St. Petersburg, Jan. 30.—Lt.-Gen. Sakharoff has telegraphed the following report to the general staff, under date of Jan. 28:

"On Jan. 26 the enemy began to concentrate in considerable force near Sandepas, intending to take the offensive against the villages of Sumapu and Paotsao, south of Sandepas, which were occupied by the enemy. During the whole of Jan. 27 an obstinate fight was going on here and after midnight we took Sumapu.

"On Jan. 26 another column, advancing upon Sandepas, occupied in the evening a great part of that fortified village; but, coming upon a strong redoubt with a triple row of artificial obstacles, which had been scarcely damaged by our fire, and which was armed with field artillery and quick-firers, and seeing the impossibility of carrying the redoubt without a preliminary bombardment, our troops left Sandepas, which had been set on fire, it being impossible to remain there without risking defeat.

"On Jan. 27 and 28 Sandepas and its redoubt were hervily bombarded, while our extreme column engaged near Samapu and Paotsao. Details have not been received.
"On Jan. 28 and 27 our cavalry, operating six miles south of Sandepas, attacked and defeated a Japanese company and took 100 prisoners. Altogether the Japanese must have suffered considerable losses."

### JAPS OCCUPY LIUTIAKO.

Twice Entirely Repulsed Superior Force of the Enemy.

Tokio, Jan. 30.—Telegraphic advices received here yestenday from the Japanese Manchurian headquarters, dated the 29th, says:

"Our detachment occupied Liutiako yesterday (Saturday), and was twice counter-attacked by a superior force of the enemy last night. We entirely repulsed the enemy.

"Our other detachment at dawn today (Sunday) attacked the enemy in the neighborhood of Feitssaihotzu, about two miles north of Heikoutai and occupied the position. The enemy fiercely counter-attacked our force, which assailed Heikoutai last night, but was repulsed entirely. To-day our force occupied the neighborhood of Heikoutai.

"The Russians are massing about 65,000 troops on the Japanese left, and bombarding the left flank and centre. Small forces of Russians are attacking all along the line. Right and Centre.

Manchurian headquarters of the Japanese army report that on Sat-urday the Russians occasionally Japanese army report that on Saturday the Russians occasionally tombarded the right and centre armies, following up the bombardment with attacks, which the Japanese immediately repulsed. In the direction of the left wing a Japanese detachment were victors at Chenchiephao and occupied Liutiako and Livchiawopeng on Saturday, the Russians retreating north and west.

The Japanese occupied with infantry positions southeast of Heikoutai on Saturday and are now assaulting the main position. Another detachment dislodged a regiment of infantry, a brigade of cavalry and twelveguns occupying Haerphao five miles south of Heikoutai.

The Russian strength opposing the Japanese left flank is roughly estimated at eight corps, consisting of fourteenth and fifteenth infantry division of the tenth corps, part of the sixty-first infantry division, part of the first Sherian corps and the first and ninth brigades of rifes.

In several cases soldiers fired on looting mobs, and in one case in a working class suburb, they fired a cannon shot, hoping to disperse the crowd. Intentitent firing was proceeding there all day. Hundreds of shops were wrecked and several stores were burned. Probably a few score killed. The ambulances were busy all day. There were alarming rumors from the country districts. It is rumored that the town of Bestlitovsky is burning."

The cannonading indicates that an extended contest is progressing. Sergius is known to be respon Sergius is known to be responsible for the charges placarded by Deputy Chief of Police Roudneff of Moscow, which is causing Foreign Minister Lamsdorff embarrassment, and now it is believed he is about to prevail in the matter of naming as Prince Mirsky's successor in the ministry of the interior, M. Bouligan, formerly Governor-General of Moscow, who, like his pattern is an extreme restreme. like his patron, is an extreme reactionary.

Sergius more than M. Witte is responsible for the elimination from the Imperial manifesto of Minister Mirsky's plan for an elected Zemstovist's Council of the Empire. Against Sergius' influence the ministers at present are apparently powerless. He remains in the little palace inside the strong ramparts of Kremin fortress in Moscow, from whence he despatches daily a courier to Tsarskoe Selo.

## HOW FORESTS GROW COUNTY

THERE ARE TWO GREAT TYPES,

one of the Enryclous Peats of Nature Is the Balanding of Conditions Where Trees of Different Enlite Enter the Struggle For Existence.

The laws which govern the distribu tion of trees produce the two great types, the pure and the mixed forest. The former is the result of local con-

In the North woods the balsam occupies the swamps, usually to the exclusion of all competitors, since no other of the native trees can thrive in wet places. In the Black Hills and ether parts of the middle west the moisture enable it to form pure woods on a soil too dry to support other native trees. The jack pine of the New Jersey barrens and the long leaf pine of the southern states grow in pure or nearly pure stands since they alone can withstand the peculiar conditions

of these regions.

Where climate and soil are favorable to various trees we find the mixed forto various trees we find the mixed for-est, the number of species in mixture depending upon the suitability of the locality to forest growth. Upon the hardwood flats of the Adi-rondacks the hard maple, the yellow

birch and the beech are the only de-ciduous trees able to withstand the severe climate. In the southern Appalachian forests, where the trees of the north and south meet under conditions favorable to both, we find more than 100 different kinds.

The distribution of trees, therefore, is the joint result of local conditions and of the individual and varying requirements of the different species up-on moisture, soil and climate. The laws, however, which govern forest distribution are not identical with those which regulate the behavior of trees in mixture. They do not explain why each species, if undisturbed, maintains the same proportion in the mixed forest. Why does not the hard maple drive out its competitors in the Adirondacks, the oak gain the upper hand in the forests of the southern Appala-chians, the red fir exterminate the western hemlock on the Pacific slope? Wherever a mixed forest occurs

there is an unrelenting struggle going on. Let us see how the combatants are armed and why the representation of each species remains unchanged.

The more important of the characteristics which affect the capacity of a tree to hold its own in mixture with trees of other kinds are its demands upon light, its rate of growth and its power of reproduction. No two species require an equal amount of light, grow

The same region the yellow poplar and the chestnut, both trees which grow rapidly and are capable of enduring considerable shade, are controlled, the one because much of its seed is barren, the other because many of the nuts are eaten by animals. And the red cedar, of slow growth and sparse representation, is aided through the distribution of its seeds by birds, with their power to germinate unimpaired. The aspen, short lived and requiring much light, holds its own with longer lived and shade enduring trees because its downy seed is produced in great quantities and is scattered far and wide by the wind. The ash and the basswood, of rapid growth and bearing an abundance of seed, are withheld by strong demands upon light and by the seed of a fresh and fertile soil. The red fire, equaled by few North American trees in rapidity of growth and otherwise well equipped to gain the upper hand in its region, is controlled through the usual failure of its seed to germinate except when accident has removed the leaf litter and exposed the mineral soil.

The study of trees as living, striving

The study of trees as living, striving organisms in a world of their own leads an almost human interest in the forest. Every day spent in the woods will be the pleasanter for some insight gained into what is going on within it, and an earnest observer can gain knowledge of practical value by an at tempt to discover the factors which control the occurrence of trees in mix ture. Forestry, which deals with the development of the highest utility of forests, means a thorough understanding of the habits of trees.—Overton W Price in Youth's Companion.





Those people of the United States whose interests were adversely affected did not appreciate this sincerest form of flattery by the Canadian Legislature, so they brought pressure to bear on their own Government, which is quick to respond to a popular demand; and the result was that some of these obnoxious laws were repealed, followed by the repeal of the identical law by the Canadian Legislature. The result of it all has been most happy. Many United States newspapers are now showing what a nice country Canada is, and urging the adoption of reciprocal relations with it. However, both the United States and Canada are common-sense countries, and I realize that the precedent cited can have no value in Great Britain."

FEED AND CARE OF FOALS.

Foals should never be neglected at any time of the year, but just at this particular season there is great necessity for being extra good to the youngsters, says Breeder's Gazette. It will soon be time to wean them; and if they have not been getting a ration of grain right along since birth they should be started up at once on crushed oats and bran. What is more, they should have shed protection these chilly nights and some place to shelter themselves when the cold autumn rains are falling. It is no hard trick at all to start a foal to doing badly at this time of the year, and if that is permitted it will be an awkward job to get it back again into the right way of doing before winter sets in in earnest. Therefore those who have foals which have not been fed grain all summer long will do mighty well to start in to feed them now.

They will not take and indeed do not require much at first, but the quantity should be increased gradually day by day until each one is eating enough grain to keep him gaining fiesh and strength. This cannot be done if the foals are subjected to wet and cold. They do not stand exame cold.

done if the foals are subjected to wet and cold. They do not stand ex-

posure well.

The mares also should have the best of care. This is true of all best of care. This is true of all mares nursing foals, but more especially so of those that are not only suckling, but 'again in foal. Such should have grain all summer long, should have grain all summer long, but if they have not been fed and in a year like this of generally good pastures have done fairly well in the way of retaining flesh they should be liberally grained from now on until they foal again, and they should have as good shelter as their young ones. After they are dried off they can do quite a bit of roughing it if it is necessary and if they get plenty of grain, but the less roughing it mares and foals do the better for them and the pockets of their owners. It is easy enough at this time of the season to let a foal by nerof the season to let a foal by neg-lect get into a way of doing badly, from the effects of which he will nev-er really recover.

Universal Pestage Problem

Universal Festage Preblems.

Postal experts of the countries belonging to the Universal Postal Union are now considering the problems which will be brought before the congress called to meet at Rome next April. Two matters of pre-eminent importance will be discussed—the reduction of the five cent rate and the issue of a universal stamp. The two cent rate proposed at the last congress is deemed impracticable, and even a three cent rate is thought to be a radical cut at the present time. In lieu of a reduction of postage the congress may favor an increase of weight of letters from the present limit of half an ounce to three-quarters or possibly to one ounce. The convenience of a universal stamp is generally admitted, but a lack of uniformity in the money standards of the countries in the union stands in the way—at least that is the view of the foreign postal officials. Another matter which will be considered by the Rome congress is the compensation for countries which forward through mails, the "transic countries have comparatively little original foreign mail to cancel, but are called upon to handle the mail of other countries passing through their territory free of compensation. The union originated in a treaty concluded in 1874 between the whole of Europe, Egypt, British India, the colonies of France and the United States. Since that time many other countries and colonies have joined. Each country sends one delegate, and questions are decided by a majority vote.

A Bed May Be a Thing of Beauty Though More Often It Is Not. Beds may come, and beds may go. but sleep goes on forever!

A bed may be a thing of beauty, but more often it is not. Many a house-wife is conscious that her bedsteads are a blot in an otherwise pretty room At night sleep begulles consciousness into oblivion, and the dream ship carries us off to pleasant harbors, remarks a writer in Boston Cooking School Magazine, some of whose clever ideas are here reproduced.

The simpler the framework of the

bed the better, as long as this be con sistent with strength, and nothing cap be daintier or more cleanly than the chaste white iron bedstead with brass knobs. Brass rods fastened at the sides of the bed make a pretty addition. From them hang chintz curtains to within half an inch of the floor. Blue and white chintz is particularly pretty, and a blue and white bedspread carries on the idea. The pillows should be dispensed with during the day, the round belster being much preferred by up to date housewives as making the bed look neater. An effective cover for this bed's bolster is made of old time patchwork style—blue and white patches in square tile design. This cover is drawn in at the ends with blue silken cords. Its chaste simplicity will be its best recommendation.

For a more elaborate bedstead poppy is a pretty fancy where red is chosen to predominate in the room, as the poppy flower is emblematic of sleep. A plain iron bedstead is painted green. Four iron uprights are attached to the four corners, with cross rods fastened at the top for valance curtains. This strangement of rods is a cheap addition to any bed that is not of itself pretty. The valance gives the suggestion of the old time canopy, with none of its hot, shut in disadvantages. The valance curtains are made of white material, with a broad band of red stitched at the bottom. Popples cut from the same red material are couched on the white cloth in clusters with black rope linen. A few heavy stitches of the same black easily make the cen-ter of the poppy. Green strips of cloth serve as stems. Curtains of the same design fall from rods at the side and foot of the bed to the floor. The mak-Cure.

At Brindisi, an attempt was made to pull down the Russian arms from the door of the Consulate. In Rome, notwithstanding a prohibition by the Government and a great display of troops, about 3,000 people assembled and tried to break through the cordon of troops and reach the capitol. There were cries of "Long Live the Russian Revolution!" and "Down With the Autocracy and the Cossacks!" The troops charged. Several people were injured.
