Public Notice

I am directed by His Excellency the Governor in Council to issue the following notice under Authority of Minute in Council passed 28th February, 1918.

Augmentation of the Pay of Royal Naval Reservists Newfoundland.

The Government of Newfoundland have decided to augment the pay of Newfoundland Royal Naval Reservists so as to place them on the same footing as men of the Newfoundland Regiment.

Under the provision of the War Measure Act, authority is given to the Minister of Militia to deal with the matter of augmentation of pay of the Royal Naval Reservists, Nfld., in consultation with the Senior Naval Officer, St. John's.

It is ordered that a sum of 33c. per day be placed to the credit of each Naval Reservist from the time of commencement of the war, in cases where men were then serving, or otherwise, from the time when their services began up to the time of discharge, or of death, or to the 30th of September, 1917, inclusive.

As the rate of pay of Naval Reservists was increased from October 1st, 1917, and as the difference between the amount they receive and that allowed the members of The Royal Newfoundland Regiment is 17c. per day, this difference will also be credited them from that date.

The foregoing amounts will not in any case be made a payment from Admiralty sources. The Minister of Militia, St. John's, Nfld., is solely responsible for the issue of any sums due.

Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve men serving in any of H. M. Ships, including all members of the Trawler Reserve and those in Defensively Armed Merchant Ships etc., are eligible for the pay as set forth, and should be informed of the following alternatives as regards the method of payment:—

(a) Payment will be made on personal application to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.

(b) Payment will be made to the nominee of any Reserve man, on written application duly witnessed, to the Minister of Militia, St. John's.

(c) Sums due will be placed to the credit of Reserve men who do not desire to avail themselves of the foregoing and can be drawn by them at the expiration of their service.

The following form is to be compiled and forwarded direct to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, Newfoundland, at the earliest possible date:—

NAME AND OFFICIAL NO.	WHAT IS DESIRED DISPOSAL OF AMOUNT DUE UNDER ORDER 1, 2, or 3. (IN CASE OF 2, FULL NAME AND ADDRESS MUST BE GIVEN.)	SIGNATURE AUTHORIZING DISPOSAL.

All communications of any description with regard to these payments are to be made to the Minister of Militia, St. John's, direct.

Payment will commence on 1st May, 1918.

In cases where members of the Royal Naval Reserve (Newfoundland) have been killed in action or died of wounds or sickness, or through any other cause, the amount due as Augmentation Pay will go to the Estate of the deceased. The authority to obtain the Estate of the deceased is, in case of a Will, Letters of Probate; and in case there is not a Will, Letters of Administration. Such letters are issued by the Supreme Court of Newfoundland on the Petition and Proofs of Executor of the Will, or the next of kin. If the Estate does not exceed \$500.00, after the proof of the facts has been obtained the petition can be applied for by the Minister of Justice.

Over 537,136. Men Join in Dominion.

Halifax, N. S., April—F. B. McCurdy, M.P., Parliamentary Secretary for the Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, addressed the Commercial Club to-day. He gave the latest figures as to the number of men enrolled in Canada's overseas army, and the force at the present time is as follows:—

C.E.F. volunteers	453,600
Permanent Force	2,470
Active Militia	9,652
Canadian Naval Service	3,210

Total 468,432
Resident Joined Colors, various Allies 21,153
Recruited for direct Navy 5,800
Drafted under the Military Service Act 25,132
Available 41,644
Total Canadian Forces, or under flags of Mother Country or Allies 537,136

Casualties to Date.
The Canadian casualties to date had been 148,000, which meant that of every eight who had gone overseas three had been killed, wounded or were missing. Soldiers were returning as well as going. Men were returning invalided at the rate of 1,500 a month, and 35,000 in all had come back.

Wins of the "Queen Elizabeth."

to which war on the high seas is always liable.

It is probable that, by this time, all the capital ships of the new program are completed and are either in commission or shortly will be so. Today, the resources of the British yards are being devoted, just as are those of the United States, to the construction of destroyers and other anti-submarine craft.

The latest capital ships of which the censor has permitted any information and photographs to be made public, are the five well-known ships of the "Queen Elizabeth" class. These ships mark a long step forward in that tendency to merge the best qualities of the battleship and the battle-cruiser in a single vessel. They are credited with a displacement of 27,500 tons, but with full equipment of fuel, stores, etc., their displacement is probably nearer 29,000 tons. The class takes its name from the "Queen Elizabeth"; the other four are the "Warspite," "Valliant," "Barham" and "Malaya." The "Queen Elizabeth" is familiar

to the public because of the part which she played in the Dardanelles campaign, when she engaged in a long-range, indirect-fire bombardment of the Turkish forts commanding the Straits.

The "Warspite," it will be remembered, got into difficulties when she was engaged with the ships of the German fleet in the Battle of Jutland. Her steering gear was jammed, and she circled in toward the German line and was for some time the target for the heavy gun fire of half a dozen German ships. She straightened out the difficulty and resumed her place in the line with surprisingly small damage. Although no particulars as to their armor have been made public, it is certain that these ships must be well covered. The survival of the "Warspite," is sufficient proof of that; for the German rifle was very accurate on that day. The "Queen Elizabeth" is reported to carry 12 inches of armor on the belt, turrets and barbettes.

The two notable features in the "Queen Elizabeth" are the armament and the speed. In these ships a new type of gun, the 15-inch, 40-caliber piece, first made its appearance. Eight of these are carried, four in two turrets forward and another four aft. The secondary battery consists of 16 16-inch guns, half a dozen anti-aircraft guns, and several 12-pounders. She has four submerged torpedo tubes, firing the 21-inch torpedo.

The "Queen Elizabeth" has a rated speed of 25 knots, which is remarkably high for a battleship—in fact, at the time these ships were built it practically placed them, so far as speed is concerned, in the battle-cruiser class. They are turbine-driven, and some of the ships, on trial, reached a speed of 28 knots and over. Their high speed stood them in good stead in the Battle of Jutland, but not quite good enough. Could they have made a knot or two more, they would have steamed in column with the British battle-cruisers, and, theoretically, Beatty would have wiped out the battle-cruiser squadron of the Germans.

The 15-inch gun is the most powerful piece afloat to-day in any of the world's navies; although it will be outclassed by the 45- and 60-caliber, 18-inch guns which are being built for our latest dreadnoughts. It is 50 feet in length, weighs 35 tons, and with a charge of 330 pounds of cordite it delivers its 1,920-pound shell with a muzzle velocity of 2,360 feet per second and a muzzle energy of \$3,500 tons.

It will be noted that the velocity, judged by our standards, is low; for our own naval 16-inch gun has been designed for a muzzle velocity of 2,500 foot-seconds. The lower velocity of the British guns was adopted largely with a view to preventing rapid ero-

High velocity means high pressure and consequent high temperature of the powder gases, and high temperature means rapid erosion. By lowering the velocity and increasing the weight of the shell, it is possible to obtain at given ranges equal penetration to that obtained by using a lighter shell with higher velocities.

The British Cordite, because of its partial content of nitroglycerin, is a much hotter powder than our own all-nitrocellulose powder, and consequently we can obtain higher velocities without a corresponding increase of erosion.

It is understood that the British have built some 18-inch guns and have installed them on one or more of their latest capital ships. This piece, of course, exceeds anything built or now under construction. Its shell must weigh approximately three thousand pounds and its energy, even if moderate velocities are used, will be enormous. Whether this huge piece will be permanently adopted is yet to be determined.—Scientific American.

How the Kaiser Raises Money.

Some piquant revelations of the Kaiser's efforts to raise money for himself are given by Miss Edith Keen, who spent seven years at the German Court.

Miss Keen was engaged eight years ago as a dresser to Princess Leopold of Prussia, the German Emperor's sister, and during her service she met many great personages of the Court, including the All-Highest himself. She only returned to England after great difficulty. "You know too much!" she was told.

In 1908, writes Miss Keen, the Kaiser was getting into financial difficulties. Many of the household accounts had not been paid for some years. The Kaiser had a heavy personal overdraft at his bankers.

"Ultimately, the Kaiser relieved himself of all his pecuniary embarrassments by the sale of some of the Royal estates at Potsdam.

"It was at this time that the habit sprang up at the German Court of very wealthy people paying large sums to obtain for their daughters some sort of a position about the Court, either as maid-of-honor or lady-in-waiting to the Empress. I heard that in the season of 1910 four Court appointments brought in £35,000 for the Empress.

"I was told by the Princess Leopold that one lady paid the German Emperor £10,000 to be allowed to accompany the Kaiser to the British Court on the occasion of the last visit of the Emperor and Empress to Windsor Castle.

"Royal warrants were sold at high figures, as much as £1,000 being paid by some tradesmen for a warrant, though some of them never, as a matter of fact, got any Royal custom.

"Invitations to great Court functions and ceremonies could be bought almost by anyone who cared to pay the price for this honor. A thousand pounds was the usual fee for an invitation."

AN APPEAL

I am addressing this Appeal to all the people of Newfoundland, but especially to those of the Outports.

Your Government have decided to make another special attempt to obtain further recruits for the duties forced upon us by the War. I am anxious to explain to you in simple and strong words why those duties are yours.

In your sea-girt home you have, I know, your own dangers and anxieties to face. As I write this my mind is still full of the appalling disaster to the Florida. But War you do not realise; you are beyond the sound of the guns which, in the South East corner of England, I have heard day after day breaking in upon the beauty and calmness of the summer air.

That awe-inspiring rumble of the guns which I ask you to imagine—that lurid light on the horizon which I ask you to picture are the signs of a terrible struggle for Right—of a mighty effort to save from ruin, not only France, but every bit of free soil in the world, including this island of which you are so proud. The awful struggle seems to be approaching its climax now and your close kinsmen are in the middle of it.

Some may ask, What is the danger? and it is my purpose to endeavour to make it clear to you.

By some permission of Divine Providence, which we do not understand, a nation of criminals is now attacking all that is just and true in the whole world. Germany has set herself deliberately to violate every law of Right and every principle of Humanity.

Never before in History has a War been planned like this. Hitherto all wars have had some sort of pretext of right or impulse of passion. It has been reserved to the German military party to plot wilfully and wantonly a great crime against the peace of mankind.

And the hypocrisy with which Germany supports the crime makes it still more abominable. As Judas treated the Christ, Germany is treating Civilization. Under appeals to God, Germany masks the utmost malignities of the devil. The German nation to-day knows no Law except that of the pagan, the liar, the ravisher, the murderer. They are a curse let loose on the Earth. And the task demanded of all of us is to fight and conquer this curse just as in our moral life we are bound to fight and conquer Sin. The Cause is a far broader and holier Cause than that which impelled the Crusaders against the Saracens.

We may thank God that the greater nations of the World have realised the justice of the Cause; and I believe that every man in Newfoundland will one day be thankful that he was at least asked to face this question—"Is it not my higher duty to go out and save humanity from destruction?"

Remember that your wives, your children, your cottages, your boats, are in positive danger if the German breaks through France. As he is treating the foolish Russians, so he will treat every nation whom he touches—America, Canada, Newfoundland, are to him mere objectives for his greedy brutality. He is entirely evil, he has no sense of right and no feelings of Mercy.

This mass of incarnate selfishness is held back by the strong arm of the Allies in France. Will any man of British race decline to do all he can to defeat and crush it?

At this moment the need is specially great, for the Germans are now desperate. They begin to realise the truth of that dread decree "He that takes the sword, shall perish with the sword". At no horror will they hesitate if they can but escape the punishment that is their due.

Now on every man and woman among us lies the duty to bear a hand in administering that punishment a duty not only to ourselves but to posterity. If age or health prevent some of us from going they do not prevent us from following the greatest example ever set to mankind and making the sacrifice of that which is dearest to our hearts.

You young men I ask to listen carefully to the appeals which will once more be made to you in the next few weeks. Believe me that the voluntary act of a man, impelled by the high sense of duty, is far nobler than the mere obedience to the provisions of a public enactment.

One special word I say to women. Try to realise the sufferings of women and children wherever the Germans come: think of the little children starved in Belgium and slaughtered in cold blood in Armenia. Let your men folk stand out and protect you, for in helping to defeat the Germans they are protecting the honour and safety of all their dear ones at home.

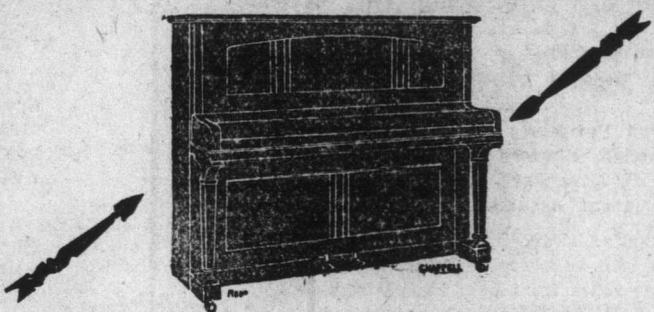

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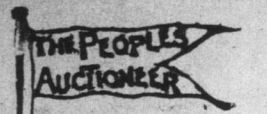
