Mr. Lamb's New Store Completed and Occupied.

Mr. McClary's Dispensary. We question if any village of its size in Eastern Ontario has made more substantial progress during the past year than Farmersville.

Mr. McClary's Dispensary. The number of new buildings that have been erected, as well as the large number renovated and repaired, bears evidence to the fact that the village is making rapid strides in material and financial prosperity.

Mr. McClary's Dispensary. The fine new Parish block and the extensive additions to the Montreal House, reference to which has already been made in these columns, demonstrate the pluck and ability of our business men to put up structures fully equal to the requirements of their business, and which add to the architectural appearance of their surrounding. For years the old wooden buildings on the site now occupied by the Central Block, were an eyesore to the appearance of Main St.

Mr. McClary's Dispensary. The building was a marvel of the workmanship and adaptability to the wants of the extensive business carried on by him. The drug store is plastered on the sides, while the ceiling is inlaid with beautifully grained woods, each alternate piece being natural ash and elm, the latter stained to represent walnut. Each piece is cut in length, and all are to be finished in the same way.

Mr. McClary's Dispensary. The circles are finished in the form of a star. Along each side of the store are arranged the shelves and drawers, splashed above each side is a row of medicine bottles, each filled with cosmetics, perfumes, fancy goods, &c. A full set of shelf bottles has been ordered and will be in place in a few days. At the lower end of the room a desk stands a large plate glass mirror 4x6 feet. At the left hand corner in the rear is the private office, which is being nicely fitted up, while on the opposite corner is a store room where the heavier articles in daily demand are kept. Immediately in rear of this is the general store room, 18x30. A flight of steps leads to another store room above, which is a store for the necessities with the general work room, where the various proprietary medicines manufactured by Mr. Lamb are put up. Here, from boxes and bottles neatly arranged, is to be seen another flight of steps leading to a number of hands busily engaged in putting up Mr. Lamb's Lubricating Lubricants, Cough Syrup, and other goods.

Mr. McClary's Dispensary. The demand for these medicines has become so great during the past year that the time of the entire staff is at times fully occupied in preparing and packing these house hold remedies for shipment. Passing on into the front of the second story we found a neat and nicely arranged dental office, and waiting room. These rooms communicate with a hall in the centre of the building and are reached by stairs, leading up from Main Street. Mr. Lamb has worked up for himself a splendid business in the dentistry line, having as an assistant Mr. Sherwin Yates, whose reputation as a manipulator of the "cold steel" is said to rival that of the "Boss" himself. Well do we remember our first experience in Lamb's dental office. It was some eighteen years ago that after wrestling with a jaw breaking tooth ache, we got our courage up to a fighting point and started for Farmersville, to have the cantankerous molar extracted. The office in town we found the dental office in the little shop now used as a shoe shop by Wm. Langstaff. The proprietor was down at Chateaufort, either to wait, or submit to having the operation performed by an amateur. Deciding on the latter course, we were in the centre of an old box in a room slightly above the street, and were rudely shoved down upon an old box in the corner of the room, and our head placed upon the knees of the operator. One, two and three "yanks" were given before the least sign of a smile was felt, and then it consisted of a smothered up mass of bone and a split piece in about five minutes, and during the process will be cooled to the temperature of the surrounding air and will be perfectly sorted.

question a solution of the vexed question of the thorough aeration of milk for factory purposes, and those who are interested in the production of good cheese cannot do better than to urge the adoption of the aerator. A NEW KIND OF FUEL. An invention has been patented by a Scotchman named Aikman, of Montreal, for making fuel out of peat. By the process the peat is thrown into an apparatus somewhat similar to a brick machine, where it is ground into a fine pulp. It is then passed over a number of hot rollers and when nearly dry it is put into moulds and pressed into blocks about twelve inches long and three or four thick. When it leaves the press it is perfectly dry and as hard as coal. Several attempts have been made to utilize the extensive peat bogs to be found in nearly every part of this country for fuel. All experiments have hitherto proved a failure, one reason being that the peat was so great, (some 12 or 15 times the bulk of coal.) By the new method a given bulk of peat weighs fully one third less than the same bulk of coal. Other experiments left the peat liable to break to pieces, and besides this it was a constant annoyance on account of the dust and dirt it created. Mr. Aikman claims that a peat brick made by his process can be carried in a lady's handkerchief without soiling it; and the fuel can be pressed so hard that they can be handled like ordinary stove wood. There is very little smoke from this prepared peat and no fear of burning stoves or chimneys. As the supply is practically unlimited, and may be found in nearly every township in Ontario, the cost of hauling would be light, and as the machinery is not very expensive it is said that it can be prepared ready for the market for less than \$3 per ton. A reporter on a Montreal paper, who was present when one of the machines was tried, tells us in a little more than half an hour he had the pleasure of eating a meal of ham and eggs cooked by what had formed part of a peat bog a short time before.

It is to be hoped that some enterprising person, or company, will look this matter over carefully, and, if the invention is all that it is claimed to be, take time by the forelock, and open up a business that would be a blessing to all in the furnishing of a good and cheap fuel, and in the giving of employment to a number of workmen. The supply of peat at our quantity can be got on the farms of Coleman and Geo. Witse, on the shores of Wiltse lake.

THE BROCKVILLE AND WESTPORT. The matter of the payment of the bonuses to the B. W. and S. S. M. railway company, by the townships through which the road passes, appears at last to be satisfactorily settled. The townships of Crosby, Leeds and Lansdowne, and the Town of Young and Escott each hand over to the trustees debentures to the amount of two-thirds of the bonuses granted. The townships of Bastard and Burgess hand over one half the amount granted. On behalf of the company it is guaranteed that all the indebtedness contracted since the 1st of Sept., 1887, shall be paid at once. The Town of Young and Escott and Bastard and Burgess deposit each a portion of their bonds in the Bank of Montreal, which for the present retains control of the same as a guarantee for the payment of the above arrangement, the bonds to be released to the company as soon as the claims are paid. The remaining portion of the debentures as soon as the road is fully completed and trains running. This settlement will aid in bringing the railway running, and the train, the only running of the railway, and will be of advantage to all parties concerned.—Recorder.

HOW TO MAKE TWO EQUAL ONE. This problem was solved by the Rev. Mr. Conder, of Brockville, at the residence of Mr. E. T. THOMPSON'S PATENT MILK AERATOR.

The net here presented represents an invention by Mr. Alex. Thompson, of Chateaufort, which is designed to perform the operation of aerating and cooling milk automatically. The up section of the device holds a pail percolating with milk, and the section immediately below all impurities are kept back by a straining gauze. From the strainer the milk is distributed over a circular tin plate, inclined upwards towards the circumference, from whence it drops through a multitude of very fine holes. The lower section fits upon the top of a simple device for raising or lowering the upper part of the apparatus, to provide for a greater or lesser fall of the milk into the can. A diverging flange prevents any waste of milk, and unless there is a strong wind the apparatus can be raised to its utmost limit, thus securing the maximum of fall and the most perfect aeration. A pail of milk will pass through the device in about five minutes, and during the process will be cooled to the temperature of the surrounding air and will be perfectly sorted.



The Rev. Jas. Pallar will deliver the concluding lecture on "Scenes in the Garden of Eden," in St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, next Sabbath evening, at seven o'clock. Subject: "The Expulsion from the Garden—Paradise Lost—A Bright Light in the Cloud—the Cherubim and Flaming Sword."

The discussion on the North Church Falls is causing great interest in fact, connecting with it. The spire was raised on October 6th, 1866, the one hundredth anniversary of the day when Barbara H. Beck and her associates held their first Methodist meeting in New York city. The spire might have very appropriately been called a centenary spire.
