An Unhealthy Winter.

This winter has not only been marked by severe weather and much distress, but also unfortunately by outbreaks of infectious and contagious diseases. Some of the cases are due undoubtedly to our growing intercourse with the outer world. The outbreaks of smallpox were undoubtedly introduced in our midst from abroad.

Outbreaks of some of the other diseases are notoriously associated with filth and lack of sanitation. These were the notorious circumstances surrounding most of the typhus cases. Insanitary local circumstances are the chief means of spreading typhoid fever. Diphtheria is due to a bacillus which has been identified. Health authorities say that "direct infection from patient to patient is probably more common than indirect infection by clothes, etc., though the latter occurs. The infection may hang persistently about a house and its belongings, in the absence of complete purification." "Aggregation in schools seems to intensify the contagium of diphtheria. The practices of kissing, of transferring sweetmeats from mouth to mouth, of cleaning slates with saliva, are common means of spreading it." It is to be hoped that the prompt action at Mount Cashel and all other institutions of injecting a small dose of anti-toxin serum into those who have been exposed to the infection will have its usual effect and render them immune. We are pleased to learn that there are no new cases at Mount Cashel, Synod Buildings nor the General Hospital, although there are four more cases in town, one of which has ended fatally.

Diphtheria Spreading.

A young woman residing on Casey Street, aged 21, developed diphtheria yesterday, but it is of a mild type and she will pull through all right. Three cases were discovered by Dr. Duncan yesterday afternoon on the Topsell Road in the residence of Mrs. Dunno. One child, aged 6 years, died this morning and the disease is of a more virulent type than what has been reported within the past few days. Inspector Lawlor went in there this morning and placarded and quarantined one house, and Dr. Chaplin is attending the patients, who will be nursed at home. The Mount Cashel and Synod patients are doing well and no new cases are reported there.

Mr. Stolypin, the Premier and Minister of Interior, has resigned and his resignation has been accepted by the Emperor. M. Kokovsov, Minister of Finance in the Stolypin Cabinet, is the new Premier, whose appointment has been gazetted. Mr. Stolypin presented his resignation personally to the Emperor on account of the rejection by the Council of the Empire of the Zemstvo Bill for self-government in nine of the west provinces.

Central District Court.

(Before Judge Conroy.)

Mayor Ellis vs. James A. McKay.
This was an action taken as a result of the refusal by the defendant to pay a demand made by the Municipal Council for the 4 per cent tax upon the proceeds of the recent hockey matches between the City and the Nova Scotia teams. Defendant acted as one of a number of promoters who got the team here to play games with a local combination. The proceeds of the matches were received by these promoters, and to the Council's demand for the tax, defendants alleged that the tax does not apply to them in that they did not enter into the venture for purposes of profit, but for the sake of the sport to the community. Several witnesses were examined on both sides, and at the conclusion of the counsel's argument His Honor intimated that his judgment would be delivered at a later date. After again hearing counsel in the matter, in the course of his remarks the Judge intimated that his position was purely that of interpreting the law, but that he questioned the wisdom of the Council in putting into effect such a tax, even if the Statute permitted them to do so. He regarded the venture as a commendable one, and had no doubt in his mind that the question of gain in its ordinary sense was not considered by the gentlemen who acted as promoters.

How to Stop Swearing.

When Sir Richard Hawkins' ship, the Daunt, was off the Guinea coast it caught fire and had a narrow escape from destruction. The sequel, as told by John Barnett in "Fighting Admirals," was curious: "The men thanked God for their deliverance and as a mark of gratitude took occasion to banish swearing from the little fleet. By general consent it was ordained that a palmer, or ferrule, should be carried by any one who was taken with an oath; and that he should give the next who swore a stroke with it. At the end of the day he who had the ferrule received three strokes from the captain or the master. Within three days there was no more swearing aboard the ships."

A Million an Hour.

The Government printers who have secured the official contract for the supply of postage stamps for 1911 and onwards have built a new factory for the purpose near London, where they are already turning out stamps at the rate of a million an hour. As they calculate 5,000 working hours to the year, the total number of stamps printed per annum will be 5,000 millions. The stamps are printed on sheets of 240, which sheets in their plain form are worth a penny; when they leave the factory their value is one pound.
