### Grand Liberal Demonstration at Oak Bay

**DR. PUGSLEY and Wm. F. TODD Deliver Ringing Speeches**

**Plans Ready for Public Works for Charlotte and Tenders will be Asked for at Once**

**Big Meeting at Milltown**

The gathering at Oak Bay Wednesday in the interests of W. F. Todd the Liberal candidate for Charlotte was a rousing success and was attended by over 1000 people. Dr. Pugsley and Mr. Todd delivered strong and convincing speeches. Hearty cheers were given Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Dr. Pugsley and Mr. Todd, and the gathering then adjourned to enjoy the delights of a clam bake near the shore.

In Eaton's Hall, Milltown, in the evening the Milltown band played selections until the arrival of the speakers. The hall was quickly filled, and a large number stood throughout the meeting. Harrison McAlister, chairman of the Liberal executive, presided.

He would not occupy any time, he said, by a discussion of these matters, but in view of the present campaign of slander in which his opponents had been engaged he could not help applying to some of his opponents the words of the psalmist: "They have sharpened their tongues like a serpent, adder's poison is under their lips."

There was a great opportunity, Dr. Pugsley continued, for a representative of the county to do splendid work for his constituents. The county had a most important coast line, a number of fine harbors including St. Andrews, St. George and L'Etang, all of which, if properly developed, might attract very considerable shipping to the great advantage of the locality and the prestige and importance of the whole county.

Dr. Pugsley then went on to explain that it was largely because of the tariff policy and vigorous immigration policy resulting in a rapid increase in the population, that more had been accomplished for the progress and advancement of the Dominion than in all the years of Conservative rule. He emphasized the fact that these improvements had been had been paid out of current revenue and that, in addition, the government had expended the enormous sum of \$121,015,115 in developing transportation.

These improvements were of such national character that they might properly have been paid out of capital. It was a marvelous fact, he said, that while during eighteen years the Conservatives were in power they increased the public debt no less than \$118,000,000 the great public improvements carried out by the Liberal party had been paid almost entirely out of surplus current revenue. The public debt during the last twelve years had been increased only \$19,463,457.

MINISTER GIVES CONVINCING FIGURES. After a reference to the improvements in the conditions of labor under Liberal rule and to the increase in wages, Dr. Pugsley spoke of the better prices which farmers received for their product, which had resulted in their purchasing power being increased. He also took up the case of the postal department, contrasting the deficit of \$700,000 under the Conservatives with the reduced rates for postage inaugurated by the Liberal government and the surplus of more than \$1,000,000 which had been obtained.

MINISTER WAS IN GRAND FORM. Dr. Pugsley, who was in excellent voice, had every reason to feel gratified with the reception accorded him. On rising the audience cheered him to the echo. Dr. Pugsley, in his opening remarks, referred briefly to the attempts being made by many of the Conservative speakers to distract attention from the important issues of the campaign by making unjust attacks upon himself in regard to his course while a member of the provincial government.

THE SLANDERERS ARE DEALT WITH. He would not occupy any time, he said, by a discussion of these matters, but in view of the present campaign of slander in which his opponents had been engaged he could not help applying to some of his opponents the words of the psalmist: "They have sharpened their tongues like a serpent, adder's poison is under their lips."

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He mentioned further that the rate of customs taxation had been reduced from \$18.28 on each \$100 worth of goods imported to \$15.86, and quoted other figures to show the prosperity which had resulted from a wise and prudent administration. He went on to ridicule the cry of the Conservatives that it was time for a change, and asked if the people would be likely to trust Mr. Foster as finance minister again. The Conservative argument, he said, was based entirely on scandal, and he proceeded to refer briefly to the different scandalous crises, touching on the Saskatchewan Valley land deal, the Robbins irrigation scheme and others. He showed that the charges made were not worthy of the attention of the electorate in view of the satisfactory record of the government and its tariff policy and general energetic rule.

Dr. Pugsley then turned to discuss briefly the imputation of Mr. Bowser, attorney general of British Columbia, who had come all the way to New Brunswick for the purpose of seeking to frighten the people, that the subjects of Japan would come to Eastern Canada to take the place of white labor.

If there was one thing more than another which rebounded to the credit of Sir Wilfrid Laurier it was that when the Japanese riots took place in British Columbia and the government was called upon to denounce the treaty of alliance between Great Britain and Japan he stood up in his place in parliament and raised public clamor, stating that the manufacturer of Canada were too deeply interested and that development of trade and imperial interests were too deeply involved to warrant such a course without first making every reasonable effort to induce Japan to exercise her influence in preventing large immigration to British Columbia.

He pointed to the fact that Japan was rising power in the east and that Canada should not lightly take any steps which would break up the alliance between the two empires. The time might come when, owing to complications in Europe, the ships of Great Britain and Japan might be floating side by side in the harbors of British Columbia, sailing together for the defense of Canada. The government took the wise course of sending to Japan, Hon. Mr. Loucheux, who had effected a satisfactory arrangement.

STAS CHARLOTTE AGAIN IN LINE. In closing Dr. Pugsley expressed his conviction that Sir Wilfrid Laurier would receive an emphatic renewal of confidence on October 26. From reports from the various sections of Charlotte County he believed that they would send Mr. Todd to parliament and that the constituency would again range itself under the Liberal banner and declare adhesion to the policy which had made for national development, progress and prosperity.

The minister was cheered again and again as he resumed his seat. George M. Byron brought the meeting to a close in a fitting speech which was greatly to the liking of his audience. His witty sallies at the expense of the opposition kept his hearers in roars of laughter.

Cheers for the speakers and a selection by the band concluding with the national anthem closed one of the most successful political gatherings ever held in this town.

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### W. F. TODD FOR OTTAWA

"Although my head is getting grey, and I am making the mistake of being coming too prevalent, that of getting old, I have still a few kicks in my body. I can do something yet for my party and something yet for my country. We have been twelve years in office. Twelve years is not a very long period in the history of Canada, but those twelve years will count in the life of this nation. As everybody knows, those twelve years have been years of unequalled prosperity but it must be recognized that those twelve years have lifted Canada from a position of inferiority to a position of exaltedness which it never had before. When we took office in 1896 Canada was a small colony, hardly known in France, though France had been its cradle; hardly known in Great Britain, though it was the gen of the British Crown; hardly known by our own neighbors to the south, although our frontier line runs with theirs across the continent; hardly known in Europe. But today, after our twelve years of office, Canada has become a new star to which is directed the gaze of the whole civilized world. That is what we have done."—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, at Stormont.

The Liberal leader in Opposition was surrounded by a host of the highest character and ability. The Conservative leader in Opposition is surrounded by pignies. Who have been Borden's lieutenants in the House of Commons? Apart from Mr. Osler, who is a C. P. R. director, and Mr. Monk, the French-Canadian leader, has there been a man of first-class ability and untarnished reputation behind Mr. Borden? There is George Eulas Foster, who in office betrayed his leader, and in private life violated a trust which every honorable man would consider sacred. There is Fowler, who remains silent under a sorry accusation, and whose Western deals have been a public scandal. There is Lefurgey, confederate of Fowler in his secret negotiations with railway corporations by which he pocketed a nice fortune in land speculation. There is Pope, the ringleader of the gang, who financed his enterprises on the credit of railway magnates, and who now repeats his secret negotiations with railway corporations by which he pocketed a nice fortune in land speculation. There is Bennett, a parliamentary hoodlum, with a penchant for slander and coarse abuse, and who was leagued, with Pope and Fowler in some of their Western exploitations.

Go over the whole list, present and prospective, and you will find that Mr. Borden, with all his boasts about Cabinet material, faces the country with as sorry a following as ever a leader had in this or any other country. He himself falls far below the standard that Canada has set for her statesmen.

Is there any national person who is prepared to vote to hand over the Government to these men?

When Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. W. S. Fielding, whose honesty and integrity are known to all men, are being assailed in all quarters as thieves and robbers and looters of the public treasury the time has come for plain speech. So far the Liberal Party has refrained from other than the discussion of public issues; but if this sort of despicable Tory warfare is to be continued, the Liberal Party will be forced to strike back and to strike at the vulnerable points of which there are not a few. It is deplorable that public discussion should be degraded to the gutter. It will be still more deplorable if a party which has endeavored to discuss public questions and public issues on their merits, without recourse to personal matters, shall be compelled to retaliate.

In the meantime the Liberal Party must gird on its armor and fight this cowardly campaign of lying and slandering to the death trusting to the good sense of decent people, actuated by a spirit of fair play and justice, to see to it that the Laurier Government is not led of office, and that men who have given faithful and honorable service to the country are not made the victims of a canvass which has already outraged every canon of decency and fair play.

The Liberal Party is going to win this fight, but it rests with its friends and supporters everywhere to do their part workably and well. In this, there is reason to hope, they will have the active assistance of many Conservatives who are not in sympathy with the methods employed in the name of their party. For, as Mr. B. W. Thomson, the veteran journalist and Canadian correspondent of the Boston Transcript, whose impartiality is attested by the Halifax Tory organ, wrote to his paper a few days ago: "Anything short of a stiff public rebuke to Laurier's opponents would be a condonation of a campaign consisting largely of deliberate, malignant slander, the success of which would degrade Canadian public life for several generations."

In Charlotte the Liberals who gave their support to the Hazen party, in local issues, will to a man support W. F. Todd in the Federal fight.

Driven to desperation the Tories are starting a riot of corruption and political delinquency in the County. This is the basis of all their political efforts.

The agencies of persuasion, of which the Tory politician knows the precise operation, are beginning to reach certain parts of the County. Watch them!

Let there be no mistake about it Laurier is going to finish his work. Laurier has made Canada the nation of the Twentieth Century, and nothing is too good for him.

Over in New Brunswick the cause of Liberalism has gained ground so rapidly that they are looking for a solid delegation for the Party of Progress. Here's hoping.—Halifax Chronicle.

Members of labor unions have the right and should carefully consider the promises and Acts of different political parties, and vote as they believe the best interests of the country lies.

"Better men and better times" is the Conservative campaign slogan. Better men? Borden for Laurier; Foster for Fielding; Fowler for Pugsley; Pope Lefurgey and Bennett for Lemieux, Aylesworth and Patterson! Think it over.

The strain of new promises and larger responsibilities must be wearing on a man, even if he imagines himself a politician.

There is Mr. Foster, the man who profited by a personal speculation with 'Trust Funds'; there are Fowler and Lefurgey, the members of Parliament who sought favors from the powerful railway corporations when they were elected to stand between the people and the greed of just such bodies, and there are others whose reputation is no strength to the conservative party."

Mr. Borden in a recent speech from which a quotation is made in another column, says he has absolute confidence in Mr. Hugh Graham's word then he can scarcely decline to accept that gentleman's advice with respect to Foster Fowler & Co.

Charlotte County harbors enjoyed the advantage of being the ports nearest Montreal and the great centres of traffic in the west which were open at all seasons of the year.

The Dominion was in its infancy, but the grain and cattle trade of the west, as well as the products of the farm, had already attained large proportions and were adding vastly to the trade of the St. Lawrence in summer and of the ports of the maritime provinces in the winter. He saw no reason why parts of Charlotte county should not receive some of the benefit from the growing traffic. Therefore it was of great importance to this constituency that they should have at Ottawa a man like Mr. Todd, full of hope and confidence in the country's possibilities, prepared to assist the grand Canadian policy to which the Liberal party was devoting its best energies of sending Canadian trade through Canadian channels to Canadian ports.—Dr. Pugsley at Milltown.

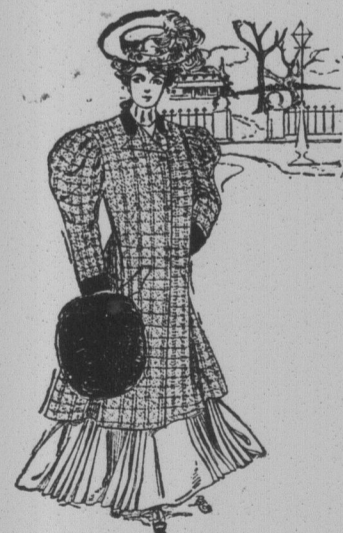

A strange fish has made its appearance among the sardine herring caught in these waters. They have been found in considerable quantities and have proved to be most excellent sardine fish. They are said to be a variety of the herring family known as the Pilchard, abundant in the Mediterranean and on the Atlantic coasts of Europe, northward to the British Channel. Sardine is another name for the same fish among the people on the coast of Brittany and Normandy. The Pilchard is smaller than the herring but thicker with the body shaped more like a mackerel; the upper part of the body bluish green, the sides and belly silvery white. In the early spring they are found in immense shoals off the coast of Cornwall, where they are caught principally for exportation to Sicily and Sardinia, whence they are returned to Europe as sardines.—Eastport Sentinel

The Liberal party was in favour of building a new railway line to increase the transportation facilities of this Dominion and to give it a greater width or as Sir Wilfrid Laurier put it, that it was the policy of his party to build from ocean to ocean railway line that would roll back the map of Canada another hundred miles. Mr. Borden recognized the necessity of improved transportation facilities, but his policy was to buy up several existing lines that would not have opened up an acre of new country, that would not have created one day's labor, but which would have simply taken the money out of the Dominion Treasury and transferred it to the pockets of certain railway magnates. The verdict of the people was that the railway policy of the Liberal party should be earned to a successful issue and as a result hundreds of miles of this new transcontinental railway line is now in operation.

**Development of Great West**  
Concurrent with the vigorous immigration policy, the Government took every means in their power to make it easy for settlers to get well started in the West. Every effort was put forth to make the new comers, as well as the old timers, perfectly satisfied and contented. Land speculation, which was rife under the Conservatives was stopped. Homestead laws were simplified and made more liberal. Local agents were appointed at many places to facilitate homestead entries. More liberal terms were given to settlers to buy school lands. Settlers were granted liberal timber permits. Bondsmen (farmers) were relieved from seed grain liability extending back to 1885. Tree planting was started, and 12 million trees have, up to date, been set out. The grain elevator grievances of Western farmers were removed.  
The Manitoba grain Act and the Grain Inspection past at the last session protect the high standards of Western grain from inferior mixtures, and secure to the farmer the increased values attaching to those standards.  
In a hundred other ways, too numerous to mention in this synopsis, the farmer in the West has been encouraged. The keynote of the Government has been—"The public lands to the bona fide settler on the most generous and liberal terms."

In 1906 a special Census was taken by the Government, and the figures show that the population had then increased to 808,863.  
The number of farms being worked there, in 1901, was 54,625, and in 1906 there were 120,439, or more than double what there were in 1901.  
By increasing the population and the productive area of the country, the Government has helped the manufacturers in the best possible way.  
As every Canadian of the North West knows the great development brought about a legitimate demand from the people there for local Government, and in conformity with their wishes two new Provinces—Saskatchewan and Alberta—were created making nine in all in the Dominion—a nice array.

"From the Red River to the Rocky Mountains there were, in 1896, something like 250,000 people settled, with just as many going out as coming in. What is now the Province of Alberta was stagnant and bankrupt. A part of British Columbia was absolutely undeveloped, I am bound to say, as far as I am concerned, that I never had but one idea when I went to Ottawa. I believed that Western Canada was as fine a country as existed in the world, and I determined that a change must be made. Nobody thought that I could make that change. My colleagues did not think that I could, and they did not believe in the methods that I adopted, nor did my opponents believe in them. I had my own opinions, I backed my own opinions. Well, a great many things conspired to assist in the work which we were carrying on, but I think I am correct in saying this, when I left office in 1903—the Dominion of Canada, especially the Northwest Provinces, was the best developed country in the world." "If anybody owns land in the Northwest Provinces for speculation, it is land granted under the legislation of the Conservative party. Our record is clear. In addition to the fifty-six million acres granted for purposes of railway land grants, a vast quantity was held subject to the selection of the company, and it took twelve long years to get this land grant settled up. Last year the last of the land in this section area was taken up, and thirty million acres came back to the Government. What happened? This whole area was thrown open to the actual settler, a fact which formed a final crowning proof that the policy of the Liberal party is the land for the settler."  
"They say that we gave the land to the speculator, but I should like to know where. Since 1896 the Government at Ottawa has granted 35,000,000 acres of land as homesteads to the individual settler. 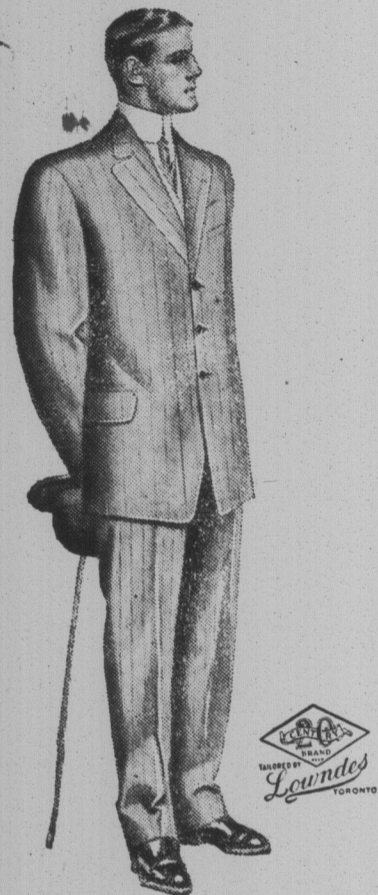
