## ELECTRICAL LORE.

Ontario Hydro Electric Commission

Takes a Helpful Step.

The Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission has just issued a book of rules and regulations to be followed by all persons using Hydro electric power. The purpose of the book is to eliminate the risk of loss of life and property by electricity and provide a standard for electrical installation and electrical work over the province. The Hydro-Electric department intends to provide all customers, both commercial and private, with free copies of the book.

The book is an excellent encyclopedia of 128 pages. The rules are all set out in black type, and following them are the illustrations, diagrams, and instructions, with pictures and diagrams, to illustrate and make everything simple.

Section A deals with the electrical plant and all the component parts. There are rules for the use of generators, storage batteries, switchboards, lighting apparatus, transformers, motors, electric cranes, collectors and out-puts.

In section B installation work is discussed and rules are given which, if followed closely, are expected to eliminate all the danger of electrical fire caused by defective wiring, and of loss of life through electrocution. "Strikes and sparks" may not be in plain sight, but it is one of the many rules under this section.

No one then who is given for wiring in theatres and moving picture establishments.

In the miscellaneous section rules are given for the use of electricity in electric railway work, wireless telegraphy and signaling.

Instructions on transmission from electric shock are found in the appendix. The appendix contains a list of the names of the various electrical engineers and electricians in the province.

Prisoner to Policeman.

To take a prisoner from the dock and give him a job in the police department was the extraordinary proposal made to Chief Vincent by Magistrate Elliott at Saint John's recently, when Paddy O'Neill, former guardman from the British army, who had been serving in St. John's, was given the honor of having crossed the International Railway bridge into Canada, contrary to the immigration act.

## VOLCANES IN BRITAIN.

Eruptions of Ancient Times Formed

When the report of a destructive volcanic eruption appears in our newspapers, most English people read with some satisfaction that such awe-inspiring displays of nature's terrible power are never seen in this country. The British Isles, however, have not always been free from volcanic outbreaks. Some of the greatest eruptions known have occurred within the United Kingdom. But our volcanoes have been extinct for ages. The last British volcanic fire died down long before man made his appearance on the earth. Though great numbers of other creatures must have lost their lives during the eruptions which occurred.

Geologists have discovered traces of the action of these old volcanoes in many parts of both Britain and Ireland. Those who have visited the Lake District have probably walked over beds of lava which were poured out of the bowels of the earth during what has been termed the "great fire." The eastern shore of Lake Derwent, where the town of Keswick is situated, is a fine example of a lava flow. No fewer than twelve distinct beds of lava have been noted there, piled up to an altitude of 1,500 feet above the sea level.

One of these hills, named Castle Rock, is the summit of the volcano, whence came the huge mass of molten rock which formed the neighboring heights. Westward, again, the deepest lake in Cumberland, and Thirlmere, the source of Manchester's water supply, are entirely surrounded by the volcanic rocks of which Scawfell, Helvellyn, and other huge mountains are composed.

Wales was the scene of numerous eruptions. Volcanic rocks are found everywhere in the Snowdon district, where lavas and ashes build up a great mountain peak. Myrddyn Mawr (great mountain), three miles west of Snowdon, has been proved to be the remains of one of these volcanoes.

In Scotland, at a somewhat later period, a line of volcanic cones, which the liquid rock elevated right across the country. One of the best-known of these is Arthur's Seat. These facts led our ancestors to the conclusion that a causeway had been constructed by giants for the purpose of connecting Ireland with Scotland. It is known, however, that these columns, which have four, were more, result from the cooling of hot lava.

It is not possible to state exactly the extent of the outflow of volcanic products which took place in this area, but it was certainly the greatest as well as the latest of British volcanic eruptions. A moderate estimate of the area covered by the lava streams is 50,000 square miles. Part of this great tract is now covered by the sea. It is worthy of notice that the volcanic rocks occur in those parts of the country which are famous for fine scenery. This is a clear connection between rugged scenery and volcanic rocks. The Lake District, Wales, and Scotland owe to their volcanic past the eruptions which millions of years ago mingled igneous with sedimentary rocks.

**Exit the Postage Stamp?**  
Is the postage stamp doomed? It is a most interesting question, hailing from New Zealand, where it has been tried with great success, is generally adopted by the postal authorities of the world. In the future, instead of buying postage stamps, "licking" or otherwise molesting the gum on their backs and applying sufficient pressure to cause adherence, all we may need to do will be to put our letters under a machine and turn a crank.

The machine, which in New Zealand is owned by the postal authorities, records the amount stamped, just like a gas meter, and payment is made by the meter. It is a very simple machine, and is operated by hand. It gives impressions of half-penny, one, three and six pence and one shilling. As a precaution against fraud, the machine is turned out from the post office with only one meter. On opening them, and that is by a patent lock, the key of which is held by the meter. The meter is a very simple machine, and is operated by hand. It gives impressions of half-penny, one, three and six pence and one shilling. As each impression is made its value is automatically recorded on a set of dials at the top of the machine.

**Introducing New Clock.**  
The British postal authorities, in order to educate the public into counting the hours of their day from one to twenty-four, have decided to introduce special clocks at the general post office in London. The hour is to be counted in the ordinary way from midnight to noon, but at mid-day a new clock face will automatically cover the other and will show the hours numbered from thirteen to twenty-four.
