Leo Bergois, Former French Cabinet Minister, Also Maintains That An Internat ional Constitution Is a Necessity For the Future.

Paris, Nov. 15.—"Germany must undergo a moral revolution as well as a political upheaval before she can be admitted to a league of nations," says Leo Bergois, former cabinet minister, who is president of a commission recently appointed to study the plan for a great combination of states for the future.

"The universal war has demonstrated to all nations the necessity for an international military international constitution," he says. "This would assure to each nation the sanctity of its rights. Diplomatic and judicial into intolerable solitude, and not only the state but its citizens would suffer. President Wilson has admitted the legitimacy of penalties, and said that they might possibly be used against the control powers. "If this weapon should fail, there would remain international military intervention. But economic measures which would deprive a country of raw materials and interrupt land and sea transport would be sufficient to crush resistance."

SPAIN WILL ADHERE TO FOREIGN POLICY

Pacific Agreements With Britain and France Included In Govt.'s Plan.

Madrid, Nov. 15.—(By the Associated Press).—At the first meeting of the new Spanish ministry, held early this week, it was unanimously decided, after an address by Premier Romanones, to continue the policy which was initiated in 1902 and reaffirmed in 1907 and 1913. The ministry has issued a note saying that the new government will be directed in a democratic spirit and guaranteeing that order will be maintained throughout Spain.

The foreign policy referred to in the above dispatch apparently alludes to pacific agreements with France and Great Britain by which integrity of coasts and insular and colonial possessions in the east Atlantic and Mediterranean were mutually guaranteed by the three countries. This foreign poicy of Spain was considered a stepaimed against German aggression. In 1907 the signature of a treaty between Spain, France and England carrying out the above objects was looked upon as the foundation of "a future united states of Europe."



This morning at 6:45 o'clock, a "lovely" (to use the V. A. D.'s adjective) baby girl, weighing 8½ or 9 pounds, was ushered into the world in the Emergency Hospital, and both mother and babe are doing nicely, thank you, the former extremely grateful for the skillful care that has been bestowed upon herself and little daughter.

Quick Response.

Dur'ng the night, Mrs. J. F. Thomson, superintendent of No. 4 Nursing Division, received a call from a doctor in the city asking if she could have une hospital opened up at once to take in the wife of a returned soldier, who was ready for the emergency, even if it was being tended at the hospital, and made as comfortable as possible.

Yesterday, the returned man, with his wife and four little children, were removing from Windsor to Toronto to make their home there. On the train, his wife was taken ill, and they decided to stop over in London.

No Chance in Hospitals.

A doctor vas called to the hotel where they registered, the idea being to secure a bed 'n one of the hospitals. Owing to the influenza epidemic, the hospitals are filled to overflowing. In any case, they have been refusing maternity cases, because of risk to mother and babe. In the dilemma, the doctor thought of No. 4 Nursing Division, and immediately called Mrs. Thomson, who was ready for the emergency, even if it was 70 clock in the morning. The father and four older children are staying in the meantime at the Grigg House.

The case of Corp. Pugh came to the attention of The Advertiser long before he went to war. When he was released from Kingston Penitentiary early in 1914, he came to this office stating that he desired to place himself on record for a new life, and he wrote several articles on prison conditions which attracted considerable attention. During his long incarceration the man evidently had spent much time in educating himself, and came out of the portals of Kingston a trained accountant, and with more than an ordinary command of English.

When war broke out he had some trouble in getting into a battalion, but after some setbacks he went overseas and served ten months in France, giving an excellent account of himself and finally being sent back for deafness.

Deeply Grieved.

The day he received the letter Corp. Pugh came to The Advertiser office and revealed the fact that he had been turned down. He was greatly stirred emotionally, and told a most dramatic story to the editor of this paper.

One of the men whom he met in the old days, he stated, came to him and attempted to get him to return to the gentle art of cracking safes and getting money easily. The character was one of the best-known "petermen" (nitro-glycerine safe blowers), in the country, and he offered to pay the fare of Pugh to a certain place to look over a job in which the stake was \$65,000. He told Pugh that the latter was a fool to think that the world would ever give him a chance again, and dangled the lure of "easy money" before the eyes of the man who, according to every indication, was attempting to get back on his feet and to support his family by honest work.

Pugh told The Advertiser of his refusal to accept the offer and of the crook's departure after another declaration that the London man was a fool, and should take up the chance.

"I have tried to keen straight, but these Government officials don't want me to," said Pugh at the time. He also believed that someone aware of his record was busy seeking to prevent him from securing work.

The case was taken up by Secretary Cunliffe of the Great War Veterans' Association, through the Dominion executive at Ottawa, and the reply which comes back makes it plain that the Dominion Jovernment has made it a rule that no matter what service a man may have performed in France at \$1.10 a day he cannot work for the Government at home if he has a record of crime. The decision is regarded as a cruel and unfeeling attitude, and it is probable that the returned soldier's case will be made a capital issue before long.







JOINTLY DEVELOP THE ST. LAWRENCE POWER

Deep Waterway Navigation System Part of Scheme.

OTTAWA, Nov. 14.-With the return to a peace basis, the Dominion Govern-ment will, it is understood, take up the uestion of joint development with the United States of St. Lawrence water powers. A large scheme has already been tentatively submitted in its broad outlines. While regarding increased navigation facilities as paramount in navigation facilities as paramount in the St. Lawrence, the scheme, it is estimated, would result in the development of enormous additional waterpower. Surplus power generated under the scheme and not needed in Canada, it is suggested, could be exported to the United States under treaty arrangements which would permit of its return when required on this side of the international boundary.

One phase of the scheme would entall the practical abandonment of the present canal system of the St. Lawrence, as the result of the creation of a deeper waterway by means of dams.

U.S. AND CANADA TO FIRST TO ENLIST RETURN FIRST, IS PLAN PROPOSED BY GOVERNMENT

Unit Demobilization Plan Discarded-Said To Have Two Serious Drawbacks.

START AT HOME FIRST

Clean Out Camps in Canada and Bring Home Women and Children Overseas.

[Special to The Advertiser.] OTTAWA, Nov. 14.—Demobilization plans are under discussion by the full really commence for some months yet, pending the conclusion of peace. However, steps will be taken in the meantime to bring back the Canadian women and children now in the old land, while the return of invalided men will continue as in the past.

As at present contemplated the overseas men will be demobilized territorially. There has been some agitation to have them come home by units, but this plan would have serious drawbacks. For instance, there are battalions which contain in their ranks men resident formerly in all parts of the Dominion. Moreover, demobilization by units would bring back in many cases recent draftees in advance of veterans and original firsts. The latter must be given preference over others.

ence over others.

Bring Back Wounded.

The plan which it is expected will be followed contemplates the bringing lack of all the men of the first contingent from Montreal. Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver or other cities first, taking second contingent men on the same plan. rom Montreal. Toronto, Winnipeg, Vancouver or other cities first, taking second contingent men on the same plan next, and so on. There are at present 33,000 Canadian soldiers in hospitals in England, and 10,000 in France. These, it is proposed, will be returned as their condition permits, and as accommodation is provided in Canada to receive them. In the meantime they are well cared for in Canadian hospitals overseas. Their return will be made not on gransports, but on hospital ships and hospital trains.

As a matter of fact, there is a considerable body of opinion in fawor of retaining the invalided men in England until such cure as can be effected has been accomplished.

Will Have Preference.

In the matter of the disposition of the men once they return preference will be given to those formerly engaged in "pivotal" industries. Already the railways are clamoring on account of freight congestion for the speedy return to civil life of men who were railway employees before they donned the khaki. In point of preference railway-

way employees before they donned the khaki. In point of preference railwaymen come first, telegraph operators second, shipbuilders and mechanics third and agriculturalists fourth.

and agriculturalists fourth.
But demobilization is to start at home first. There are in Canada at present 71,000 men in khaki. Of these 10,000 are returned men in hospitals, and 1,600 are men on harvest leave from the draft. These latter will simply be called upon to report and secure their medical examination, so that they may medical examination, so that they may be discharged without the danger of subsequent claims for pension being made on the Government. It is expected that the demobilization of those in camps at present will take but a few days, and may start soon. Little dislocation will follow their absorption back to givil life as there is at present ack to civil life, as there is at present a demand for labor in most branches of industry and business.

It is possible that four or five thousand of them will be retained in khaki for some time.

Department Overwhelmed.

After nine stenographers, specially detailed for the work, had endeavored unsuccessfully to cope with the flood of letters received requesting the immediate return of soldlers from the front, the militia department issued the following statement:

"In view of the very large number of letters received at military head-quarters during the last few days, requesting that, in view of the armistice, sons, brothers and other relatives may be immediately discharged from the army and returned to Canada, the dedepartment of militia and defence finds it necessary to state: Department Overwhelmed.

department of militia and defence finds it necessary to state:

"First—That owing to the large number of these communications and the tremendous labor involved in dealing with them, replies will not be sent to any received during the last few days, unless the cases appear to come within the policy affecting leave of absence on compassionate grounds, in which event they will be dealt with in the usual way.

"Second—That it is impossible to accede to, or even consider, such applica-

"Second—That it is impossible to acceed to, or even consider, such applications unless they are based upon circumstances involving hardship, which bring them within the scope of policy governing compassionate leave. Any other course of action would involve the return to Canada of soldiers by preference, or selection for private reasons which could not in any way be justified."

It was impossible for the nurse to stay, and the patients were removed to the hospitel. Another case showed five people all living in one room, four being ill with influenza and one with pneumonia. The filth and dirt of these homes was said to be unspeakable. Often there was no bedding whatever found, and clean mattresses had to be supplied. Another point mentioned was the fact that in the city, there are houses being rented for quite a high sum, which are not fit for people to live in, their owners having the poor at their mercy. That something should be done to prevent such living conditions was the unanimous opinion of the meeting, and again the only solution seemed to be a co-ordinated health association which would work in harmony with the Social Service Council, under which head all the relief work in the city is now being organized. Mrs. J. B. McKillop also emphasized the fact that a great amount of overlapping was caused by lack of co-operation on the part of the city health and relief organization due to the fact that all its work was carried on under one head. Definite Plans for an enlarged board of health worked out by Miss Fidlar presented an outline which showed clearly just how much co-operation aheady existed in the city, between the different health and relief organizations, stating at the same time that it was in a very feeble and anaemic state. One thousand one hundred and forty-nine nursing days were covered in that time, with an average of five nursing days to each family. Some required a nurse for one day only, and some for sixteen days and nights. Ninety-four nurses registered, this number being far from equal to the demand, as some were continually dropping off. Seventeen women registered to assist as housekeepers in the homes.

PEORIA, Nov. 14. — War between the major leagues and the minor organizations of the country threatens to develop as a result of action taken at the annual meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues here today protysting against the privileges of the major leagues to draft star players from the majors. Draft prices will be raised, the privileges of the major leagues to draft star players from the minors.

The protest was embodied in a resolution drawn by A. R. Tearney of Chicago, president of the Three-I League, and presented by Jack Holland, owner of the St. Joseph (Mo.) club of the Western League. The resolution demanded that the American and National Leagues relinquish the right of the draft, and also the practice of "farming out" players under the optional agreement. It was adopted without a dissenting vote.

The salary limit of Class A leagues was fixed at \$2,500 a month, Class B at \$2,000. Class C et \$1,400, and Class D at \$1,200.

The clubs will be required to deposit substantial guarantees with the league presidents, and failure to enforce the salary limits will result in fine for the two first offences and forfeiture of their charter for the third offence.



The motherland has joyfully celebrated the cessation of hostilities, but the motherland needs food, yet more food, and the daughter land carmot refuse to supply the lack, even to the limit of her ability. France needs food, and Italy, Belgium and Serbia. Under the plans of the Allied food controllers made some months ago, at least 70 per cent of the deficiency in essential foodstuffs of the Allied countries in Europe must be supplied during the coming year from North America, because of the short ocean haul, compared with that from other available food markets. Signing of an armistice doesn't fill empty cupboards and chouses with food and satisfy hungry mouths.

Old Mother Hubbard will find the cupboard sadly lacking for many a moon n Britain, France, Serbia, Belgium and Italy unless America stands by her wartime food pledge, thus giving tangible expression of her gratitude to the old world Allied countries, which have known the real horror and hardship of the war, to

rationing of butter will be necessary for many a day to come if North America is to fulfill her obligation. MY FAVORITE FISH RECIPE.

fish recipes in order to help to popularize fish as a diet. A number have shown their patriotism by making a prompt response. One letter received was in unmistakably masculine writing and it reads

Dear Mademoiselle Editor,-Will you let a plain man have a look in to your interesting page for once? Saw last week that you were asking for fish recipes. I pride myself I am some cook myself, patriotic frills and all. I wonder if any of the ladies who read your page have tried dipping fish in cornmeal instead of flour before frying it? I'm past military age, and not so young as I used to be, so I find it is absolutely necessary for me to get away for at least a week's rest from business each year. None of your swell hotels for mine! I get two or three good pals the fishing is good. The others can cook the potatoes, flapjacks and bacon if they like, but I don't trust anyone else with the fish, that is, with the cooking. The boys can catch them and scale them and clean them if they like. I never object to little helps like that Up at the island where I was stopping this year we got the finest, flaklest white fish that ever made a man hungry for more,

"I split the whitefish down the back, then cut it in pieces three or four inches long, dipped these in commeal, and popped them in the frying pan over a good, brisk fire. I used bacon grease, or the saved fat in which the fish had been fried the day before, or better still, butter. I cooked the herrings the same way, only, of course, I didn't cut them up. Just cut off the head and trimmed the tail nicely. Eat? Say, you should have seen the boys pitch in. I can tell you, we never had anything left for these here 'leftover' dishes the women talk so much about. There's one thing to remember about frying fish. Be sure to cook it thoroughly on one side before you turn it over. You are liable to break it up if you try turning it too often. Another thing, never put on the lid when you are frying fish. It makes the fish flabby to cover it when it is cooking. If you don't take my word for it that the commeal improves the flavor, besides saving the flour, try it for yourself. Among other recipes which have been sent in is the favorite of Christy Mackenzie, whose sage advice has added interest to this department on several previous occasions. She tells this time about the way she prepares and serves whitefish.

"Aunt Jemima," is a newcomer, who has most seasonable advice to offer concerning the cooking of finnan haddle. "From now on, we will have it at least once a week during the season," she says, adding: "I learned this method of cooking it by experiment, and my family thinks nobody can cook it just like mother." Aunt Jemima also gives a recipe which sounds wonderfully good for making a salmon loaf, which she serves with riced potatoes, green peas and egg sauce. The whitefish, finnan haddie and salmon recipes will appear next week, space permitting.

VIRGINIA CORN BREAD WITH CHEESE.

The very name, "Virginia Corn Bread" suggests something appetizing, doesn't it? It sounds crisp and toothsome, something one would enjoy eating for luncheon or the substantial evening meal when dinner is served in the middle of the day. Just think of piping hot Virginia corn bread on the table when you come in hungry some frosty autumn or winter evening!

Virginia corn bread has an added and very big merit at this time of the world's history. It is a substitute for both meat and wheat. That is the reason the making of Virginia corn bread was demonstrated by domestic science experts in the Canada Food Board exhibit at the Western Fair.

These are the ingredients, as stated by Miss Demonstrator: One-half cup of cornmeal, one-half cup cold water, mix the meal and cold water to a paste, then add one and a third cups of boiling water. Cook fifteen minutes, then cool and add one egg, one-half cup of flour, one cup of grated cheese, one teaspoonful of salt, and one teaspoonful of baking powder.
