAT WILL THEY DO?

The statements made by Commissioner McLellan at yesterday's meeting of the city council make it all the more necessary that the people of the province should be given the fullest information concerning the affairs of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company and its relations with the provincial government. How much money has the company received? Where has it gone? Why has it cost more to build the east-end portion of the line than it was anticipated would complete the whole work? What are the relations between the government and the contractors and between contractors and officials? What guarantee is there that if the aid now asked for is given there will not be another raid on the provincial treasury year or two hence? Will the road reach St. John by the Robitaille route? When will it be completed?

WHERE IS MR. HAZEN?

In view of the present discussion of railway matters in St. John and throughout the province, an extract from the speech of Mr. F. B. Carvell in the House of Commons on Wednesday last is of very special interest. Mr. Carvell pointed out that the people of New Brunswick were led to believe that the city of St. John would be one of the terminals of the Grand Trunk Pacific, connection being made with St. John over the Valley Railway. Mr. Carvell further pointed out that the present Valley Railway, which he described as a tramway, does not go within twenty-five miles of the Grand Trunk Pacific, nor does it go to St. John, and in his belief the tory government never intended that it should come here, but that it should run from Andover on the Canadian Pacific at one end to Westfield on the Canadian Pacific at the other. Continuing Mr. Carvell said:

"Years have gone by, and not a finger has been lifted to give St. John access to this great work. We are paying our share and getting no benefit, and as far as I can see years more will go by and we will not have any chance of participating in the benefits. I wish that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries (Mr. Hazen) were here tonight. I hope that before the debate concludes he will take the people of New Brunswick into his confidence and tell them what he is doing and what he hopes to do in order to give his own city connection with this work, and put the people of that city in a position to receive their portion of the benefits which they have fondly hoped they would receive from the expenditure of millions on this great project. He is not here; I am afraid he will be as usual on this question as he was during the debate in this House on the famous Gutelius agreement by which our rightful freight business is carried by Mr. Gutelius, for one-half what it actually costs to transport it, away to Halifax. The hon. minister was very anxious to have a chance to talk about it, so anxious that he got the Minister of Public Works to adjourn the debate in order that he might discuss it later on. The resolution went to the bone pile and is there yet; it has never been called up and never will be. The minister has not had an opportunity to discuss it, he never will, and I am afraid he will be quite as silent in this debate as he has been on all other matters referring to his own city, his own constituency, and our great commercial port. These things are not in the report, but they are of great importance to all the electors of New Brunswick, and of more special importance to the electors of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries than all of this put together."

ASQUITH'S BOLD STROKE

By a bold stroke Premier Asquith has again changed the complexion of affairs in the British parliament. He has himself assumed the burden of the war of office, as a guarantee to the Liberal party and the country at large that the civil

power shall prevail, and that there is to be no military dictatorship. His action has restored harmony, and rallied to the government's support the strength of the Laborites as well as of the Liberal party; while the Unionists regard with dismay the prospect of a campaign in which Parliament versus the Army might be the rallying cry. The Unionists are now reaping the results of their tampering with the army, and some of them have quite lost their heads and are rushing to extremes. Thus, Mr. F. E. Smith, who is one of the chief supporters of Sir Edward Carson, in a speech in the house last night said:

"Whatever the consequences, civil war or any other calamity that might dismember the whole Empire, the Unionist party would support Ulster whatever the consequence might be." If this is not treason, what is it? Surely the party whose boast it has been for years that it stood for loyalty to the king and constitution has fallen from its high estate. One of its leading members asserts that he is prepared, and his party is prepared, to rebel against the expressed wishes of the people of the United Kingdom, rather than have a policy which has been endorsed more than once by the majority of the people not only in Ireland, but in England, Scotland and Wales, carried into effect. The position of the government is made stronger by the conduct of such opponents as Mr. F. E. Smith. The crisis in parliament has been met by the prime minister with consummate statesmanship, and despite the resignation of Col. Seely, Sir John French and Sir John Ewart, the atmosphere today is very much clearer than it was at the end of last week.

A bill to close hotel bars on Saturday afternoon and on all legal holidays was defeated in the Ontario legislature yesterday at the instance of Hon. W. J. Hanna, who said that the government was already keeping pace with the minds of the people in the matter of temperance legislation.

The claim that the city council should have control of the expenditure on schools would be endorsed by the majority of the people in St. John if they were given an opportunity to vote on the question. This fact, however, is in no sense an argument against the introduction of the kindergarten as a part of the common school system. The curriculum is one thing and the finances another.

The Standard this morning made no reference whatever to Valley Railway affairs, the speech of Commissioner McLellan on that subject yesterday, or the fitting back and forth of analogous politicians between St. John, Fredericton and Ottawa. The Standard, however, used big type to tell its readers that there was "ignorance, misrepresentation and fraud" in connection with the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. That's some consolation.

It was announced yesterday that the Borden government had appointed Mr. R. A. Pringle, K. C., ex-M. P., to investigate the charges made by Mr. F. B. Carvell in relation to the Southampton Railway. Mr. F. B. Carvell, M. P., will now have an opportunity to give fuller information concerning the "padding items and other irregularities." If Mr. Pringle conducts a real investigation, some very interesting evidence should be brought to light.

Representatives of the St. John city council and board of trade who discuss Valley Railway matters with the provincial government should be extremely careful before committing themselves to the support of any proposition which does not ensure the completion of the railway to Grand Falls as well as to St. John. The government was originally pledged to this policy, and should not be permitted to vary the original plan. Whatever is done should be done in the open, so that all the people may have an opportunity to pass judgment upon the merits of the proposition; and those who represent the interests of St. John should hold themselves free to condemn any arrangement which would fail to do justice to the city and province.

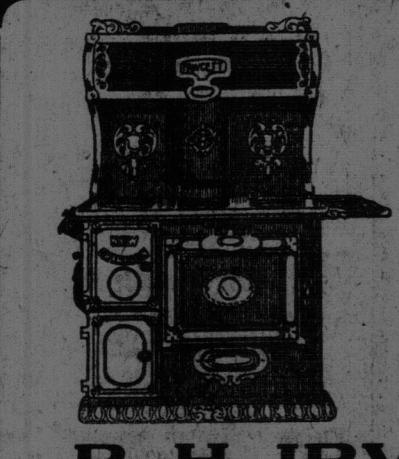

HON. MR. PUGSLEY WILL TRY TO SECURE FACTS

To Bring up Cautious Matter in Parliament—Valley Railway Affair a Bungle. (Daily Telegraph). Just before leaving for Ottawa last evening Hon. Mr. Pugsley told a Telegraph reporter that the Gutelius agreement would again be discussed in the House, probably during the present week. He introduced the subject himself at the earliest possible opportunity, and hopes to be able to secure more information than has yet been brought to light, with the object of preventing the renewal of the agreement for another year.

Mr. Pugsley came to the city on Sunday, owing to a slight illness of Mrs. Pugsley. Speaking of the situation in the house, previous to his departure last night, Dr. Pugsley said that the debate on the National Transcontinental report would probably continue until Wednesday, when he thought the vote would be taken. He made reference to the masterful speech of Hon. Mr. Graham in the house a few days ago, and other Liberal members who followed him proving the partisan nature of the report. Dr. Pugsley said that the Gutelius-Bowworth affair could not possibly be brought up until the N. T. R. report had been settled.

"What a bungle is being made of the Valley railway," said Dr. Pugsley. "No matter what is done, the people of the province will have a heavy financial burden to shoulder. The crisis," he said, "is lamentable."

DEMAND AN INVESTIGATION

Common Council Want The Full Facts

VALLEY RAILWAY DISCUSSED

Inquiry by Royal Commission Before Further Aid Granted—The McAvity Bill—Boxing Exhibitions Wanted—The Free Kindergartens

Commissioner McLellan found instant and unanimous support in his stand at the common council meeting yesterday afternoon for a careful investigation by the government into the financing and building of the St. John Valley railway.

He requested that the full facts be made known to the public, and that the charges of graft against those in authority, including members of the government, be exposed by Commissioner Schofield, while Commissioners Agar and Wigmore also came out in favor of the facts being put before the public.

Commissioner Schofield said that he too had heard the same disturbing rumors as Commissioner McLellan, and thought they would stand careful investigation. He was of the opinion that an investigation as suggested by Commissioner McLellan should be made before any further action was taken.

Commissioner Agar, although of the opinion that Commissioner McLellan was a little severe in places, agreed that his observations were well timed and he was heartily in favor of having the whole matter investigated. He said, "It looks like bad business. There is something wrong somewhere. Let the people know where it is before their financial resources are taxed to their utmost."

He believes that the premises will, or at least he should, take the people into his confidence and tell them how this matter stands, said Commissioner Wigmore. He said he heard the rumblings and agreed with Commissioner McLellan that the thing should not be hurried through the legislature, but that the charges should be investigated, even if the building of the road is delayed for a short time.

The mayor said he was going to Fredericton to get what information he could, keeping in mind the principle of providing for G. T. P. connection.

As for the rumors of financial troubles and graft I know nothing, I have no facts to go on, said Commissioner McLellan's statement, although I have some information on the subject in my reference to my relations with the federal government and their reported effect on the action of the common council in this matter."

McAvity Bill. Some final touches to the bill authorizing the fixed assessment on the new McAvity plant were added yesterday's meeting of the common council with the understanding that the bill should be presented by Recorder Baxter at the session of the legislature last evening.

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Commissioner Schofield recommended that the dispute over rental of oak sheds to Mr. A. G. Dick be adjusted by accepting from Mr. Dick rent from June 15 last and this was adopted.

An invitation to contribute to the funds for a city planning convention under the auspices of the Commission of Conservation at Toronto in May was laid on the table.

A largely signed petition asking for the granting of a license to Daniel Littlejohn for holding boxing exhibitions was referred to the mayor. The first name on the petition was that of James L. Squire, labor candidate for commissioner, and others signing were F. Hyatt, C. G. Langbein and Charles Ledford.

Mrs. Georgina Whitehead wrote informing the council that she would take action for damages if her claim were not acted upon before March 31. The recorder has already reported the city was not liable and the communication was filed.

City Court Bill. A delegation of lawyers consisting of R. G. Murray, H. W. Robertson, H. J. Smith and H. A. Porter asked for the endorsement of the council as a committee to support the bill making changes in the city court procedure and were authorized to go to Fredericton for the purpose.

James Lewis had complained that he was obliged to repair a wharf from which the city drew a revenue but on appearing yesterday he said he had found nothing in his lease which required him to maintain the wharf and he wished the city to look after it. The matter was left with the commissioner of harbors, ferries and public lands.

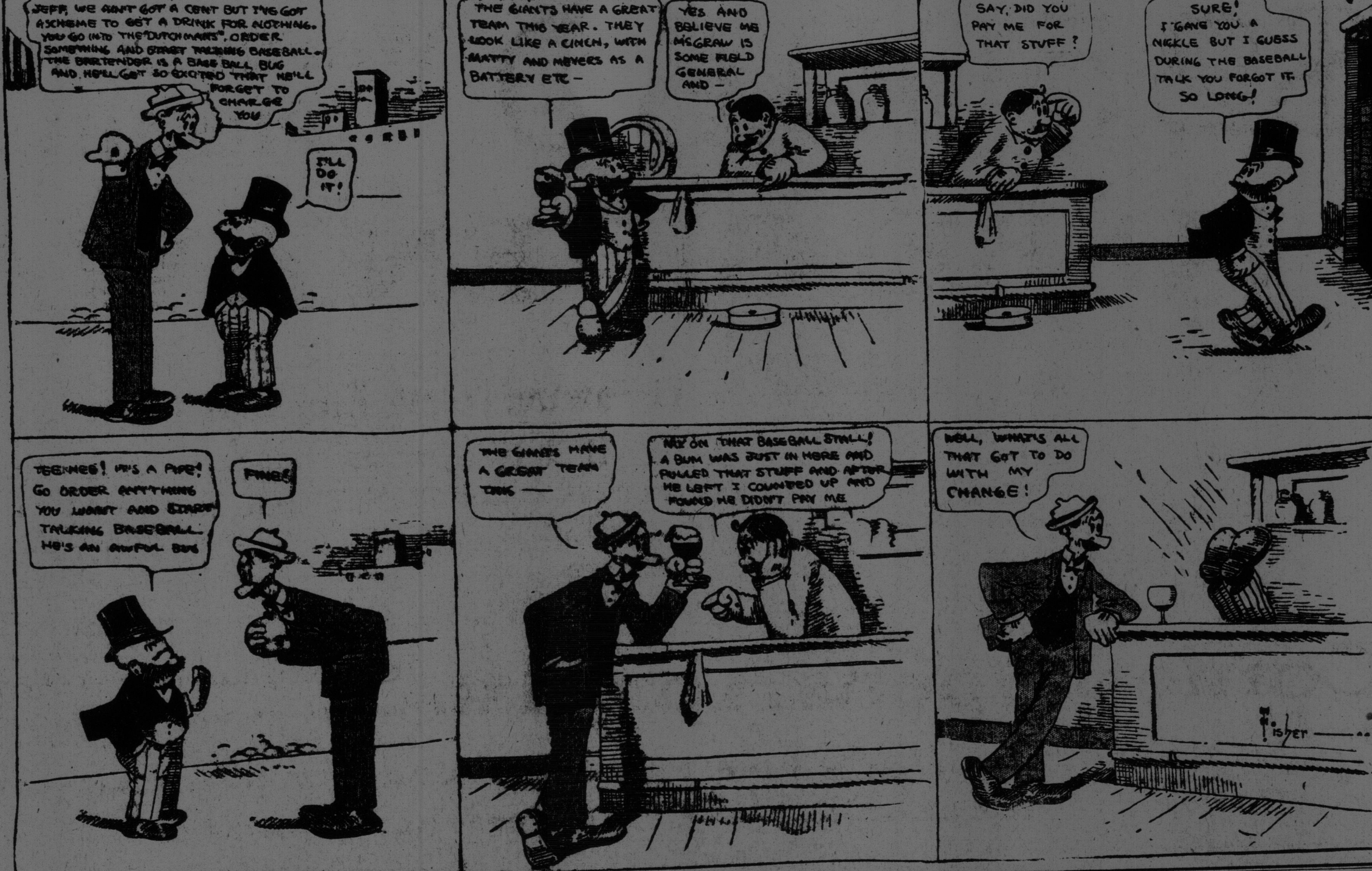

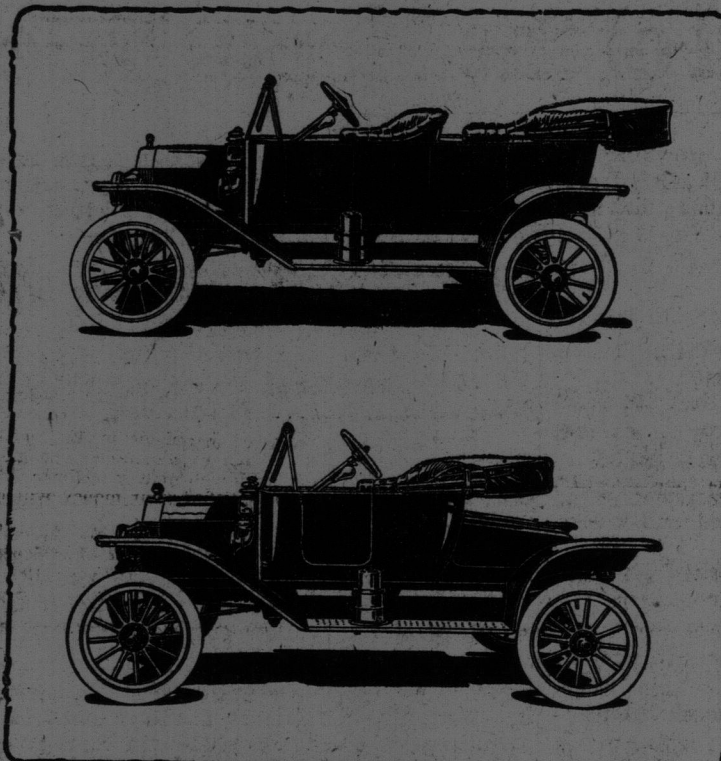

She is survived by four sons and four daughters—Morris, with the Pejepscot Paper Co.; Wilfred, European buyer for Jordan Marsh & Co., Boston; Ellisworth and Clifford, of St. John West; Mrs. M. W. Gillis, of Chicago; Mrs. C. Fleche, of Hartford, Conn.; and Edna and Florence, at home. The funeral will probably be held on Thursday.

TO THE PENITENTIARY FOR THREE YEAR TERM

Judge Borden Sentences Frederick Armstrong, Who Escaped From Jail

Dorchester, N. B., March 31.—At a special session of the county court today before Judge Borden, of Moncton, the case of the King vs. Fred Armstrong of Moncton, was taken up. Armstrong made a sensational escape from the county jail on October 20 with Fred Legere, who has already been captured and sentenced to the penitentiary. The chase after Armstrong had been on for some months. He was finally captured by Chief of Police McLeod of Sussex on last Saturday. He pleaded "Guilty," and his honor sentenced him to three years in the Dorchester penitentiary.

RECALLS WALLACE ROSS IN THE DAYS WHEN ST. JOHN WAS FAMED IN AQUATICS

Many followers of old-time sport about St. John will be interested in an article printed in the Montreal Star of a few days ago concerning the late Wallace Ross who some thirty years ago was famous in aquatic and other sports. He was a brother of L. R. Ross, I. C. R. terminal agent, and still a resident here when this city was famed for its oarsmen. A picture of Mr. Ross is printed with the following notice in the issue of the "Star" of thirty years ago.

"London—The Daily News, speaking of the recent sculling match between Ross and Babear, says: 'The result is sadly disheartening to all who hoped that in Babear we had found a man who might possibly restore our lost supremacy in the art of sculling. Babear can make no sort of a fight with Ross, and Babear beats all other English scullers easily. What must our scullers be like?' From The Montreal Star, March 27, 1884. The late Wallace Ross was a clean professional Canadian, standing six feet two in height. His racing weight ranged from 170 to 185 pounds. He first came into notice in aquatics on St. John Harbor in 1872, when he defeated a local sculler named Hastings. The next year he won on the same waters the governor-general's silver medal and a money prize of \$5, defeating Alex. Bready, considered an extra good man. He afterwards defeated Plasted on the Kennebec course, and in 1887 beat Warren Smith. The races between Ross and Hanlan were in many ways a disappointment. The backers of Ross for many reasons felt that he should have won.

FAIRVILLE JOYOUS OVER RESUMING OF WORK IN THE MILLS

Better Spring Note Than Even That of the Robin—Last Night's Storm

The robin is generally regarded as the real harbinger of spring, and many people refer to the winter as a thing of the past when they hear the "cheer up" song and watch the red breasts fill by.

But the average wage earner in Fairville, Milford, Randolph, Pleasant Point and the West End generally listen for a different spring note, and when they catch its full intent, things brighten up for their horizon and they say in truth and gladness the winter surely is past. And these particular words they have just heard for from month to year and on again the information has been passed round that the mills will start in the latter part of this week and to many this is a more tuneful spring song than the robin's lay.

True, last summer things went bad, but the winter just over has been even worse from a financial standpoint, and so the men return to the mill season for 1914 with something akin to zeal. Most have a considerable distance to walk from their homes to their cars or even direct to the winter port sheds in West St. John, and relief from that alone is better hours and no night work awakens desire in the millman for his regular employment.

And the merchants too, are talking of the commencing day when J. E. Moore's, Randall & Baker's, Murray & Gregory's, Miller's, Stetson Cutler's mills become hives of industry and the fortnight Saturday pay day follows in natural sequence. The lumber mills are still the great stand by as the news that the start comes this week is of good cheer to many.

Then there is the matter of fuel, a good many householders using wood stoves. Because of the scarcity of wood consequent on the short cut last year, there was not enough to go around and now the demand has reached abnormal proportions altogether. This will be overcome in due course and the wood delivery man is anxious to begin on his list.

Reports from all over the province indicate an unusually heavy cut of logs and if fresh conditions prove satisfactory the coming season should be a long one with plenty of raw material available and willing hands to aid manufacture.

LOCAL DOG FANCIERS BRING IN GOOD ONES

Bench Show Should Be Better Than Ever Because of These Importations

An increased interest is being shown by local dog fanciers in well bred dogs, if one is to judge by the number of thoroughbred importations that have been received in the city during the last few days. At least six high class dogs of different kinds have been purchased by local outside dealers and are now either in the city or on their way here.

A recent arrival from Delavan, Wisconsin, was received by Robert Magee, of Waterloo street, in the shape of a beautiful Irish terrier bitch, named Victoria Countess, nine months old, by Champion Viceroy Demon, ex-Champion Thorncroft Colleen.

An Irish setter bitch, aged one year, was brought here during the month from Blackstone, Virginia. The sire of this dog is the English champion, Morty Oge, which was recently brought to the United States from England, and the dam is Richmond's Roxie, a dog noted for her work in the sporting field. The new setter is called Glencho Green and will likely make her name prominent in the next bench show.

Mrs. LeBaron S. Driscoll, whose Boston terrier, Mike, carried off the non-sporting dog honors at the last N. B. Kennel Club show, but died soon afterwards, has a new Boston terrier which is said to be superior to the former champion. Mrs. Driscoll brought the dog with her on her return from the Eastern states about a week ago. His name is Spider and he is sired by Dailian's Champion Spider ex Corbett's Ruby Queen and is an excellent specimen of the breed.

William McDonald, of the city market, expects a champion bred Irish terrier from England by the next trip of the Royal Edward.

One of the local Pomeranian fanciers has also received recently an excellent bred dog, which will be seen at the next kennel show. Another importation into the toy dog circle of St. John is expected this week in the form of a King Charles English toy spaniel, weighing three and a half pounds, named Glencho Night. It is coming from New York to a local fancier. The sire is Earl of Carrington, which won three prizes at the recent New York show and the dam is Dotty Dimple.

There is a possibility of other high bred dogs being brought here in the near future.

Robert Magee has also imported from Swanton, Ohio, a smooth fox terrier bitch, three years old, named "Midge." She is a splendid dog and comes from high lineage, being by Melode Spendthrift ex Nola Banjo. H. Mont Jones has just received a first class Boston terrier bitch from Amherst. It is being greatly admired by local fanciers.
