Thirty Track-Laborers Plunge to Death Near City of Vancouver.

THE BRIDGE GAVE WAY

Engine Got Across in Safety, But Apparatus Car Was Too Heavy For Structure.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 28 .- Speeding through a howling storm in the darkness, while the people of Vancouver and New Westminster slumbered in the long Sunday morning rest, a gang of Japanese track laborers who had turned out to repair the ravages the Great Northern Railway had suffered during the worst night's weather in years went headlong to death, the oridge near Sapperton collapsing under the weight of the heavy work train. At least twenty and perhaps thirty unfortunate Japanese are reported dead, and others more or less seriously injured are in the hospital iere and at Westminster. The train left Vancouver in the morning at 5:30 and reached Sapperton at 6:15. The track passes by a bridge over the Burnett River, and a heavy flood had submerged the track on both sides. The train was in the swirling waters almost before those on board were aware the bridge had been reached. The line now reaches to the summit of the Cordillera, and will join a railroad from Mendoha. The Trans-Andine line will continue on the La Paz, Bolivia. The completed line from Arica to La Paz will be about 300 miles long, and will cose in the neighborhood of \$15,000,000.



Washington, Nov. 27. — Congressman Mann, who was chairman of the special committee on wood pulp and print paper of the last Congress, but who was overruled by Congress in the final passage of the tariff law, takes the position that the country may well be alarmed at the danger of a tariff war with Canada, growing out of the new rates on wood pulp and print paper. Mr. Mann has prepared for introduction to Congress next month several measures relating to the subject, One is a joint resolution to postpone the application of the maximum tariff from April 1 next to January, 1911. Another resolution provides that the maximum tariff shall be held not to apply to wood pulp and print paper imported from Canada.

The bishop chose as his text Haggai ii., 7: "I will fill this house with glory, said the Lord of hosts." He was not sure that people realized why they came to church. It was his hope that their so doing was not the result of a habit, but rather in a desire and a hope to meet the Lord Jesus Christ and receive some strength and that God would send his spirit into their hearts. Continuing, the bishop said that the peculiar glory of the Church of England was that it proclaimed the faith in all its fullness, while other bodies have either taken from or added to the faith as set down in the Bible.

A great many reople were inclined to think of the church as a social club where they paid so much and received visits from the rector, and a certain social recognition. If the church were filled with the glory of the Lord, he continued, this could not be, it must be a missionary church The bishop closed with an appeal to his hearers to look carefully needs of the diocese and also to the wider fields of the west and foreign lands.

St. George's Church had had its beginning in a little brick school house about 35 years ago, and two years later a church was erected which is now used as a school room in connection with the church.
