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

FLAGS OF HEALTH

AN INTERESTING INQUIRY INTO THE CAUSES OF THE BLUSH.

The Permanent and the Occasional Blush - The Blush May Become a Condition - But It's Better to Do Without the Red Color Than to Use Rubefacients.

There is in the cheeks of many people a rosy color which is ever present, and the cheeks thus flushed by nature are spoken of as bearing the "flag of health."

Temporary rubescence of the cheeks is due to the action of the vessels of the face, which are under the control of the nervous system.

So, also, there is an ever-present color in some cheeks which is more of a purple than a red, and which we seldom see without a subsequent feeling of uneasiness.

Like the roses in the lily's bed, blushing indicates a momentary congestion of the capillaries, which are excited by an instant by nervous excitement, then contract again, and by this contraction the blood is driven back into the vessels.

The rising blush which the cheek ever assumes is a sign of the lily's bed.



He had been out in the woods hunting during the afternoon, using a double-barrelled muzzle-loading shotgun, and was returning home when he was overtaken by a neighbor named DeWolfe, who was driving a double-barrelled mule, and who was a careful boy for his age, when told to get the gun between them, declined to do so, but placed it in the rear of the wagon, the muzzle pointing outwards, remarking as he did so that if it went off it would hurt no one. He does not seem to have noticed, however, that the reason when placed in the rig rested partly on a bag partially filled with shot. When the spot was reached where the young hunter got out he went to the rear of the wagon and grasped the gun, not forgetting to hold the muzzle of the gun. He failed to notice, however, that his right arm was not so placed. The hammer caught in the bag and the weapon was discharged, the whole charge taking effect in the unfortunate boy's right arm, entering it diagonally.

Though only 14 years of age, the young hunter proved that he was made of good stuff. He entered the rig alone, and the flesh from his broken arm hanging in shreds was driven about 3/4 miles to Lym, where his wounds were dressed by Dr. Judson. He was then brought to the General Hospital where a careful examination showed that amputation would be necessary. This operation was successfully accomplished by Dr. Cornell, assisted by Drs. Judson and Bowie, the arm being taken off at the elbow. To-day the young patient is resting nicely and his life will no doubt be saved.—Recorder.
