

THE POSITION OF THE TEACHERS.

Several questions of importance may be considered in respect to the position which will be presented to the local government asking a larger measure of provincial support for the school teachers.

It should be pointed out at the outset that increased government grants do not necessarily mean increased salaries.

It is to be remembered, also, that New Brunswick has lost many good teachers because of the comparatively small remuneration there has made them more willing to accept offers in other places.

Another matter which has been discussed by teachers themselves and by others interested in them is that of a pension fund.

The good teacher is never overpaid. It is important that the average be kept as high as possible, and government aid is important.

ly 100, including all the principal employers of labor, signed the roll. They say at the start that they do not intend to attack the labor unions but that their preparations are for defensive warfare should it prove necessary.

The people of Columbus who belong to neither an employers' union nor a labor union have not yet been heard from. Whether they will find it necessary to organize remains to be seen.

There will be no general revision of the tariff. In spite of the pressure brought to bear by the manufacturers, the government stands firm.

Horticultural Association; Mr. Jones a bill to incorporate the Charlton County Hospital.

May Have to Move Normal School.

Mr. Osman gave notice of motion with reference to the unhealthy condition of Fredericton in consequence of its location and the prevalence of typhoid fever, and to the necessity which might exist for the removal of the Normal School to a more healthy town.

Mr. Copp presented the petition of Silas W. Copp and others for a bill to incorporate the Main Street Baptist Church, Fredericton; Mr. Allen's petition of Henry W. King and others for the bill to incorporate the New Brunswick Gas and Power Company; Mr. King's bill to authorize the closing of certain unimproved highways in Hampton parish on the ground of urgency. It was read a second time; Hon. Mr. McKeown a bill to incorporate the Dalhousie Normal School.

Hedribution Case to be Argued Monday.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie announced that the chief justice of Canada had set down Monday next for the argument of the Hedribution case. The house went into committee on bills Mr. King in the chair and agreed to the bill to incorporate the Maritime Christian Missionary Society, to authorize the municipality of Charlton to assist in aid of the hospital, and to incorporate the Seaside Water and Sewerage Company.

Mr. Copp explained that the last proposed to increase the capital of the company by \$25,000.

Mr. Clark resumed his debate on the fishery resolution in 1890, when this subject was under discussion in the parliament of Canada. He said, it was shown that if the amount of the award were to be paid over at any time to the provinces they would also have to assume the burden of protecting and developing the fisheries.

A New Brunswick is not entitled to increase the amount of the award if paid over from \$750,000 to \$1,000,000. He said it is recognized by those competent to judge that steps will soon have to be taken to preserve our fisheries as many fishermen are afraid of some of our most valuable fisheries will disappear because of overfishing and other causes.

The premier, Mr. Mackenzie, said that in the event of the provinces receiving the money the government would have at its disposal a considerable increase of revenue for the maintenance of the various public services.

He (Clark) protested against any such disposition of the money. He moved that the resolution be amended by the addition of the following amendment: Provided that in the event of a decision of the Supreme Court of Canada that such proprietary rights and privileges were vested in his majesty in right of the provinces of Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and P. E. Island and the Government of New Brunswick, and before a final adjustment of such claim the government of the province shall be satisfied by assurance from the government of Canada, that the resolution in relation to the development and proper administration of the fisheries of the province and that as a result of such final adjustment the burden of the expenditure necessary for such purposes shall rest on the government of Canada.

There is no question but that the amount paid under the Halifax award belongs to the maritime provinces. There was no danger of the fishermen suffering in the event of New Brunswick receiving its share of the award and he thought it his duty to support the resolution.

Mr. Loggie said he was not opposed to the object of the motion, but until the province was ready to assume the burden of maintaining and encouraging the fisheries it would not be wise to insist on the payment of New Brunswick's share.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie enlightens the Opposition. Hon. Mr. Tweedie said the opposition would fall in its duty now.

did not appear to be fully aware of the position of matters. The question as to taking over the fisheries does not arise at all, the point merely being in New Brunswick entitled to its share of the Halifax award? The government would be recreant in its duty if after the decision of the privy council it did not endeavor to ascertain the rights of the province and have the amount disposed of according to the law.

This is a question of law and why should we debate as to who should be done hereafter? The member for Charlotte assumes the province would be bound to take over the maintenance and protection of the fisheries. The terms under which British Columbia, Prince Edward Island and Manitoba entered confederation state, among other conditions, that no protection and encouragement of the fisheries devolved upon the dominion government, and the same duty was thrown on them at confederation, and they assumed it. Therefore the question of protection does not enter into the consideration of the matter at all.

If that Halifax award had never been made the same encouragement would have been given to the fisheries. All the province is asking is that a decision be had and done at once. The division of the award can be discussed after the award. If the province is successful in obtaining this award and the dominion as a result refuses to continue its policy of paying bounties to our fishermen the New Brunswick government will give the fishermen the same encouragement that they receive at present.

No Government Would Discourage Deep Sea Fishing.

He was satisfied that no federal government, Liberal or Conservative, would dare to discourage a policy of encouraging the deep-sea fishing. It has been the policy for years and the bounty act applies to the whole dominion. The opposition is not doing themselves justice. The matter of the better terms and the fishery award are not party questions and it should be the desire of every member of the house to assist the government in every possible way in obtaining a favorable decision. Every member should feel that it is in the interest of this province to have our rights asserted.

Mr. Hazen.

Mr. Hazen said New Brunswick's position on this question is weakened by the attitude of Nova Scotia. It is evident that before the dominion government will pay over the money they will try to have a case framed that will be fair to them. But, if it is decided that the money belongs to the provinces how will the division be made? He concurred with the member for Northumberland that it would not be advisable for us to get interest on the sum. He was informed that the fisheries principally considered in the award were the mackerel fisheries, in which New Brunswick had a very small share. He felt that the amendment was a fair and proper one. It simply asked the government not to act hastily and not to press a claim inconsiderately.

Mr. Morrison.

Mr. Morrison agreed that this matter should not be approached from a party standpoint. He agreed that if we claim this award we cannot expect the dominion government to protect the fisheries.

Hon. Mr. Hill said that the premier on every occasion when the matter was discussed, laid down the principle that in the event of the award being obtained the province should do better by the fishermen than even the dominion government had done. He thought the whole matter of the distribution of the award was entirely foreign to the question. The first thing to do was to get the money. It was a pure and simple question of ownership and it was the duty of the government to press this claim in the interests of the province.

Hon. Mr. Puseley.

Hon. Mr. Puseley said that the honorable gentleman opposite seemed to be under much apprehension in regard to the resolution existing between the government and the fishermen of Canada. From their speeches one might suppose that the whole duty of the fishermen arose from the Halifax award. He held that the duty was cast upon them by the British North American Act. Under the 91st section of that act the parliament of Canada was given exclusive legislative authority with regard to the sea coast and inland fisheries and surely it will not be contended that having this power they will not exercise it. How could they be held blameless if they declined to discharge their duty with regard to the fisheries and not to enforce their own regulations?

From 1871 a period of 11 years before the Halifax award was paid over the dominion government never hesitated to perform its duty with regard to fishery protection, and now no matter what the courts may decide, it is inconceivable that it would fall in its duty now.

British Columbia, Prince Edward Island and Manitoba would become a part of the dominion it was expressly stated in the act admitting them that one of these services, the charge of which was to be borne by Canada was the protection of the fisheries. Is it conceivable that this would be done as to three provinces and not as to the rest of the dominion? He had no fear of any result.

Mr. Morrison Mistaken.

The member for Northumberland who last spoke had stated that the dominion refused to protect the inland waters of this province. This is an entire mistake. It is true that the province incurred some expense for the purpose of protecting its rights, but the dominion did not cease to maintain fishery overseers and wardens in dominion waters or to keep up fish hatcheries by means of which these waters might be stocked with fish.

Looking at the matter from another point of view the dominion government has a large revenue derived mainly from customs duties, its receipts have increased enormously. The fishermen are consumers of dutiable goods and contribute largely to these revenues. Millions of dollars which have come out of their pockets are spent in the west for the development of the country by the construction of railways and in other ways. Is it reasonable to expect that the dominion government will pay to the fishermen what will help others out of the dominion, the loss of, or give you no assistance?

In conclusion he would ask the members of the house not to pass this amendment. All that the government demands is that the house will approve of the measures which have taken to get justice done to the people of New Brunswick.
