There is positively no doubt that the exclusion act will become law as there are plenty of votes to pass it over a possible Presidential vote. The administration has not been in favor of Japanese exclusion. Secretary Hughes has steadily voiced that opinion.

By an overwhelming vote—an almost unanimous vote—the Senate told Japan to mind her own affairs—told her that the question of immigration was one in which the United States could brook neither interference, advice, nor suggestion from any power on earth, and decided to throw into the discard the "gentlemen's agreement," under which Japanese have been allowed to come into this country for some years past. The vote was 76 to 2, only Sterling of South Dakota and Colt of Ithode Island voting to retain the "gentlemen's agreement."







N. B. LUMBERMEN ORGANIZE FOR "SAFETY FIRST"

The newly organized "New Brunswick Lumbermen's Safety Association" has made public the following:—

"The assessments against the lumbering industry in this province for workmen's compensation have reached such large, proportions that the annual assessments have become a very heavy charge on the industry.

"These assessments are based on the number of accidents and the cousequent amount of money paid out for claims and medical fees.

"To reduce these the entire lumbering industry of the province has become organized as the "New Brunswick Lumbermen's Safety Association," with F. C. Beatteay, vice-president and general manager of the Stetson, Cutler company as president and W. E. Anderson, the well-known insurance agent and broker, as secretary.

"Mr. Anderson's extensive- experience in handling workmen's compensation insurance when that business was being carried in this province by the insurance companies put him in possession of just the knowledge required to assist mill owners and operators in reducing accidents and claim costs.

"The lumbering industry as a group realize that if it is to remain in business something must be done to cut down the present very large financial outlay they are obliged to make for workmen's compensation, and the purpose of the Safety Association will be to work in close co-operation with the Workmen's Compensation Board and the factory inspector in a determined effort to reduce the number of accidents to employes in the lumbering industry."

Mr. Richards opposed Scully said he felt he must vote for the right of the minority, and Mr. Scovil opposed because he felt the bill should be held over and made more acceptable. The opponents were careful to explain they were not opposed to church union, but to parts of this particular bill. Mr. Estabrooks said he felt that he could not vote either for or against the bill. The vote in favor of the bill was so large that no division was called for by its opponents.

Amendments Withdrawn

J. M. Flewelling moved an amendment, which was seconded by Mr. Vanderbeck, that further consideration of the bill be deferred until after the passage of the bill before the Dominion Parliament. This was voted down by a vote fo 25 to 16.
