# AN ESKIMO'S **SNOW HOUSE**

Blocks of Firm Snow for Bricks.

The Eskimo vault is a true dome: it exerts no outward thrust and requires no temporary scaffolding. It is also unique in that its material is not brick or stone, but snow.

The construction is used for the beehive shaped winter houses of these socalled savages and is spiral in plan. A row of blocks is first laid on the ground in a circle-or more exactly a polygon. Each of these has a slightly slant top and each thus raises its surface a little beyond the last, until when the circle is completed the gap in height between the last and first blocks gives the thickness for the following courses. In these the upper and lower surfaces of each block are parallel, as in a brick, but the gradual upward trend given by the first course

is of necessity maintained. In each successive round the snow bricks are leaned inward more by having their lower surfaces sliced off to a level. If set squarely end to end they would before long lean inward so far that they would tumble. For this reason the end of the block last laid is cut at an angle. The next following block has the joining end slanted at the reverse angle. Thus it fits in behind the preceding and is prevented by it from slipping inward. As the house grows the circles be-

ENGLAND'S GREAT SEAL

A New One Necessitated by the New Reign.

The new reign renders the adoption of a new great seal of England imperative. Upon the accession of a new sovereign or upon a change of the royal arms or style or upon the mechanical parts of the great seal becoming worn out and the fillings and ornaments becoming defaced, an order is made by the sovereign in council for the adoption of a new seal: the old one is publicly broken, and the frag-ments become the fee of the lord

The ceremony of breaking or damasking the old great seal consists in the sovereign giving it a gentle blow with a hammer, after which it is sup-posed to be broken, and to have lost all its virtues.







# **FUGITIVE OFFICIAL**

## Attachment Will Be Made Against Property of Missing Gouldthrite.

Ottawa, June 27. - No trace has as yet been found by the Dominion po- ALL THE GOLD WAS HIS lice of Frank S. Gouldthrite, the fugitive superintendent of stationery, who decamped on Monday last following the discovery of the frauds at the Government printing bureau consequent upon the investigations of Hon Charles Murphy. Circulars have been sent out by Col. Percy Sherwood, the chief of the Dominion police, to various police departments in Canada and the United States, giving a description of the missing man, and the Government will spare no effort to have him apprehended.' Meanwhile an attachment will be made against his property in Ottawa to cover the loss of at east part of his speculations. Gouldthrite was appointed to the staff of the printing bureau seventeen years ago

His salary was \$2,300 a year. Hon. Mr. Murphy, assisted by King's printer, Mr. Charles Parmelee is continuing the investigation into affairs at the bureau, and until it is completed no details as to the other members of the staff against whom ir regularities are proven will be made public. The minister has determined on a thorough reorganization of the whole bureau, with a view to making any further rakeoffs or frauds of any impossible. As far as can be learned at present all the instances of collusion between employees at the bureau and sellers of stationery have been in connection with United States firms. A searching audit of all the accounts for years past is now being made, and it is probable that many firms doing business with the bureau will be asked to tell all they know

# French Medical Student Insisted On Being Cut Open.

Marseilles, June 27. - An extraordinary case has come before the Marseilles hospital authorities in the person of a young medical student who declared he suffered of cancer of the stomach, merely because his nerves were overwrought.

The student had left his home in the Levant for Paris, where he began to study for his degree. He got into depressed spirits and imagined he had cancer of the stomach. He continually asked his professors to take the usual measures for an operation, but they as often refused, declaring that nothing was wrong with him except certain symptoms of nervous breakdown from overwork.

He was not satisfied, and finally was permitted to enter a hospital. Here he was watched for several weeks, at the end of which he was told his malady was only one of the nerves. Disappointed with this favorable report, he applied for admission to a hospital in the Champagne country. Here too, the doctors asserted he needed no operation of any kind. And so he left the hospital, going finally to Mar-

Arrived here he determined to qualify himself for the operation. He took up a position in front of a police station, and then, after having attracted the notice of the agents of the law, he swallowed several coins and an open penknife. The police conduced him in great agony to a drugshop near by, from which he was carried to the hospital. This time an operation was imperative, but the physicians doubt that it will save the young man, for he is in an extremely precarious state.

# What to Do in An Emergency

Objects in Ear .- Act gently. Hold the head with injured ear downward. Syringe with soapy water. A slight smack on other side of head

Nose Bleeding.—The application of cold water or cold articles to the back of the neck will often stop the bleeding. Cold water should be applied and sniffed upward, holding the head well back.

Cuts .- If the flesh be cut very deeply, the doctor should be sent for. Always wash a cut in clean (previously boiled) cold water, and let the blood flow a little. To keep the dirt away, bind up in a tight lint or linen bandage. Boric solution prevents festering.

Bruises.—If the blow has been very severe, and the bruise does not "color" quickly, rags soaked in hot water will bring out the bad blood. Any cold water bandage or substance, such as ice, will quickly reduce the swelling and inflammation.

Swe'ling in Eye.-Don't rub the eye. Lift the lid of the eye up or down and try to reach the foreign body with the edge of a clean handkerchief. Grits in the eye may often be washed away by causing the eye to "weep." Shut both eyes and press against the ball of non-affected eye. If there is a burning sensation, boric acid solution should be introduced. Don't use

Arm Broken.-The suffer's arm should be quickly bandaged in three strips of wood, and the doctor called or visited as soon as possible. Handkerchiefs fastened lightly will serve for bandage cloths.

Choking.—The sufferer should be made to drink water as quickly as possible. The old-fashioned remedy of slapping on the back will often cause the obstruction in the throat to dislodge. If water will not remove the bone or whatever may be in the throat, swallowing some hard edible, such as stale

Leg Broken.-Quickly cut away trousers or boots, and bind both legs together tightly and send for the doctor.

Burns.-In cases of severe burning, the part should be cleansed and lightly bound in salad or olive oil, so aked rags, or even flour may be ap-



The above diagram has been prepared to show how the gross earnings of the Canadian railway companies are at present distributed. ing in its relation to the present demand of employees for a higher scale of wages. The following statement, accompanying the diagram, has been

'The above diagram should prove interesting to the general public, to railway managers and employees. It should be of some help also to conscientious statesmen, who are often asked to throw the harpoon into the railroad before the latest wound has healed. It will surprise some people to learn that, according to Government reports, 43.58 per cent of the gross earnings of Canadian railways goes to labor direct, as compared with 41 per cent paid on the same account by American roads. This is largely due to the climatic conditions and to the lower earning power of the Canadian railways.

'Moreover, American roads, covering about the same territory as Canacountry, serving 87,000,000 dian roads cover, operate through a settled people, while Canadian roads have only 7,000,000 to serve.

'In addition to the 43 per cent of gross paid for labor, 75 per cent the money paid on account of fuel and oil, representing 9.7 per cent gross earnings, goes to the men who mine coal and boil oil. This brings the amount paid to labor directly and indirectly up to 52.65 per cent of the The cost of upkeep, material, equipment and supplies eats up 8.82 per cent of the gross earnings, 6.02 per cent of which goes to the men who work with their heads and hands to produce these items and articles.

"So we find that the railway pays out close to 60 per cent of every dollar taken in for labor. The fact that Canadian railways pay considerably more of each dollar on this account than is paid by their American competitors refutes the argument that American manufactures come to Canada in order to recure cheaper

"Naturally our winters being longer and harder and our days shorter than the winters and days are farther south our railways get less out of the


"Another point against our railway is that nearly every American line running east and west passes through or near some vast coal field. Canadian roads have not only to haul their coal great distances, but in addition have to pay a heavy duty on every ton of coal they import, a serious handi-

"The tendency in Canada, as in the States for the past decade, has been the rates to reduce the earning raised taxes and at the same time reduce the rates to reduce the earning power and increase the fixed charges. In the meantime during the past ten years the wages of railway employees in Canada have been increased by

"So all things considered Canadian railways make a splendid showing from most any viewpoint, and they unquestionably have in many respects a harder row to hoe than have the American lines, with whom for transcontinental traffic they must compete.

"Always when planning war on the railway the railway employee has to keep in mind the benefits accruing from pension or superannuation funds, the saving of years, which are lost to him if he severed his connections with the road. As the railways contribute largely to this fund, they very naturally insist upon an oversight of that department. In the case of a recent strike at Winnipeg one faithful old employee had but a year to serve before becoming eligible for benefits, but he was forced to walk out and lose

# **OPENS TOMORROW**

Bill Will Be Introduced by Asquith Altering Form.

BUDGET UP THIS WEEK

Not Expected That Lloyd George Will Reduce Tax on Whisky.

London, June 27.-The proceedings in Parliament last week were overshadowed in public interest by futile guesses as to the nature of the deliberations going on at the conference of the leaders of both parties, which was arranged with the hope of arriving at a satisfactory compromise on the Lords' veto question. The newspapers and the public call it a con-ference, but Premier Asquith referred to it as a meeting, not a conference. A meeting seems to be an adequate description of the informal non-comnital relations prevailing among the leaders of both parties. The Labor party is the first one to record officially its attitude towards the meeting, passing a resolution heatedly de nouncing any compromise that would modify the effect of the veto policy. It has been discovered that Mr. Asquith issued a detailed memorandum describing the present relations between the two Houses of Parliament which formed the basis of the discussion at the meeting formerly called a conference. Mr. Asquith narrates th alleged injustice of the present condition of things from the Liberal viewpoint and suggests many numerous possible methods of compromise for consideration. It is expected that ex-Premier Balfour will issue a memoran dum commenting on Mr. Asquith's views, and naming certain conditions on which a compromise is possible When Mr. Asquith's and Mr. Balfour's memorandums are submitted to members of the meeting then the latter will be able to get down to business Mr. Asquith on Thursday outlined the course of business which the House of Commons will transact during the course of business the House of Commons will transact during the remainder of the session. He intimated that he did not intend to introduce

contentious legislation, but politicians are puzzled by his definition of the word contentious. A bill altering the Accession oath will be introduced on Tuesday. The budget for 1910-11 will be introduced Thursday. It is difficult to understand why Mr. Asquith considers the formeasure uncontentious. It doubtful whether the bill will pass its first reading Tuesday without precipinot only by the Irish Unionists, but by many Protestants. Neil Primrose, M.P., Lord Rosebery's younger son, has been working against the bill and claims to have a large number of members of the House of Commons behind him.

John Redmond, the Irish leader, who returned to London to attend the Bryan dinner, has issued a whip, urging the Irish Catholic members of the House to be present at the session

Despite Mr. Asquith's pledge that the bill merely proposes an alteration n the language of the sovereign's declaration and will not vary materially he conditions of the succession to the throne, there is nevertheless bound to be trouble Tuesday. Not only do average Protestants oppose any alteration in the form of the oath but trouble is expected from the extreme high hurchmen in the Commons and their friends on the Episcopal bench in the House of Lords, who object to any form of declaration which repudiates the doctrine of transsubstantiation. Therefore Mr. Asquith's idea that the bill is not contentious seems to be quaint.

The budget, too, may prove a contentious subject. It is understood that Mr. Lloyd-George, chancellor of exchequer does not intend to lower the increased tax on whiskey imposed last year. This will undoubtedly precipitate heated opposition from Irish members, aided by some of the Scotch members, and if the Unionists and Nationalists vote in favor of a motion reducing the tax the Government would be put into a minority. thereby precipitating a serious political However, the risk of a Tory-Irish combination against the Government on the budget is not serious, but it is possible that this is one of the risks which a Government without a nomogeneous majority must always Nobody believes that Mr. Redmond has got sufficient power to hold up the budget.




