Britain's Navy Criticised. LONDON, Aug. 30.—In the House of Commons Mr. Edward T. Gourley, member for Sunderland, and a well-known shipbuilder, asked whother, since the sinking of the warship Victoria, the Government's attention had been directed to the criticism of experts at home and abroad as to cism of experts at home and abroad as to the utility of ships of monster size, and whether an inquiry would be made regarding the capability of the lower structure of such ships to prevent capsizing in the event of some of their] compartments filling with water. He also asked whether the Admiralty officials were aware that the lower structure of these ships when pierced might, as in the case of the Victoria, disturb the center of gravity and cause them to "turn turtle."

Right Hon. Sir U. J. Kay-Shuttleworth, Secretary to the Admiralty, replied that the Admiralty had not failed to consider the criticisms referred to, but was decidedly criticisms referred to, but was decidedly of the opinion that it would be advisable to build more ships of the dimensions already decided upon in view of the strength of shoes they might encounter in case of war. The Admiralty saw no reason for a special inquiry into the subject, as the question of the lower structure had necessarily been dealt with in designing the ships.

In the course of a general reply the Secretary of the Admiralty said that a further inquiry in regard to the loss of the Victoria would be instituted if the Admiralty should consider it necessary.

When the navy estimates came up for consideration, the Right Hon. Lord Geo. Hamilton (Conservative), lately First Lord of the Admiralty, attacked the Government for neglecting to maintain the efficiency of the navy. He declared that unless a determined effort was made to construct new war ships England's supremacy on the seas would vanish within three unless a determined effort was made to construct new war ships England's supremacy on the seas would vanish within three years. Already the French and Russian battleships together reached a total of 25 against 22 effective British vessels of that class. France and Russia have ten battleships in course of construction, while Great Britain has only three. In first-class cruisers only was Great Britain elightly superior to France and Russia. He suggested that supplementary estimates be allowed for the purpose of pushing on the work of building new warships.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt held that the superiority of the British navy over the navies of other countries was never so great as now. He denied the accuracy of the figures presented by Lord George Hamilton. The Chancellor of the Exchequer concluded by declaring that the Government was fully alive to all its obligations and would maintain the naval superiority of Great Britain.

New York, Aug. 30.—A special from Columbia, S. C., says the first train from Charleston since Sunday evening arrived this afternoon, bringing the first authentic news of the have wrought there by the cyclone. The western side of the city is now under water. The entire ocean front is a complete wreck, not a wharf escaping. The battery and White Point Darden, the lamous seaside promenade, is a mass of ruins, and the handsome residences facing the driveway and walk are all damaged. Many residences and other buildings in various parts of the city were unroofed and partially wrecked. All the charches auffered severely. The losses in the city alone will aggregate fully \$1,000.

The historic Sullvan's Island is laid waste. Very few of the residences remain intact and the entire island was under water for 12 hours. Only six lives are known to have been lost, three on the island, three in the city. A report has reached Columbia, S. That the best relation between the two sections of the race on this continent, and the only one on which they can permanently rest, is that of equal and honorable union, is the conviction to which I have been led after due consideration of the arguments on the other side. The severance was the work of pure historical accident, and of a quarrel as devoid of any permanent significance as a quarrel can be. 

Repairing an Ocean Cable. It has always been a speculation and wonder to most people as to cable, once broken in mid-ocean, is ever got

cable, once broken in mid-ocean, is ever got together again. The explanation is this First, it must be known that the cable practically rests everywhere on the bottom of the sea. Of course there are places where sudden deep places coming between shallow ones will cause the cable to make a span, as over a ravine or guilly. In other places the ocean is so deep that the cable finds its specific gravity somewhere in midwater, so to speak. In that case it rests quite as firmly as if it were on solid ground. When a break occurs the first step, of course, is to accurately locate its position. A conductor such as a cable offers a certain amount of obstruction or "resistance" to the passage of an electric current. Ap-
