Must Have Canadian Wheat.

The Secretary of the United States Treasury has ruled that Canadian wheat, ground in American mills for export, may enter the United States free of duty. American millers find that a mixture of Canadian hard wheat improves and cheapens their flour, but the duty of 25 cents per bushel has prevented its importation, American flour, however, is losing its reputation in the markets of Europe, and the American millers must have Canadian wheat if they are to hold their export trade. They have given bonds to sell the flour, made in part from Canadian wheat, only in foreign markets, and on this understanding will be allowed a rebate of the duty on the wheat imported from this country. AND WHEREAS, by "The City of Assessment Roll for the time being of the said City;
