THE DINGLEY BILL PASSED

Sent to the Senate By a Vote of 205 to 122.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 31 .- Tomorrow morning the duties imposed by the Dingley bill will be enforced and the present law will cease to operate, provided the last amendment attached to the bill before its passage in the house today fixing April 1 to be the day on which its provisions shall go into effect be in the bill when it is finally enacted. The vote on the final passage of the bill stood, ayes, 205; nays, 122; present and

Section 27. "Yes," said Mr. McArthur, "I believe such a concentrator not only desirable, but necessary. The various concentrators built by individual companies have not proved as effic-ient as was expected for the lack of a steady and water supply. As the country is deago. sufficient water supply. As the country is de-nuded of its timber covering, not only will the snow fall be largely diminished from year to year, but what there is, being unprotected, will melt at an earlier period and much more rapidly, so that the water supply will not last so long as it does at a constant.
