

Eruptions of Ancient Times Former

VOLCANOES IN BRITAIN.

When the report of a destructive volcanic eruption appears in our newspapers, most English people reflect, with some satisfaction that such awe-inspiring displays of nature's terrible power are never seen in this country. The Estish Isles, however, have not always been free from volcanic outbursts. Some of the greatest eruptions known have occurred within the United Kingdom. But our volcances have been extinct for ages. The last British volcanic fire died down long before man made his appearance on the earth, though great numbers of other creatures must have lost their lives during the eruptions which occurred.

Geologists have discovered traces of the action of these old volcances in many parts of both Britain and Ireland.

Those who have visited the Lake District have probably walked over beds of lava, which were poured out of the bowels of the earth during what has been tarmed the "age of fire." The eastern shore of Lake Derwent-wise for the appeal is lined with hills which are composed of abeats of lava and ashes. No fewer than twelve distinct beds of lava have been noted there, piled up to an altitude of 1,500 feet above the sea level.

One of these hills, named Castle Head, is the sump of the volcano, whence came the huge mass of molten rock which formed the neighboring heights. Wastwater, again, the deepest lake in Cumberland, and Thirlmere, the source of Manchester's water supply, are entirely surrounded by

supply, are entirely surrounded by volcanic rocks of which Scawfell, lyellyn, and other huge mountains composed.

Wales was the scene of numerous eruptions. Volcanic rocks are found over a great part of North Wales, especially in the Snowdon district, where lavas and ashes build up a great mountain group. Mynydd Mawr (great mountain), three miles west of Snowdon, has been proved to be the remains of one of these volcances.

In Scotland, at a somewhat later period, a line of volcanic cones belching forth liquid rock stretched right across the country. One of the best known of these is Arthur's Seat.

These facts led our ancestors to the conclusion that a causeway had been constructed by giants for the purpose of connecting Ireland with Scotland. It is known, however, that these columns, which have four, five, six, or even more, sides, result from the cooling of hot lava.

It is not possible to state exactly the extent of the outflow of volcanic products which took place in this area, but it was certainly the greatest as well as the last of British volcanic eruptions. A moderate estimate of the area covered by the lava streams is 60,000 square miles. Part of this great tract is now covered by the sea.

It is worthy of notice that the volcanic rocks occur in those parts of the country which are famous for fine scenery. This is a close connection between rugged scenery and volcanic rocks. The Lake District, Wales, and Scotland owe much of their beauty to the eruptions which millions of years ago mingled igneous with sedimentary rocks.

Is the postage stamp doomed?

It is if a postal innovation hailing from New Zealand, where it has been tried with great success, is generally adopted by the postal authorities of the world. In the future, instead of buying postage stamps, "licking" or otherwise moistening the gum on their backs and applying sufficient pressure to cause adherence, all we may need to do will be to put our letters under a machine and turn a crank.

The machine, which in New Zealand is rented from the postal authorities, records the amount stamped, just like a gas meter, and payment is made to a collector, who calls at intervals. It gives impressions of halfpenny, one, three and six peace and one shilling, and as each impression is made its value is automatically recorded on a set of dials at the top of the machine.
