





The H.A.C. is thus the doyen of all our military forces, and the lineal descendants of the Trained Bands of the vice. The H.A.C. was for centuries and as such took a large share in the part played by London in the raising of forces for the Parliament during

the Civil War. Many famous men have belonged to the H.A.C., notably Milton, Monck, Pepys, Prince Rupert, and Wren. the Army Boot.

Mr. Roland Gorbold, of Northampon, speaking at the Cordwainers' Hall, London, recently, said that at the outbreak of war the Army was served with a wholly hand-sewn boot. To meet the great demands a design was fixed upon for a new kind of machine-made boot. A chrome tan was substituted for the vegetable tan, with the result that leather could be produced in a month, whereas formerly it took a year. To-day 60,000 pairs of boots are being produced every day -more in a day than could be produced in a week before the war.

Mr. Gorbold mentioned that a man came back from the trenches, having worn the new boot for eight months The new boot resembles the American nodel with a "blocked" toe. A type of boot made for the trenches, so as to do away with the puttees, is watertight up to the knees.






