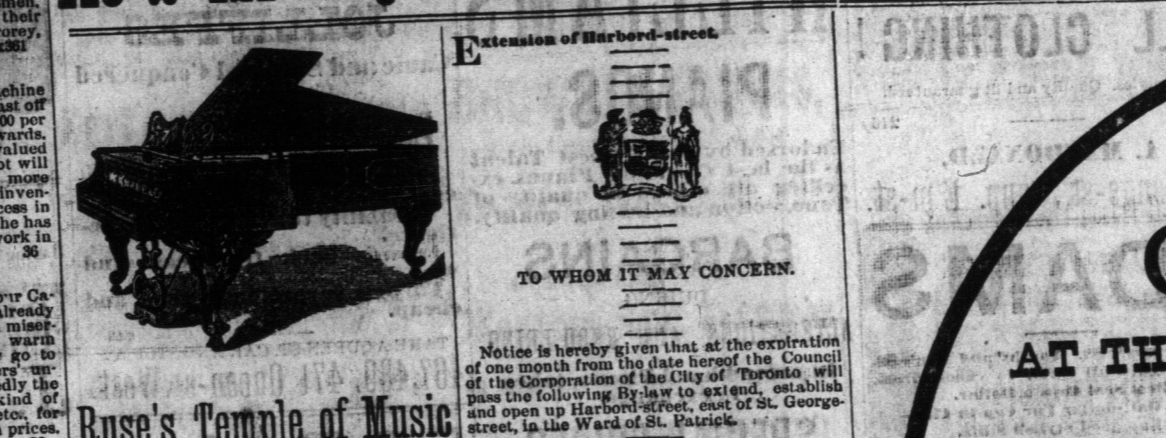

STORY OF AN IRISH JOURNALIST.

The heir to an Estate Working on a Long Island Farm. From the New York World. Working upon a small farm near Bayville, L.I., as a common laborer is a young man who has not only made his mark as a journalist in Europe, but who is the heir to a fine estate in Ireland. The young man, who until a year ago had only a small share of misfortune, but had had plenty of it, is Henry A. Kennedy, a quiet, jovial Irishman with the manners of a bohemian. The events which led to his accepting such a humble position make an interesting story.

While still a boy at school in his native town of Maryboro, Ireland, Kennedy displayed an aptitude for Journalism and acted as correspondent for a newspaper. After studying in Dublin and Edinburgh he entered Kings College, in London, and secured the position of night Editor of the "Standard" for the Dublin Freeman's Journal, which he filled in conjunction with pursuing his collegiate course. After completing his studies he devoted his entire time to newspaper work. Kennedy succeeded so well that in 1852 he was sent as a special correspondent of the Central News Company to the cholera districts of France. His letters were widely read, and on his return to England after two years' service on the Continent he was presented with a costly testimonial in recognition of his effective work. Subsequently he was attached to the home staff of the Freeman's Journal and on one occasion narrowly escaped death while reporting a fashion fight in Derby. He was stabbed while talking notes and received a very ugly wound.

In the meantime the young man's parents had died and his elder brother, John Kennedy, was appointed administrator of the estate. This brother was employed in the War Office as London reporter for the "Irish Times." After his arrival in New York John Kennedy transferred all his rights and title in the estate to his brother Henry, but the paper was declared defective and another document properly drawn up was sent by the family solicitor in Ireland to New York.

This document was never returned, and as nothing further was heard from John, Henry crossed the Atlantic to hunt up his brother. He arrived a short time after the death of his brother had been found in his study in Hudson. The shock of this announcement prostrated the young man and brought on a sickness so prolonged that all his funds had been exhausted and his jewelry and extra clothing sold to pay his doctor's bill. Without friends or money he was forced to go to Ward's Island, where he recovered and was given a pension of \$100 per week. He was then transferred to the dead-house, of which he relates some most revolting cases of disinterment from a Long Island, finally locating in his present place.

LEWIS' CAPSULES AND LABOR.
Pierre Leitch contributes a short but very significant article to the December North American Review, touching the "burning question" of present political economy. He says, for one thing, "I believe in limited political socialism that ceases, rivers, canals, railways, postal and telegraph systems should be owned by the National Government for the use of all, at as low a toll as will provide for their proper maintenance; that is, for the use of labor in both its forms, industrial and capital."

Rights of private property should be respected. A man's earnings, whether by ability, luck or wit, should be his entirely and without restraint during his life. There should be no income-tax, which only offers a premium on fraud, and operates as a penalty on both labor and capital. A legacy tax should be laid, to the extent of say ten per cent, on all fortunes in excess of \$200,000. This legacy tax would not oppress the heir receiving as much property, and should not be regretted by the dead, who was indebted to the nation of the government which enabled him to accumulate his wealth. This legacy tax, leading to distribution through division of estates, could be fairly collected. It would give handsome returns to the State, and a considerable reduction of taxes. It would give the perpetuation of immense fortunes under the same family, and would thus obviate that grave impending danger, the concentration of wealth in single families, which wrecked the Roman Empire.

Mr. Leitch's article shows that, like many other able men—the wealthy, the practical as well as the "dreamers" and "theorists"—he has been earnestly considering the "signs of the times." He closes his paper by a trust that these few words will be of some service to my brother workers, labor and property. I wish to see them work hard and hand for that great end, the improvement and enlightenment of the human family, to wit: to bring our nineteenth century.
