Another seat on the Govern nent side of the House of Comnons has become vacant, through the death of the Hou. Frank Cochrane, Minister without port Cochrane had been ailing for the past two years, and latterly his health had been very precarious death occurred early on Monday morning September 22nd. The deceased statesman was a native of Clarenceville, Que, where he was born in November 1852 He received his education at the Clarenceville Academy. Early in life he moved to Ontario, and for some years was a hardware elected, as a Conservative, to the Ontaria legislature for the district of East Nipissing in 1905. He was re-elected for the legis lature in 1908 for Sudbury, and was appointed Minister of Lands Forests and Mines in the Whitney Cabinet. He was a member of the Royal Conservation Commission in 1909, and vice-president of the Dominion Forestry Association. He was opposed to the Taft-Fielding reciprocity compact, and upon the defeat of the Laurier administration at th polls, in the general election of 1911, he accepted office in the Borden cabinet, as Minister of Railways and Canals. His ad ministration of this portfolia is generally conceded to have been most highly successful. Mr Cochrane, in his politics, might be regarded as a disciple of the late Sir James Whitney, Premier of Ontario; under whom he served as Minister for several years. He was a man of sterling integrity, fearless in his advocacy of what he believed to be right and honest; most unremitting in to do what he believed to te right. He was most highly

his devotion to duty, and strong as adamant in his determination steemed by his cabinet colleagues, and generally regarded by those who were best acquainted with him as one of the very best men in the public life of Canada His health in 1907 was rather precarious, and when Sir Robert Borden was forming the Union Government he placed his resignation in the hands of the Prime Minister, in order to make way for someone else. Preston, in consequence of his services to the Liberal party at and was an extremely dangerous person to antagonize, in th slightest degree, by the party which he served so faithfully In consequence of this, he was constantly kept in office, of one kind or another, by the late lib eral government of Canada, and for several years prior to 1913 was employed, in different parts of Europe and Asia, as an Immi gration agent. Possessing such a remarkably unsavoury repu tation, it has been a wonder to all reasonable people in Canada that the late Laurier Government should employ this man as their chief scrutineer and manager for them in the overseas elections of 1917. 


