They declared in a statement that since the strike began 1,052 workers have returned to duty, while 340 employees had been brought to Chicago from other points.







TOWN PLANNING NOT CHECK ON NATURAL **GROWTH OF CITIES**

Plates of Additions To In- Expert Explains the General Aspects of the Idea.

PLAN OUTSKIRTS FIRST

And Thus Avoid Greater Expense After Districts Are

The general aspects of town planning were explained by Alfred V. Hall, landscape architect, Toronto, to members of London's town-planning commission, several aldermen and representatives of

several aldermen and representatives of the county council at a meeting in the city hall Saturday night.

Mr. Hall said that town planning was not chiefly concerned with determining the architecture of public buildings, but was something to provide for the needs and growth of the city. It was merely an orderly plan, prepared with foresight, by means of which the city would grow along the lines of least resistance. It implied nothing to check natural growth.

It implied nothing to check natural growth.

Outlying districts should receive first attention, as much money could be saved by proper planning before these districts were built up. Some of the chief divisions of the work were provision for lines of communications; sanitary and storm drainage; parks and open spaces; building restrictions or open spaces; building restrictions or zoning; internal transportation, and public and semi-public buildings.

zoning; internal transportation, and public and semi-public buildings.
Under lines of communication were grouped arterial roads and steam and electrical lines. Air lines might later be included for which air harbors would have to be provided. In the matter of roads the country and city must link up and provide easy means of communication. Efforts could be made to provide that firms using the railroads could be established near them, while residences would be kept away from the localities as they were not suitable for residential purposes.

residential purposes.
Under drainage provision would be made for draining the city along natural courses. New sections would be ancourses. New sections would be an-nexed to the city by watersheds rather than by streets. Areas could be ac-quired and used as parks, and later they would form the route taken by the

drainage system.

Would Save Expense.

The city would be saved the expense of buying high-priced land for this

purpose,
Parks areas should be carefully con-sidered, Mr. Hall said. It should be possidered, Mr. Hall said. It should be pos-sible for every citizen to reach one of these breathing spaces within a few minutes. and the whole system should be linked up by boulevards. By means of it industrial areas would be confined to the part most suitable for them while residential districts would be kept free of factories and other similar buildings. In some cases the height of buildings might also have to be limited, although this problem was not confronting Canadian municipalities to any extent.

Dropping of the Contentious Clauses Will Shorten Up Debates.


NEED THREE WEEKS YET

Drury Government Has Given Up Hope of Finishing in Fortnight.

TORONTO, April 25. - With the dropping by the Government of the chief clause of contention in the new election act, that of naming August 1, 1923, as the date on which the next provincial elections shall be held, and possibly sending proposed important changes in the workmen's compensation act over until the next session, the close of the present session draws appreciably nearer.

The Government has given up hope of finishing up the business in two more weeks, as had been anticipated a short time ago, and it will run at least another three weeks. The most contentious clause in the proposed changes in the compensation act is that relating to increasing the benefits from 55 to 75 per cent. This is so great a change that in view of the fact that the employers have not been given an opportunity to state their views on the matter, and the amount the province would have to pay under the new scale is so large, the decision on the question may be postponed until next year. In the meantime, some minor changes may be made in the act.

The vote on the McCreary resolution asking for a referendum on the liquor importation question, will probably be taken on Tuesday. The budget debate may use up a good deal of time this week, but it is possible that it may peter out suddenly. possibly sending proposed important

Heart-failure following an attack of pneumonia, was the cause. The body will be taken east for interment at Owen Sound, Ont.

The Hon. Mr. Mackay came to Edmonton in 1912 from Ontario, where he was for a time leader of the Liberal Opposition in the Provincial Legislature. He was soon recognized as one of the ablest criminal lawyers in Alberta.

He was elected a member of the legislature for Athabasca in 1913 and entered the Government in 1918 as minister of municipal affairs, to which was later added the department of health. His administration of these departments won him high commendation from political opponents as well as friends, and the progressive health legislation of the last two years will remain as a monument to his administration.

German Protestant Synod Gives Vote of Thanks To Wilhelm.

Berlin, April 26.—A vote of thanks to former Emperor William, as last temporal head of the Protestant State Church, was given at the closing session of the annual general synod. The synod also paid a tribute to the former monarch and his consort for having "in many ways testified to their practical Christian spirit by works of love toward their brethren."

The synod passed a resolution to the effect that the future—path of the church lay in the direction of a state free church embracing all the German peoples. It added that while the church would welcome within its fold adherents of all political parties, it would itself avoid all politics.

Sonora Troops Take Mexican City; Meet With NoResistance

Los Angeles, Cal., April 25.—The city of Guaymas, Sonora, on the Gulf of California, was captured April 12 without a shot being fired by 5,000 Sonora state troops commanded by Gen. Angel Flores, according to Capt. N. K. Jacobson of the Gulf mail steamer Nehaimen, from Torreon to San Francisco, which arrived here today.

SEE CANADA'S TOTAL NEAR NINE MILLION PEOPLE THIS YEAR

Ottawa, April 25.—Officials of the board of census and statistics, while reluctant to make any estimates of Canada's population, are inclined to believe there are eight and three-quarter million people in the country at the present time. They admit, however, that this is merely a calculation, and that the figure may prove to be higher. When the census of the three prairie provinces was taken in 1916, census officials looked for an increase in five years of only 16 per cent, but the increase proved to be 26 per cent. It is pointed out that abnormal conditions in Canada of late years have tended to make population estimates more difficult than usual.

BOYCOTT BRINGS DOWN PRICE OF POTATOES

Hamilton, April 25.—The price of potatoes on the market here dropped on Saturday from \$6.50 to \$5.50, and the women's boycott is said to have caused the drop.



Almost from the beginning the activity of Russian Socialists has been the evil star of the movement In 1864 the first Internationale Socialist body was unded by Karl Marx. The first congress was in Geneva in 1866. Three years later Michael Bakunin. the Russian anarchist, entered the International with his followers. Their entry put an end to the Marx organization. For sixteen years international Socialism had no official organization. In 1889 triennial meetings were revived.

A New Lease of Life. In 1900 the International Socialist Bureau was established at Brussels and the Internationale took a new lease of life. The number of its adherents continually increased. Socialist theories became more popular. Primary among them was that of the solidarity of the working class throughout the world. In 1914 a meeting was to have been held in Vienna. Legien, German Socialist, was secretary of the Internationale. But war prevented the conference. Legien and the majority of German Social ists supported the kaiser. Once again the Inter-

nationale had practically ceased to exist. During the war sporadic attempts were made to evive the Internationale. A conference was called at Stockholm in 1917, but the attempt was illstarred, for the Allied Governments declined to grant passports, and the conference was postponed. Then in 1919 came the Berne conference. It was held at the same time, and in the same city as an international trade conference called to consider some international basis for labor legislation.

The Berne Conference.
The German Socialist conference is of paricular interest, as it marks the great divide between constitutional and evolutionary Socialists, the two main wings of the movement. Ninety-four delegates were Among them were representatives from the Allied countries, from Germany and Austria and the constitutional Socialists of Russia. Russian Bolsheviki declined to recognize the conference. They formed their own international Socialist organization, with headquarters at Moscow They called it the Third Internationale and Lenin was made head of it. Since then the old Internationale has been known as the Second Internationale. The Third Internationale.

Naturally, the Third Internationale has formed the rallying point of revolutionary Socialism. Since its inception a large section of the Italian Socialists have affiliated with it, as have advanced Socialist groups in Great Britain, the United States, Dennark, Bulgaria, Serbia and Rumania, and, of course the German Spartacans. The moderating force in Socialist workingmen's movements is to be found in Great Britain and France. The Independent Socialists in Germany, too have not joined the Third Internationale. For a time the attitude of French Socialists was uncertain. The Strassbourg Congress, recently ended, has made it clear. The fight was extremely bitter. One day the extremists carried their point-affiliation with the Moscow Socialists was voted. Before the end of the congress, however their vote was overthrown on a technicality. By a vote of 3,000 to 1,600 it was decided to take steps to creat a new international organization of Socialists.

An even more bitter conflict followed at the subequent congress at Glasgow of the British Independent Labor Party, which must not be confounded with the main labor party of Great Britain. At the Glasgow conference a resolution in favor of ing a new Internationale was carried by 472 to 206. But those 206 delegates, supporters of the Mosco





Dining-Room.

The man whose wife is ill is also given the privileges of the day nursery for his children. For the first child a charge of 25 cents a day is made with an extra charge of 10 cents for each additional child. The children entered must be free from infection with body clean and clean clothing. They will be served three times daily with nourishing food, and while in the nursery must be entirely under the supervision of the nursery staff. The day nursery will open at 7:30 in the morning, and admissions will be made until 9 o'clock. The nursery will close at 6 p.m.
