### NO VOTES FOR WOMEN OF NEWCASTLE

Newcastle, Dec. 24.—Newcastle Town Council met last night. A. H. Stewart, W. L. Durick, in the chair; D. P. Doyle, R. W. Crocker, John Russell, Percy Russell, Charles Gargan and H. H. Stuart, Aldermen; Mayor Troy and Ald. Ritchie.

A communication from the Newcastle Town Improvement League read as follows:

Newcastle, Dec. 19, 1915.  
To the Mayor and Town Council of Newcastle.

The last was a meeting of the Newcastle Town Improvement League held on the 19th inst. at the Town Council Chamber, Newcastle.

To appoint a Tripartite Committee to consider the compulsory attendance provisions of the school law are those enforced within the town limits.

To apply for legislation at the coming session of the Legislative Assembly for each amendment of the Town Incorporation Act or the Newcastle Incorporation Act, or both.

(a) As will abolish all property qualification for the office of alderman.

(b) As will abolish all property qualification for the office of mayor.

(c) As will admit women to the same rights and privileges as men in town elections and offices.

To order a new survey and plan of the town, appropriation for the same to be made in the estimates for 1916.

To appoint only such persons as assessors for 1915 as will agree to pay attention to the provisions of the assessment law, which provides that all assessable real estate, personal property and income shall be assessed on its full value.

Kindly give the above matters, most of which have been before previous councils, the most favorable attention possible.

Good progress is being made in the re-organization of the Canadian Manufacturing Co. and it is not likely that the industry will have to stop as feared a few weeks ago.

The Stohrer Mercantile Co. have moved into their large new brick block opposite the post office.

The Government has relinquished direct control of the Newcastle Wireless station and the officers have been sent elsewhere—Chief Comptroller Chas. E. Oodwin to Newfoundland and the others to Ontario.

Newcastle, Dec. 24.—John E. Keith was severely hurt in the Canadian Manufacturing Co.'s factory here yesterday afternoon about five thirty, when he was struck in the leg by a heavy rubber belt that had just broken. He will be laid up for several days. The leg narrowly escaped being broken.

Ald. Stuart said it was patent that all properties were undervalued. This gave a chance for the smaller properties to be valued nearly at par and the larger at a lower percentage of the true worth. If anyone complained he was likely to have his own assessment raised without any change to theirs. Therefore most people kept silent.

Ald. Crocker—Can you name any one who is undervalued?

Ald. Stuart—Yes; put through an order to place the assessments on the table tonight, and I will show where there are mistakes.

The section was lost, 5 to 1.

Edward Walsh was read and accepted to take effect Dec. 31st instant.

That the Northumberland County Council be asked to guarantee this in case the Town of Newcastle's assessments at any time decide to appreciably increase the assessment on the town property or incomes for town purposes, it will not take such town assessment or valuation for the county assessment or valuation of all other parts of the county which shall not have been so revised and increased.

The chairman strongly endorsed the motion. As the customs year, the county council have no valuation as its own and thus take much more taxes from the town than it should. It is proposed that the county districts pay. Often a farm worth \$4,000 or \$5,000 is assessed at no more than a little house in town without any tax. The motion was a good one.

Ald. Doyle thought the motion was a good one. The proper way to assess real estate was full value. But without an agreement with the county, it would be risky to raise the town's assessment. He did not think the town could prevent the county taking the town's assessment as its own.

Town Clerk Linton said that the county had the right of access to the town's assessment list. There was no harm in asking the county to come to an agreement.

AM. P. Russell wanted to see Chatham on the matter.

Ald. Stuart said that he did not believe the county had the right to take an advanced assessment of a town at par while its assessment of the parish at a lower rate. If it did so, an injunction against such action could be obtained in the courts, but if an agreement could be arrived at between the county and town so much the better for all. Chatham was increasing its assessment thus keeping the rate low—and would undoubtedly co-operate with Newcastle before the county council.

The motion passed unanimously.

On motion of Ald. P. Russell and Crocker, it was resolved that a copy of this resolution be sent to Chatham Council with request that the latter negotiate with the town of Newcastle on the matter.

Ald. D. W. Crocker said he was in favour of the motion.

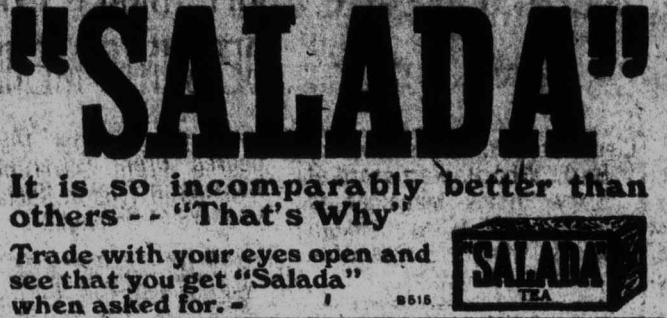

WILSON THEORY GIVES BRITAIN LARGEST NAVY

Cannot at Same Time be Exclusive Interpreter of Sea Laws... WHAT DOCTRINE MEANS Would Not Hamper Britain—League of Nations Would Definitely Solve Problem.

Paris, December 23.—In connection with President Wilson's visit to England there is much discussion here of the doctrine of the freedom of the seas. It is remarkable that while the President is not expected to take up matters of policy which have a profound influence on the subsequent proceedings in Paris.

One of the subjects which closer relations resulting from his contact with the British public will tend to remove from the field of controversy is the one mentioned. The British have been more aggressive in their attitude than any other point, and when the President's fourteen points were accepted as a whole, exception was taken to this clause.

"When Lord Halsbury went to Berlin the Kaiser was influenced by his pacific ideas, but later von Tirpitz gained an influence over him and then it was that the Emperor began to have an ambition to have not only the greatest army but also the greatest navy and mercantile fleet and the idea grew until he delivered the will-rendered utterance: 'Our future lies on the water.' During the war the Kaiser became the tool of Ludendorff, but von Tirpitz was really to blame for the war."
