Dear Sir: I would like to call the attention of the people of Cross Point, Lodian River, to the fact that within the last few days there has been slaughtered within the above neighborhood one moose, one caribou and two deer, right under the very eyes of those God-fearing people.

Now I ask where is this brave and fearless protector of game, Mr. Fair, who no later than last September, rushed through Kempt Road with the assistance of one man of the law, Smith, and fell upon and captured two desperados, named John Alexander, Jr., and one boy, Thompson, seized their little guns hauled them before the Magistrate and fined them.

This affair was a treacherous outrage, as my boy was perfectly justified in spending a few days in the forest, of the Province of Quebec, as I have been a resident of the said Province for the past five years.

I would like also to draw the attention of the public to the great numbers of some of the people along the shores of Escuminac and Escuminac Falls, and also some of the people on the New Brunswick side in regard to the sorrow they have for the few wild geese that are killed by a few gunners by the aid of a light. Those contemptible kites are too lazy, too cowardly and too poverty-stricken to risk their lives or by the necessary outfit to get a goose and some will shoot high power rifle bullets when he is concealed on the shore at the poor downy goose hunter. Last fall they reported a game warden, I think from Moncton, by the name of Day, who was a good judge of Campbellton whiskey.

He with the aid of three or four others so hounded the goose hunters that directly or indirectly it was the cause of a most appalling tragedy, the life of one of Campbellton's most useful and respected sons, the late George Sargent, being lost.

In regard to the killing of geese on the Restigouche, I would say that about one goose in ten million is killed on the Restigouche. I suppose they are protecting them for the Americans, who in the southern part of the continent, kill them and the wild duck by the thousands, by every device invented by man, even using the airplanes, pont guns, swivel guns and automatic guns. Airplanes are hired by the owners of the rice fields to destroy these fine game birds by the thousand, to save the rice fields, but when it comes to a Campbellton gunner and a few other gunners from both sides of the river and some of them, very poor people, getting a goose or a duck for their family they are now in dread of their lives, thinking only of the whites of the bullet from the deadly rifle in the hands of the cowardly assassin. The sporting goose hunter is always a good, hale and hearty fellow, willing to share his little all with his fellow-man at all times. But the hounders of the goose hunters are always narrow-minded and jealous, and when they leave this earth they will leave unwept, unhonored and unsung.

BARSA OF PALESTINE
Man Who Recently Died Led a World
Faith.
There are other souls which are
sacred to one section of mankind or
another, but what country can rival
Palestine in its wealth of religious
shrines? Very little is known of the
head of the movement of world religion
which should die there and receive
from the dignitaries of that land the
highest funeral honours.
The death of Abdal Baha, Palestin-
ian, recently of Abdal Baha Abbas, leader
of the Bahai movement, removed
one who was not of Palestinian birth,
but it has been from that region that
his influence has gone forth. Bahai-
sm is of Persian origin, but it was
in Syria that Abdal Baha and his
father, Baha O'Allah, were confined
in a penal colony. To the place of
their imprisonment, Aca, came
hordes of pilgrims and students of
many races and tongues. After his
release, Abdal Baha remained at
Aca, and conducted his religious
work throughout Palestine and all
Syria, for which he was knighted by
King George in 1920. At his funeral
there attended Sir Herbert Samuel,
the British High Commissioner, and
this distinguished Jew saw nothing
incongruous in thus honoring one of
another race. For was not Abdal
Baha of the prophets?
Bahaiism is a religion which claims
an internationalism, nothing of a
nature to make it either militant or
sectarian. It is a religion of peace
and brotherhood, and it is a religion
which was only uttered thousands
of years ago by the Hebrew prophets.
It could echo the statement of Paul
that "God hath made of one blood
all mankind." It appeals to Christ
for authority in its teaching of peace.
Many Christians have aided the
movement, and Sir Herbert Samuel
could well be said to be the father
of the Bahai movement. Perhaps the only
opposition to Bahaiism will come
from Mohammedanism. Other Ori-
ental faiths may passively resist, but
the doctrine of Abdal Baha, which
the committee of alonement which
succeeds him strike at the very heart
of Islam, in India, Central Africa and
even in the marshes of Russia the
Mohammedans are on the aggressive. They
will fight Bahaiism to the death. The
attitude of Christianity will become
more apparent as time passes. Bahai-
ism Christians have allowed Abdal
Baha and his teachers their pulpits.
But the fact remains that the
Bahaiism has come again an appeal
for international brotherhood and
good-will.

AGAIN SEEKING
INCORPORATION
St. Quentin Applying to Legisla-
ture for Act of In-
corporation.

The residents of St. Quentin, are
again applying to the Legislature for
the passing of an Act incorporating
the town of St. Quentin. The dis-
trict asked to be incorporated has
been made somewhat smaller. Natu-
rally there is some opposition to the
proposed incorporation of the dis-
trict. A water and sewerage ap-
plication is being made for the
district and it is felt that a
district seek incorporation, as all
men cannot see alike. St. Quentin
has a population of about 1200. Fire
insurance rates are particularly high
in the district and those back of the
incorporation movement are seeking
to have these rates reduced, but can-
not do so until they have adequate
fire protection. It is claimed by
those supporting incorporation that
the saving in insurance rate and the
revenue derived from the sale of
water, would more than offset the
town taxes which would be improved
upon the residents under incorpo-
ration. A water and sewerage ap-
plication can be put in for about \$20,000,
artesian wells being used for the
supply of water. A brook about
four miles distant from the town is
available for an abundant water supply
but this means the putting down of
four miles additional water pipe to use
this source of supply. Yet the ad-
ditional cost would no doubt fully
warrant the expenditure. There is
absolutely no doubt that with a good
water system in St. Quentin fire in-
surance rates would be considerably
reduced and much money saved the
district. Had the water system been
installed several years ago much of
the property loss sustained in the
great conflagration which occurred
there nearly two years ago could have
been saved.

Quaker Meeting House.
The old Quaker meeting house at
Barton, Me., is probably the oldest
frame building standing in the United
States—just where it was built
and as it was built without any
change, additions or subtractions,
and with an authentic record since
1823. An occasional replacing of
shingles on the roof and of the weath-
erboarding are all the repairs it
has had. Its frame, inside and wood-
work, and some of the weatherboard-
ing, are the same as when made
about the same time that William
Penn, who visited the building, was
trading with the Indians and laying
out Philadelphia. The only preser-
vative used on the wood has been sid-
e-finished white wash on the outside.
Seven of the original plank seats and
the woodwork inside have had no
paint whatever. White oak, white
pine, cypress and southern pine from
the Maryland forests, were the woods
used.—Pittsburg Chronicle-Tele-
graph.

For Deaf People.
A new development by which
partly deaf persons may be made to
hear, was shown recently at a meet-
ing of the Parady Society. Kibbur
Scott exhibited crystals of Rochelle
salt, made artificially, which possess-
ed the remarkable power of reproducing
sounds. Mr. Scott explained that
deaf persons could wear a small
crystal behind the ear, connected
with a little soundbox worn over
the chest. The sounds of conversation
would then be transmitted to the ear-
drum in the form of vibrations which
would enable them to hear.

Barfoot In Fire.
Walking barfooted through a
charcoal fire four feet deep and more
than thirty feet long forms part
of the extraordinary religious festival
that annually takes place in honor of
a Hindu goddess at one of the tem-
ples in the city of Benares.

RUSSIA AND GENOA.

There is no doubt but what Russia, once a great empire, is now on the brink of utter devastation and ruin. The whole industrial organization of the great country has been stopped like a clock by the gigantic upheaval which every system of order or government has undergone. To bring order out of this pending chaos and, consequently, productiveness and prosperity, is indeed a colossal problem. But in this advanced day of civilization when the world's destiny is being guided by the master minds of statesmen, whose achievements approximate to the superhuman, is there not some means by which this horrible regime of bloodshed and wholesale destruction can be stopped and the re-adjustment of Europe in its entirety accomplished?

Some sections of the press are strongly adverse to the idea of striking Russia being represented at the Genoa Conference. They go so far as to declare this decision an idiotic concession on the part of the leading powers. That is one side of the question. No doubt it has its points which would support argument in its favor. But on the other hand, if Europe is to be reconstructed the Russian problem must be disposed of. No plan for international readjustment would be complete or adequate in coping with the tremendous demands that will be made upon it unless

the Russian menace is given due consideration. Did not the Washington conference accomplish much? Were not many problems of international import, which, without a solution, threatened the peace and hoped-for prosperity of the world, more clearly understood because of the conference and judiciously settled by the statesmen entrusted with their successful disposal?

All in all the achievements of the Washington parley will, undoubtedly, make for world peace and security and prove invaluable in forwarding European readjustment. Therefore it is no more than sane and logical expectation to hope that the conference at Genoa may be instrumental in getting this war-racked old world on a substantial working basis and so usher in a greater degree of contentment and co-operation which are essential to world peace and prosperity. Well then, if the conference at Genoa can give the attending statesmen a clearer conception of the underlying impetus to European unrest, enable them to view the situation with deeper insight and agree upon its imperious needs, would it not be well to have Russia a recipient of the knowledge which will be an inevitable result of this gathering? Might she not then be more competent to diagnose her own trouble and better fitted to describe a permanent cure?

Probably this is a treat which Russia scarcely deserves. But surely entering into negotiations and joining associations with statesmen of Western Powers will break down all barriers now erect and bring to Russian leaders a clearer realization of their country's menacing attitude in her sister nations of the world. Thus may Russia be fitted for a place in that great association of nations which had its inception at the disarmament conference. In this way, and in this way alone, can world peace be preserved and world brotherhood achieved.

OLDEST HUMAN SKULL

It Has Been Uncovered In Rhodesian Cave.

A fossil skull has just been discovered in Northern Rhodesia which reveals a new chapter in the history of man. The scene of the discovery is the "Bone Cave" at the Broken Hill mine, already famous for the beauty of its stalactites and stalagmites and the remarkable fact that the lime of which they were originally composed has been largely replaced by phosphates of zinc and lead. It was the commercial value of these formations that led to the transformation of the beautiful caves into one of the strangest mines which has ever been worked. But it was very peculiar mining, for the lime was nothing but a mass of fossilized remains of elephants, lions, leopards, rhinoceroses, hippopotami, antelopes, birds, bats and small mammals. Many hundreds of tons of these animal remains have been removed during the course of mining operations, but no trace of man was discovered until a depth of 60 feet below water level was reached, when the bones of one of the most remarkable types of mankind yet revealed to us were found surrounded by soft friable lead conglomerate.

Pictures published in the Sunday Times of Johannesburg show a skull that seems to resemble the most primitive member of the human family at present known to us, the Ape Man, discovered in Java by Prof. Dubois in 1892. But, unlike the Java specimen, the Rhodesian skull has the face preserved and reveals a type curiously similar to that of the Gibraltar skull. Whenever the fuller examinations of the specimen may reveal, we are certain, says a scientist, that the new discovery introduces us to the oldest type of man yet found in Africa and gives a new orientation to the early history of the whole human family. For whether the Rhodesian man is a very primitive ancestor of the European Neanderthal species or a new species of the Javanese Pithecanthropus, by its discovery the importance of the part played by Africa may have been the original home of the human family receives further corroboration. In any case, the new find is one of the most important in the history of man.

The skull seems to be quite complete, but unfortunately there is no jawbone. If peculiar interest and significance. But as some compensation for the loss of the mandible, the collar bone, a leg bone and part of the hip bone are said to have been found and will enable us to form some idea of the bodily form of Rhodesian man. It is hoped that when these important remains get into the hands of a competent anatomist many of the gaps in our knowledge of early man will be filled.
