A new class of officers, to be called stampers and sorters, will be created. At present first class clerks were engaged in this work. The work in Great Britain was done by stampers and sorters, as proposed here.

The House, in committee, resumed consideration of the tariff, taking up items Nos. 255 and 256, barbed wire and strip fencing, and galvanized wire for fencing. Nos. 9, 12 and 13, 15 per cent until Jan. 1, 1898, and thereafter free. A lively discussion ensued upon a statement by Mr. Paterson that it was never intended to go further and make all wire fencing free. This left the woven wire fencing at 25 per cent. Mr. Foster insinuated that the duty was retained on woven wire fencing because it was made in a factory re presented by a supporter.

## A MISCHIEF-MAKING MATCH

Causes a Terrific Explosion in a Fireworks Factory-A Score of Persous Hurt.

Chicago, June 10 .- A match carelessy dropped by one of the workmen in the fireworks factory of M. Shure, at the corner of West Van Buren and Halstead streets, caused a terrific explosion Tuesday night. It was shortly after the closing time of the factory and many of the workmen had gon ome. A number of the employe the building were badly hurt, and the flying rockets and candles struck sev ral people who were passing in street cars and on the sidewalks.

The force of the explosion was s reat that nearly all the windows in the block were demolished, and the Shure building, which is a four-story ructure, was badly damaged. Imp diately following the explosion the uilding was ablaze from cellar to root and it was almost destroyed. The loss to the building and contents is estimated at \$60,000. The flying missiles from the factory struck a number of persons, and one man who was gazing in a store window 400 feet distant was hit squarely in the back by a rocket. He fell to the sidewalk unconscious.


Collecting Pew-Rents Denounced as an Anti Christian System.

Brantford, June 10.-In the Hamilton Methodist Conference, Rev. A. THE EMBARGO ON AMERICAN CATTLE.

Washington, June 10 .- The Administration has outlined an important policy to be pursued with regard to the controversy existing between this Gov-ernment and Great Britain, Germany, France and Belgium as a result of the action of other countries in excluding American cattle and dressed beef.
