EMIGRATION FROM LIVERPOOL .- The returns prepared by the Government emigra-tion officers at Liverpool show that during the month of August 9,495 persons left the Mersey as emigrants, the largest number in any month this year, except May, when 9,889 sailed. The largest proportion, viz., 7,584 proceeded to the United States, while 1,641 went to British North America and 63 to Australia. The remainder sailed to South America, the East and West Indies, China, and the west coast of Africa. The prejugalism and the west coast of Africa. The nationalities of the emigrants were—English 5,834; Scotch, 114; Irisu, 786; and foreign 2,001. Of 670 the nationalities were not denoted. The returns show an increase of 2,229 over those for August last year.
