"How will the dairyman get a good cow?" asked Hon. W. D. Hoard, of Wisconsin, at the Western Ontario Convention in Wood-

British market, were not long ago presented in the ADVERTISER, and were read with much interest. The future performance of any animal either as a special milk or beet producer, or a combination of the two, neither function being excessively developed at the expense of the other, depends largely upon its treatment up to two years old. Speaking to Mr. A. C. Hallman, of New Dundee, one of the most sagacious and enterprising farmers in the grand county of Waterloo, he stated that he aimed to have the heifers come in milk for the first time at about 27 or 28 months old, allowing the calf to suckle the dam for a couple of days or less, as may be thought best under the circumstances. Then remove, and for a week give four or five pounds sweet milk three times a day, after that changing gradually, feeding only night and morning, till, at the end of four weeks, all skim milk is fed, the quantity depending on the appetite and thrift of the calf. At three weeks old a tablespoonful of oil cake scalded is added to the milk, which is fed always at about the natural heat of freshly-drawn milk, and at five or six weeks as much as three tablespoonfuls may be given of the oil cake, which serves as a substitute for the fat taken from the milk in creaming, Mr. Hallman being a butter maker and his market town Berlin. For the calf's mid-day meal at a week old a little dry bran and out chop is given. A taste of ground peas is sometimes added also after a couple of months. Fresh hay is fed as soon as the calves take to it. Care is taken that food is fresh at every meal, and the supply eaten clean. Milk is stopped at six months, and more grain fed. The feeding of bulls and heifers is practically uniform, though the latter are given a fairly bulky ration to develop size and a roomy barrel, that being an important point in a dairy cow. In the turnip season a few pulped, sprinkled with the grain ration, are fed. Corn stalks and straw are cut and mixed with the pulped turnips, the mass being dampened, and one meal kept always ahead. From this tank, through a three-quarter-inch pipe, the water gravitates to the dairy building and stock barns further down the hillside, so that for all purposes there is always a pure, cold and fresh supply of water. It is an admirable arrangement, the total cost of which, including ram, piping, labor, board of men, etc., was only \$150. 





In the year 1873 there were 165 establishments engaged in publishing cheap, corrupt literature. From one publishing house there went out twenty different styles of corrupt books. Although over 30 tons of vile literature have been destroyed by the Society for the Suppression of Vice, still there is enough of it left in this country to bring down upon us the thunderbolts of an incensed God.

Now, how are we to war against this

Now, how are we to war against this corrupt literature. First of all, by the prompt and inexorable execution of the law. Let all good postmasters and United States district attorneys and detectives and reformers concert in their action to stop this plague.

Itought not to be in the power of every bad man who can raise a 1-cent stamp for a circular, or a 2-cent stamp for a letter, to blast a man or destroy a home. The postal service must be kept clean, and we must all understand that the swift retributions of the United States Government hover over every violation of the letter-box. Many cities have successfully prohibited the most of that literature even from going on the news-stands. Terror has seized upon the publishers and dealers of impure literature, from the fact that over a thousand arrests have been made, and the aggregate time for which the convicted have been sentenced to the prison is over 190 years, and from the fact that about 2,000,000 of their circulars have been destroyed, and

Another way in which we are to drive Another way in which we are to drive back this plague of Egyptian frogs is by filling the minds of our young people with a healthful literature. I do not mean to say that all the books and newspapers in our families ought to be religious books and newspapers, or that every song ought to be to the tune of "Old Hundred." I have no sympathy with the attempt to make the young old. I would rather join in a crusade to keep the young young. Boyhood and girlhood must not be abbreviated. But there are good books, good histories, good books of all styles with which we are to fill the minds of the young, so that there will be no more room for the uncless and

Against every bad pamphlet send a good pamphlet; against every unclean picture send an innocent picture; against every sourrilous song send a Christian song; against every bad book send a good book; and then it will be as it was in ancient Toledo, where the Toletum missals were kept by the saints in six churches, and the sacrilegious Romans demanded that those missals be destroyed, and that the Roman missals be substituted; and the war came on, and I am glad to say that the whole matter having been referred to champions, the champion of the Toletum missals with one blow brought bown the champion of the Roman missals. So it will be in our day. The good literature, the Christian literature, in its championship for God and the truth, will bring down the evil literature in its championship for the devil. Agriculture in Austria.

In 1868, when the Ministry of Agriculture was created in Austria, there were 23 agricultural educational institutions, including dairying and forestry. The number was soon increased, however, as the Government took a strong interest in agricultural education. At the present time there are 100 schools in the Austrian empire for giving instruction in agriculture and allied industries. These comprise I superior school of agriculture, 16 secondary schools, 20 schools of practal agriculture, 25 schools in which a course of instruction is given in winter only, 5 dairy schools, 5 forestry schools, 16 institutions in which horticulture, viticulture and hop culture are taught, and 4 for instruction in brewing and distilling. Persons who imagine that in America agriculture receives more public attention than elsewhere, will be undeceived by a few such examples as the foregoing. If we mistake not, the first dairy school in America was started in Wisconsin. Even progressive Ontario is without one. Austria, as mentioned, supports five. Canada can well afford to step forward in this matter.
