

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

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FIRST DAY.

ORANGE HALL, OTTAWA, ONT.,

Tuesday, May 31st, 1898.

The Most Worshipful the Grand Orange Lodge of British America assembled this day in its sixty-ninth meeting, in the Orange Hall, City of Ottawa, in the Province of Ontario.

M.W. Companion, Hon. N. Clarke Wallace, Grand Master and Sovereign, took the chair at 2 o'clock p m., M.W. Companion, Major A. J. Armstrong, Deputy Grand Master, in the Deputy Chair.

The M.W. the Grand Master having called the Companions to order, appointed Companion Jno. Boyce as Inside Herald and Companion Wm. Chitty as Outside Herald, and instructed them in their duties.

The M.W. the Grand Master appointed Companions John Scarlett, County Master, South Huron; R. D. Reveller, County Master, Dundas; Robert Burns, Past Grand Director of Ceremonies; A. Harris, District Master, Centre Toronto; J. W. Holmes, County Proxy, Monek, and Thos Boyce, District Master Carleton, to take up the test in the Orange and the Illustrious Degree of Royal Scarlet.

The M.W. the Deputy Grand Master reported the Companions correct and entitled to sit in the M.W. Grand Chapter.

All the preliminary ceremonies having been completed, the M.W. Grand Chaplain, Rev. Companion W. F. Wilson, read a portion of Scripture and conducted devotional services in accordance with the usages of our Illustrious Order, after which the M.W. Grand Master declared the M.W. Grand Chapter opened in proper and acceptable form for the transaction of business in the Royal Scarlet Degree.

M., Ontario East; John McMillan, D.G. M., Ontario West; R. H. Holland, D.G.M., Ontario East; Wm. Collins, C. M., East Bruce; B. Nesbitt, M.D., District Proxy, and Jas. Kelly. P.G. M., New Brunswick.

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The lecture of the Royal Scarlet Degree was repeated by M.W. Companion R. A. C. Browne, Grand Lecturer B.A., and Companion R. H. Holland, Deputy Grand Lecturer B.A.

Moved by Companion A. J. Hunter, D.M., Orangeville, seconded by Companion Wm. Johnston, C.M. Dufferin, and

(3) Resolved—That the question re the R.A.P. Obligation be referred to a Special Committee to be named by the M.W. Grand M aster, to be reported on at Wednesday morning session.

The M.W. Grand Master named the following as such Committee, viz: Companions Dr. T. S. Sproule, District Proxy; Wm. M. Fitzgerald, D.D.M.; Dr. Hunter, D.M.; Wm. Johnston, C.M.; Wm. Collins, C.M.

The decision of the M.W. Grand Master respecting the ruling re the refund of a portion or the whole of the degree fee was taken up.

Moved by Companion John McMillan, D.G.M. Ontario West, seconded by Companion Rev. C. E. Perry, D.G. Chap. British America, and

(4) Resolved—That the ruling of the M.W. Grand Master, as to the fee for the Royal Scarlet Degree, be approved by this Grand Chapter, and we hereby declare that any evasions of the rule cited is a violation of the Constitution and punishable accordingly.

(5) Resolved—That the Special Committee to whom were referred the R.A.P. Obligation be also asked to consider the advisability of amending the working of the R.A.P. Degree as suggested by the mover.

Moved by Companion J. W. Holmes, Co. Proxy Monck, seconded by Companion Wm. M. Fitzgerald, D.M. Toronto, and

(6) Resolved—That Companion James Kelly, New Brunswick, and Companion R. Watson, Toronto, be requested to properly exemplify the secret work of the five degrees of the Orange Association.

Moved by Companion H. H. Morton, J.D.G.M. East Toronto, seconded by Companion Jno. Shepherd, P.G.L. Ontario East, and

(7) Resolved.—That this Grand Chapter be reduced to the Orange Degree.

The M.W. the Grand Master declared the Grand Lodge reduced to the Orange Degree accordingly and instructions were given to the Heralds.

The Grand Master of the State of Maine, U.S., was introduced to the Grand Lodge and invited to a sent on the platform.

GRAND MASTER'S ADDRESS.

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The M.W. the Grand Master presented and read his annual address as follows :

To the Most Worshipful the Orange Grand Lodge of British America:

Dear Brethren,—I am enabled once more under Divine Providance to bid you welcome to the annual meeting of Grand Lodge assembled in the political capital of the Dominion. It is appropriate that our meeting should be held under the shadow of Parliament, to which we look for the conservation of our civil rights, the maintenance of our liberties, and the advancement of our welfare as a people; but it is also fitting that this Grand Lodge should assemble in the midst of the brethren of the Ottawa District, who, among the first founders of the Association in Canada, have ever shown themselves steadfast to its tenets, unswerving in their allegiance, and prompt to uphold their principles when duty called.

I am happy to be able to inform you that the vigor of our Associations remains unimpaired, membership increases, meetings of lodges of every degree are numerously attended, interest in their proceedings grows apace, and a cheering sign is the steady accession of young men to our ranks. The condition of our Association, in a word, is flourishing, and its usefulness, both in the inculcation of right principles and the promotion of social intercourse, was never more marked than at the present time.

Since our last annual meeting it has been my privilege, in company with a number of our brethren in Canada, to attend the meeting of the Triennial Council held in Glasgow, Scotland, on July 14th and 15th, 1897. The gathering there assembled was large, influential, and representative of the vigor of Orangeism throughout the Empire. Our reception by the good people of Glasgow was cordial in the extreme, the hospitality extended to us unbounded, and the sentiments in which their welcomes, both public and private, were expressed, proved that an active sympathy with the principles of our Order pervades the people of this flourishing portion of the Kingdom. In my address as Imperial Grand President I took occasion to extend, in your name, a warm invitation to the Triennial Council to hold its next meeting in Canada, promising its members in your behalf an enthusiastic, heartfelt, fraternal greeting, and while it was not found convenient at that time to accept the invitation, I cherish the hope that ere many years have elapsed the privilege will be afforded us in Canada of repaying, in some measure, the debt of kindness we are under to the Triennial Council.

In company with Bros. Bell, M.P., D. M. Jermyn, and Pitts, M.P.P., we had the honor and privilege of taking part in the great annual celebration of the 12th of July in Belfast and of addressing the brethren assembled there in their tens of thousands, and of conveying the fraternal greetings of the Orangemen of Canada.

The year, as you will not have forgotten, was memorable as the Jubilee year of the reign of our beloved Sovereign, and I need not tell you shat the outpourings of fervent loyalty and affection for our reverse Queen were intense with a passionate love. In the presence of that ardent fealty, I felt very much indeed as if I were at home again in this Canada of ours, the loyalty of whose people is so conspicuous.

The year in which we are met is the centenary of the abortive Irish Rebellion of 1798. It would, doubtless, be deemed bad taste in some quarters were I to allude at any length to that unhappy event, in the course of which it is calculated no fewer than seventy thousand persons perished -either in the field, by military execution, or by popular vengeance-of whom fifty thousand were insurgents. It was in May, one hundred years ago, that the rebellion broke out, and the autumn was well advanced before its complete suppression—the most important conflicts being those of Arklow, Ross, and Vinegar Hill. I may be, however, allowed to say that throughout this unfortunate strife the Orangemen of Ireland, as upon so many other occasions, rendered signal service to the cause of the Empire, attesting their loyalty to the throne by innumerable deeds of valor, self-sacrifice and devotion. The progress of popular government since that day has been truly marvellous. To us who enjoy so fully the blessings of individual liberty and electoral rights it is strange to read that, of the three hundred members who composed the Parliamant of Ireland two hundred were returned by individuals, that forty to fifty were roturned by ten persons, and that several of the boroughs had no resident elector at all. Equal rights and popular liberty, as understood in our day, were then unknown; and yet, looking back in the light of a century of experience, who can truthfully assert that the union of Ireland with Great Britain for legislative purposes, which grew out of the rebellion, has not produced a degree of material development and prosperity to the people of that island commensurate with their highest happiness? Nor, looking down the vista of the last hundred years, can it be doubted that, recommended in the King's Message to the Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland in January, 1799, the union of the Kingdoms has best tended "to improve and perpetuate a connection essential for the common security, and to augment and consolidate the strength, power and resources of the British Empire ?"

In the public affairs of Canada little has occurred since our last meeting worthy of notice at this time. The Manitoba school question seems to have effectually received its quietus as a factor in Federal legislation, though I cannot refrain from impressing upon members of our Order resident in that Western Province the importance of exercising constant vigilance to thwart any attempt, open or surreptitious, to undermine the fabric of the Public school system. Signs are not wanting that the advocates of Separate schools will seek to recover, little by little, the restoration of the old order of things, and our friends cannot be too alert in watching their efforts to that end. Indeed this purpose is openly proclaimed, for in a letter addressed to the Papal Secretary of State by Mr. Charles Russell, the accredited agent of the Prime Minister of

Canada, his colleagues and supporters in Parliament, on the subject of the Manitoba Schools, this language occurs:

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"We do not solicit His Holiness to sanction as perfect the concessions obtained, but that in his wisdom he will be pleased to regard them as a beginning of justice. With the aid of time, and thanks to the patient work of persuasion by their compatriots, the Catholics of Manitoba may hope to obtain satisfaction."

In the face of this avowal of the opponents of Public schools it behooves our friends in Manitoba to lie ever on their arms, ready for the call to battle the moment effect is sought to be given to the schemes for the destruction of the non-sectarian educational system. I would direct your attention also to the spectacle presented by a large group of public men of invoking the aid of a foreign potentate in the settlement of questions of purely domestic concern. In matters of conscience and faith, of Church doctrine and discipline, Roman Catholics may appeal to the head of their Church without exciting comment from those of other denominations; but when public men solicit Papal interference in secular matters in the Dominion it is time to sound the alarm and call a halt to them.

A movement pregnant with promise of great consequences has lately been launched under high auspices for an alliance of the Englishspeaking people of the world. Its consummation, for which we fervently hope, would make for the peace, progress, prosperity and enlightenment of mankind, because the Anglo-Saxon race has, above all others, proved its capacity for that good government which finds its sure foundation in individual liberty, freedom of conscience and well ordered society. may not be inapt in this connection to recall the fact that Orangeism has been the forerunner of the closer federation of Provinces within the British Empire. Before the Confederation of Canada was brought about the union of Orange Associations throughout British America had been accomplished. Preceding the Imperial policy of drawing the colonies nearer to Great Britain had come the Triennial Council of Orangemen of the British Empire and those of the United States. Now it may be the precursor of that wider Anglo-Saxon alliance to which I have referred. It was arranged last year that the Triennial Council representatives of the Orangemen of Great Britain, the Colonies, and the United States shall, in 1900, for the first time in its history, assemble in the neighboring Republic.

There has recently been removed from the public life of Canada a man of conspicuous ability and large influence, by whose sad death the country has sustained a distinct loss. I allude to the late Mr. D'Alton McCarthy. Although not a member of the Orange Association, Mr. McCarthy showed himself to be animated and guided in his public career, on more than one occasion, by the principles we espouse, more particularly in his identification with the opposition to the Jesuits Estates legislation of Quebec, and to the re-establishment of the Separate school system in Manitoba. A man of sturdy and fearless independence of character, he won the sympathy and respect of the Orangemen of Canada

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by the tenacity and resolute courage with which he maintained his political principles, and the widespread sorrow his untimely death provoked was profoundly shared by them.

The Orange Association in general, and particularly those who are members of the Orange Mutual Benefit Fund, will be pleased to know that through the favor of Divine Providence, and the careful management of the Executive Committee whom you appointed last year, that Company stands in's splendid and prosperous financial position to-day. The report of the Secuetary, which will be read to you, will show that though we were a year ago in quite an unfavorable position, to-day we have met every obligation and have a large surplus of cash on hand. With the same careful management continued, I think I am justified in saying there is a prosperous future for our Benefit Fund. The Committee have recently appointed Mr. H. M. Brown, of Thornhill, Ontario, as the travelling agent to promote insurance interests, and I would ask from all the brethren their cordial co-operation and assistance.

In conclusion let me say a word to you personal to myself. It is now eleven years since you conferred upon me the distinguished honor of election to the Grand Mastership of the Grand Lodge of British America. At each annual meeting since then you have expressed your continued confidence in me by re-election to the office. I cannot find language to adequately syllable the pride and gratitude this repeated evidence of your favor has given me, nor to convey my keen appreciation of the kindness of which I have ever been the recipient at your hands. During my incumbency of office stirring events of deep interest to our Association and of high consequence to Canada have occurred, in many of which it has been my lot to play a more or less prominent part. It is more than ample recompense to know that the course I have pursued has received your approbation, and I can assure you in all sincerity that the consciousness of your fidelity and support buoyed and sustained me through many a fierce fight for principles when my motives were liable to be misconstrued and my actions to be maligned. But, brethren, I feel that the time has arrived when I may step aside and give place to another. You have more than heaped full my cup with honors. Our Association has many members of experience and ability to fill the office of Grand Master more worthily than I, and I would ask you to now allow me to retire with a profound sense of the great and lasting obligations for which your unremitting kindness will ever make me your debtor.

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GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT

The M.W. Grand Secretary presented and read his report as follows:

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master and Members of the Most Worshipful Grand Orange Lodge of British America:

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren, I desire, in accordance with the constitutional custom of this Most Worshipful body, to present my first annual report as Grand Secretary, and in doing so I am pleased to be able to report continued prosperity and harmony.

I shall as briefly as possible lay before this Grand Lodge the several matters bearing on the welfare of our Association.

We are assembled this day in the city selected by our beloved Sovereign as the capital of the Canadas, and at a time between that Sovereign is natal day and the day of her coronation, which should stir, if it were possible, in every heart a greater degree of love and loyalty to the Sovereign who rules the Empire. The place in which we meet reminds us that here is the political centre of a great Dominion, with its Parliamentary institutions—a monument of the progress of our race, and of the benevolent sway of Her Majesty, as well as of the pluck, energy and loyalty of her Canadian subjects. In the upbuilding and development of this Dominion the members of our Order have played no unimportant part, and in the inculcating of a spirit of loyalty and attachment to the Empire have always been in the foremost rank.

The correspondence for the year has been large and of the most satisfactory nature. There are only a very limited number of appeals against the decisions of the Provincial Grand Lodges, and the Lodges are working in harmony.

THE SEVENTH EDITION OF CONSTITUTION.

On account of the many proposed changes in the Constitution, this issue was limited and is now exhausted, so that it will be necessary to have a new issue at as early a date as possible, in order to supply the demand. It would be well to have a committee to put in shape such amendments as may be adopted at the meeting and have the new issue printed as soon after this session as possible.

The returns from the several Provincial Grand Lodges have been received and will be presented at this meeting in the proper order. The figures taken from the returns will show the movement of the membership in the several Provincial jurisdictions, and form some idea of the progress made:

Ontario West—Initiated, 1,278; joined by certificate, 436; re-instated, 232; withdrawn by certificate, 597; suspended, 1,298; expelled, 53; died, 179; value of real estate, \$58,385; other property. \$65,612; insurance, \$60,050.

Ontario East—Initiated, 635; joined by certificate, 193; reinstated, 106; withdrawn by certificate, 291; suspended, 426; expelled, 39; died, 87; value of real estate, \$85,150; insurance, \$38,505.

New Brunswick—Initiated, 483; joined by certificate, 161; reinstated, 143; withdrawn by certificate, 83; suspended, 167; expelled, 8; died, 30; value of real estate and other property, \$55,250; no insurance given.

Newfoundland—Installed, 208; joined by certificate, 27; reinstated 112; withdrawn by certificate, 46; suspended, 179; expelled, 5; died, 34; no property reported.

Prince Edward Island—Initiated, 26; joined by certificate, none; authorized, 3; withdrawn by certificate, none; suspended, 23; expelled, none; died, 3; no property given.

Nova Scotia—Initiated, 269; joined by certificate, 60; reinstated, 72; withdrawn by certificate, 83; suspended, 190; expelled, 9; died, 20; real estate, \$30,150; other property, \$2,150; insurance, \$12,250.

Quebec—Initiated, 113; joined by certificate, 40; reinstated, 10; withdrawn by certificate, 30; suspended, 19; expelled, 9; died, 11; value of real estate and other property, \$5,750; insurance, \$3,150.

Manitoba—Initiated, 69; joined by certificate, 66; reinstated, 8; withdrawn by certificate, 83; suspended, 69; expelled, 3; died, 6; value of property not given.

North-West Territories—Initiated, 37; joined by certificate, 29; reinstated, none; withdrawn by certificate, 18; suspended, 8; expelled, none; died, 3; value of real estate and other property, \$3,000; insurance, \$500.

British Columbia—Initiated, 90; joined by certificate, 67; reinstated, 10 withdrawn by certificate, 44; suspended, 92; expelled, 1; died, 5; no property reported.

Recapitulation—Initiated, 3,208; joined by certificate, 1,079; reinstated, 696; withdrawn by certificate; 1,275; suspended, 2,471; expelled, 127; died, 378; real estate and other property owned, \$305,447; insurance, \$114,755.

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I have sent out the annual report of the Grand Lodge of British America. The blank forms for returns for Primary, District, County, and Provincial Grand Lodges were sent out in November in duplicate, and in some cases more should be sent in order to allow the lodge making returns to retain copy for future reference. As per resolution of Grand Lodge, a circular letter was sent to all the Provincial Grand Lodge officers, County, District, and Primary Lodge Masters. This letter contained the report of Special Committee on Grand Lodge representation, and had the following questions subjoined:

- Are you in favor of any change in the present system of representation to Grand Lodge?
- 2. If you are in favor of a change, do you approve of any or all of the recommendations of the Committee ?
- 3. Are you in favor of the Primary Lodges having direct representation to the M.W. Grand Lodge through the Worshipful Master?

Two thousand circulars were sent and one hundred and seventy-five replies received. Of these thirry three reply "No" to the questions, and among them are the R.W. Grand Lodge of Outario East, County Lodge of South Simcoe, County Lodge of Huntingdon, and District Lodge of Ottawa. Thirty-seven answered "Yes" to the questions, and includes the District of Nipissing. Sixty-four favor a change, but do not approve of all the recommendations of Committee. Sixty want direct representation through the Worshipful Masters

I would urge upon the Provincial Grand Lodges the importance of sending in their returns as soon as possible after their annual meeting, so that if there are any errors ample time will be given for correction, and enable the Report of the Grand Secretary of this Grand Lodge to be fully prepared and compared with that of the previous year.

Reports have been received from the following Grand Lodges: England, Ireland, Scotland, County Grand Lodge, County Down, Ireland; Victoria, Australia, and Supreme Grand Lodge United States, Massachusetts, New York, Michigan, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, New Brunswick, Quebec, Ontario East and West, Manitoba, North-West Territories and British Columbia, Orange Young Britons and True Blue Association.

How sad the thought, brethren, that amid the turmoil and labor of this life, death is ever near, and that we have not escaped is shown by the returns—378 of our members have gone over the River. Let us trust, that in the faith strengthened by the Christian teaching of our Order they will receive that welcome summons, "Come, ye blessed, enter into the rest prepared for you." Among them are many whose familiar faces will be missed at Grand Lodge meetings. One whose name has for more than a quarter of a century been connected with this Grand

Lodge, Bro. Wm. Anderson, will be long remembered, not only for his connection with the affairs of the Association, but also on account of his qualities as an Orangeman and Christian.

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The brethren will hail with delight the appearance of a History of the Orange Order, issued during the past year by Bro. Wm. Banks. It is concise and well written, and fills a long-felt want. To the active members of the Orange Order it must be apparent that we must educate our membership in the work now going on and in the history of the great events of the past, in brder to have deeply rooted a knowledge of our Association and its work. As a means to help to do this our members should become subscribers for good Orange and Protestant paperslike The Sentinet, of Toronto, and thus read the everyday history of our Order. I understand a depot will be opened shortly in Toronto for the publication, securing and selling of sound Protestant books and literature. I trust the undertaking will prove successful and be a benefit to the Orange Association.

Since last this Grand Lodge assembled the sixtieth anniversary of the accession of our Most Gracious Majesty Queen Victoria has been celebrated on a scale of magnificence and spontaneous loyalty on the part of her subjects never before equalled in the history of Britain if ever in the world. Not only was the event observed by her own subjects, but the people of nearly every nation contributed in paying respect to a ruler whose name is associated with everything that tends to make her government good and true: her womanly virtues have endeared her to her loyal subjects. This has also tended to make the event unique in the world's history because no ruler has made such a lasting impression by her womanly acts as Victoria the Good.

Since our last meeting the Triennial Council of Orangemen have held their Triennial Session. I need not refer to this at any length, as the M.W. the Grand Master will deal with it in his address. Suffice it to say that meeting was representative of the Grand Orange Brotherhood.

PROVINCIAL GRAND LODGE MEETINGS.

The meetings of the several Provincial Grand Lodges were largely added and characterized by a spirit of fraternity, brotherly love and harmony which tend to make such meetings a benefit to all taking part.

ORGANIZATION.

The question of pushing the organization work in the several jurisdictions received more or less attention at the annual sessions of the Provincial Grand Lodges, and by many was very fully discussed. Now, as this question has received more than the usual attention at nearly all the Provincial Grand Lodge meetings, and in addition has been the subject for correspondence during the past year, I deem it my duty to lay the question before this M.W. Grand Lodge, believing that they too have only to be reminded of the importance of the question, and that they will at this session take steps to at least aid in pushing the organization work. Now as to the importance of this question, I have only to

direct the attention of every thinking brother to the figures presented by our returns from year to year, as we must bear in mind that the success or increase or otherwise is entirely the result of a labor of love. No other organization in this country, and I make the statement fearless of successful contradiction, has had as much done without cost as the Orange Society. No remuneration but love for the cause and the great principles which it represents has actuated these brethren, and to the early pioneers of the Order, no matter what their station in life may have been, we owe a debt of gratitude for the good work accomplished Since then the conditions have very much changed. We are not met by the same opposition. If opposition at all, it is of that secret, dangerous character that we do not perceive, and in fact do not, as we should, prepare for. And as a result it is more difficult to organize lodges than when there was open opposition. Besides, we are confronted with an entirely different condition of things. There are many and various other orders which are bidding for the support of our members. These organizations have agents actively engaged pushing their work in every quarter, and we have to depend entirely on the devotion and loyalty of our membership. Those of us who have been long in the Order may be constrained to remain, but what of the young men outside the Order? Does it not seem reasonable to assume that a large number of them are likely to join societies whose agents are so actively at work? And we must confess we are behind most, if not all, other societies in the equipments furnished at organization. It is quite true we charge less for what we furnish than most others. I would suggest that a committee be appointed to go into this matter, to fix a higher fee for Warrants, and furnish, in addition to supplies now given with dispensations—one dozen Constitutions, two gavels, one ballot-box, one Recording Secretary's membership and minute book, one Financial Secretary's roll book, one Treasurer's book, one Financial Secretary's receipt book, one Worshipful Master's order book—and thus place a lodge at its organization in a position to properly carry on its business. There should be a determined effort made to push the work in Manitoba, North-West Territories and British Columbia, as these jurisdictions at present are not in a position to do so without assistance. I beg to quote from a letter received from Right Worshipful Bro. Ferguson, the active Grand Secretary of the North-West Territories, regarding this question. He says:

"I regret there is no effort made to put an organizer in the field, and I fear in future years we will have cause to regret it still more. There is no doubt about the future of our North-West. It is going ahead. Whether it be Protestant or no depends to a great extent upon the action and activity of the Orangemen, and the opinion of the observing men, so far as I can gather (and I have given the matter some attention), is that efforts are silently but surely made to have the majority of the immigrants and population of the future of the Roman Catholic faith."

And furthermore this brother states: "We have not, so far as I know, any man qualified for this work, and feel we must look to the Grand Lodge of British America for assistance along these lines. We

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Tru brot have many good, staunch workers in the North-West Territories for the cause who would give all assistance within their power, but we lack an efficient organizer and speaker, and these two in one are required."

Nova Scotia is taking up the work, as is also New Brunswick, and this Province, by the way, leads in the increase of membership for the past year. Ontario East is taking up the work, and Ontario West, while not at their annual session appointing an organizer, will, I feel convinced, through their Executive, consider the question.

There is also another thing that we should seriously consider, and that is the making of the proper appropriations to enable the chief Executive officer of this Grand Lodge, the M.W. Grand Master, to visit in weak and struggling districts, to infuse new life and energy into the lodges. The effect of such visitation was brought forcibly under my notice by a letter from a brother in the Niagara District, who writes, in a letter received this year: "The visit of the M.W. Grand Master to our district in January last has been attended with benchical results to the Order." It remains with this Grand Lodge to make such visitations of regular occurrence, as at present they are entirely a labor of love, and are attended with expense, which must be met by the chief officer out of his private purse.

I appeal to you, men and brethren, near the close of the century, to take this matter into serious consideration. Do not leave it off until next session. There may be some questions you can leave over until next meeting, but do not neglect this. Remember, one hundred years ago this organization was going through a troublesome experience, and that at Wexford, Vinegar Hill and other places many Protestants and members of this Order were done to death because of their fidelity to the cause of freedom of worship, and at many places during that troublesome year Orangemen could be depended upon to do their duty to King and country. Small wonder that the Orangemen of those days became firmly attached to the Orange Order, forming as it did the means of protection to the adherents of the Protestant Crown of England. Shall we, the descendants of those heroic men, be found wanting when it requires an effort to push ahead the organization work? I feel satisfied when we have our attention called to it and its needs we will not cease until every corner of our Dominion is occupied by a lodge, as around it will be found loyal citizens of our country.

I have to thank the officers and members for their kindness, and to the R.W. Grand Secretaries my thanks are specially due for their prompt attention to all correspondence. In fact, all with whom it was my privilege to hold correspondence were anxious to render all possible assistance.

May the Giver of all Good be with us and direct our deliberations. Trusting that everything done at this session may be in the spirit of brotherly love and in the best interest of our beloved Order,

ADDRESS OF WELCOME.

His Worship Mayor Bingham, accompanied by a deputation of the City Council of Ottawa, were announced in waiting, and being introduced (the Grand Lodge adjourned for that purpose) His Worship presented and read the following address of welcome on behalf of the City of Ottawa:

HON. N. CLARKE WALLACE, M.P.,

Most Worshipful Grand Master and Sovereign, and Gentlemen of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America:

On behalf of the City of Ottawa I greet you and extend to you a hearty welcome, and trust that during your visit to this, the capital of the Dominion of Canada, you will find both time and opportunities to view our city from every point; to become acquainted with its natural beauties, to learn of its natural and steady growth, and by your personal observation to fully realize how certain it is to become in the near future one of the most important industrial and manufacturing centres in Canada.

Some, perhaps most of you, have been told of what we as a city once were, what we are now and what we are likely to become; and some of you may have and still have doubts as to whether our expectations will be realized. But it needs but a few words of explanation to cast aside all doubts and to have you join with us in our expectations for the future.

With such waterways as the Rideau Canal running to the west; the beautiful Ottawa River connecting with the St. Lawrence in the east; with the great Canadian Pacific Railway in its tour across the continent, from the Atlantic to the Pacific Ocean, tapping our city; with the Canada Atlantic Railway, connecting with the Grand Trunk at Coteau, and bringing in its traffic from Montreal, Boston and other important seaports; with the Ottawa and Arnprior Railway rushing westward to Parry Sound, and there connecting with the great navigable waters of the west; with the Ottawa and Gatineau Valley Railway penetrating the Gatineau Mountains, renowned for their beautiful lakes and excellent fishing, which are unparalleled in any other portion of the American continent, and carrying the trade of the Gatineau Valley; with the

Ottawa and New York Railway opening up a new and important channel of commerce; with the Pontiae and Pacific Junction Railway, in close vicinity, and last but not least, with our Ottawa Electric Railway, second to none in existence as regards efficiency—connecting with the Aylmer Electric Railway at Hull. With all these I say, and with the construction of the Interprovincial Bridge, which will close the Ottawa River at Nepcan Point and bring the City of Hull closer than ever to our doors, we look forward to the time when industries, numerous and extensive, will dot our shorse for many miles, from the north to the south, and from the east to the west, and when thousands and thousands of sturty hands will be steadily employed in making nobler and grander and greater than ever the importance of Canaba as a progressive and important industrial and manufacturing country.

Even now we are called "the Convention City of Canada," and rightly so, for, and I say it, not boastingly but modestly and truly, there is no other city in Canada that has been so blessed by nature with sights that claim the admiration of all who see them. Man's conception, man's handiwork could but poorly imitate the natural beauties which crowd themselves about our city, making it picturesque and admirable to see.

Our Chaudiere and Rideau Falls alone remind one of the great Niagara Falls, whose name has been mentioned in almost every home in the civilized world, and to whose shores millions of people have travelled far and near to see. Yet, those who have come to Ottawa and have seen our "Niagara of a smaller scale" have expressed their many opinions on the grandeur of the scene.

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As Mayor of Ottawa, I take a pride in drawing to your notice these matters. You have come from all parts of Canada and from Newfoundland. You come representing a strong and well-known and important organization, whose existence is not of a day, a year, nor a hundred years. You come to our city to sit in session, to revise and enact laws to govern your great organization; and when you have finished your labors you will return to your respective homes to give to your conferers a report of your stewardship.

It is when you have returned to your homes that I wish you to think and speak most of us. to tell those with whom you come in contact what you have seen and how you like our city and people; to explain how Ottawa has progressed, and what, as an industrial centre in the near future, she is sure to become; to make known what nature, in its goodness, has done for her and how you admire her Parliament Buildings, parks, the Experimental Farm, and the general appearance of her buildings from an architectural point of view; our streets, our street ralway, and everything you see. You can also tell them that in 1855 we had but 10,000 of a population, while to-day it has grown to 54,000, with assessable property to the value of \$39,000,000, and that within ten years from now we expect to have a population ranging from 80,000 to 100,000. You can tell them of our begautiful waterworks, our fire brigade, of which we are justly proud, and of our great lumber industry; and, gentlemen, last but not least, you can tell them that ng city, through

its Mayor, ever extended to you a more cordial and hearty welcome than the City of Ottawa.

Most Worshipful Grand Master and Sovereign, and gentlemen of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America, I again extend to you the hearty welcome of the City of Ottawa.

To the Members of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America Benefit Fund in Grand Lodge assembled in Ottava this 31st day of May, 1898;

Brether,—I have great pleasure in behalf of the Executive of the above Fund to present to you a concise statement of the business transacted during the past year under the present management.

I am sure it will be very gratifying to the members of this Fund, as well as to the Grand Lodge as a whole, to know that we have a balance of over \$5,000, without an obligation of any kind, except a small account of the Solicitor's; although a year ago there was a large number of unsettled claims, now there are none.

This balance, we hope (with economy and a kind Providence), to increase until it becomes large enough as a Reserve Fund to meet any unusual death rate, without having to call on the members for extra assessments

It is also encouraging to be able to state that we have over 1,800 members in good standing, whose average age compares favorably with any other insurance society of the same kind in the Dominion of Canada.

The present signs indicate that this number will soon be largely increased, for we have sent out during the week just passed at the rate of one certificate a day. It is now as safe an insurance society as any other of the kind in the country.

These results show the wisdom of the amendments made last year at the Grand Lodge meeting at Windsor to the rules of the Benefit Fund, under which an Executive was appointed, who carefully watched over the business of this department and held so many meetings, no doubt in many cases at great personal inconvenience to themselves.

We hope to be able to show to the Dominion at large before very long, with the undivided support of the whole Orange body, which we Orar deed and

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crave and expect, that an insurance department can prosper within the Orange Association and be a lasting financial monument to the glorious deeds of Orangemen in the past, as well as a support for many a widow and orphan in the future.

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CONSTITUTION AND LAWS.

R.W. Bro. John McMillan, D.G.M., Ontario West, presented and read the report of the Committee on Constitution and Laws:

To the Most Worshipful the Grand Master and Members of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America:

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren—We your Committee on Constitution and Laws beg leave to report as follows:

The report of the Committee on Constitution and Laws, appointed last year, made a supplementary report which on motion was laid over for discussion till the next annual meeting. We submit the following as our report on all the questions submitted to us:

1. Notice by R. W. Bro. R. H. Holland, C.M., East Durham, that Rule 7 be amended by adding thereto the following provise: "Provided always that notwithstanding anything hereinbefore contained or any of the provisions of Rule 114, no person, after having been for three consecutive years elected to the office of Most Worshipful Grand Master, shall be elected for a fourth consecutive time to the said office unless he shall receive a clear three-fourths of the votes of all the representatives present and entitled to vote. The Committee think it inexpedient and impracticable to restrain the free exercise of choice by the Grand Lodge at all times in the selection of its officers, and therefore cannot recommend the proviso suggested.

2. By W. Bro. Joseph Dickey, D.M., Mono: That Rule 137 be amended by providing that the minimum fee for the Royal Arch Degree be reduced to \$1. Cannot recommend the clause.

3. By R.W. Bro. O. F. Wilkins, P.G.L., Ontario West: That a rule be added to the Constitution providing that the sum of ten cents be collected on 12th July in each year from every brother in active connection in this Dominion, for the purpose of endowing the Orange wing of the Protestant Orphans' Home in Toronto with funds sufficient for its support. The Committee do not think it expedient to impose an additional yearly tax upon the membership.

4. By W. Bro. Stephen Radcliffe, C.M. Vest Middlesex: That a committee be appointed to examine into the price of Grand Lodge supplies, with a view of making them cheaper, and report at the next Grand Lodge meeting. The Committee think no good purpose would be served by such an investigation, as in the opinion of the Committee the price of supplies issued by this Grand Lodge will bear very favorable comparison with any other organization.

5. By R. W. Bro. Wm. Lee, G.S., Ontario West: That Rule 116 be amended by striking out all the words after the word "returned," and adding the words, "to the Provincial Grand Secretary." The Committee do not deem it expedient to alter the present provision as contained in

the rule, but see no objection to adding the words, Provincial Grand Secretary, as suggested, without otherwise interfering with the rule thre

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6. By W. Bro. Dr. A. J. Hunter, D.M., Orangeville: That provision be made so that the Constitution of the Royal Scarlet Order be printed as an annex to the Orange Constitution. The Committee think this is desirable and recommend accordingly.

7. By W. Bro. Dr. A. J. Hunter, D.M.: To amend Rule 5 by adding after the words, "Deputy Master," in 21st line, the words, "shall hereby be entitled to sit and vote"; also in same rule, amend the words "or proxy" to read "or a proxy." This matter has been referred to the Special Committee on Grand Lodge Representation, who will con-

sider it in their general report.

8. By W. Bro. Dr. A. J. Hunter, D.M.: To amend Rule 98 by inserting after the word "members" in second line, the words, "including the roll-book, which shall be marked at each regular meeting." The Committee think this is already provided by the rule and that the suggested change is unnecessary. Also to amend the same rule by inserting after the word "arrears" in the fourth line, the words, "and make a demand upon each member in arrears for payment thereof at least once in each year, collect and"— The Committee think this proposal would be an improvement in securing the payment of dues and recommend that the amendment be made.

9. By W. Bro, Dr. A. J. Hunter, D.M.: To amend Rule 129 by striking out the words "a Primary Lodge" in third line, and inserting instead the words, "the Primary Lodge nearest to their place of residence except as hereinafter provided." The Committee recommend the

adoption of the proposed amendment.

10. By W. Brof Dr. A. J. Hunter, D.M.: To amend the Constitution by adding Rule 129\(\frac{1}{2} \), as follows: "A candidate desiring to join a lodge other than the one nearest his place of residence, may make application to any Primary Lodge by obtaining and presenting with his application the consent in writing (and a recommendation) from the lodge in whose jurisdiction his place of residence is situated; and no lodge shall receive or act upon an application from candidates outside their jurisdiction unless accompanied by such documents." The Committee recommend the insertion of the rule, but are of opinion that the lodge's recommendation should not be required with the application, and recommend that the words "and a recommendation" be climinated; and the rule should not apply to cities and towns where more than one lodge exists, in which case co-ordinate jurisdiction should exist.

11. By W. Bro. Dr. A. J. Hunter, D.M.: To amend Rule 136 by erasing the words "a degree" in the third line, and inserting the words "any degree conferable under an Orange warrant." The Committee think it well to make the change in order to render clear an anomally existing between the Orange and Scarlet Constitutions.

12. By W. Bro. W. S. Wilson, D.M., Niagara: To amend Rule 93, page 84, by inserting after the word "not" the words "more than

three months." The Committee do not deem it expedient to alter the wholesome rule that a brother must not be in arrears for dues when entitled to the annual.

13. By W. Bro. W. S. Dinsmore, P.C.M., South Perth: To amend Rule 85 by striking out the words "two dollars" in the second line, and inserting the words "one dollar" instead thereof. The Committee do not consider it expedient to alter the present rule.

 By W. Bro. James Kane, Representative from L.O.B.A.: That the Grand Mistress and Past Grand Mistresses of the Ladies' Orange Benevolent Association be allowed to sit and vote in this Grand Lodge at its meetings in each year. This request has been forwarded to the Committee on Grand Lodge Representation.

 By W. Bro. J. Noble, Representative from L.O.B.A.: That permission be given to the Ladies' Orange Benevolent Association to use in their ceremonies the burial service as laid down in the Orange Ritual. Cannot recommend, as it does not seem appropriate that the Ladies Association should conduct funeral services.

16. That a uniform recognition sign be adopted between such Association and the members of the Orange Order. The Committee do not think it expedient to accede to the request.

17. That the Funeral Service of the Orange Association be printed in the next and all subsequent editions of the Constitution. We would advise that the funeral service and Constitution be printed separately as heretofore.

18. That the reading of the obligation of the Degree being worked be part of the Order of Business at every Orange Lodge meeting. We agree to the sure in, and that the obligation be read by the Master and repeated here at the opening of each meeting, and shall be the last () and for business

19. Reles to Grand odge representation, and should be referred to the comptee on the sae.

20. As to have the arlet Dispensation placed with the Primary lodge whener least seven Scarlet members in good standing in such and mot recommend any change at present.

COMMITTEE ON CORRESPONDENCE.

The report of the Committee on Correspondence was read by W. Bro. Beattie Nesbitt, M.D., D. Proxy:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master and Members of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America:

Your Committee on Correspondence have considered the Grand Master's address and would report as follows:

We consider the Grand Master's happy reference to the meeting of this grand body in the capital of Canada as timely, and we sincerely hope that the principle of good citizenship that this Order is so intent on promoting, will never suffer at the hands of the representatives that the people send here from time to time to promote the true interests of our country.

It is with pleasure we note that the Orange Order in Canada still continues its triumphal march, as it is the best guarantee that Canada can have that principle and not narrow partisanship will dominate our public men. We are certain that in the time to come measures and not men or parties will be the only issue in our public affairs.

We are delighted to make the glowing reference to the Triennial Council, as we see in this fraternal union of universal Orangeism the forerunner of that greater and larger union of a kindred people that we pray may soon ensue, so that man everywhere may be lifted to a higher level by the force of Christian civilization of which Great Britain has been the champion.

The reference to the Irish Rebellion is most opportune, as showing the wonderful progress made in self-government by our people, both at home and abroad. rio rio

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The reprence to the Manitoba School question meets with our full endorsation. We feel that the electorate of Canada has done its full duty in driving from Federal politics the pernicious proposition of coercion in any form, and we also feel that the Province of Manitoba will loyally guard the undying principle of equal rights to all and special privileges to none. Still we would impress upon our brethren and friends in Manitoba that eternal vigilance is the price of liberty. We know that all the strength of the hierarchy, abetted by the duplicity of designing politicians, will be used to rob Manitoba of her national schools.

We are in hearty sympathy with the reference to Anglo-Saxon unity. Surely the phenomenal progress of our race and tongue in the last four hundred years means something in the order of Providence, rather than of chance, for the uplifting of humanity. We believe the time is ripe for such a union, and we would earnestly pray that despite all discordant opposition from whatever quarter, that this union in the best interests of a common humanity may soon take place.

The sympathetic and deserved reference to that great Canadian, Mr. Dalton McCarthy, meets with our warmest approval. We are persuaded that the life and work of this patriotic statesman, who has been all too soon taken from the public life of this young country, will live on and bear good fruit in the better government of Canada. The lesson of true manly independence taught by him in the exercise of our individual citizenship will be emulated by young Canada in the years to come, so that no party may with impunity trifle with the rights and liberties of our people.

We are glad to learn that the Mutual Benefit Fund of our Order is in so healthy a condition, and hope the advantages it affords to the brethren will be appreciated, and every effort put forth to build it up.

We are heartily in sympathy with the Grand Master's personal references, but feel that we, your committee, cannot allow this occasion to pass without again expressing, as this Grand Lodge has so often done, our admiration and appreciation of the many sacrifices he has made and the noble stand he has always taken in behalf of the principles of our Order. The Order has lately passed through severe trials, and it was only by having a man staunch and true at the helm that we so bravely won. Yet we must remember that there are indications that our trials are not at an end, and we feel that although every attention should be paid to his desire to retire, that for the present we need his services too much to concur, and would therefore urge him most strongly to allow this Grand Lodge to decide whether they feel that his services can yet be spared.

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REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE.

R.W. Bro. H. H. Pitts, P.G.M., New Brunswick, presented and read the report of the Special Committee on Insurance:

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master, Officers and Members of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge of British America:

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren—The Special Committee to whom was referred the report of the Secretary of the Orange Mutual Benefit Fund, beg leave to submit:

1. The Committee did not consider it necessary to examine the books and vouchers of the Benefit Fund, as the same had been audited by the Auditors of the Grand Lodge and an expert as well, but that they have carefully examined the expenditure as presented by Secretary Leighton in his statement of the financial condition of the Benefit Fund, and consider that the expenses of management are exceptionally low—undoubtedly lower than any other similar institution in America; and while of necessity, as the membership in the fund increases, the cost of management may be expected to increase, yet we believe that the low cost of management will still continue.

2. The course pursued by the executors of the Benefit Fund in contesting the fraudulent claim for benefits, thus incurring a considerable expense, has the hearty approval of your committee. Should the law expenses have equalled or oven exceeded the amount of the certificate involved, it was incumbent upon the executors to protect those who were consistent and honest members of the fund from this or any future infringement upon the constitution and rules of the Benefit Fund, and especially when evidence of fraud were so apparent.

3. Your Committee desires to emphasize the reference made by the Secretary to the amount paid over by the Fund to the survivors of those who had been thoughtful of the needs of those whom they left to battle with the world. A good Orangeman is a thoughtful, wise Orangeman, who looks beyond the present and makes provision for the future. Grand Orange Lodge, when it assumed responsibility of the Benefit Fund, never contemplated any financial benefit to the body as an institution, but the principle that governed the promoters of the idea was the necessity of giving material and practical assistance to so many widows and orphans of Orangemen who had not been possessed of abundance of this world's goods. The funds of the Grand Lodge were neither adequate or properly accessible for this purpose, and so the Fund was established, and without any direct expenditure from Grand Lodge funds, the grand total of two hundred and nine thousand six hundred dollars have been paid to the beneficiaries of Orangemen. And who can estimate the incalculable comforts this has brought to so many families that would otherwise have been left in penury and misery. Those who have pushed this branch of the Society against great opposition should have, and doubtless do have, in the contemplation of what it has done, a sufficient remuneration and satisfaction for the expenditure of their efforts, time

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98. May and money. The great regret this Committee has is that so many are thoughtless and procrastinate who ought to at once associate themselves with the Benefit Society. The mere handful in the Fund, compared to our vast and never-ceasing increasing membership demonstrates the fact that there has been masterly inaction in the past, and that this negligence can only be made up by the members here assembled returning to their homes determined to give it their unequivocal and hearty co-operation. Your Committee are assured by the progress that has been attained in the last few months, that the Executive and the present Secretary have caught the true spirit, and that nothing is now lacking but the co-operation of the members. There should be no less ambition on the part of the Order than to report 5,000 members of the Fund at the next meeting. Shall it be work and 5,000, or shall it be fault-finding, insinuations and apathy ! No! it will be a giant stride for the foremost place among beneficient associations, where we rightly belong.

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4. It has been gratifying to the Committee, and will be so appreciated by the Order, that all outstanding claims have been settled; that the surplus from assessments have steadily increased, and that through the indefatigable attention and exertions of the Secretary and Executive that the Benefit Fund is in such a healthy condition. We expect the Excutive to continue their weekly meetings so far as possible and advise the Secretary in those matters wherein it is so necessary to apply the united wisdom of the Board in pushing the objects of the Fund before the Order in general.

5. The appointment of a permanent travelling agent, under salary, is a most commendable step, and is one that will meet the approval of the entire membership of the Benefit Society. Your Committee recognize that the Executive can be ever so diligent, and if the Secretary does not carry out his part of the work, it will be resultless. Again, if the Executive and Secretary be ever so anxious and aggressive they cannot push the work unless they have competent, intelligent agents and workers. Your Committee believe that the time has arrived for a pushing, aggressive policy on the part of the Executive and its agents, and have no doubt the Executive, which is clothed with ample powers, will proceed upon the lines employed by kindred societies to increase the Benefit Fund membership. Your Committee believe that, in connection with the work of the special salaried agent of the Benefit Fund, much can be done to propagate the Order generally; and this we believe could be done (1st) by allowing the agent of the Benefit Fund an allowance of ten dollars for every Orange lodge he is instrumental in organizing, which contains not less than twelve members; and (2nd), that the special inducement for every new member joining the Society for the next six months be offered, with the option on the part of the Grand Master to enlarge this time to the next Grand Lodge meeting; that all new members joining the Society who become members of the Benefit Fund as well, be remitted the three dollars admission fee, thus materially reducing the first cost of the applicant to the Fund; and (3rd), That any member in good standing in a Primary lodge may, if application be made within the next six months, be admitted to the Benefit Fund without the usual payment of three dollars entrance fee.

ADDRESS FROM COUNTY LODGE, CARLETON.

The following address was presented from the County Lodge, Carleton:

N. CLARKE WALLACE, Esq.,

Most Worshipful Grand Master of the Supreme Grand Orange Lodge of British America, the Officers and Members comprising the same:

MOST WORSHIPFUL SIR AND BRETHREN—On behalf of the County Lodge of Carleton, it affords us very much pleasure to welcome you to the Capital of our fair Dominion, where you have assembled for the purpose of holding the 69th Session of this Supreme Grand Lodge.

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It is 19 years since the last meeting of this Supreme Grand Lodge held in Ottawa. APPENDIX B.

SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS.

To the Most Worshipful Grand Master and Members of the Grand Lodge of British America:

Most Worshipful Sir and Brethren—Your Committee on Suspensions and Expulsions beg leave to report that they have very carefully examined the returns from the several Grand Lodges, with the following results:

1. Grand Lodge of British Columbia—Eighty-nine suspensions are reported for non-payment of dues until dues are paid. All sustained. Attention is drawn to the fact that in the report of the Grand Secretary of British America, ninety-two suspensions are reported, but this appears to be inaccurate, and if so found, should be corrected. One expulsion, said to be for "Violation of the Constitution and Laws," but no particulars are given as to the alleged violation, and your Committee, in consequence, are unable to decide upon the validity of the expulsion, and therefore recommend that the return be referred back, with instructions to have this information inserted and then reported back to this Most Worshipful Grand Lodge for further consideration at the next session thereof.

2. Grand Lodge of North-West Territories.—Twenty-eight suspensions are reported, of which twenty-one are for non-payment of dues, one for violation of obligation, and six referred to as follows: Names not given. Report referred back for correction. The report does not show for how long the twenty-one brethren suspended for non-payment of dues were suspended, which, under Rule 150, can only be "until dues are paid." With an amendment of the report to show the term of suspension, all these twenty-one suspensions are sustained. As to Bro. J. B. Sandford, of L.O. L. 1631, suspended for "Violation of Obligation," no particulars are given as to the alleged violation, and your Committee, in consequence, are unable to decide upon the validity of the expulsion, and therefore recommend that the return be referred back with instructions to have this information inserted and then reported back to this M.W. Grand Lodge for further consideration at the next session thereof. As to the six members whose names are not given and as to whom the report is stated

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ereby oba in ion. to have been referred back for correction, your Committee recommend that no action be taken until the report shall have been amended as ordered. Attention is drawn to the fact that in the report of the Grand Secretary of British America eight suspensions are reported, but this is clearly inaccurate and should be corrected. No expulsions are reported.

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 Grand Lodge of Manitoba—Sixty-nine suspensions are reported in the R.W. Provincial Grand Lodge return. All of which are sustained.

Three expulsions are reported and are all sustained.

4. Ontario West-Twelve suspensions are reported in the R.W. Provincial Grand Lodge return, although the M.W. Grand Secretary of British America in his report states that there were 1,298 suspensions, which information was procured from the report regarding County Masters and Secretaries. No explanation is given of the discrepancy. Your Committee recommend that the report be referred back for amendment by having this information inserted, and be returned to this M.W. Grand Lodge for further consideration at the next session thereof. At the same time your Committee recommend most strongly that James Hammond, John Tisdale, Hamilton Tisdale, and Walter Thompson, of L.O.L. No. 353, the "Melancthon fire-bugs," convicted of arson, being liable to expulsion under Rule 145 "for being convicted of felony by a court of competent jurisdiction," should not have heen merely suspended for "two years from June, 1897," but must be expelled. The Constitution of the Loyal Orange Association does not compromise over criminal matters of this nature, but peremptorily requires that every criminal be expelled. The Primary Lodge should be forthwith ordered to expel these men and report back through the various intervening lodges that such has been done, and your Committee recommends accordingly. Twenty-two expulsions are reported in the R.W. Provincial Grand Lodge detailed return, although the M.W.G.S. of British America in his report states that there were 53 expulsions, which information was doubtless procured from the report regarding County Masters and Secretaries. No explanation is made of the discrepancies between these returns, and this should be attended to at once, so that the statistics of the membership of Grand Lodge should be correct and reliable in every particular. The expulsions referred to in the report are recommended to be dealt with as follows: As to L.O.L. No. 617, where an expulsion is reported, neither name nor offence is given, and the report must be amended by inserting full particulars thereof. As to Joshua Madeson, L.O.L. No. 1020 (Nipissing), and John Robinson, L.O.L. No. 758 (Simcoe East), in respect of whom no date or offence is given, the report must be amended by inserting full particulars thereof. The remaining 19 expulsions are sustained. The report should be referred back for amendment as indicated, and should be returned to this M.W. Grand Lodge for further consideration and action at the next session thereof.

5. Grand Lodge of Ontario East—Two hundred and fifty-eight suspensions are reported in the R.W. Grand Lodge return, although the M.W.G.S. of British America in his report states that there were 425 suspensions. No explanation is made of the discrepancy between these returns, and this should be attended to and corrected at once. The sus-

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pensions reported in the return of the R.W.G.L. are sustained. Thirty-five expulsions are reported in the R.W. Grand Lodge return, although the M.W.G.S. of British America in his report states that there were 39 expulsions. This is clearly inaccurate and should be amended accordingly. The report expels a large number of members for "violation of obligation," but does not state in what particular the obligation was violated; in default of which information your Committee are unable to conclude whether the punishment should be suspension or expulsion, and therefore recommend that the report be referred back for this information to be inserted and then returned to this M.W.G.L. for further consideration at the next session thereof. As to the other expulsions contained in the report, the same are sustained.

6. Grand Lodge of Quebec—Five suspensions are reported in the R.W. Grand Lodge detailed return, although the M.W.G.S. of British America in his report states that there were 19 suspensions. No explanation is made of the discrepancy between these returns, and this should be attended to and corrected at once. The above five suspensions are all sustained. Four expulsions are reported in the R.W. Grand Lodge detailed return, although the M.W.G.S. of British America in his report states that there were nine expulsions. No explanation is made of the discrepancy between these returns, and as this is clearly inaccurate it should be corrected at once. The four expulsions are all sustained.

 Grand Lodge of New Brunswick—One hundred and sixty-seven suspensions are reported. All are sustained. Eight expulsions are reported. All are sustained.

8. Grand Lodge of Nova Scotia—Twenty-five suspensions are reported in the R.W.G.L. return, although the M.W.G.S. of British America in his report states that there were 190 suspensions. No explanation is made of the discrepancy between these returns, and this should be attended to and corrected at once. The above 25 suspensions are all sustained. Eight expulsions are reported in the R.W. Grand Lodge return, although the M.W.G.S. of British America in his report states that there were 9 expulsions. This is clearly incorrect and should be corrected. The 8 expulsions are all sustained.

9. Grand Lodge of Prince Edward—No expulsions were reported in the R.W. Grand Lodge return, although the M.W.G.S. of British America in his report states that there were 23 suspensions. No explanation is made, and proper enquiry should be made and correct return made at once. No expulsions are reported.

10. Grand Lodge of Newfoundland—One hundred and seventy-nine spensions are reported. All are sustained. Five expulsions are reported. All are sustained. Referring to the report of the Committee on Suspensions and Expulsions, dated 26th May, 1897, the Grand Lodge of Ontario East has given considerable further information required by that report, but L.O.L. Nos. 352, 912 and 528 have not yet reported to their superior lodge, and your Committee recommend that they be called on to report at once. The additional returns required from the Provincial Grand Lodges of Manitoba, Ontario West, New Brunswick and

Nova Scotia are not forthcoming, and should be supplied at once-and considered by this M.W. Grand Lodge at the next session thereof. Your Committee also draw attention to the clause in last year's report which directs that proper enquiries be made, with the object of showing whether the directions given by this M.W. Grand Lodge in previous years relating to returns of suspensions and expulsions have ever been obeyed. No further information is forthcoming and no enquiries appear to have been made. Your Committee reiterate the recommendation contained in last year's report, and would suggest that the M.W. Grand Secretary of British America be charged with this duty and instructed to lay full and complete information relating thereto before this M.W. Grand Carand Lodge at the next session thereof.

11. Your Committee also reiterate the recommendation of last year that the form of return be so amended as to give the additional information referred to.

12. Your Committee again draw attention to the fact that the number of suspensions for non-payment of dues is still unduly large—the total number of suspensions this year amounting to 2,471, as against 2,418 last year—an increase of 53 more than last year. The expulsions this year total 127, as against 166 last year, a decrease of 39. It will be seen at a glance what tremendous inroads are made in our membership every year by these suspensions. Your Committee are strongly of opinion that this huge drain could be largely stopped if greater care was exercised by the officers of the Primary lodges in personally visiting brethren in arrears for dues in order to induce them, if possible, to keep their dues paid, and not permit them to run so far in arrear that payment becomes impossible and thus leads to suspension. In order to overcome this difficultty to some extent, your Committee reiterates the recommendation of last year that a special circular be prepared (by the Grand Secretary of British America) and forwarded to every Primary lodge, drawing attention to this, and urging the lodges to amend their by-laws by requiring their Financial Secretary to communicate with the members in arrear regularly at least once every three months and presenting returns as to dues in arrears; and recommending that the officers of the lodge then personally canvass every member in arrears and urging their utmost endeavors to secure payment thereof. Your Committee is positively assured that greater care and attention in this regard would be of the greatest benefit to the Association and to the individual

APPENDIX E

GRAND ORANGE LODGE OF BRITISH AMERICA.

The recognition of the Orangemen of Canada appears to have been determined upon at a meeting held in the City of London, England, in April, 1832, of what was called the Grand Lodge of the Empire. This meeting was presided over by His Royal Highness Prince Ernest, Duke of Cumberland, King of Hanover, K.G. Ogle R. Gowan, afterwards Lieutenant-Colonel and member of Parliament, was at this meeting appointed Deputy Grand Master of all the Provinces of British America, with the dependencies, colonies and settlements belonging, appertaining or adjacent thereto. Bro. Gowan held the office of Grand Master of the Grand Orange Lodge of British America up to the Grand Lodge meeting held in the year 1846. There are no reports in possession of the compiler to show what brethren were associated with him as Grand Lodge officers. The following brethren held the offices for the years placed opposite their names:
