## FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HAVEN AND PRISON GATE MISSION.

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The Committee of the Haven and Prison Gate Mission have much pleasure in presenting to the public a report of the work of the past year, and desire to express their deep gratitude to God for help afforded, encouragement given, and prayers answered in the efforts for our erring sisters.

Whatever of blessing or success has come, we gladly ascribe it to Him who has promised to direct the paths of those who acknowledge Him, and give wisdom to those who lack.

### THE NEW BUILDING.

As was mentioned in last year's report, the old building formerly occupied having been condemned by the Health Officer as being neither safe nor sanitary, was moved away and a new wing commenced early last spring, under the direction of Mr. D. B. Dick, architect, and is at this writing near completion. The added accommodation will be 24 dormitories, pleasant nursery, with Board room, Superintendent's office, etc., with first-class facilities for carrying on the laundry work, which the Management purpose to make a source of increased revenue.

### THE SPIRITUAL WORK,

which we deem most important, has been, as in former years, very faithfully carried on. Ven. Archdeacon Boddy has for many years past held an afternoon service on Tuesday; Messrs. W. H. Howland, Stack, McCarter, Brase, Bone, Dr. Moffat, W. Kerr, Best, Harvey and Rev. J. Hunt. Mr. Sampson's Bible class has been very helpful and interesting. The lady helpers are, Mrs. Smith, and Mrs. (Dr.) McFall, also Mrs. J. B. Willmott, Miss McGuffin, and other members of Metropolitan Epworth League; Misses Sweetman, Parker, Hastings, Winters, Millen, Morton, Cullen, Hamilton, and others.

The Committee feel themselves deeply indebted to this noble class of earnest Christian workers for services given in the spiritual welfare of the inmates of the Haven, for assistance in this most important of all labors, and who, though they may not see immediate results, yet by faith continue to sow the "good seed," believing that "the Word shall not return void, but shall accomplish that whereunto it is sent."

## "THEY CEASE FROM LABOR."

Death has taken from us, during the past year, some who have for many years rendered very valuable aid and counsel. Rev. Charles Sylvester, who for thirteen years held services for the inmates of the Haven, was called to his reward in midsummer last.

Our dearly loved Honorary President, Mrs. Clarke Gamble, after a protracted and painful illness was released, and "went home"; also Mrs. Wm. Greey, our true friend and wise counsellor, on May 4th, 1893, "entered into life immortal. These dear ones all "rest from their labors and their works do follow them."

## CHANGE OF SUPERINTENDENT.

A change occurred in the resident management of the Haven during the year. In May last, Mrs. Moore, so well-known, and highly esteemed, who had been for sixteen years Superintendent and faithful co-worker with the Haven Committee, tendered her resignation. It was indeed difficult to fill the vacancy made by the departure of one so efficient, and so dearly loved, but, though the workers cease, the work of God shall go on, and in His good providence Miss C. B. Sanderson, of Peterboro', was sent to us, a lady of deep piety and broad experience, who has already endeared herself to Committee, matrons and inmates; who by her ability as writer and speaker, as well as her power to govern, shows herself a Christian lady eminently suited to all the needs and demands of this trying work.

## EFFECT OF HARD TIMES.

There are no specially new features in our work, save that the scarcity of labor in our city, and the continued hard times, have caused much distress among the poorer classes, and have sent to our door many wives with their little ones, because the father, the bread-winner, weary with seeking work and finding none here, had gone to other cities or towns for employment, and as there was no money to pay rent, the home was broken up; in consequence of which the Haven has been full during the entire year, and the expenses above the average.

What means are used to help? It may be asked what means are used toward the reformation and placing on a more hopeful plane the great variety of unfortunate and vicious women? Namely, four methods are as far as possible brought to bear upon them. 1st, Kindness to them and sympathy with them in their troubles. 2nd, The influences of home life. 3rd, Regular and steady employment. 4th, Religious instruction and services. No curious questions regarding previous life or conduct are asked, but by flexible rules suited to each particular case we aim to arouse self-respect and natural affection toward those who stand closest to them by the ties of nature—toward the mother whose heart is broken over her daughter's waywardness; the sister who has been made to blush

for sins not her own; the father who, years ago looking into her rosy, innocent face, rejoiced as he thought her the purest and fairest among daughters; the brother, playmate of her early years. Thus in many cases reconciliation with the old home circle is brought about, and the prodigal daughter returns to her father's house. True, all who come to us do not have the memory of a pure, happy childhood and family fireside. Some poor ones have been cast out so early in life that they have no clean, sweet visions of such a childhood and its innocent joys; the offspring of vice and lust, theft and avarice, their first teaching and thoughts were to protect self from all the world, whom they look upon as enemies. "Their hand is against every man, and every man's hand against them." God pity all who come into life with such fearful weight of ancestral guilt! Who, with a natural aversion to labor, look upon their fellow-creatures as lawful prey, and feel that because they are in the world the world owes them a living, without the effort to earn that living. We call such the "fallen." But who are the fallen? Who can say "I have not sinned?" The blessed language of inspiration is, "God hath concluded all in unbelief that He might have mercy upon all." This is the hope out of despair for every son and daughter of Adam. For every daughter? Are there not some so fallen, so degraded, that they can never be saved? As the voice of an angel, the gracious answer still comes from Heaven, "Mercy for all."

#### MATERNITY CASES.

The rule under which maternity cases are admitted is more stringent. Those coming from a distance must have \$6.10 to pay their hospital fee and \$1.50 per week for board. If this is not possible, the Secretary or Superintendent corresponds with some responsible person in the place from whence she comes for the needed help. Should this fail, she must return to her own municipality. No cases are ever kept in secrecy, but always, and in every case, some member of the girl's family is communicated with, so that in case of accident or death no responsibility or blame can attach to the Christian women who seek to redeem the soul and future of these unfortunate ones. Indigent city cases can procure a pass from the City Physician to the Maternity Hospital, but in every case the maternal obligations must be kept by entering and remaining in the Infant's Home until the child is weaned, unless a home is offered by friends for herself and baby.

#### MANY KINDS OF PEOPLE.

Although our work is principally for two classes, yet the two by no means cover the entire work. The various Institutions of the city take each a special class of work, but the inmates of the Haven cannot, strictly speaking, be classified (although in a general and moral way they are so), so great is the variety of circumstances and individual character.

However, the following list will give an approximate idea of the classes received in this Institution :—

- 1st. Women discharged from jail.
- 2nd. Women from Mercer Reformatory.
- 3rd. Women and girls discharged from Police Court.
- 4th. Patients for Maternity Hospital.
- 5th. Patients for General Hospital.
- 6th. Patients discharged from General Hospital.
- 7th. Mothers not eligible to Infants Home.
- 8th. Women unprotected and unprovided for.
- 9th. Servants out of situations (former inmates).
- 10th. Inmates of disreputable houses.

#### SUPPORT OF THE INSTITUTION.

The Management desire to express their gratitude to the Ontario Legislature and Toronto City Council, for annual grants toward the support of the Institution. About \$100 was added to our treasury last spring, by an "At Home" given by Mrs. George A. Cox, in her elegant and hospitable mansion on Sherbourne St. To our good friend and legal adviser, Hon. S. H. Blake, we owe much, both for service and advice. To Messrs. Gordon & Sampson, for arranging and securing of the loan for building. To Mr. A. Mackenzie, for very valuable service, *re* the Incorporation of the Institution; also to Mayor Fleming, Aids. Saunders and Lamb, Treas. Coady and Health Officers Allan and Sheard. To Mr. George A. Cox and Mr. H. A. Massey, for help and advice in adjusting financial matters in connection with the new building.

The Institution having been incorporated during the past year, the Board of Trustees are no longer necessary; these gentlemen now stand as the Advisory Board of the Haven and Prison Gate Mission.

#### THE CITY PAPERS

have been most kind and obliging in bringing our work and needs to the notice of the public from time to time, and have our thanks. Our thanks are due to the U. C. B. S. for a liberal donation of Bibles, per Mr. John Harvie; and to Brown Bros., for blank book and secretary's supplies.

To Messrs. Dudley & Burns we are much indebted for excellent work done at reduced rates.

The thanks of the Committee are hereby tendered to Mr. Charles Builder, for the auditing of Treasurer's statement from year to year.

#### TO OUR PHYSICIANS,

Dr. Stowe Gullen and Dr. Irving Cameron, both of whom are ever ready to respond to cases needing their attention, we are deeply indebted.



We call special attention to the table of Government statistics, so well and carefully kept by Miss Fitzsimmons, who is the capable housekeeper of the Haven.

Mrs. Canfield, Matron of the Prison Gate work, has proved herself in every way suited for the responsible and trying position of managing the class of persons who are for the most part engaged in the laundry work; and Miss Buck, who is in charge of the Sewing Room, has been most faithful in all committed to her care.

A fuller account of the industries, viz.: the sewing and laundry, will be found elsewhere in this report. We ask of the friends of the Institution, and the public generally, liberal patronage in one of the most important of all means for the reformation of the erring, viz.: steady employment; also, aid given in this way, will enable the work to be more nearly self-sustaining, and thus become less a tax on the community; and to those who stand as helpers, shall come the great satisfaction of helping these unfortunate ones to help themselves. Noble Christian women of this fair land! may none of these "poor ones" rise up on the last day to condemn, and to say in the words of a noble Christian worker: "*You* belonged to the *fortunate* class, whose opulent and forciful lives were fed from a thousand springs of opportunity and blessing; but *we* were untrained, unwarned, uncared for. *You* were shielded in Christian homes, while *we* were motherless or unbefriended, and in our youth and inexperience exposed to manifold temptations. *You* had the discipline of education, and the stimulus of intellectual development; *we* never knew the wholesome companionship of great thoughts, and the self-control which only studious habits can impart. The love of Christ was a beacon-light in *your* lives, while *we* plodded on in shadowy paths of sin. And yet you never tried to match our weakness by your strength, our poverty by your riches, our ignorance by your knowledge, our sin by your saintliness. *You* never tried at all!" Dear sisters, who of us is willing to face such a record as that? The opportunity is ours to-day, the "great account" is not yet closed; the smallest effort made by a sincere, fervent heart, will not be lost; there is for each the blessed inquiry: "Lord, what wilt *Thou* have me to do?"

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

"Defend the poor and fatherless; do justice to the afflicted and needy."

This injunction to the Hebrew judges by the sweet-voiced shepherd king gives the keynote to all the work projected, and, to a wonderful extent, accomplished in the "Haven." To help the poor, succor the needy, care for the widow and fatherless, cheer the afflicted and suffering, shelter the homeless, and uplift the fallen are but different phases of the blessed work done daily In His Name.

Perhaps I cannot do better than give an outline of a single day as a sort of bird's-eye view of the general routine. When the sun is smiling his early good morning to the world the rising bell rings its peremptory summons, when every one who is able to get up is expected to do so, and, having dressed quickly and neatly, to put her bed-clothes to air. The inmates breakfast is at 7, afterwards attention is given to the babies and to any who may be ill. Breakfast for Superintendent and Matrons comes next, and during this half hour beds are made, dormitories tidied, and preparations made for scrubbing, etc. Then follows family worship in the service-room, at which every one who is able is expected to be present. A favorite hymn is sung, a passage of Scripture read, with or without comment, and prayers offered for God's special help and blessing during the day. After prayers the roll is called and absentees enquired after.

Next come interviews by the Superintendent, with any who want permission to go out on any special errand, or to secure situations, any who need medicine or medical attention; or with those who want to write letters to friends, etc. By this time the Matrons have rallied their forces, and settled them at work in their various departments. These efficient helpers know, almost at a glance, who are likely to do good service in dormitories, dining-rooms, sewing-rooms, wash-house and ironing-room. In view of the varied characters and capabilities of our inmates, this portioning out of the work requires great wisdom and tact; and, taking everything into consideration, the results are wonderful. Just here let me say that too high an estimate cannot be put upon the self-denying, faithful, earnest-hearted efforts, and helpful Christian influence of these dear sister-workers.

As the morning advances the postman's ring is heard, then letters have to be read and answered amid endless interruptions by telephone, from business calls, appeals for advice and sympathy, and decisions upon any and every sort of question.

Then come admissions, sometimes three or four in a day. A woman or girl just released from jail or the Mercer wants another chance to

straighten up and do better, get a good place and begin again; a young wife, with a baby in her arms, asks a home until her husband can get work; an old woman, friendless and forlorn, comes seeking a place where she may rest; a girl, equally friendless and infinitely more forlorn, wants shelter and care. These must all be dealt with individually, each case upon its own merits, and each must have God's plan of salvation made plain and clear. Then will come a case where the craving for drink has been gaining force day by day until there seems no more power to resist, and excuses of all descriptions are invented in order to get out and satisfy the awful thirst. Just here one is driven straight to God for grace and wisdom, and strength of will to meet and conquer the demon of unrest in the poor tempted one. Not always is victory on the Lord's side, but in many instances His mighty power to restrain and help are plainly felt and seen, and the quivering nerves and excited brain are gradually soothed into quietude and rest. Next comes a lady seeking a servant, and soon some industrious woman or girl has a fresh start given her, and hope springs up anew, as a place of service, away from old surroundings, opens up to her the promise of better things. And so the work goes on day by day, no two days alike, yet all equally full of earnest, prayerful effort. Evening settles down, tea is disposed of, evening duties attended to promptly, and at 8 o'clock the service bell rings out its cheerful call. Through the kindness of Christian workers of all denominations almost every evening is filled, and the variety of helpers gives added interest to the services. The inmates are attentive and respectful, and we have every reason to hope that the good seed thus sown falls into prepared ground, and that by-and-by there will be an ingathering of precious fruit. During the last two months at least two dear girls have been led to give their hearts to God and to dedicate their lives to His service. At the Master's valuation of a soul, this alone is worth all the effort that has been expended.

I cannot close without paying a tribute of affectionate respect to my predecessor, Mrs. Moore, who, though far distant, is still present in the sweet fragrance and undying influence of her consecrated life. In view of what has been done we thank God for the past and take courage for the future.

CONSTITUTION  
OF  
The Haven and Prison Gate Mission.

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## I.

The Institution shall be called "THE HAVEN AND PRISON GATE MISSION."

## II.

The object of the Mission shall be, intermediate reformatory work, the visiting of the Gaol, the meeting of female prisoners on the morning of discharges, and the maintenance of a home for the shelter of friendless and fallen women.

## III.

The management of the Prison Gate Mission and Haven shall be vested in a committee of Ladies, known as the Board of Management. The said Board of Management shall elect annually from among themselves, a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and appoint all Sub-Committees.

## IV.

An Advisory Board of Gentlemen shall be elected at the annual business meeting, and shall be consulted in all matters referring to the building, and the important alterations and repairing thereof, also in the investment of the funds.

## V.

The Board of Managers shall meet weekly for the transaction of all business. The annual meeting for the election of officers shall be held on the first Wednesday of October, at which annual meeting a report of the preceding twelve months shall be submitted, and arrangements made for the annual public meeting.

## VI.

The funds necessary for the support of this Institution shall be procured from Government, County and City grants, annual subscriptions, donations, collections and bequests, etc.

## VII.

In electing new members to the Board of Management, one month's notice in writing shall be given at one of the weekly meetings, in which notice shall be set forth the name and residence of the lady proposed.

## VIII.

The Board of Management shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution, By-Laws and Rules, provided one month's notice shall be given in writing, setting forth the alteration or amendment proposed, but no such alteration or amendment shall be made unless the same shall be carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Board of Management.

## RULES.

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### I.

The regular meetings of the Board of Management shall be held on Wednesday, at half past ten. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon the order of the President, or at the request of any three members, at such other place and time as may be ordered.

### II.

All meetings shall be opened with Scripture reading and prayer. Five members, of whom one shall be an officer, shall form a quorum at regular weekly meeting. The President, or in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, or some one chosen by the meeting shall preside. She shall sign the minutes of the preceding meeting, and shall propose and declare all resolutions giving the casting vote in case of a tie.

### III.

For the investment or disposal of the funds, or the sale of any of the property of the Institution, a quorum of nine members of the Board of Management, of whom three shall be officers, shall be necessary. But no such investment, or disposal, or sale shall take place without the consent in writing of a majority of the Advisory Board.

### IV.

The Secretary shall keep a record of all business, read the same at the following meeting, and inform the meeting of all correspondence connected with the work. She shall give notice of all special meetings, prepare an annual report of the progress and prospects of the Institution, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office.

### V.

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution, deposit the same in one of the chartered banks of the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditures, and pay all accounts by cheques, on the order of the Board of Managers. She shall present a report on the first Wednesday of each month; prepare a statement showing receipts and expenditure during the year, to be submitted at the annual business meeting. Said statement to be audited by some one appointed by the Board of Management.

### VI.

The various departments of work shall be in charge of Sub-Committees, to consist of several members, and a report of each department shall be submitted upon the first Wednesday of each month.

### VII.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all discussion shall be addressed to the chair and only one member shall be allowed to speak at a time.

### VIII.

Any member of the Board of Management absenting herself from twelve consecutive regular meetings, except from sickness or other unavoidable cause, shall thereupon cease to be a member of the Board of Management. Members unavoidably absent are requested to notify the Secretary.

## RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

## I.

The visitor for the week shall give a report every Wednesday. She shall interview all admissions, not departures, and temporarily absent in the hospitals. She shall read, pray and converse with inmates, either individually or collectively, as she may deem proper. She shall have a general supervision of the household, and shall visit as frequently as possible. She shall confer with the Superintendent with regard to holding of religious services at the Haven.

## II.

City cases awaiting admission to maternity hospitals, shall not be received as regular inmates until they have procured a city pass.

## III.

All maternity cases who are eligible for admittance to the Infants' Home, shall be required to go there, unless some other provision for mother and child, approved of by the Committee, has been made. Maternity cases, not eligible for admission to the Infants' Home, shall be arranged for by the Board of Management as soon as possible after admission.

## IV.

Former inmates having left their situations without proper cause, are not to be admitted, unless they report themselves *immediately* to the Matron or a member of the Committee, and shall not be retained as inmates unless the Board of Management consider they had sufficient cause for leaving their situation.

## V.

Inmates leaving other charitable institutions without just cause, shall not be retained as regular inmates.

## VI.

Inmates incapable, through sickness, age or infirmity, of employment and not having friends, shall be transferred, as speedily as possible, to benevolent institutions in the city elsewhere.

## VII.

When circumstances admit, inmates shall be required to pay one dollar and a half a week for board—fifteen cents for lodging and breakfast. The admissions of inmates shall not, in any case, *depend* upon their ability to offer remuneration, and those able to pay are in no way excused from taking part in the work.

## VIII.

Infants shall not be adopted without the approval of the Board of Management, and parties wishing to adopt must furnish references.

## IX.

Applicants sent with a written order by the Mayor, any member of the Council, Minister, member of Board of Management or other responsible person, shall be admitted, *if the order be presented within a reasonable time after its issue*, applicant to await the action of the Board of Management.

NOTE.—This condition is imposed, to prevent persons decidedly intoxicated from expecting to be admitted; any one sending applicant, will kindly mark the time in the note.

## RULES FOR SUPERINTENDENT, MATRONS AND INMATES:

## I.

It shall be the duty of the Superintendent to take charge of the household, receive visitors wishing to inspect the Institution, and those applying for servants and charwomen, interview all applicants for admission, and friends of the inmates. Inspect all letters received by inmates, and control the behaviour of the inmates. In cases of insubordination, the Matrons shall appeal to her.

## II.

The Superintendent shall take charge of all moneys brought into the Home by inmates, giving a receipt for the same, keep an accurate account of money paid out for board and other expenses, and submit said account to the Treasurer upon the first Wednesday of each month, and pay to her all money received for board during the foregoing month.

## III.

The Superintendent shall admit all applicants, subject to the approval of the Board of Management.

## IV.

Inmates regularly engaged in the work of the industrial departments, shall not be sent to situations or removed from the department, without the knowledge and consent of the Convener of the Sub-Committee in charge of that department.

## V.

The First Matron shall act in the absence of the Superintendent, have charge of the housekeeping, and the supervision of the maternity wing, and employ the inmates of said wing.

## VI.

The Second Matron shall have charge of the Prison Gate wing and Laundry, and employ inmates of said wing.

## VII.

A room in each wing of the building shall be set apart for use as a nursery, in which infants shall be kept separate from the rest of the inmates, during the hours of work; one or more women shall be placed in charge, and shall be responsible to the Superintendent for the proper discharge of her duties.

## VIII.

Inmates shall rise at 6 o'clock. Breakfast shall be served at 7.30. Dinner at 12, and Tea at 6 p.m. Morning prayers held at 8.15. Evening prayers at 7.30. Hour for retiring, 9.30. All inmates required to be present at prayers, and to attend the various services held in the Home.

## IX.

All inmates are required to assist in the industrial departments and household work, any refusing to do so shall not be retained as an inmate.

X.

When employment offers, any inmate capable of work shall be required to accept it. The rate of wages to be agreed upon in the presence of the Superintendent and proposed employer.

XI.

The use of profane language *strictly* forbidden ; a second offence to be reported to the Board of Management. Smoking not allowed.

XII.

The infringement of any of the above rules, improper behaviour, and insubordination, if continued after remonstrance by the Matrons, Weekly Visitor, or any member of the Board of Management, shall render the offender liable to expulsion.

XIII.

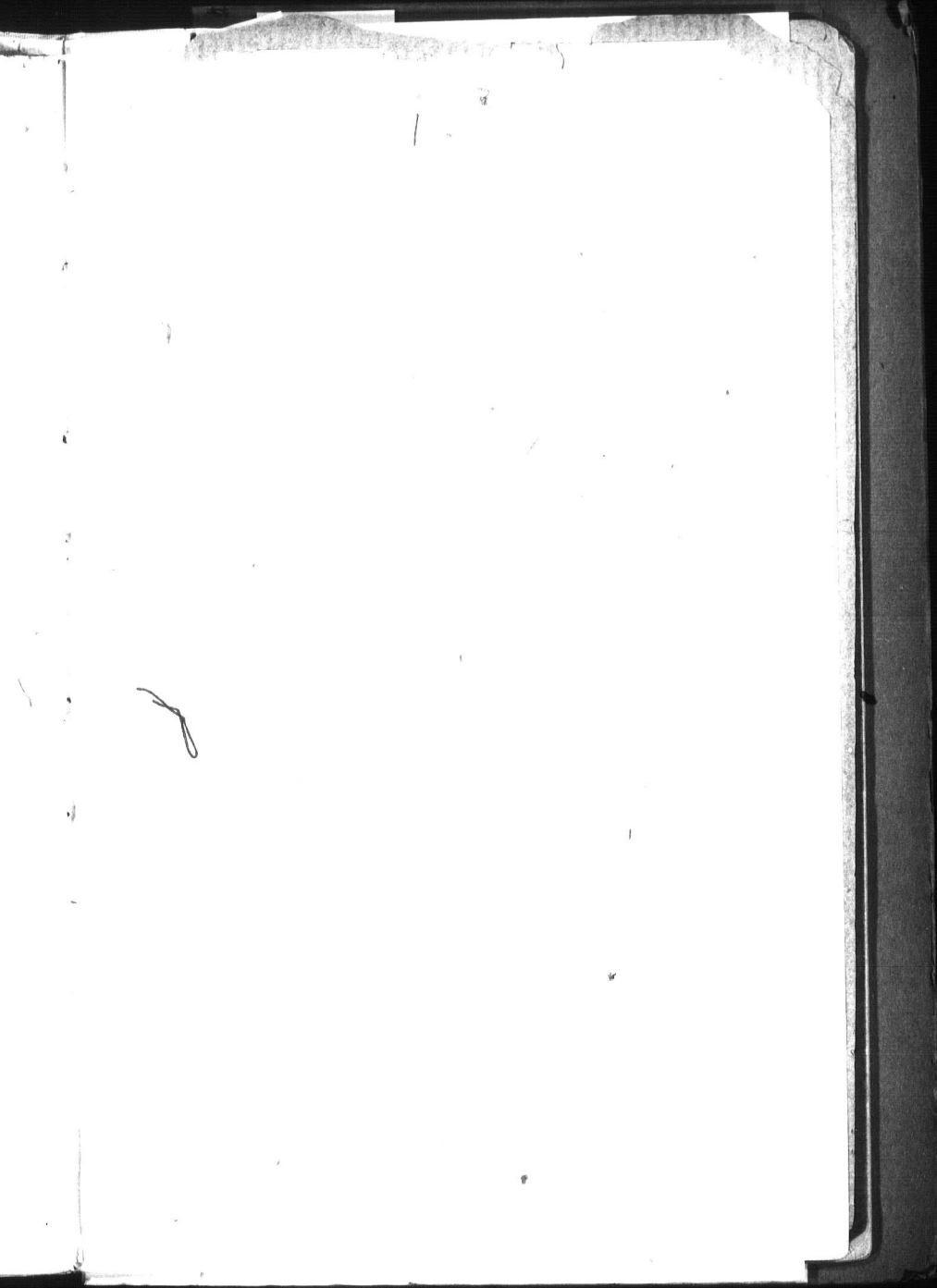
Former inmates visiting the Haven shall report themselves at once to the Superintendent, and shall not be allowed to enter the industrial departments or dormitories, without special permission.
