London, Sept. 11.-A conference representative of agricultural and commercial interests was held at Glasgow today, with the object of endeavoring to obtain an interview with Lord Onslow, president of the Board of Agriculture, and Mr. Chamberlain during their visit to Scotland in October. 





The Mail also publishes extracts from an emigrant's letter complaining of the treatment received from agents. R. A. Pease writes: "I have no hesitation in confirming the statement that many emigrants from England were stranded at Brandon." Mr. Pease talked with some of them at the time.


