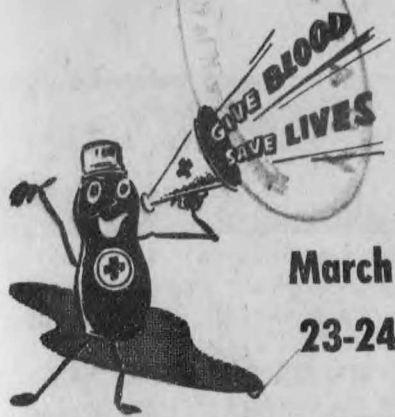

## CBC rejects CAUB

TORONTO — The Canadian Broadcasting Corporation has flatly rejected current proposals for a national university radio program.

The proposals were made at a two-day conference in Hart House at the University of Toronto. Barry Yoell represented UNB at the discussions.

Despite the CBC's rejection, the student broadcasters decided to form their own organization anyway. It is to be called the Canadian Association of University Broadcasters.

CBC representatives termed the project "impractical because of regional loyalties."

E. G. Hallman, a director of the CBC's national network, said that "the contents of any such program must appeal to the public in general and not only to students."

He stated that the government-owned CBC entertained doubts about the quality of material which would be submitted and about the percentage of students who would actually listen to such a program.

At the same time, he left the door open for future negotiations.

CAUB has decided to go to its individual member student councils to get approval for the organization. If it is approved, the association would then concentrate on building up its operations on the local level.

CAUB plans to hold a conference next October at the same time as the annual meeting of the National Conference of Canadian University Students. At that time, it will make another approach to the CBC.

To aid in this scheme, CAUB has elected a slate of officers to hold office until next October's conference. Dave Warren of Memorial University, St. John's, Nfld. was elected president.

Dr. Desmond Pacey stated before the Universal Student's Day of Prayer held last Sunday that he was glad to see a growing religious interest on the campus. Conducting the service was Craig Neylan, Gen.-Sec. of the SCM. The sermon was delivered by Rev. John Farmer of St. Anne's Church.

Members of the UNB Choral Society also took part in the service, organized by the UNB SCM.

# ELECTIONS TOMORROW THREE SEEK PRESIDENT'S POST

With the three candidates for the presidency of the SRC — Richard Alexander, Ted Boswell and Arthur VanWart — stepping up their campaign for tomorrow's SRC elections, *The Brunswickan* conducted separate interviews with each of the candidates.

The candidates were each asked the same three questions, and none of them were informed of the answers that their opponents had given.

The three questions asked and the replies of the candidates follow:

(1) What do you feel is the most important matter with which the SRC will have to deal in the coming year?

Alexander: Mr. Alexander feels that the most important matter facing the SRC is the participation of the student body in the university's fund raising campaign. He also feels that some revisions in the constitution of the SRC are necessary, as he has heard quite a few complaints of the existing constitution.

Boswell: Mr. Boswell gave a similar answer. He said that the most important matter is "working together with the Administration in connection with the building program." He added that the students have already been asked by the Administration to co-operate.

VanWart: Mr. VanWart outlined the three functions of the SRC as being (a) maintaining good relations between students and administration, (b) co-ordinating the activities of the student body, and (c) administering the SRC fees. He declined comment when asked what was the most pressing matter, stating that he felt there were a fair number of things which would have to be dealt with.

(2) What can be done about student apathy in nominating candidates for campus elections?

Alexander: Mr. Alexander feels that people should be encouraged to attend meetings of the SRC. He believes that this can be done if the SRC class representatives keep "on their toes", and inform their friends of the problems of the SRC. Mr. Alexander also feels that the matter of student apathy should be handled in a different way in *The Brunswickan*, stating that some students don't even know the meaning of the word, "apathy".

Boswell: "This is a job which is directly connected with the executives of each of the different classes", said Mr. Boswell. He believes that the executives should "scout around for good candidates". The executives should be more ac-

tive, but, then again, what about apathetic class executives?

VanWart: "The activities of the SRC must be kept before the public," was Mr. VanWart's solution. He believes that this should be done through *The Brunswickan*. He also said, "It is the duty of the President and of the members of the SRC to discuss problems with the people they represent." On important matters, student opinion on the campus should be sounded, so that all the students feel that they are contributing something.

(3) What is your reaction to the recent developments at Acadia when the editor of *The Athenaeum* and one of the staff members were taken to task for an article which appeared in their newspaper?

Alexander: Mr. Alexander believes there must be some limitations on what is published. He feels that the persons involved should have shown some restraint, since they were attending a denominational university. He stated that the article would not have caused such a furore at UNB, as it is a non-denominational institution. Although he hasn't read the article in question, Mr. Alexander believes that if it was in poor taste and proved nothing, there was no reason for publishing it.

Boswell: Mr. Boswell, commenting on the expulsion of the author of the article by the university administration, said: "This type of thing could easily happen at UNB unless student discipline is strongly controlled by the students as it is now". Mr. Boswell also feels that the editors of the newspaper were at fault for printing such an article.

VanWart: Mr. VanWart believes that religious prejudices don't hold such a sway at UNB as at Acadia, and thus feels that this incident would not occur at UNB. He declined to make further comment, saying that this was an Acadian affair, and not directly related to UNB.

## Tories, Grits, C.A. offer

The three parties seeking seats in UNB's third annual Model Parliament have released their platforms. Full texts appear on Page Three.

The parties go before the voters tomorrow. The balloting is being held in conjunction with the SRC election.

Seats will be distributed on the basis of proportional representation. Voting will be by party only, and no individual's name will appear on the ballots.

The parties have the same leaders as they had last year. Dick Steeves heads the Progressive Conservative Club, Joan Proudfoot leads the Liberal Club, and Terry McCluskey is chief of the Christian Atheist Party.

In last year's election, the PCs won 22 seats, but were outnumbered by an opposition of 12 Liberals and 11 Christian Atheists. The Tories formed a minority government, but were overthrown when the Liberals and CAs coalesced late in the session.

Tomorrow is election day!

Over 1,500 students will vote for candidates offering for nine positions. Every registered student is permitted to cast his ballot, from freshman to postgrad. However, Seniors are asked to take note that they may vote only for the SRC Executive (President of the SRC, Treasurer of the SRC, and President of the AAA).

(The manifestos of the three candidates for President of the SRC and of the two candidates for Treasurer appear on Page 3).

Elections for representation in the annual Model Parliament will be held concurrently.

The Juniors, Sophomores and the Freshmen may vote for the SRC Executive and their respective class representatives and executives at the following polls

Arts Building: All Arts, Bus. Ad., Phys. Ed., and Science students with the exception of the Freshman. Civil Engineering Building: All Engineers with the exception of the Freshman.

Chemistry Building: All Freshman Engineers.

Forestry Building: All Foresters and Geologists (2nd-5th year), and all Freshman with the exception of the Engineers.

These polls will be open from 9.15-12.30, and 1.45-4.30.

Voters are asked to read the bottom line of the ballots very carefully to see whether to mark the ballot with an X or with numbers. Preferential voting, that is marking the ballots with numbers to indicate the voters preference where election of the President of the SRC and Class Representatives are involved, is used in this election. In voting for the President of the AAA, Treasurer of the SRC, and the Vice-President, and the Secretary-Treasurer of the Sophomore Executive, an X is to be used.

The ballots will be counted immediately after the polls close by the returning officers, Earl Carpenter and Dave Irvine and appointed clerks, in the presence of the President of the SRC, Ron Manzer. Any candidate who wishes to do so may have a scrutineer present at the counting of the ballots, and any candidate may call for a recount within 48 hours after the count has been made. Results of the election will be announced officially on Friday.

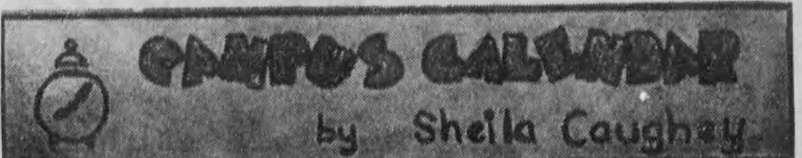
## Never Say Die

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## Presidential Race

### Candidates Issue Manifestos

Election manifestos for the three candidates for the SRC presidency have been released to *The Brunswickan* by the campaign committees.

The three candidates are: Richard Alexander, 23, third year arts, from East Riverside, N.B. Ted Boswell, 22, fourth year forestry, from Brantford, Ont. Arthur VanWart, 20, third year arts, from Fredericton.

#### Richard Alexander

Anneke Deichmann, second year arts, member of the campaign committee, issued the following statement on behalf of the candidate: "A voice for all is what Richard Alexander offers to UNB students if they vote him in as SRC president. He justly prides himself in not belonging to any particular clique or having the interests of any one group ahead of any other. He is outspoken and fond of creative discussion which is apparent from the fact that three of his courses this year are in philosophy. His other academic activities include creative writing.

"Dick is 23, and a native New-Brunswicker. He graduated from Rothesay Collegiate School, and before he came to college, served in the Canadian army and worked in a bank. Those who know Dick feel that he will bring a fresh, uninfluenced attitude to the SRC, and will manage its affairs with efficiency and effectiveness. "If this is what you want—then vote Alexander tomorrow."

#### Ted Boswell

Ian Collins, fourth year arts, co-chairman of the campaign committee, issued the following statement on behalf of Mr. Boswell: "Every few years a man possessing exceptional qualifications is nominated for the job of SRC President. A man taught by exper-

ience—broad in outlook—and enthusiastic by nature. This year we have a case in point. The man is Ted Boswell.

"He can stand on fact to support his campaign. He can choose from a long list of organizations with which he has been connected, for recommendations as to his qualifications. Not just one or two groups, but many, many organizations. Furthermore these are campus organizations — organizations with which we are all familiar—not groups that he belonged to prior to his entrance to UNB.

"Possibly one of his most important duties on campus has been the office of SRC Vice-President. After two years of previous SRC experience he was considered fully capable of fulfilling his obligations in the office. This he did—expertly—smoothly—persistently. Because of this Council experience Ted Boswell knows better than any other nominee how the SRC operates. "This is not the only responsible position that Ted has held during his four years of study in the Forestry faculty. He has been on the Forestry Association Executive for two years. He has been in Model Parliament and the Red and Black, and also on the committee that initiated Winter Carnival four years ago.

"One other factor that assumes great importance is that Ted has been a member of both the Athletic Board and the Athletic Association. He is well acquainted with the operation of these organizations. A keen participation in athletics or a knowledge of the workings of these associations are essentials in the list of qualifications for President.

"Can anyone match Ted Boswell's qualifications in terms of experience, enthusiasm or success? He has proven without a doubt that he is capable of doing any job that he attempts—and capable of doing it

to perfection.

"In this article no attempt has been made to falsify or distort. These are no slyly phrased innuendos. These are facts. Students as a rule respect an honest presentation of the facts. We respectfully ask that you support Ted Boswell for SRC President."

#### Arthur VanWart

Bill Stanley, second year electrical engineering, member of the campaign committee, released the following comment to *The Brunswickan* on behalf of Mr. VanWart: "During his three years at UNB, Arthur VanWart has taken part in a wide variety of campus activities.

"In the athletic field, Arthur played junior varsity basketball and participated in the intramural hockey, basketball and softball leagues. Non-athletically, he was one of the original members of the UNB Chess Club, worked on the program committee of the Arts Society, and acted both years in the Winter Carnival musical comedy. He is also president of the Pre-Med Club and was an SRC representative for a year.

"Besides this, taking pre-med in arts has enabled him to enjoy a broad study course. We feel this has given Art the opportunity to meet a wide variety of people and has given him a good understanding of the average student.

"For the past five summers Arthur has held responsible leadership positions with the YMCA in Halifax, Fredericton and Toronto. He feels that this will be an asset in shouldering the responsibilities of the SRC presidency because, as he puts it: "There is no responsibility greater than human life. On the campus last fall, Art took the responsibility of getting 500 people to give blood.

"The sincerity and seriousness which Arthur showed during these activities has prompted us to back him in his campaign for President of the SRC.

"We feel that with his year of experience on the SRC, his leadership ability, his drive, his sincerity, and his maturity, that he is the best man for the job."

## Model Parliament Set March 6-7

### Three Campus Parties Seek Students' Support

The composition of this year's Model Parliament will be decided tomorrow. Balloting will take place in connection with the annual SRC election. The Parliament is set for March 6-7.

The parties are campaigning on the basis of platforms announced last week. The platforms are printed below, with the parties listed in order of the number of seats held in last year's Parliament.

#### Progressive Conservatives

The platform of the Progressive Conservative Club was released by Dick Steeves, the party leader. It follows:

The Progressive Conservative Club favors:

1. That the Federal Government purchase the Avro Arrow to equip all NATO and home squadrons of the Royal Canadian Air Force.
2. Prizes to be offered to engineers and architects for designs to be kept on a moving shelf of public works projects.
3. A grant to support financially Canadian athletic teams and individuals chosen to represent Canada in international amateur competitions, to be completely administered by the Canadian Olympic Association.
4. A grant to the Canada Council, the interest on which would afford undergraduate scholarships to be administered by the various universities along the lines of the present post-graduate scholarships.
5. Compulsory sex education.
6. The raising of the basic income tax exemption for university students to \$2,000.
7. (The clause that refreshes) The recognition of Chesterfield Rugby as the national sport of Canada.

#### Liberals

Joan Proudfoot, party leader, announced the platform of the Liberal Club. Here is the text:

- UNB Liberal Club advocates:
1. Employment: We advocate that a division of the National Employment Service be set up to provide summer employment for every university student in Canada.
  2. National Defence: We advocate (a) that Canada's nine RCAF fighter squadrons be equipped with the Avro Arrow CF-105. (b) that the Canadian Army be supplied with transport aircraft for the swift deployment of troops in the event of international crises. (c) that the Royal Canadian Navy be provided with atomic anti-sub submarines.
  3. Education: We advocate that free tuition shall be granted to deserving university students.

#### Christian Atheists

The platform of the Christian Atheists was released by Terry McCluskey, the party leader. The

1. MARITIME RELIEF: Maritime producers should be compensated for all their products which are not consumed by Maritimers. The people affected would primarily be fishermen, but would also include farmers, coal miners, student journalists, and others.

2. CBM: The Canadian Board of Mating, by co-operation with the CBC, CNR, Bank of Canada, and other national organizations, will offer valuable government assistance to the mating of potential wives who cannot find males. This Board is needed because each year more females are born and fewer die in relation to males, thus creating a surplus of potential "Mothers of Canada".

3. REDUCTION OF ARMED FORCES: We, the Christian Atheist Party, propose to introduce legislation aimed to drastically restrict and reduce the number of the male citizens enrolled in the armed services of the country, said legislation being in harmony with our platform of encouraging peaceful relations among the countries of the world.

4. NEW CANADIAN FLAG: We feel that to have a truly unified country we need a distinctively Canadian Flag. We are not anti-British or anti-Commonwealth, but Pro-Canadian and Pro-Commonwealth.

5. A COMMON LANGUAGE—IROQUOIS: As a basis for an all-Canadian linguistic exchange in the House of Commons and to eliminate the confusion of bilingualism, a return to Canada's first diplomatic tongue is advocated. All MPs would be required to learn the Iroquois language no later than the next session of the House.

## Treasurer's Job Sought By Two

Two sophomore business administration students are competing tomorrow for the post of SRC treasurer. They are:
