A New Year Problem.

One of the problems the Canadian
people have to face in the new year is
the increased and increasing cost of
living. They have been discussing
the question in Winnipeg, and the
Tribune says that two definite
proposals have been made: (1) that the
city should go directly into the busi-
ness of supplying necessities of life to
the public, and (2) that co-operative
stores should be established. These
are radical proposals, but one of the
controllers of the city is among those
who have suggested that if the cost of
living continued to advance the city
would be forced to enter into the busi-
ness of selling directly to the people
some of the principal necessities of
life. This controller has received a
letter which the Tribune publishes, and
it is certainly an interesting com-
munication. The writer says he has
lived about two years in Winnipeg,
coming there from England, and he
cannot help being struck with the
great difference in Winnipeg prices as
compared with those obtained in the
old land, after making a sub-
stantial allowance for conditions.
Let us note what this man says to
substantiate his statement about the
difference in prices. He writes:

"For instance, bread of guaranteed
quality is sold in England at from 7
cents to 8 cents per loaf of 5 pounds,
while prices ruling here for a quality
in every way inferior range from 5 to
7 cents per 1 1/4 pound loaf (it you
get the right weight). All bread in
England has to be weighed on deliv-
ery, and the bread cost has to carry
as part of its equipment, a pair of
guaranteed government stamped
scales, no spring balances being al-
lowed. I see from this morning's pa-
per that eggs are sold in Philadel-
phia at 33 cents a dozen. Last week I
paid 25 cents a dozen for eggs in
Winnipeg 50 cents a dozen. Why is
this? What is grown in Canada at
our outskirts. It is collected, trans-
ported to port, sent across the ocean,
stored in Liverpool, Cardiff or Lon-
don, freighted to the mills, where it
is made into flour, which is sold to
the baker, and the latter sells the fin-
ished product at less than half the
cost here. Who gets the profit? Not
the producer, and from what I can
learn, not the retailer. Who, then,
combines? It is time this was al-
tered, and I think it is time that either
a co-operative society is formed, or
that the authorities take the matter
up. I quite appreciate the difficulties

connected with the proposed
scheme, but I think it is worth
considering.

Monday Pudding.

Cut bits of entire wheat bread into
dice. Use a half cup of any fruit
that may have been left over, prunes,
raisins, chopped dates or canned
fruit. Grease an ordinary mold; put in
a layer of fruit, etc., until you have
the mould filled. Beat three eggs,
without separating, with four table-
spoons sugar; add one pint of milk;
pour over the bread; let stand for ten
minutes, then put the lid on mold
and steam or boil continuously for
one hour. Serve with lemon or or-
ange sauce.

**Shipbuilding in Great
Britain.**

The British and Irish shipbuilding
yards are enjoying an unworked run
of prosperity. At present there are
520 vessels, aggregating 2,366,372
tons, under construction, which rep-
resents an increase of 22 per cent.
over the tonnage of vessels being
built last year. The ship yards can-
not obtain sufficient men, and they
are frequently working over time and
using double shifts. In spite of this
activity new orders are being taken
rather than the ships are being com-
pleted. Though American operations
are on a much smaller scale, it is
gratifying to know that our yards are
also full of work.—Scientific Ameri-
can.

The Civic Elections.

Although the time is fast approaching when the citizens of Wolfville will again be called upon to fill the ranks of the Council Board very little is heard as to what action will be taken. This would indicate that citizens are well satisfied with the doings of our civic rulers during the past year, and lead to the assumption that if possible the retiring Councilors will be re-installed in office. In the case of Mayor Chambers it goes without saying that he will be asked to again allow himself to be elected for another year. It is a sort of unwritten law in Wolfville that the mayor shall at least serve for two terms. It is only fair to the town as well as to the mayor that this rule should obtain. One year is not sufficient to allow a man to show his ability as a civic administrator and the town is always the gainer because of the added experience in the second year. The three retiring councilors this year are Messrs. Hales, Sleep and Bishop. Mr. Bishop has served for one year, having been elected to fill the vacancy caused by the retirement of Mr. Chambers. He has been a good man in the Council and citizens, we feel sure, will be inclined to give him another term at least. Coun. Sleep has proved a valuable man and has done splendid work in his department of water. He will be still more useful in the coming term and will no doubt be asked to continue in office. No man has done better service for the town than Coun. Hales. For eight years he has sat at the Council Board and apparently given as much of his time to the town as to his private business. To him is due largely the fine system of streets that has been begun and citizens, we are sure, will ask him to go on and finish the work. He has a splendid grasp of the financial condition of the town. The ACADIAN believes that we cannot do better than to prevail upon our men to continue in charge of our civic affairs.

Editorial Notes.

One of the most important advances made by our town last year was the erection of a new D. A. S. station. The new building is a very great improvement both in the matter of convenience and comfort and is much appreciated by our citizens and travellers generally. Two things that are still needed in connection with the station—aside from the seating which has not yet been installed—are a properly kept bulletin of the arrival and departure of trains and a drop-letter box. Both these would be gladly welcomed by our people, and the mere calling attention to their need should be sufficient to cause them to be provided. For a long time there has been an agitation for the letter-box and now that the station is completed we feel sure that our energetic young representative at Ottawa will see that the matter is not longer delayed.

The passenger department of the Dominion Atlantic Railway is now receiving notice from persons who desire to take summer boarders in their private homes. This information is to be included in the 1913 edition of 'Summer Homes in Nova Scotia,' now in course of preparation and which will go to press at an early date. Applications for forms to be filled out may be addressed to Mr. R. U. Parker, General Passenger Agent, at Kentville. The publication of this book has in the past been the means of bringing thousands of tourists to this province, and it is doing a splendid work in calling the attention of those planning summer trips to the attractions of the 'Land of Evangeline.'

THE ACADIAN, as is the case with all newspapers, sometimes comes in for criticism because of slight inaccuracies in the matter of details in news items. Our news department makes every effort to give as little cause for complaint along this line as possible, but in spite of the utmost care, not being infallible, we sometimes err. An effective way to prevent the possibility of this is for the parties immediately interested in any event in which the public may be interested to communicate the facts to the paper at the earliest opportunity possible. We want to give all the news and a nearly correct as may be possible.

The Canadian North-west is becoming one of our best markets for gravestones. To heavy orders for this market the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' Association has secured Mr. C. W. Baxter, Chief Fruit Inspector for the Prairie Provinces, to address them on 'Nova Scotia Fruit in Western Markets,' at their annual meeting at Middleton.

Mr. John Buchanan, of Berwick, raised a crop of four hundred barrels of prunes last season, that packed eighty per cent. No. 1. He will tell how he did it in his address on 'Commercial Pruning' before the Nova Scotia Fruit Growers' Association at their annual meeting at Middleton on Jan. 25.

Dr. Robert Matheson, Entomologist, Agricultural College, Truro, will address the Fruit Growers at Middleton on 'The Saw Fly Beetle Situation in Nova Scotia.' Without vigorous measures taken, this subject will be of even more importance later. Better have Dr. Matheson and learn all you can about it.

What Prohibition Does.

People engaged in the nefarious business of liquor selling and friends of the liquor interest tell us that prohibition does not prohibit. Many people not in the business, nor yet friends of this evil, have also come to believe this as being a fact. It is a case of constant dripping wearing away a stone. The most ardent advocate of prohibition does not claim that the evil is entirely eliminated by a prohibitory law, but they do claim and it has been proved that a prohibitory liquor law, honestly administered, is just as effective as any other criminal law.

A glance at the condition of affairs in Kansas shows what prohibition can do. The attorney-general of Kansas does not claim that prohibition is the cause of all the prosperity manifested that he does claim that prohibition has been largely influential in bringing about a state of prosperity. Under prohibition cities have sprung up out of frontier villages. Almost one third of all the population of Kansas is enrolled in the public schools and out of more than eight hundred newspapers and magazines less than twelve carry liquor advertisements. In one hundred and thirty-five counties of the state, eight-sevenths of them have no insane, fifty-four have no feeble minded, and ninety-six have no inebriates. There is only one pauper in every three thousand of the population.

In twenty five years, in one of the counties, only one grand jury has been called. Last July fifty-three county jails were empty. Sixty-five counties have no prisoners serving sentence.

In 1889, just prior to the passing of the prohibitory law, the deposits in the savings bank were \$30,000,000. To-day they amount to \$200,000,000. Just before 1889 the death rate in Kansas was the same as that in Michigan, Wisconsin and Iowa, or seven teen to the thousand. At the end of thirty years the death rate in Kansas has decreased to seven and one half per thousand, while in the other mentioned states the rate increased.

One Man's Opinion.

I have just read in a Halifax paper some notes on the work of the United Fruit Co., Limited, of Berwick, N. S. The fact that their representative has made arrangements with twenty-eight different firms in England to handle their fruit is a very interesting thing. For the sake of argument, we will take Sheffield. Perhaps he will give a man there 300 barrels to sell. The competition is then taken out of the room in Liverpool for this man's requirements and it is probable that as they are on commission he will get them out to his neighbors at the best possible price. So you will see that in twenty-eight different towns this takes the competitive bids of twenty-eight men after stuff out of the room. The consequence will be—and is—that the midland towns have very often more apples than they ought to have. Prices suffer in consequence and there is no competition in the sale room.

Australians and Tasmanians have found this out 2 years ago when they tried the same thing. They now confine their shipments to Liverpool and London and give part of their consignment to the most of the regular well known and recognized firms. When I was in London last June their representative told me that from practical experience they had found this by far the best method of distributing their fruit. Some of them even go so far as to say that they found selling to people in the midlands and outside ports tended to lower the general results of the sale room.

If Tasmania and Australia, two of the greatest socialistic countries in the world, have found this out, I wonder when the very enlightened Nova Scotians will come to the same conclusion.

[The above is an extract from the letter of an occasional correspondent who was over in England last year. As for some years he has made a close study during repeated visits and is largely interested as a shipper, and sometimes as a receiver of his own apples in England, his opinion should be of value and we commend it to the attention of those apple growers who are interested in the co-operative movement, on which we may have something more to say at no distant date.]
