A Once Prominent Public Man Accuses His Relatives of a Terrible Wrong.

New York, Oct. 2.-If Charles T. Bay-

New York, Oct. 2.—If Charles T. Baylor's story is true his life history is more remarkable than fiction. He has been fitteen years an inmate of different insane asylums, though periectly sane, and the desire of his family to prolong his living death has succeeded in such enlightened States as Massachusetts and Connecticut, in spite of law and medical science.

His story is declared credible by physicians, and it is believed by the Lunacy Law Reform League of New York. Mr. Baylor was found by a reporter at 10 East Fourteenth street. He is 66, talks fluently and connectedly, is of fine physique, and with his flowing white hair and beard is a patriarchal and interesting figure.

He was a lawyer by profession and is a veteran of the Mexican war. In the eight years preceding the civil war, he was at different times United States Consul at

reteran of the Mexican war. In the eight years preceding the civil war, he was at different times United States Consul at Amsterdam, Manchester and Cologne. In 1860 he was sent on a special mission to Belgium in the interests of the cotton planters under the commission of the State of Georgia. While making his report in that State in the following year the war broke out. He was offered the command of a Confederate regiment, but refused it. This brought him into conflict not only with the Confederacy, but with the relatives of his wife, who were ardent "rebels." The latter never forgave him, and to their enmity, he says, he owes his imprisonment.

In 1866 his health gave way, and he was in luced, he claims, by his relatives to go to what he supposed was a sanitarium: It was the McLean Insane Asylum at Somerville, Mass., and for thirteen years he was detained there in spite of his efforts to get out. There, he alleges, he saw awful brutalities practiced on the patients, and he himself was a sufferer from them. All the usual asylum punishments were resorted to and blows, the straightjacket and the dark cell were common. A little over two years ago he secured a transfer to the State asylum at Worcester. There he was treated better, and after a conflict with redtapeism, lasting almost two years, he was released as sane. This was last March. He went to Boston to join his family, but before he could again settle down to the life of a free man he alleges that the same people who had previously caused his incarceration again attempted to seize him. He escaped to Hartford, Conn., thinking he would be safe outside Massachusetts, but was arrested by Massachusetts, but was arrested by Massachusetts, of the safe outside Massachusetts, and knowing the uselessness of resistance, he offered to enter the Hartford asylum. It was so agreed, and he signed his own commitment and was incarcerated again. There he was treated kindly and given his parole. He could was the tunacy Law Reform League mentioned in a newspaper and wrote to it. They had their Hartford attorney, Louis Estanton, look into the case.

He made this demand a week ago yesterday, and was immediately locked up. On learning that he was to be taken to Massachusatts under restraint he succeeded in getting word to Mr. Stanton last Thursday.

The latter at once obtained a writ of habeas corpus from Judge Carpenter. On Friday morning Dr. Stearns, of the asylum, came to him and disclaimed all intention of detaining him. He admitted he should be free, and said that if legal proceedings be dropped he could go his way in peace. Mr. Baylor accepted the ofter and has since be a free man.

QUEBEC TORY CANDIDATES' DEPOSITS. Where the Money Came from-Point Blank Charges Against the Ottawa Government.

Quebec, Oct. 1.—L'Electeur brings another serious charge against the Ottawa Government. Referring to the fuss kicked up by the Tories over the admission that the money for the election contestation deposits made by the Liberals in this district was raised by notes signed by Mr. Pacaud and indorsed by Hou. HIS DYING DECLARATION.

Boulanger's Political Testament and Will-Preparations for His Burial.

PARIS, Oct. 1.—The property left by Ime. Bonnemaine had been judicially tied PARIS, Oct. 1.—The property left by Mine. Bonnemaine had been judicially tied up to prevent her bequesthing it to Gen. Boulanger. The first sojourn of the pair in Brussels and London cost \$200,000, and another \$200,000 was frittered away over his papers and election funds. Beyond needless extravagance he never tried to feather his own nest, as did many of his pretended adherents.

REASONS FOR HIS RASH ACT.

The general showed symptoms of consumption, of which disease Mme. de Bonnemaine died. This knowledge, added to the taint of hereditary insanity, leaves no wonder that he committed the rash act. It is stated that Boulanger left a document in his desk ascribing his own death solely to inconsolable grief over the loss of Mme. de Bonnemaine.

You ask for my opinion as to what is the "best cure for the present day political corruption in Canada." We might say with Carlyle that "there is no Morrison's pill for curing the maladies of society." Neither the case nor the cure can be stated in a simple sentence. You cannot build an honest government out of rotten material. And it looks now as though a large portion of the people had lost the power of discerning between men, or between truth and falsehood, or between honesty and dishonesty. Hence they have in many instances chosen men to rule over them who were not worthy of their trust. I have felt a difficulty in speaking of this plague of political corruption in the pulpit on several grounds. One reason is because of my conviction that much of it is the natural fruit and outcome of the system of protection which the people have adopted. That system appears to me to be based on injustice and of necessity gives rise to political corruption. It is, in my judgment, simply a legalized form of robbery. It naturally, therefore, has encouraged other forms of robbery. Yet the majority appear to support it, and see no evil in it; and as they have the same right to their views as I have, I do not feel at liberty to denounce it in the pulpit however much I may do so elsewhere. A BONE-GATHERER'S WORK. Three Hundred Miles of Prairie Devas

ELLENDALE, N. D., Oct. 1.—A courier arrived last evening from Fort Yates with an appalling story of a prairie fire, which has swept along the Missourl River for miles. The fire was started by a searcher after Buffalo bones, who, finding the grass hindered him in his business, applied a match to it. The conflagration got beyond all control and burned to the water's edge. The flames ran up and down the Missouri and a long distance west, burning over a strip 300 miles long and 700 miles wide. The great fire destroyed farm houses, barns, granaries, thousands of tons of hay and numerous herds of cattle and horses. Two days after the killing Gray went before an officer in Centralia and confessed to the murder. After having been indicted for murder he informed his counsel that he wanted to pread guilty provided he would be sentenced to be hanged. When told that no such promise could be made, he then told his attorney that he was not guilty and that he had confessed because he thought by so doing he would be hanged, as he was without money or friends and wanted to die. He was tried, went to the witness stand, testified that he was not guilty, and gave his reasons for having said he had done the killing. The jury found him guilty, and he was sentenced to the penitentiary for life. Less than a year ago he became very anxious for a pardon, and a petition was circulated to that effect and received many signatures, but as yet he is still in prison.

BUCKE ON MEDICINE,

Remarkable Address Before the McGill College Faculty.

Injurious Customs that Must Be Got Rid Of.

Total Disuse of Alcoholic Stimulants Likely to be Brought About.

Whip and the Jail Will Be Obsolete.

MONTREAL, Oct. 1 .- Dr. R. M. Bucke, medical superintendent of the Asylum for the Insaue, London, to-day delivered an introductory lecture on "The Value of the Study of Medicine," before the Medical Faculty of MeGill

the value of the Study of Medill College.

In opening, the doctor recalled the time when one-third of a century ago he sat upon the benches of McGill College, eager for knowledge and longing for distinction. His first duty was the pleasant one of thanking the distinguished faculty for having singled him out from among far worther men for the supreme compliment of delivering the introductory lecture. His purpose in appearing before them was to speak upon a topic, which, as it seemed to him, was less often and less freely dwelt upon than its importance deserved. In the mindsofmost people the chief (if not the only) object of the study of medicine was the cure of disease. A few diseases could be cured, but by far the greater number could not be cured by any means known at present. The study of medicine was valuable for the cure of disease, the relief of suffering, the prolongation of life and the management of such diseases as tend to get well of themselves. The doctor enlarged upon the value of the study of medicine for the prevention of diseases in which the art had made its great practical conquests, although trifling to those awaiting it in the near future. By special means, such as vaccination and by general sanitary measures many of the most deadly contagions and also a large number of other ailments have been rendered less frequent and less fatal. Continuing, the doctor said: "Again the sciences of anatomy and physiology are teaching us every day the folly, I might even say the sin, of certain highly injurious customs connected with dreas, such especially as tight lacing; and I believe that common sense, in spite of fashion, is, as a result of scientific teaching, gradually permenting this department also; and perhaps our great-grandchildren will enjoy the pleasure which is denied to us of seeing in our homes and about the streets the beautiful female torm, as originally designed by the Creator natural and graceful. unde-College. our great-grandchildren will enjoy the pleasure which is denied to us of seeing in our homes and about the streets the beautiful female form, as originally designed by the Creator, natural and graceful, undeformed by artificial appliances of any kind, the clothing so designed as to exhibit (not impiously attempting to improve) that supreme work of the Great Artist. When this day comes many diseases and weakness now common will be unknown. In the meantime, as a recent able writer has said, while the dress of men is not in all respects what it should be, that of women is a disgrace to civilization. In the matter of diet, and more especially in that of drink, the inhabitants of civilized countries, guided by medical science, have of late years made vast strides towards a more rational and more healthy life; thus it is now demonstrated that alcohol is always injurious when taken as an habitual article of consumption. This knowledge now gradually permeating the masses everywhere is unquestionably destined to lead at last to the total of the contract of the co

TOTAL DISUSE OF ALCOHOLIC STIMULANTS. TOTAL DISUSE OF ALCOROLIC STIMULANTS. Already the change effected is marked, the quantity of alcohol consumed per thousand of the population in Western Europe and America being to-day much less than it was even 25 years ago, and diseases caused by its use have proportionately diminished. Medical science was already beginning to point out how such common and terrible sourges as consumption and insanity should be attacked, and he had no doubt that in the course of another century the acute specific fevers, such as scarlet fever, measles, typhus, typhoid and the rest would be stamped out in all civilized countries. The study of medicine, affirmed the learned The study of medicine, affirmed the learned lecturer, meant the study of man. Going into detail he ably showed how a number of ascending lines starting from the various departments of lower nature converge toward and at last meet in that miracle of elaborate organization, the human body. These lines or series may be designated as first the morphological series, second the histological series, third the chemical series, fourth the dynamical series, and fifth the psychological series. The morphological series is the term used to designate the ascending sequence of forms which pass in an unbroken order from the lowest animals up to man. No member or organ in the human body can be fully understood until it has been traced throughout this series. For the various members and organs of the human body were not originally created as they exist in that body, but have each one of them a long history stretching far back into pre-human times. For illustrative purposes the doctor took up the evidences of the

INTIMATE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN HUMAN

took up the evidences of the Intimate Relationship Between human Beings and other animals who occupy a lower place in the scale of creation. It was learned that every organ in man, down to the most minute, is tallied by a similar organ in any one of the higher animals that we may choose to select and examine. One of the most striking instances is the following: All the apes use their feet, as well as their hands, to grasp with; they can all use the great toe as we use the thumb—that is, they can oppage it to the other toes, and seize and hold sticks, nuts, or other things between the great toe and little toes, just as they or we can seize and hold small articles between the thumb and fingers. We have no such power, we cannot make use of our toes in this way, still every muscle which exists in the foot of the ape by means of which he executes the movements in question exists also in our feet; but we make no use of them, and can make no use of them. Did we ever make use of these muscles? If so, when? If we never used them why were

they placed in our feet? Why should dozens of muscles be made and carefully placed and connected in our feet for no purpose? The muscles in question are now greatly atrophied for want of exercise. Were they created in this atrophied state, or were they created to be used, and have they since shrunk from want of exercise?" From these and other analogous indications flowed the vast and splendid speculations which light up with starlike beauty the pages of such writers as Darwin, Spencer, and Haeckel, whose radience carried forward and increased from age to age shall yet illumine the darkest recesse of nature. The second series, the histological, was a large subject upon which only a few words could now be said. Here was a marvelous series: First, animals consisting each of a number of cells, but all the cells of the same kind; then animals consisting each of a single cell; then animals consisting of two kinds of cells; then of a larger and larger number of cells and of kinds of cells, until we ascend to man, whose body contains a greater number of different kinds of cells than that of any other creature. But now comes a curious fact: Man's body (as well as the body of every living creature, animal or vegetable) begins its individual life as

This cell is multiplied by growth and division until we have at last the immense number of cells and of kinds of cells found in the full grown man. So here again we have two series corresponding with one another; the infinite series, namely, of the different animal forms from the unicellular to the most multicellular and the ceries through which the individual man passes from his origin as a unicellular living form to his million-celled maturity. The third series was the chemical. One of the first things we learn when we begin the study of medicine is that life is almost entirely a chemical process; that the body consists entirely of chemical molecules; that these are constantly breaking down and as constantly being renewed; that every act of which we are capable, every motion we make, every thought we think, every emotion we experience, has for its physical basis chemical change. We thus see that the study of a man's body, supposing it to be successfully prosecuted, necessitates not enly a study of the other living forms below him in the scale of existence, but the study of dead or inorganic mature as well. Passing on te the dynamic necessitates not early a study of the other living forms below him in the scale of existence, but the study of dead or inorganic nature as well. Passing on te the dynamic series the doctor contended that this was just as true of the torces which animate our bodies as it was of the material of which those bodies were built up. "Just as the matter of which our bodies are composed is related to all other matter—is built up of dead matter and returns to dead matter and returns to dead matter again—so is it equally true that every one of the varied forces which reside in our frame, and which we call vital forces, is merely borrowed for a moment from the great ocean of force in the outer world, and when used is returned to that again. And this is true not only of the force which drives the blood through our arteries and veins, of the force which the force which drives the blood through our arteries and veins, of the force which we exert with our limbs, and the force with which we breathe; but it is true also of these far more etheral and, so to speak, human forces called thought, desire, emotion, passion and will." All vital dynamics is a constituent and necessary part of the study of the human body, and therefore of the study of medicine. On the fifth of the series the psychological, the lecturer laid special stress. "Why should my mind as well as my body begin as infra-human and gradually become human? And if it must begin as infra-human why does it in its evolution follow the exact path which is pursued by the growing mind of a dog, an elephant or a baboon? —and this before all else is the prime condition of human advance." Great thinkers
made it clear that a mastery of biology and
psychology was an absolute premade it clear that a mastery of biology and psychology was an absolute prerequisite to anything like a sqientific conception of sociology. Mind being, as it is, an offshoot or prolongation of body, and depending on this for its very existence, it is easy to see there must be a close analogy between the laws of the two and that that one of them which first came into existence must have had almost everything to do with establishing the laws for its own offspring. A person born with the criminal constitution does not need to be damned cither by God or man—he is damned already. He does not the laws for its own offspring. A person born with the criminal constitution does not need to be damned already. He does not meed to be punished; he is punished already. He can no more lead what we call a good life by his own unaided endeavors than an idiot can lead the life offs mentally well equipped individual. As long as there are criminals doubtless society must protect itself from them; but the day is surely coming (and is perhaps not far distant) when the gallows, the whip and the jail will be as obsolete as are to-day the stake, the thumbarew and the rack. What may be called the criminal constitution once acquired is inherited—transmitted from father to son, just as is lunacy, idocy, phthisis, or asthma, or just as stature, features, figure, complexion, mental traits or bodily constitutions are transmitted. Upon mathematics rests astronomy upon astronomy physics, upon physics chemistry, then in turn as we ascend the scale come biology, psychology, sociology, and on the top, to crown the whole, morality—the principle of the classification being that as we ascend from science to science each becomes less and less simple and general and more and more special and complex. "Medicine," said the doctor in conclusion, "is therefore the key and the doorway to all the loftiest, most interesting and most important branches of human knowledge. The study of medicine has been above all other things the origin and source of human enlightenment. It has been one of the principal agents in the enfranchisement of human thought. It has more than perhaps any other agency tended to and assisted in the ennoblement of man."

The conditions of warfare have been so radically changed by smokeless powder and magazine rifles, effective at a mile and a half, that European governments are zeeking for services that will afford protection to soldiers. Austria and France are experimenting with shields for this purpose. A committee of the French War Office have reported in favor of a buckler of aluminum and copper. If E. J. Steele, Union, who was so severely injured under a moving train in this city last week, and who was able to leave the City Hospital, yesterday having had one hand and two fingers amputated, is able to recover \$5,833 33 from the insurance companies, his misfortune will not have been so unlucky to him after all. He is insured in the Provincial Provident Institution, of St. Thomas, for \$5,000, one-half of which is payable in case of accident resulting in incapacitating the insured from following his usual avocation. About two weeks ago Mr. Steele also took out an accident insurance policy in St. Thomas for \$10,000 in the Hartford, it being his purpose to travel considerably during the coming year. The provisions of this policy are that the insured is not paid a weekly benefit if injured, but if he loses both hands, or one foot and one hand, or the sight of both eyes, he is paid the amount of the policy, or if he loses one hand, or one foot, he receives one-third of the amount of the policy, \$3,333 33.
