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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

Youn Scotin Eastern Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 1st.—This body shall be called the Eastern Baptist Association of Nova Scotia, and shall consist of Delegates representing the Churches of which it is composed, each of whom shall be a member of one of those churches, together with Delegates from Corresponding Associations, not exceeding five from any one Association; and such others as may, by the Association, be invited to sit in Council; none but delegates being entitled to vote, and such only as represent churches being elligible to office, or to vote for officers.

ART 2nd.—Each church connected with the body may send five Delegates besides its Pastor.

ART 3rd.—The object of this Association being the cultivation of Christian Union, the promotion of individual godliness, and by mutual consultation, to seek, in the use of Scriptural measures, the extension of the Redeems Kingdom—it disclaims all authority over churches, and shall in no case interfere with their internal con erns, or their entire scriptural independency. Yet it may dissolve its connection with any church that, upon sufficient examination, shall be judged by the Association to have departed essentially from Scripture principles or Baptist faith and practice.

ART. 4th.—This Association shall meet at such time and place as it may appoint, and the meetings shall be opened with devotional exercises.

ART. 5th.—The Officers of the Association shall be—a Moderator, who shall preside at all the meetings, nominate all the Committees not otherwise provided for, and perform all the duties naturally connected with such office; a Clerk who shall keep a record of all the business transacted, prepare the Minutes for the press, and attend to their distribution; and a Treasurer, who shall receive all the moneys contributed for the purposes of the Association, and dispose of them according to its direction. All the officers shall remain in office until their successors are chosen.

ART. 6th.—The religious sentiments of this body are those expressed in the "Articles of the Faith and Practice of the Baptist Churches in Nova

ART. 7th.—The Association may receive any Church which, by letter, shall apply for admission, and shall give satisfactory evidence of its faith and order, in agreement with the religious sentiments of this body; and each Church belonging to this body shall send annually a letter, containing an account of its history for the year preceding, particularly of its additions and diminutions, with its number then in fellowship.—also, money to assist in publishing the Minutes. Any Church that for three successive years omits sending any Letter, Delegates, or money, shall be considered withdrawn from the Association, and shall be discontinued from the Minutes, unless sufficient reason may appear to account for the omission, or provided it may appear desirable to make some inquiry, by committee or otherwise, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

Agr. 8th.—This Constitution may be altered or amended by a vote of two-thirds of the members at any annual meeting of the Association.

BULES OF ORDER.

RULE 1st.—At each annual meeting the Letters from the Churches shall be handed to the clerk, who shall retire and make out a list of the delegates the Moderator meanwhile shall conduct devotional exercises.

2nd .- From the list so prepared the Moderator shall be chosen by ballot-

3rd.—The first letter read shall be from the Church with which the

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Association is assembled.

4th.-No subject shall be discussed without a motion first made and seconded, and no person shall speak on any subject more than twice unless by consent of the Association.

5th -When any Church is received, the Moderator shall give to one of

its delegates the right hand of fellowship.

6th .- At the commencement of each sitting the Minutes of the preceding one shall be read and approved, and of the last before the final adjourment. 7th .- Motions made and lost shall not be recorded on the Minutes except so ordered by the Association.

8th .- All resolutions shall be presented in writing.

9th.—Each meeting for business shall be commenced and concluded with

10th.—The Committee of Arrangement shall, in addition to the provision for the "order of business," provide also for the discussion of the more prominent topics, Education and Missions, by appointing one or more persons to speak upon them. Said Committee shall further recommend the place for the succeeding Association, the preacher of the Associational Sermon, and the writer of the Circular Letter.

11th.—No delegate shall leave the Association before the business is finished, without permission of the body.

12th.—These Rules shall be read by the Moderator at the commencement

of each annual session of the Association.

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REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

The Committee on Obituaries beg leave to report that during the past year, two valued young brethren have been removed by death from our midst, viz:—Bro. Aaron Ross, of Margaree, C. B.,

and Bro. Joseph H. Pipes, of Amherst.

Brother Aaron Ross was converted at Horton about three years ago. His mind became impressed by words which fell from the lips of Dr. Sawyer in a social meeting at Wolfville; these were used by the Holy Spirit as the means of leading Him to Jesus; where He found peace. He was baptized by Rev. S. W. DeBlois, and soon afterwards entered upon the work of the ministry. He labored earnestly and faithfully in this work during two vacations. Subsequently he was compelled by failing health to abandon his studies and return to his home in Cape Breton, where after a short but painful illness, he fell asleep in Jesus. He was a diligent and punctual student, and an earnest christian worker. His fellowstudents and more intimate friends and relatives sincerely mourn his early removal. His absence leaves a blank in our ranks, but we trust he has entered upon the rest remaining for the people of God.

Brother Joseph H. Pipes was welcomed into the church of Christ by Revd. D. A. Steele, of Amherst, whose heart was gladdened by seeing him engage in preparation for the work of the ministry. He entered Acadia College intending to take a full course, but was compelled to relinquish that object by the failure of his health. He engaged in preaching the gospel as often as the state of his health permitted. His efforts were creditable to himself, and highly appreciated by those who heard him. He was suddenly removed on Saturday, May 15th while about to take a drive with his brother. He was twenty-three years of age. Many friends mourn his

departure: but for him we doubt not death is eternal gain.

Thus God removes the laborers from the vineyard of earth to partake of the joys of the heavenly paradise. May we so labor that when our work is done, we may be permitted to share their joy.

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REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education are glad to be able to report signs of progress. The College, under the Presidency of Dr. Sawyer and an able staff of coadjutors, is doing good work, and deserves well of the denomination. Six young men finished their Collegiate

career in June, and go forth to enrich the world.

Your Committee would direct attention to the anomalous state of the Government grants to the Colleges. For some reason unknown to your Committee, one of the Colleges was voted a large extra sum at the last session of the Provincial Legislature. There is an evident need of a readjustment of these grants, and your Committee would suggest that means be set on foot whereby the sums voted may be equitably disposed. Acadia College is performing a work which will bear the strictest comparison with any of the higher institutions in the Province, and if Government grants to denominational Colleges are right in principle, we should insist that the Baptist College should participate fairly in the public appropriations.

Your Committee would draw the attention of the Association to the auspicious circumstance, that increased attention is being fixed upon the preparatory training of pupils. One large building, to accommodate one hundred male students, is being pushed to completion, and it is expected will be ready for occupation in September next, while another edifice is in contemplation, in which

our young women may receive first-rate advantages.

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Your Committee commend these as a whole to the sympathy and generous support the Baptist public qui side of big ylung qualitaving

The operations of "The Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union" during the past year have been of an encouraging character. The income of the Society was about ten thousand dollars, and the work done largely exceeded that of any previous year. In order to carry on the operations of the Union its funds should be greatly increased. We would urge a more systematic raising of funds, and that according to resolutions adopted by both the Western and the Central Associations, monies be raised in all the Churches for the Union each year, during the second quarter ending Dec. 31st.

We would also suggest that in mission fields and in feeble Churches, and where practicable in larger Churches Auxiliary Home Mission Societies be formed on the plan of weekly contributions, according to God's word in 1 Cor. xvi. 2. We would earnestly suggest that Pasters, Missionaries, Deacons, and all concerned should give their timely aid in this important matter. So that the mission

may be able to meet its obligations.

It defends christian doctrine, it contains general intelligence, the news of the churches, and devotes itself to whatever pertains to the welfare of the denomination. Every Baptist family should give it a hearty welcome, and every church member should labor to extend its circulation.

Your Committee would impress upon the churches the necessity of guarding the Libraries of their Sabbath Schools from the introduction of works that are contrary to our views of Bible Truth. The youthful mind should not be allured by the gilded bait of error,

but built up in the pure truth of the word.

Books and papers that are placed in the hands of the young for their religious instruction should be not only free from error, but

positive in their teachings.

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Your Committee would therefore recommend the works of the Baptist publishing houses, and that some books at least, distinctively Baptist be placed in every Sabbath School Library, and would further commend this department of the work of the Missionary Union to the favorable consideration of the churches.

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Abstract of Letters to the N. S. Eastern Baptist Association

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ADVOCATE HARBOR.—Rev. T. B. Layton, Pastor. Special service held during the past three months. The Lord has been pleased to pour out his Spirit. The Church has been revived. Thirty believers have been added by baptism. One restored, three received by letter. Our Pastor gives himself wholly to the work.

AMHERST.—Rev. D. A. Steele, Pastor. Still holding on to the allimportant doctrines of the cross; not without some manifestation of Divine favor; three have been added by baptism. Our Pastor labors in all faithfulness. Have secured the labors of an assistant from the States for a few months, Brother H. W. Taite.

AMHERST SHORE.—Rev. E. B. Corey, Missionary, has been laboring with us a part of the time, for the last six months. No additions to report. We have our prayer and conference meetings.

Anticoniss.—Rev. J. B. McQuillin, Pastor. God has again visited his people of this place, and it is our privilege to report to you this year, comparatively large accessions. Twenty-seven have been added by baptism. The work of grace commencing with us happily extended over the larger part of the counties of Antigonish and Pictou, and Guysborough, and it is estimated that not less than two thousand souls have been led to Christ. We give God all the glory.

BROOKFIELD.—Rev. J. Meadows, Pastor. During the winter and spring have had a precious revival. Those indulging secret hopes have been able to make profession of their fath, and sinners have been converted. Have visited the baptismal waters twice, and hope to do so again soon. Five have been immersed.

Barney's River.—Rev. J. B. McQuillin, Pastor. We enjoy the labors of Brother McQuillin one quarter of the time. Two have been baptized. Baptist principles are on the advance, even here We are striving to have a church edifice erected but on account of pecuniary weakness it is making slow progress towards completion.

CAPE CANSO.—Rev. G. W Thomas, Pastor. We have had some precious tokens of Divine approval. The Cape has not retrograded; God has been rearing the church's walls, and this and that one has been born within her gates. Nine have been added by baptism. While we have been engaged in prayerful endeavor for the perishing around us, we have remembered in our prayers and giving the sad needs of the Foreign fields. We feel specially gratified with the action of the Convention recently held at Amherst.

CENTREVILLE AND MOUNT PLEASANT.—Rev. E. B. Corey, Missionary Pastor. Under the faithful labors of Brother Corey, the church has been aroused from her slumbers, and sinners converted to God-Sixteen have been added by baptism. Our church is united, and earnestly engaged in building a meeting house which we expect will be finished the present year.

Cow BAY, C. B.—Rev. John Brown, Pastor. A year ago the Rev. John Brown was sent by the Home Missionary Union; since then he has labored with us, in connection with Mira Church, faithfully and earnestly: accepted and loved by the people, and we believe his work is accepted and will he owned by God. We have been stimulated and encouraged, and feel more determined to "hold fast." Four have been added by letter.

Crow Harbor.—Rev. George W. Thomas, Pastor. Has labored for a part of his time with us, during the past two years, aided by the Home Missionary Union. His faithful labors have been attended with precious results. Since the beginning of the present year we have been allowed the happy privilege of welcoming to our fellowship thirty of our friends. Our meetings on Thursday evening and on Sabbath afternoon, are sustained with unabating interest. We learn with regret of our Pastor's intention to leave us soon to enter upon a course of Theological study at Newton; yet we trust another faithful minister may be directed by the Lord of the Vineyard to our community. We claim a place in your prayers.

DILIGENT RIVER.—(No Pastor.) We have been destitute of a Pastor since the Rev. Samuel Thompson was laid aside from preaching, about eighteen months ago, and but an occasional sermon, which has been attentively listened to and highly appreciated. We have an interesting prayer-meeting every Sabbath, and last summer a Wednesday evening prayer meeting was kept up in a back settlement. We have a Sabbath School and Conference meetings. We should like to have the Board send us a Missionary to labor here, and at Port Greville, a part of the time at least.

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LOWER ECONOMY AND FIVE ISLANDS.—Rev. D. McKeen, Pastor. Have had no special manifestations of the power of God, yet we believe seed has been sown to the honor and glory of His name. Have had but little preaching for the past six months, on account of our Pastors' health failing him, but he is again with us, and we hope for better days.

GREENVILLE AND RIVER PHILIF.—(No Pastor.) Brother Armstrong has labored a small portion of his time in one section of our church. Brother James W. Higgins (Lic.), is now laboring with us under the direction of the H. M. Union, to good acceptance. The church is scattered. There are seven preaching stations, but if a Missionary could be located among us, we think a considerable portion of the expense would be met by the church.

Goose River.—Rev. D. W. Crandal, Pastor. The past year has been one of prosperity; Brother J. W. Higgins (Lic.) came to the assistance of Pastor Crandal, in holding extra meetings, and the Lord greatly blessed their labors. Many of the young converts promise to be very useful. Our church is united, and not only willing but thankful to have the privilege of assisting by our contributions every religious interest connected with our denomination. Twenty-seven have been added by baptism.

Goshen.—Rev. J. B. McQuillin, Pastor. Our church is on the increase. We have the Rev. Mr. McQuillin with us a part of every fourth Sabbath, his labors are highly appreciated. Our church has received four members, but one of them have been called away by death. We are getting along with our meeting house.

Great Village, Lendonderry.—Rev. M. P. Freeman, Pastor. We welcome you to our village and our homes. Since we last addressed you, the soul cheering truths spoken by our Pastor, and the assistance rendered by Rev. Obed Chute, who has recently connected himself with us, have been greatly blessed to the salvation of many. Thirty-five have been added by baptism and seven by letter, making in all forty-two. We believe there are others anxious to know what they must do to be saved. We trust the meeting of the Association with us may prove a blessing to the church and community.

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GREENVILLE.—Rev. I. J. Armstrong, Pastor. Our church has been revived. Sinners have been brought to seek salvation. Twenty have been added to our church, almost all young converts. Our Pastor proclaims the Gospel in all fulness; his labors have been rewarded. Our prayer and conference meetings are generally well attended. We have also an interesting Sabbath school. Twenty were added to our number by baptism and three by letter.

GUYSBOROUGH AND MANCHESTEE.—Rev. A. W. Barss, Pastor. Our numbers have been diminished by seventeen, but we look for reviving influences. Through the kindness of the H. M. Union we were supplied during the year by the ministrations of Rev. J. P. Beel, who has returned again to England. We have now engaged the Rev. A. W. Barss, as our Pastor, with some assistance from the H. M. Union, and we hope our church may be built up and converts gathered in Three have been baptized and three added by letter.

Indian Harson, Guysbonough County.—Rev. Henry Eagles, Pastor. We have had one added by baptism and others are enquiring the way of salvation. Our Conference, Prayer and Communion seasons are comforting, and our Sabbath schools well attended.

Isaac's Harbor.—Rev. L. M. Weeks, Pastor. Last September Brother L. M. Weeks was ordained. Since then we have enjoyed many refreshing seasons. God's people have been led to devote themselves anew to His cause; nearly sixty have joined the Church, a number more are hopefully converted; many are "almost persuaded now to believe." Under God we owe much to the Home Mission Union for kindly supplying us with a man to reap for Christ. We expect to lose the labor of our Pastor the first of September, but we look to the Head of the Church for another, who shall be blessed among us and made a blessing.

UPPER LONDONDERRY.—Rev. M. P. Freeman, Pastor. We rejoice in the prosperity of sister churches around us, but have to mourn our own condition. We do not, however, review the year with unmingled sorrow. The Ministerial Conference at Colchester and Cumberland met with us last autumn, and the efforts of God's servants were blessed in arousing the church in some measure from its apathy. Three were baptized the Sabbath following. Our Pastor labors with us one third of the time to good acceptance.

MARGARRE.—(No Pastor). We were favored with the unwested labors of our beloved Brother Isaac R. Skinner (Lic.), during the past winter. We are getting feeble and scattered. There are scores of young men and women among us unconverted. May the Lord send, by whom he will; only send prosperity.

Our Sabbath School is in a good state; many young men and women attend. In this we rejoice, as to these we look mainly for new accessions to our numbers. Remember us in your prayers.

Maccan.—Rev. H. Bool. Pastor. Labors here one-third of his time. The church is in a low state, not having been visited with the revival influences which have blessed many of the churches. We trust that the seed sown by the Pastor will not be in vain.

Onslow, East.—Rev. S. March, Pastor. We, as a church, are endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace. We are enjoying the ministrations of the Word through the devoted labors of Rev. S. March, who serves us one half of his time. His preaching is listened to with marked attention. We are not without tokens for good. Two have been baptized and added to the church since last report. We have two Sabbath Schools in connection with the Church, which are pretty well attended.

Onslow, West.—Rev. S. March, Pastor. In view of our past failures, we feel constrained, by Divine Grace, to labor more diligently in future. In all our struggles the Lord is with us. He has brought us hitherto, and he will not now forsake us. He has lately sent us a Pastor who has been blessed in winning souls to Christ; and who, by his sound teachings and exemplary deportment, exercises among us an influence for good. We are trying to cultivate a commendable interest in all denominational enterprises; but our resources are somewhat heavily taxed in our efforts to erect a Parsonage. We have added sixteen to our number by baptism and seven by letter.

Passocough.—Rev. D. McKeen, Pastor. Our much esteemed Brother, Martin Hunter, Church Clerk, has been suddenly removed from us by death. We have been afflicted by the illness of our beloved Pastor, Brother McKeen, but we are again comforted by his presence and messages of truth. Our prayer is that God may fully restore him to health, and that he may long break to us the bread of life. We are still striving to sustain the means of grace, praying that the God of Grace may again revive us. Three have been added by baptism.

Picrov.—(No Pastor). Though our history and condition as a church, is somewhat discouraging, yet the outlook for the future is not wholly destitute of hope. We have had an addition of four by baptism, and others are enquiring the way to Zion. We are happy to say that union and harmony prevail among us. Our young brethren and sisters that joined our church a year ago, we are most happy to say, are standing well.

Lower Stewlacks.—Rev. J. Meadows, Pastor. It is proper to state that our church must now be considered in two sections, one at Lower Stewlacke, the other at St. Andrews. At the latter place a Sunday school and prayer-meeting are being sustained, and two have been lately added by baptism. We are building a new meeting house at Lower Stewlacke. We hope to have it ready to occupy the coming winter.

UPPER STEWIACKE.—No Pastor. We have been without any one to break to us the bread of life since the faithful ministrations of Rev. O. Chute terminated last autumn, until Bro. G. E. Good came among us in the beginning of June. We are happy to say, the "darkest hour with us, was just before the dawning." 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CONSTITUTION

OF THE

NOVA SCOTIA BAPTIST HOME MISSIONARY UNION.

1. The Consolidation of our Home Missionary organizations, both English and French, would, in the estimation of this Convention. tend to the more rapid advancement of the Redeemer's Kingdom in this Province;—the French Mission to be considered a separate Department, and all gifts, bequests, &c., made to the French Mission to go to that Department.

2. This Convention shall be called the Nova Scotia Baptist Home

Missionary Union.

3. The object of this Union shall be to promote the spread of the gospel throughout the Provinces of Nova Scotia, P. E. Island, and the Island of Newfoundland, the fostering of feeble Churches, the planting of new ones, and the dissemination of denominational literature.

4. This Union shall be composed of ordained Baptist ministers in good standing with their respective churches in the Province, and delegates appointed by the Churches, each Church in good standing with its respective Association sending not more than three delegates; together with the President of Acadia College, the Principal of the Theological Institute, and the Principal of Horton Academy, the same being members of Baptist Churches in good standing.

5. The officers of the Union shall be a President, who shall be elected annually by ballot; four Vice-Presidents, one from each Association, two Secretaries and an Auditor, all of whom shall be appointed

by open vote.

6. The Union shall annually appoint and locate an Executive Board of thirteen suitable men, seven of whom shall form a quorum; and every Baptist Pastor in the Province shall have the privilege of meeting with the Board, and taking part in its deliberations, but not voting; the officers of the Society named above to be ex-officio members of the Board.

7. The duty of this Board shall be to conduct the Missionary work of the Union, and report yearly to the same, or oftener if required.

8. There shall be an Annual Meeting of the Union held in each of the Nova Scotia Baptist Associations, in turn, to assemble the day previous to the meeting of the Association with which it is held, at 10 o'clock, a.m.

9. This Union shall appoint annually a Board of Directors to consist of eight from each Association composing the Union, whose duty it shall be to give advice to the Executive Board in cases of emergency, and by the written requisition of eight or more of whom, the President shall call a special meeting of the Union.

10. No alteration of this Constitution shall be made unless by a twothird affirmative vote of the members present at an annual meeting.

Brother J. W. Barss, on behalf of the Committee appointed on Friday evening, reported as follows:-

Your Committee to whom were referred the Accounts of the Treasurer of the Baptist Missionary Union report

That whilst presuming upon the correctness of the payments and receipts as stated in the account, yet they consider the items extended. too much in detail and too much unclassified to be easily understood. They have therefore endeavoured to condense and arrange the payments and receipts under different heads, so far as they could do so without the aid and assistance of the treasurer, who, had he been present, would have aided in the placing of items under their proper heads, of which they were doubtful. But we recommend in future that the Board condense their account for publication, and arrange the payments and receipts for the various services of the board under suitable heads.

Especially would we recommend that the Book and Tract department be separated from the other account, so that a knowledge of its financial state may be readily apprehended. And to do this they suggest that an inventory of the stock on hand at the date of this account be taken, to make a starting point for future operations.

They regret that they had no method of arriving at the true state of the Board's financial standing, as no statement is made of indebtedness to Missionaries, Agents, or Publishers. This they

hope will be avoided in future.

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They recommend that the Financial year of the Board close on the last day of May in each year hereafter, and that no receipts or payments be entered on the accounts after that date. And in submitting their accounts they would suggest that so far as possible all the amounts due for missionary labor or otherwise be stated; and also that an approximate estimate be made of the probable amount that will be required to carry on the work of the board efficiently for the year to be entered upon.

All which is respectfully submitted. J. W. BARSS, Chairman.

THIRD ANNUAL REPORT application of the part of the property of

A. S. Baptist Home Missionary Union.

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The Executive Board of the Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Union beg to present their third Annual Report. At their first session after the Anniversary of the Union, the Board elected the Officers of last year. They were soon, however, compelled to lose the valuable services of their Treasurer, Samuel Brown, Esq., whose feeble health rendered his resignation imperative. The Board were successful in soon finding a suitable successor in the person of P. D. Kinney, Esq., who had been one of their Auditors. The removal of Revds. J. H. Sanders and P. R. Foster to other fields of labor was felt to be a severe loss to the Board. These brethren had been connected with the Union in its incipient state, and had worked laboriously and efficiently as members of its executive. Their places, however, were soon taken by other men, good and true.

General Agency,-As your Board were pushing on their work as rapidly as possible, they were surprised and sorry to learn that their General Agent intended very soon to resign his position. As they had not expected such an event, they had not provided for the contingency. The work of a General Agent seemed to the Board to be so important at this early stage in the history of the Union that they with much regret were forced to accept Bro. Wallace's resignation. But they could not attach any blame to him, inasmuch as he felt that domestic duties rendered such a course on his part absolutely necessary. The Board immediately endeavored to secure the services of a General Agent but were unsuccessful in their efforts until the first of January last, when Rev. D. Freeman, A. M., consented to undertake the work. As the field supplied by their missionaries during the past Summer did not yield the returns which the Board anticipated, they felt the urgent necessity of making a direct appeal to the churches for financial aid. The General Agent was therefore instructed to make the collecting of funds a prime object with him in his work. During the Winter and Spring the Agent visited the counties of Annapolis, Kings, Hants, and Halifax, He presented the claims of the Union fai hfully and met with considerable success. Your Board, however, regret to say in this connection, that very few seemed to feel the question coming home to them with power, "How much owest thou my Lord?" After Bro. Freeman had closed his labors in the counties named above he passed into Cumberland, thence to Colchester. There he did a very excellent work in exploring destitute fields, and assisting some of the pastors in holding extra religious services. As the churches were beginning to gather funds for the Association, he thought it

not wise to prosecute the work of collecting for the Board. The information concerning the Union and its work which he presented so intelligently to the churches, and their duty in the matter of benevolence which he so forcibly exhibited, must in due time produce beneficial results.

Theological Professorship .- At the last Annual Meeting of the Union, the Executive Board were instructed to surpervise the collecting of a thousand dollars per Annum to pay the salary of a Theological Professor in Acadia College. Your Board requested their General Agent to solicit subscriptions for that object. He entered upon this work so energetically and succeeded so well in getting pledges that your Board were confident that the amount needed could be quite easily raised. At the time of the Convention held in Portland, St. John, Rev. D. M. Welton, A. M., was unanimously elected to fill the new Theological Chair in Acadia Your Board heartily concurred in the appointment. Professor Welton has been doing good work for the Denomination in his new sphere of labor, as the following extract from his report will show. He says:—"The work which I have performed under your auspices during the past year has been divided between the College proper and the Theological Department. In the latter, i. e., in the Theological Department, I have given one lecture a week in Homiletics, dividing the time equally between instruction on the preparation and delivery of sermons and the criticism of plans of sermons prepared by the students.

About thirty young men, members of the College and Academy, have more or less regularly attended these lectures, and, if I may be

allowed to say so, have manifestly profited from them.

As it is not deemed advisable to blend the study of Theology proper with the regular College course, only partial course students have been left to engage in this. Of these the number has been somewhat small—the class consisting of Messrs. Goudey, Parry,

Carbonell, Spencer, and one young lady,-Miss Masters.

Three lectures a week have been given, and three of the principal divisions in a systematic course have been gone over, namely, Bibliology, Theology, and Anthropology." another term to be able also to give some instruction in Church History and Pastoral Duties to the e requiring them." . Baptist brethren in New Brunswick would endow a Theological Chair, and the present instructors in theology were relieved from assisting in the Aris course, something very respectable might be done, and we might hope to arrest the annual exodus of our young men to Newton.

of

Your Board deeply regret that the funds necessary to meet the claims upon them from this department of the Union have not

been received. The causes are evident. The failure of parties to pay their subscriptions, the erection of Academy buildings at Wolfville, and the unusual financial pressure, are among the number. But your Board are not discouraged with reference to this matter. They regard the work of Professor Welton as among the most important branches of enterprise in which the Union is engaged. It our ministerial students are to be retained in our own Provinces it will be done mainly by giving them a good Theological training at home. The influence of the Theological Professor for good will soon be felt by the churches through the labors of our ministerial students. Your Board therefore regard any disturbance of this department of the Union a very long step in the wrong direction.

French Department.-Your Board are pleased to report that a good deal of work has been done in this department, and some success has been apparent. The Missionary has been toilingon, sometimes almost discouraged, then again cheered with good tidings. His work has evidently been blessed. Copies of the Holy Scriptures given away years ago have been brought to him with the request that he would explain the doctrines they teach. The truth is spreading gradually, slowly, but certainly, and success is sure to come. The hand of persecution was raised against the Missionary and the converts to the truth, but this opposition turned out rather to the furtherance of the Gospel. Several of those that joined in this work have been brought to acknowledge the truth as it is in Jesus, and some of them have died in the faith, blessing God for the French Mission and its Missionary. Others of the number are quietly helping on the work of the Lord.

The little meeting house at St. Mary's Bay, commenced last year for the accommodation of the French and English families residing in that locality, has been carried towards completion. It has already been opened for divine service. When completed it will be a great convenience and blessing to the inhabitants of that place. The French Mission premises at Tusk-t and Saulnierville are kept in good repair. One house is rented; the other is occupied by our menting,

French Missionary.

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Your Board believe that a mission should soon be established among the French population in the Eastern part of this Province. And just as soon as sufficient funds can be obtained for the purpose. they would recommend that the work be commenced there.

Book Department. Your Board still feel the importance of having a pure Baptist literature circulated extensively in this Province. They regret that many of our churches do not seem to be alive to this matter. They are pained to learn that a large number of our Sabbath schools are still chiefly supplied with books published by Pædo-Baptist and so-called Union Societies. Many of these books teach unmistakably Pædo-Baptist doctrines. Possessing as we do so rich a literature, the foregoing fact is to be deeply deplored. If our children are to be taught the truth, as we believe it, we should place that truth before them in the libraries of our Sabbath Schools.

Your Board are enabled to report that they have done a large amount of work in the book department during the year. More than five thousand volumes of sterling literature have been put in circulation. Cramp's Baptist History, Carson on Baptism, Spurgeon's Sermons, Bunyan's Pilgrim, The life of Judson, Theodocia Ernest, Mary Bunyan, Grace Trueman, Infidel's Daughter, and works like these have been placed in many hands. Essays on Baptism and Close-Communion, in pamphlet form, and tracts teaching our denominational views have been circulated, not only by the hundred but by the thousand. Other religious tracts in English, German, French, Swedish and Norwegian have been

distributed in great numbers.

Your Board were called on to accept the resignation of J. Albert Wester, Esq., on the first of December last. He had been in commission nearly seven months. Although he did not meet with as much financial success as the Board anticipated, yet they believe he did a good work. The books sold and given away by him were of superior quality. Their teaching will be felt, its effects will undoubtedly be seen before many days. Bro. Walker visited more than five hundred families, with many of whom the Scriptures were read and prayer was offered. He likewise distributed more than two thousand pages of tracts. Although your Board believe this department to be of very great importance they did not think it advisable to use their funds to any large extent in carrying it on. They believe it will be nearly self-sustaining. They did not therefore appoint a successor to Mr. Walker. Gardner Tufts, Esq., still continues to traverse the counties of Digby, Annapolis and Kings. He labors energetically, and his efforts to circulate extensively a pure Baptist literature are being crowned with considerable success. Your Board cannot but express the belief that if the Baptists of Nova Scotia saw clearly their duty in regard to placing. denominational teaching before their children in the Sabbath School and in the family circle, a great work would be done for the truth by the book department.

Enlarged sphere of operations.—The last anniversary of the Union added P. E. Island and Newfoundland to our Home Mission field. As P. E. Island seemed to be a very inviting sphere for missionary operations, your Board decided to occupy it at once. They accordingly appointed Rev. D. McDonald as General Missionary for the eastern part of the Island. He has been laboring at St. Peters, East Point, Souris, Dundas, Grand River, Georgetown, and Montagu Bridge. In several of these places he met with the most signal success. No less than one hundred and thirty-nine that been baptized by him and added to the Church since the first of August last. Brother McDonald aids the Board very materially by giving information and advice. Rev. T. A. Kidson, a most successful missionary, was appointed to the western part of the Island.

Rev. J. I. DeWolf was stationed at Tigg, Alexandra, and Belfast, Brother C. C. Burgess was appointed to Cavendish and vicinity. Several other brethren have gone to the Island to spend there their summer vacation; hence that important field is for the present

fairly supplied.

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Your Board intended to establish, during the year, a mission in St. John's, Newfoundland. They failed, however, until very recently, to obtain a suitable person to explore the field. merely express the belief in regard to this matter that their successors should undertake mission work in Newfoundland as early as practicable.

Important points held.—Your Board are pleased to report that much success has attended the efforts of their missionaries at very important points. Annapolis, the former capital of the Province, has had, until very recently, neither Baptist Church nor Baptist preaching. During the past year a beautiful house has been opened for divine worship. Large congregations have been gathered by the able pulpit ministrations and faithful pastoral efforts of Rev. T. A. Higgins. The Sabbath School is also large and flourishing. In view of what has been accomplished in this field on so short a time, your Board thankfully exclaim, "What has God wrought"! Mission work has likewise been very successful at Shelburne. This old town, where the ancestors of many of us found their first home in Nova Scotia, your Board considered too important to be neglected. They determined to hold it. Success has attended their efforts, and very soon the cause there will be self-sustaining. Cow Bay has been supplied during the year with superior ministerial labor. Guysboro and Manchester were occupied by one of our best workers. The absence of regular pastoral labor from those churches for several years left them sadly unproductive. They are now in fair working order. Port Hawkesbury has been supplied part of the time. The Board regret the failure of brethren appointed there to occupy the field. They regard the place as very important, and feel that it must be supplied with suitable ministerial labor.

Efforts to retain Ministers.—The Board felt the importance of using all the means in their power to retain in these Provinces our young ministers. They therefore wrote to Newton Theol. Institution to induce our young men there to return. Several complied with the Board's request and are now at work in their various fields of labor. The Ministerial Students in Acadia College and Horton Academy, with scarcely an exception, have been appointed to mission stations or introduced to pastorless churches. The Board wished in this way to assist the churches and encourage the brethren. The following is a list of the missionaries and their fields of labor.

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Bramary.—It will appear from the foregoing list that 80 missionaries and agents have been in commission during the year, 20 of whom have been re-appointed. Together they have travelled 46,867 miles; preached 3180 sermons; attended 2596 other meetings; made 16,140 family visits; distributed 59,252 pages of tracts, 24,292 pages of books; recived 14 subscriptions to the "Christian Messenger"; baptized 362; built or carried to completion 2 subscriptions to the "Christian Messenger"; baptized 362; built or carried to completion 2 meeting houses; organized 1 church, and 5 Sabbath Schools; established 3 Woman's Mission Aid Societies, and performed 1264 weeks' service, equal to 24½ years. Collected on the field

In addition to the appointments which the Board have made, they introduced Rev. A. E. Ingram, of Mahone Bay, to the Church at Newport, and Rev. Edward Roberts, of England, to the Bridgewater Church. They are glad to learn that Pastors and Churches

are pleased with each other.

In conclusion, your Board wish to record their heartfelt thanks to Almighty God for His great goodness to them, their agents, and missionaries, during the past year. Their lives have been precious in His sight. Only two-and these young men were ailing when first employed by the Board-have passed away since our last annual meeting. These brethren-Aaron Ross and Joseph H. Pipes-were cut off in early years, but they did their work and have gone to their reward. Another cause for gratitude is found in the fact that although there has been an unusual stringency in monetary matters, more than Ten Thousand Dollars have been in the treasury of the Union since the anniversary of last year. As your Board remember that this sum is nearly Four Thousand Dollars more than was received the year previous, and more than three times the amount raised in any one year by the three Home Mission Societies when separate, they would devoutly say, " Hitherto the Lord has helped us."

In reference to the future, your Board regard the outlook as very hopeful. The commercial horizon is dark, it is true, but clouds will not always obscure the sky. With a prospect before the Union of doing so much for the Master, your Board cannot suggest the idea of retrenchment. Other religious societies are being equipped more completely for Home Mission work. We cannot afford to be behind them. Fires which our fathers kindled in desolate places can we suffer to be extinguished or to be fed by other hands? Gardens which they began to plant, can we allow to lie waste or to be tilled by others because they are more faithful than we? Let us rather with prayer and faith go up and possess the land. And soon the field will be clothed in beauty and the harvest

will be bountiful.
