He says: "I had repeated to his Oxford hostess, a story told me by the principal of a Scottish university, of how Lord Rosebery, engaged to speak at a great Liberal meeting in a northern city, found himself previously dining with a confidentially total provost, who provided for his guests no other liquid refreshment than orangeade in large glass jugs. As the depressing beverage circulated, the Liberal leader's spirits fell almost to zero; and it was by the advice of my friend that, between the dinner and the meeting, he drove a trolley to an hotel, and quaffed a pint of dry champagne before mounting the platform and making a speech of fiery eloquence, which the good provost attributed entirely to the orangeade. The lady, unknown to me, passed on this delectable story to one of the Union Committee, who took it very seriously; the result being that when Lord Rosebery reached the committee-room, just before the inauguration ceremony, a grave young man whispered to him confidentially: "There are tea and coffee here; but I have got your pint of champagne behind the screen; will you come and have it now?" "Well, do you know?" said the great man, with his usual tact, "I think for once in a way I will have a cup of coffee."

"I am deeply shocked to learn of the terrible catastrophe which has befallen your country causing so great loss of life and property," President Harding said. "My countrymen join with me in extending heartfelt sympathy in this hour of suffering and national grief. The American Red Cross will hold itself in readiness to render such assistance as may be in its power, and I beg that your excellency will not hesitate to let me know if this organization can serve the people of the stricken districts in any way."

If you cultivate the love of colors and color contrasts and harmonies, joys will await you everywhere.

In the autumn woods, in the attractive home, in the garden, in the theatre, in women's dresses (but alas not in men's the magazine cover sometimes), in sky, sea, and shop

windows, in jewelers show cases and in a child's eyes.

Man Rivals Nature.

Do not be wroth at me for putting nature's and man's effects on the same level. It is conventional to pretend that man cannot rival nature in such lines as these but it is true? Condemn me if you will but I never saw my color contrast in nature that gave me more joy than one of the blue and orange settings in the Follies of nineteen something or other. Man has done wonderful things with colors in these last few years. He has created shades that never were on land or sea and I love them all--or most of them.

Even the names have a music and allure to me. Some, of course, are merely conventional (as for instance "Harding" or "leather") but see if you do not find a certain measure of

poetry in the following list clipped from an advertisement of silks to be had in the colors named below.

Constantinople Once An Art Centre.

Constantinople before its capture by the bestial Turk was enriched with innumerable works of art when Rome was in pitiful ruins. The Hippodrome, 1400 feet long and 400 wide, was adorned with the images of victorious charioteers. There was a statue of Helen, probably comparable to the Venus de Milo in the Louvre. There was a Hercules of Lycausus, of noble size, a colossal image of Juno from her temple on Samos, and there were the wonderful bronze horses that now form the quadriga over the portal of St. Mark's in Venice. These were but a few. The city evolved an

architecture. The Roman arch, rotated on a vertical axis, would describe a dome, and this superbly beautiful form crowned the Byzantine Churches. Under those domes the supporting pillars and peditives were en-crusted with mosaics of semi-precious stones, the altars set thick with gems; the whole was ornamented with an overdone, prodigal embellishment.

This was a city of great churches, of domes and towers, of palaces and convents and public baths and libraries and theatres, and of open-air shelters wherein the incessantly dissatisfied people could split with rhetorical razors the single hair that

divided the Arian and Athanasian doctrines, or some other subtlety of the Nicene creed--the free silver or protective tariff question of their day. It was filled with artists, critics, connoisseurs, savants, dilettantes, theologians, rhetors, ranters, metaphysicians, pamphleteers, authors. It seethed with intellectual activity, it was the seat of a learning and a culture which, while not creative, at least preserved some of the values of a mighty past. If there had been printing presses there would have been extras on the street every thirty minutes.

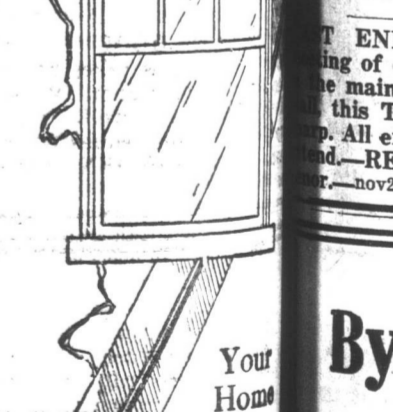
PERVERSY

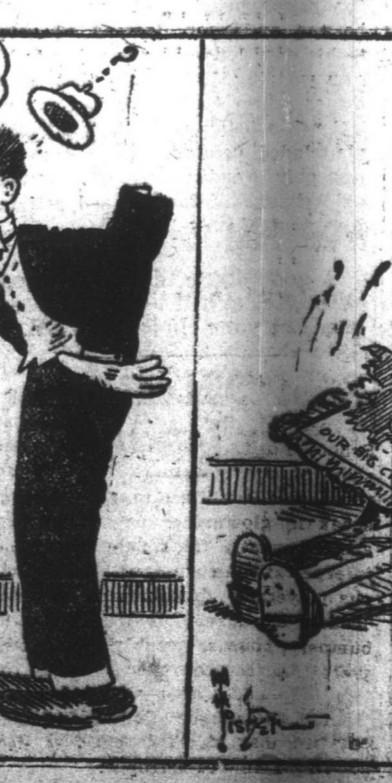
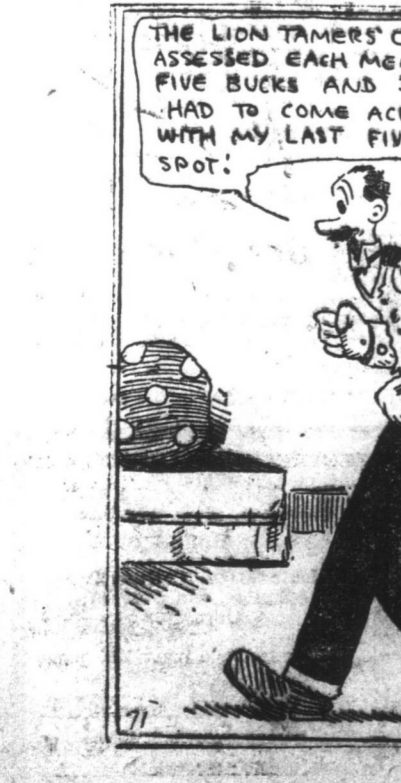

The Annual Address

With the opening paragraphs of the Address of the President of the Fishermen's Protective Union, delivered to the 14th Annual Convention, few will find fault, unless it be the shareholders themselves. The sentiments expressed are purely commercial, and is in effect a brief resume of the volume of business done by the Trading Company during the year. Of course the usual bombast is there and the perennial boast that the U.T.C. is doing far more trade in imports and exports than any other concern in the island. Whether this is so or not is another matter. If the Trading Company has only accomplished half of that which the President says it has, then it is to be congratulated as a going concern and one of the main integers of commerce in the whole colony. With the internal economy of the Trading Company or any of the other associate companies, the public has nothing whatever to do. Only the shareholders are interested in the financial statements. These companies are no more to be criticized in the conduct of their affairs than any other firm in trade. And we must repeat once more that it has never been our policy to delve into the transactions of any copartnership or limited liability company. How these manage their own affairs is not any person's business, so long as the conduct of the same is legitimate and within the law. Whether they make profits or incur losses depends entirely on the methods and system of management, but such has no place in the scheme of public affairs, and is not a matter for public discussion. No person, so far as we know, has made any move to kill the commercial present or future of the Union Trading Company. The daily press has ever treated the business end of the Union with the same courtesy and respect shown similar ventures. Nor is there any desire whatever on the part of those who are and will remain strongly opposed to the political aspirations of the Union itself, to injure in any way, shape or form the credit or reputation of the concern, which Mr. Coaker says has carried on such a tremendous business. May it continue to do so is all the harm any honest person wishes it. But there is another aspect to this. Mr. Coaker never ceases to play on the credulity of certain of his Union supporters, by constantly, in season and out, impressing them that the real object of those who are opposed to him is the killing of the Union Trading Company. The Advocate promulgates this rabid sentiment, and those men who do not have an opportunity of reading any other newspaper, are apparently convinced of the truth of such absolutely untruthful statements. Mr. Coaker emphasises these in his address, when he says that "our enemies want us to disappear and with us a million dollars belonging chiefly to the fishermen. They want us out of the way; they strive daily, almost hourly to bring about our destruction at home, and abroad, in the press and in their secret recesses, in Parliament and in the counting

offices of some who are better fitted by nature for sanitary laborers than fish exporters and merchants." In this declaration Mr. Coaker most grossly lies. Are not some of the men he stigmatizes as better fitted for sanitary laborers, his closest commercial friends? Such inflammatory expressions are used to take effect amongst those, who, as we said before, have not an opportunity of seeing the other side of the picture. If Mr. Coaker really means that his political opponents want to oust him, then he is correct, but for him to tell intelligent men that members of the commercial body, some of whom came to his financial rescue not so very long ago, are anxious for him to disappear with a million dollars belonging to the fishermen, invested in Trading Stock, we presume, then we are constrained to repeat that he most volubly prevaricates.

Opposition Becoming Active.

PUBLIC MEETING WEDNESDAY NIGHT. A meeting to discuss matters of moment is being held tomorrow (Wednesday) evening at 8 o'clock, in the Star Theatre. This meeting, which is being held by the Opposition party, has been brought about as the result of many pressing requests both from the citizens of St. John's and some of the fishermen now in port. Leading members of the party will address the meeting, laying before the people their views of the present situation. The meeting is a timely one, and there are many matters to be discussed. If the Government had honored its pledged word and opened the House on the 31st of last month, as it agreed to do when adjournment was taken on June 20th last, the matters which are now exciting public interest could have been debated on the floors of the Assembly. That privilege was denied when the House was prorogued by proclamation in utter disregard of the rights and responsibilities of the Legislature, and the Opposition are acting wisely in responding to the demands of the people for a public declaration on issues that are of great and far reaching importance. That the meeting will be an overhauling one goes without saying.

Two Million Pounds For Humber.

PRINCIPAL AND INTEREST GUARANTEED—PRIME MINISTER AND MINISTER OF JUSTICE PLEDGE COLONY TO THIS. Hon. W. R. Warren, Minister of Justice, who has been in England during the past summer and fall, returns to the colony last evening, coming via Ottawa and Montreal, where some matters in connection with his visit had to be finalized. Seen by a Telegram reporter this morning the Minister stated that the final draft of the Labrador Boundary Dispute has been completed by the Colony's Solicitor and from consultation he has had since reaching this side of the water, the case can now be heard before the Privy Council. Whilst in Ottawa Hon. Mr. Warren made a new agreement whereby thousands of dollars may be saved in the printing of maps. It was the signing of the agreement that necessitated his going to Ottawa. According to the arrangements there will be no necessity of making separate maps and other documents prepared. Each party agrees to bear equally the expenses of those to be used. Another matter which engaged the attention of Hon. Mr. Warren was the getting of legal opinions on the railroad contract. Owing to the courts being closed and the lawyers on their vacation there was much delay, and except for securing the opinion of Sir Wm. Finlay, K.C., shortly after the Minister arrived in the Old Country nothing could be done in the matter for some time. The opinion of Mr. Barrington-Ward, K.C., was secured next, but the Minister had to wait until October 11th before hearing from Mr. Douglas Hogge as he had been abroad. The Mr. Hogge referred to is, we understand, one of the leaders of the English Bar and has since been made the Hon. Mr. Justice. Asked how matters stood in relation to the Railroad contracts Hon. Mr. Warren stated that he was not at liberty to say anything, but his own opinions are all in writing, these would be laid on the table of the House of Assembly at the next session. Speaking of the Humber Dispute the Minister stated that the Prime Minister and himself spent considerable time over this matter. He, with Sir Thomas Berridge attended to the legal details of the agreement which was worked out by the Prime Minister. This matter was not settled until late in October, hence Hon. Mr. Warren was delayed and could not get away before Nov. 22nd. Asked how much did the agreement involve the Minister stated that the British Government had guaranteed two million pounds principal and interest and we are to make a similar guarantee. Hon. Mr. Warren speaks highly of our new Governor, Sir Wm. Allardree. He is an able man, witty and agreeable. Whilst in Montreal the Minister stated that the Newfoundland club anxious to hear how things were progressing in the home land entertained Mr. Warren at the Engineer's Club. The gathering was very large and was presided over by Mr. Charles Whitten. Amongst the well known Newfoundlanders present were Mr. Chas. Blackler, President N.F. Club; McGill; Dr. Peters, Frank Jackson, Leo Jackson, E. Mudge, Col. Renouf, J. J. Renouf, Col. Adams, Arthur Chis, Dr. Crowley, George Crowley, Joseph Young, A. C. Jensen, A. G. Howell, E. C. James, G. H. Adams, J. A. Baldwin, Wm. Ewell, G. H. Roberts, J. C. Lancaster. All present wished to be remembered to friends at home. The Prime Minister, we learn is on the Atlantic, en route at New York and will be home within the next few days.

S.S. Bethlehem Arrives.

WILL UNDERGO REPAIRS. S. S. Bethlehem arrived from Wabana, Bell Island, this morning and immediately went on dock to have a new rudder placed in position. The vessel, it will be remembered, met a mishap about four weeks ago off Channel Head, having been conveyed into Port aux Basques by S. S. Kyle, where she remained until a week ago. The matter of salvage is still pending between the owners and the Reid Nfld. Co.

THE INDOOR SPORTING EVENT ON DEC. 7TH.

A largely attended meeting of the National Sports Committee was held at the office of the President, Mr. W. J. Higgins, last evening to make arrangements for an Indoor Championship Meet to be held at the Prince's Rink on the night of Tuesday, December 7th. As announced some time ago the object of accumulation of funds is to have Newfoundland represented at the British Empire Exhibition athletic meet in 1924 and it is confidently felt that the Committee has the fullest support and sympathy of the public in the attainment of their aim. The following programme was drawn up:—

- 1—Senior, 50 yards.
- 2—Junior, 100 yards.
- 3—Senior, 100 yards.
- 4—1 mile walk.
- 5—Senior, 1 mile.
- 6—Junior, 1/4 mile.
- 7—Inter-Club, tug of war.
- 8—Senior, 1/4 mile.
- 9—Junior, 1/4 mile.
- 10—High Jump.
- 11—1/4 mile, senior.
- 12—Inter-Club, basket ball.
- 13—220 yards, senior.
- 14—5 mile.

The specially designed A.A.A. gold medal will be awarded the winner of each event, and in addition there will be a victor laurel wreath, for the individual securing the most points, which will be allotted as follows:—

first place, five points, second, three points, and third, one point. The tug of war and basket ball do not carry points, but a beautiful silver cup is being awarded for each. The event will doubtless be unique in the respect that it will possibly be the first appearance in public of the new Governor, Sir William Allardice, who is keenly interested in all branches of athletics. The following special committees were appointed: Tug of war, Messrs. T. Curran, J. W. Morris, P. Piggy and William Noel; Basket Ball referees, Mr. Young of the Methodist College Staff; while the various distances will be verified by Messrs. Noel and John M. Tobin. In accordance with the A.A.A. rules, the junior age limit is defined as under 15, and birth certificates must be produced. Clubs or Societies will note that one team only can be entered from each in the basket ball and tug of war, and the contestants must be suitably attired in athletic dress; otherwise they will not be permitted to compete. T. W. Sparkes was unanimously chosen as Treasurer, and his knowledge and interest in all sports will add to the strength of the Executive. The Mount Cashel Orphanage Band will be in attendance. On this Friday, Saturday and next Tuesday nights the rink will be available for practice. Greater interest will be centred in the event by the entry into the sprints of Stanton Jackson, of Halifax, while his brother Laurie, the noted long distance man, will be pitted against such splendid locals as Bell, O'Toole, Furlong, Dodd, Kelly, Dunphy, Cooper and Matinder, who did so well in the Telegram road race last summer. The medals and cups won at the A. A. A. track championships, are expected from England on the Schem, due Friday, and it is hoped they will arrive in time to be presented at the Indoor Meet on the 7th December. A final meeting will be held next Tuesday evening, and if the entries for the various events warrants preliminary heats they will be run off on the night previous to the sports.

PERSONAL PURPOSE LOST.

The Import Tax on codfish was levied in 1918 when Sir M. P. O'Connell was Finance Minister and the Minister. The tax was then levied per quintal on all fish exported. In 1921, under the present Government, an alteration was made and the tax on codfish exported in foreign vessels a forty cent tax was levied on the twenty cent tax being levied on the home carriers. This tax has been abolished in all countries where the foreign-owned vessels are not on the same footing as the home-owned ones. The real object of the twenty cent tax was to encourage the Newfoundland men and vessels to export the fish to the whole season of the present and future. The tax was to be repaid to the individual fisherman, a work that will require discretion. How many hundreds of thousands of quintals have been shipped this season, the receipts have been fictitious names, and will the owners be traced? It is a well-known fact that under the present system of fish-selling on the wharf the fish is shipped by a dealer who may be in debt to the dealer and the receipt is made under the name. Why not pay the tax to the exporter and have him pay the tax when he receives the fish? This is the best means of getting through his agents, the man who when fish was received. It is a well-known fact that all the fishermen by the present plan adopted in payment of the tax, receive that which really belongs to them. There are many intricacies in the sale of the fish and it is said by those who know something about the business.

See The British Navy In Action.

"THE EMPIRE'S SHIELD," A WONDERFUL PICTURE, IS NOW BEING SHOWN AT THE MAJESTIC.

No picture was ever shown in St. John's that is more at home in this old naval port than "The Empire's Shield," which opened yesterday at the Majestic. No picture ever came here to exceed it, certainly not in the sentiment which the people of this city should have for the subject of it, and never any to surpass it as an extraordinary production. What subject in the world of to-day could so stir one's imagination as the British Navy in action.

The picture is a presentation of Britain's gigantic naval efforts toward winning the war. **Turkish Nationalists
At Home.**

In the afternoon, I repaired to the wide and pleasant terrace above the beach at Inebolu, for a dish of sherbet, in the coffee-house. This terrace was a favorite resort of the men of the town in their hours of ease, and I never lacked a companion who knew a little French or English.

French and Italian ships appeared in the roadstead at least six times a week, and an occasional Russian ship shows up under a French flag. The cargo brought in consisted chiefly of army supplies. I was told that small Bolshevik boats had been making this port with precious cargo for the Nationalists, but that they were now going to ports farther east. Occasionally a Greek warship appeared in the offing, on the lookout for the venture-some Turkish boats from Constantinople, but it dared not interfere with steamers flying the flags of the Allies and could not stand helplessly by while they discharged Nationalist passengers and cargo for Anzora.

In the evening all the men of the town congregated there for their "nightcap" of Turkish coffee. The last bulletin with news from the front had already been posted on the terrace, and the courier from Castamuni had arrived with the daily paper. There was much eager discussion of the day's news.

"In this new Turkey," said a merchant to me as we sat on the terrace, enjoying the cool evening breeze from the sea, "the Turk must remain the offender. We shall never again permit the control of business in this land to slip out of our hands." And he had confidence that by the fiat of government the commercial monopoly of the Turks in Turkey had been for all time assured.

As we talked, great ox-carts were being loaded at the Custom-house near by with supplies for the army in the interior and were setting out in creaking procession to make the steep ascent of the mountains in the cool of the night. "The young men are all with the army," said my companion, "and the transport, as you see, is in the hands of boys and old men and women." I was amazed at the strength and agility shown by the worn women who heaved bales and boxes into place on the wagons, adjusted the loads and with poles worried the oxen into proper position and started them off on their long pull. Their scanty dress was frayed and dirty; their feet were bare; but they never forgot the Moslem tenet of feminine modesty. In the midst of their scurrying hither and thither they kept their scarfs drawn over their faces, holding them in place by a fold clenched between their teeth. The veil, like the fez, was a symbol of the Nationalists. In the five weeks of my sojourn in Anatolia, I saw only three unveiled Moslem women.—By Laurence Shaw Moore, in "Asia Magazine" for April.

It is pitiable to see so many people, many of them estimable in many ways, joining in such a ridiculous chain, either from thoughtless belief or as a lark. Just figure it out starting from one and work as far as the first ten rounds of the chain and from the figures derived you will have some slight idea of the amount of stationery used and the postage wasted through the following of such a scheme. 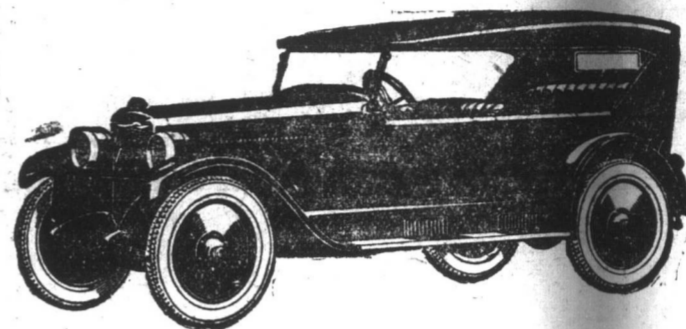
