Sir Edward Grey has cleared the political atmosphere and poured oil upon the troubled waters of Anglo-German relations by a speech which lasted for an hour and a half in the House of Commons this afternoon. He reviewed the whole Marcocontrol of the street of treaty, and unflinchingly upheld the attitude taken by the British Government. At the same time he declared that its action was never antagonistic to Germany or to any settlement that she was able to arrange with France which would not threaten the rights of Britain. Sir Edward made no secret of the fact that the situation had at one time been tense, but thought his statement to-day would had been indulging in a fit of political alcoholism: that the time had arrived for it to get and keep cool and sober. 

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
