A distinctly unfortunate ircumstance has been reached, whereby through the imployers' attempt at a dictatorship, they have perpaps unwittingly given a wider scope to the lawless sections of the I. W. W. and its kindred ilk.

the protection of the legitimate international trade mion organization, through autocracy of the employer, here is but one avenue, and that leads to mob associa-tion, with its wrecking implements. The harassed efforts of the pioneer, continued with lack of sympathy from within and without, have finally been acknowledged as correct, and the results attained are in the nature of a repayment for those who blazed the trail.
