IBy Special Wire to the Courier] LONDON, Nov. 3 .- Another ye-wtiness account from the battle front in France and Belgium, written as previously by Col. E. D. Swinton, of the intelligence department of the British general staff, was given out to-day by the official press bureau. It, bears the date of October 26, and is as follows:

"October 24, 1914." Before the narrative of the progress of the fighting near the Franco-Belgian frontier, subsequent to October 20 is continued a brief description will be given of the movement of a certain fraction of our troops from the former line facing north and east of Paris to the present position facing east in the northwest corner of France.



LONDON, Nov. 3—Telegraphing fram Calais, a correspondent of The Daily Mail says:

"The British wedge, which the Crown Prince Ruppirecht of Ba-varia and Grand Duke Albrecht of Wurttemburg, tried to crack between them, still puts forward a veritable vayonet thrust at the heart of the German line at Ypres and has finally wrecked the raid on Calais.

Bombardment by a British Cruiser of Troops Made Up of Turks and Germans Who Were Preparing to It vade Egypt.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—1.10 p.m.—Great Britain and Turkey are at war; Germany has recruited an ally in the east. After twenty-four hours of uncertainty, during which hope was expressed that the Porte might make amends for the incidents in the Black Sea, the British Admiralty announced shortly before 1 o'clock this afternoon that a British warship had bombarded and destroyed the Turkish barracks at Akabah, on the Turco-Egyptian frontier.

It was at Akabah that Turkish cavalry patrols were reported yesterday preparatory to moving into Egypt. There the British found soldiers apparently under Germans serving as quasi-Turks, much in the same manner as the German officers remain in charge of the cruisers Breslau and Goeben, and British officials say, there was no course but to open hostilities.

LONDON, Nov. 3.—Russia has replied to Turkey's apology for the raids of her navy in the Black Sea with the fateful words "too late," and in London it is hardly thought likely that diplomatic pressure will prevent the war party among the Young Turks from dragging their country into the European embroglio. The events of the past twelve hours show that the grand vizier of Turkey has made every effort to concilate the entente powers, but the influence of his partizans in the Turkish cabinet is not believed to be great enough to force the porte to meet the demands for reparation formulated in the Franco-Brtish notes. 



[By Special Wire to the Courier] PARIS, Nov. 3.-The French official announcement given out this afternoon, says the Germans would appear to have completely abandoned the left bank of Yser below Dixmuden, and that troops of the allies have re-occupied points on the river without great

The text of the communication follows:

"On our left wind, the enemy seems to have completely abandoned the right bank of the Yser down stream from Dixmude and reconnaissances by troops of the allies undertaken on the highways in the inundated regions were successful in re-occupying points of passage across the river without great difficulty.

"To the south of Dixmude and in the direction of Gheluvlt our advance was particularly percep-

Instant Dismissal of Germans Only Can Avert Serious Trouble.

LONDON, Nov. 3, 4.23 a.m. -A Reuter despatch from Petrograd sas

"In reply to a telegram from the Turkish grand vizier expressing regret at the rupture of the good relations existing between Turkey and Russia, "owing to an attack by the Russian fleet," Sergius Sazonoff, the Russian minister of foreign affairs, denied that the Russian fleet was the first to fire and said he feared it was too late to enter into pour parlers of any kind with Turkey."

The telegram from the grand vizier was read to Foreign Minister Sazonoff by the Turkish charge d'affaires. It said;

"Convey to Sazonoff our deep."

"Convey to Sazonoff our deep regret at the rupture of the good relations between the two powers which has been caused by the hostile acts of the Russian fleet. You can assure the Imperial Russian government that the sublime Porte will not fail to seek an opportune solution to this question.

a repetition of such incidents.

"You can declare to Sazonoff
that the Ottoman Government
has decided to forbid the Turkish fleet entering the Black Sea.
