#### Train Wrecked by a Cyclone.

VIENNA, June 1 .- The mail train running from Agram to Brod was struck by a cyclone to-day while at the Nowska station. Two of the passenger cars were lifted bodily into the air and hurled down an embankment. Others were knocked over by the violence of the storm and were badly smashed. Twenty persons on the train were badly injured, some fatally.

#### Rebellion in Honduras.

London, June 1.-Latest news from Honduras shows that in the battle between Gen. Bonilla (not Borneo as before reported) and the Government troops at Porto Cortez, about 100 persons were killed or wounded. Gen. Bonilla retired from Porto Cortez to Livingston after securing all the arms and ammunition which had been stored in the custom bouse. While the insurgents were in Livingston Gen. Bonilla and four of his officers were captured by the Government troops and put in prison, where two of the officers died from fever. The army of Bonilla re-treated to the forests, where they remain.

## Two Hundred Miners Killed.

PRAGUE, June 1 .- A late dispatch from Przibram states tha! 500 men were working in the mine when the fire broke out. Latest news from the scene of the disaster indi-cates that the loss of life is much larger than was at first reported. After investiga-tion it is reported that the list reaches the startlingly large number of 200. At last accounts 25 dead bodies burned and blackened in a terrible manner had been re-covered from the mine and 25 of the covered from the mine, and 25 of the miners were rescued from the death trap in a very precarious condition. Most of the victims, including three men who lost their lives while bravely engaged in the work of rescue, died of suffocation, being overcome by the fatal gases which pervaded the mine.

The mines belong to the state. They are the deepest in the world, and yield fifteen tons of pure silver annually.

#### Banished to Siberia. LONDON, June 2. - Five persons concerned

Some accident, trivial, even absurdly insignificant in itself, may precipitate the struggle." 

MR. GRIEVE, M. P. for North Perth, had a cordial reception from his associates on the Liberal benches when he was introduced to the House of Commons last even-ing. The member for North Perth is one of the most popular of the recent accessions to the Liberal ranks in the House.

IT WILL be seen from our telegraphic columns that Rev. J. G. Scott, of St. Thomas, has been elected president of the London Methodist Conference. It is an excellent choice. The new president was for three years pastor of Queen's Avenue Church in this city, and he has hosts of friends here who will congratulate him on the distinction he has attained. ARE Canadian men less gallant than

formerly? It has been put on record that when two girls were carried off and criminally assaulted in this neighborhood re-cently their appeals for assistance were unheeded by the men who heard them. Perhaps a timely protest would have been sufficient to stay the hands of the assailants, but if not, manly men should have taken more severe methods to prevent so gross an outrage.

A Hamilton woman is reported to have drawn the \$3,000 prize in the Derby drawing gambling enterprise at Montreal. She is to be pitied, for it is an evil day when any person obtains money for which he or she has not honestly toiled. It has been said that such money comes lightly and goes lightly, and in all probability this is the case. But the effect of such gambling practices is never good. The reward of honest toil alone can give permanent satisfaction to anyone.

#### LONDON IS HIT HARD.

We observe that members of Parliament continue to speak of London as a city with 22,000 of a population. That is the size of the city, according to the decree of the present Administration. The members of Parliament talk of London as they find it cut down to suit the whims of the men who have decreed that the people of this city shall not vote together, but in three separate constituencies. This is a humiliating arrangement, for it minimizes the size and import-ance of London and tends to make outsiders believe that it is not the important com-mercial, manufacturing and educational center that it is. If Mr. Hyman, M.P., had not been deprived of his seat by as gross an outrage as was ever perpetrated under an infamous law, London's interests would to-day be properly set forth at Ottawa, and a demand so persistent, so justly made nent till justice was done the city. While every other city with a population as large as that of London has two members, while Victoria. B. C., with 18,000 has two members, while Quebec city, with 63,000 has three members, London, with its \$2,000 citizens has only one member. its people are kept voting all over rural constituencies, and its interests are sacrificed. How long is this sort of thing to be tolerated? Surely no self-respecting Londoner, who honestly desires the city to maintain that prestige which nature and the enterprise of her citizens has established, can defend the gerrymander so far as it affects London. It is not too late to compel the doing of justice to this important constituency.
Why should Lendon be singled out for humiliation and why is no voice raised in Parliament on her behalf?

No fewer than 58 Conservatives, 10 Liberal "dissidents," and 20 Liberals have announced that they will retire from the British Parliament before the general election now pending. Sir R. Kuightly, who has been in Parliament nearly 40 years, heads the list of the retiring members with uninter-rupted records. There are 46 retiring supted records. There are 46 retiring members whose Parliamentary careers have ommenced since the passing of the Redistribution Act in 1885, 31 being Conserva-.ives. THE PRESENT AND THE COMING

MAN AND THEIR FOOD. One of the most interesting articles in the last number of the Forum is contributed by W. O. Atwater, and is entitled "What the Coming Man Will Est." The author makes telling comparisons between the inhabitants of Europe and those of the United States as regards the nourishing quality of their food. He thinks that the people of North America eat too much; but however that may be, he shows that our neighbors eat more food and more expensive food than any other people in the world. The author prefaces the results of his inquiries by reminding us that food nourishes our bodies in two ways-first, by building and repairing the tissues, and, secondly, by furnishing fuel to keep the body warm and give it strength to do its work. The protein or nitrogenous compounds, such as the myosin, which forms the basis of lean meat, the albumen of eggs, the casein of milk, and the giuten of wheat, are sometimes called fleshformers, because flesh, or, in other words, muscle and sinew, is formed from them though they make blood and bone as well. The fuel ingredients are the fats and carbo hydrates, such as butter, clive oil, and the oils of corn and other vegetable foods. It is customary for chemists to compute the fuel value of nutrients in heat units or calories, the calorie being the amount of neat needed to raise one pound of water bout four degrees Fahrenheit. A pound of potatoes, which are three-quarters water, contains about 340 calories; a pound of rather fat sirloin of beef 900, a pound of wheat flour 1,600, and a pound of butter 3,500 calories. Mr. Atwater is right in saying that diet should be so adjusted as to provide at once enough portein for the fuel to keep it warm so as to do its work, but there can be no doubt that erroneous habits of eating cause disease and shorten life to a very considerable extent. It is not so much the quantity a man eats, but whether his system assimilates the food without over-taxing the machinery of his

Taking the outcome of Mr. Atwater's comparisons it is found that of the diet aries of American wage-workers examined the very smallest furnished 3,500 calories of energy per man a day. The average of seven dietaries of 421 persons in Massa chusetts, factory operatives and mechanics engaged in moderately fatiguing work, was 4,415 calories; and the average of four dietaries of mechanics and laborers in Connecticut engaged in severe work was 6,705. The dietary of a number of brickmakers in Massachusetts was found to supply 8,850 calories per day. On the other hand, in a multitude of European dietaries, for which statistics are accessible, there are many which range from only 1,700 to 1,900 calories. The average of eleven dietaries of poorly-fed wage-workers in Saxony and Prussia is 2,290. The largest European dietary for men employed even in the hardest laber, of which Mr. Atwater has found a record, does not reach 4,500 calories. Voit's standard, based upon observations of the food of such wage-workers in Germany as are well paid and well fed, allows 118 grams of pretein and 3,055 calories of energy. For men engaged in severe physical labor Voit's standard calls for 145 grams of protein and 4,500 calories of energy. In the dietaries of professional men in Germany, Denmark and Sweden, lawyers, physicians, university professors and students, the amount of energy furnished varied from 2,325 to 2,835 calories a day; the average was 2,670. In the German army the peace ration is computed at 2,800 calories, and the extraordinary ration, given in war time for service in the field, at 3,985 calories. Contrast with this the above-mentioned dietaries of Massachusetts and Connecticut factory operatives, mechanics and day laborers at moderate work, which average 4,500 calories of energy a day.

The statistics collected put beyond question what has long been asserted that workingmen are better fed in the United States than anywhere else in the world. Whether the workers in North America will continue to be so well fed in the future depends a good deal on themselves. In the past they have had, and will continue for some time to come to have, a distinct advantage over the workers of Europe. On the other side of the Atlantic, the land has all been appropriated, and few opportuni-ties for the betterment of their condition are open to the toilers. On this continent. with its immense natural advantages, wages have been kept higher than in old world lands through the comparative plentifulness of opportunities for workers to make a living. If their trade has been dull they have always been able to go on the land, and as they brought the virgin soil under subjection they have given em-ployment to others. Thus food supplies soil under subjection they have given employment to others. Thus food supplies have been made plentiful while wages have been kept high, in spite of many stupid restrictions in the international exchange of the products of labor. By and bye the land will be all taken up, as in Europe. If the same conditions prevail here as prevail there—God grays they want they are to fight. vail there-God grant they may not !there will be the same small quantity of food for the workers, and the same difficulty to maintain a decent standard of comfort. Life in North America is rendered more to least the same from over-study. is rendered more tolerant because of the comparative fewness of titled idlers and of armed hosts, which swarm over Europe and are all maintained at the expense of the workers. It has been easier to prosper here because this is a new country, with boundless natural resources, but when these resources are all appropriated where will North America stand? Governed by right principles, we have no fears for the future of the northern half of the hemisphere. to deal with those questions relating to the But there must be a constant struggle empire as a whole. This reform would against that which is dishonest or inbring immense benefit to the British people, it is coming perhaps more rapidly than is heritage which the American branch of

the English-speaking people controls.

CANADIANS AT HOME AND ABROAD

The ADVERTISER recently chronicled the appointment of a clever young Londone to a professorship in a Kentucky university. This young man is the son of a Dominion Government official who cannot be said to be prejudiced in favor of the United States, but he could not prevail upon his offspring toremain in Canada under the present system while a better opportunity to make a living was offered elsewhere. The fact of the matter is, young Canadians can hold their own with the best men of any nation, as was evidenced more fully in a recent gathering of consulting engineers at Boston. No fewer than eight of the number were Canadians, who all occupied lucrative and honorable positions in this one line in the States.

When Canadians do so well abroad, can there be any good ground for the assertion of the opponents of reciprocity with the United States that at home the Canadian is a poor, puny, sickly fellow, unable to make a living except by the assistance of taxes imposed upon his neighbors? It does not stand to reason that the trade restric tionists are right. In this bracing northern atmosphere we rear the best of men and women, as is evidenced by the position they take when they enter into free competition with the people of other countries. With their boundless natural resources, added to their native ability, Canadians should have nothing to fear from liberty to trade freely with their neighbors. The monopolist alone, who is in a combine to obtain class advantages, would be injured by throwing off the shackles on international commerce.

Perhaps they do buy some of their supplies elsewhere for less money than they could at the exchange or perhaps they only think they do. It is an easy matter for a merchant to underbid the store on a bill of goods when the purchaser tells him just what the co-operative price is. He can well afford to sell one bill at cost to the miserable shopper who is selling his birthright for a mess of groceries.

It must be expected that in towns where there is no merchants' union (the members of which agree to a code of prices) the prices on various goods will vary somewhat and a shopper can pick out at each store some bargains—perhaps. Again, each store, especially in a good sized town, will almost any day be selling some article at cost or even below cost in order.

True, it was small, but they gave it their entire support, and increased it as fast as their limited means would permit. What is gained by this system of beating down? A farmer comes into town with potatoes, and accepts 32 cents per bushel, taking his pay in eash, with which he buys phosphate. He beats the price down from \$28 to \$26 per ton. A laborer in the fertilizer works buys the same potatoes for 40 cents after beating them from 45 cents. With the exchange principle worked out, the farmer would have got at least 36 cents for his potatoes and paid \$26 for the phosphate without haggling, and the laborer would have paid his 40 cents in eash, and both would have known that they would get their share of the net profit at the end get their share of the net profit at the end of the quarter.—[Joshua Adams, Quondaga county, N. CONFERENCE BOUNDARIES.

The Proposal to Reduce the Number of Methodist Church Courts.

London and Niagara Conferences May B Amalgamated.

J. J. McLaren, Q.C., writes: Some of your readers will remember that the commission on the boundaries of the six annual conferences in Ontario and Quebec, composed of a minister and a layman appointed by each of these conferences, met in September last. By an almost unanimous voit they concluded that it was desirable to reduce the number of these conferences if duce the number of these conferences, if a practical scheme could be devised. After carefully considering the matter in committee, a division into four conterences was deemed the most feasible, and the following was proposed:

1. A conference composed of the present Montreal Conference with the addition of

1. A conference composed to the Montreal Conference with the addition of the Napanee and Tamworth districts, and without the Nipissing and Sudbury dis-

tricts.

2. A conference composed of the present Bay of Quinte Conference, less the Napanee and Tamworth districts, but including the following districts from the present Toronto Conference, namely: Toronto East, Whitby, Bradford, Barrie, Collingwood and Bracebridge, also Nipissing and Sudbury districts.

3. A conference composed of the present Guelph Conference and the following districts from the present Teronto Conference, namely: Toronto West, Brampton, Orangeville, Parry Sound and Algoma; and from the Niagara Conference the Milton district, except Waterdown and Millgrove circuits.

4. A conference composed of the present London and Niagara Conferences, but excluding the Milton district, with the exception of the Waterdown and Millgrove circuits.

The secretary was directed to have the report published, and to furnish each member of the commission with a comparative summary of the proposed conferences. I think it desirable that it should be again published in the Guardian, so that it may be considered at the approaching conferences prior to the final meeting of the commission. circuits.

northwesterly direction. No. 4 has the whole territory between Lake Ontario and the southern part of Lake Huron, traversed in all directions by railways. Only one district is divided, and even that is not a necessary part of the scheme.

The advantages of a smaller number of conferences are so generally acknowledged that they need not be even now enumerated. Thus far, I have heard of only two objections to the proposed plan. The ated. Thus far, I have heard of only two objections to the proposed plan. They are: I. That the conferences will be so large that it will be difficult to billet them. 2. That Toronto will not consent to be divided in two.

I. There will be more places in each conference at which it may meet. The plan of a billet fee has worked well in conferences, and might be extended. By the rearrangement of business at the last General Conference, there is no need of the full conference being detained more than three or four days.
