### THE GUELPH PACKING HOUSE.

Some of our readers may not be aware that the Guelph Packing House has been in operation for a month past. As this is a new branch of business in the town, and as everything which tends to inase our prosperity and add to our pop

ror the purpose, so that as the business expands, as the proprietors have every reason to expect, the premises may be greatly extended. On one side of the road leading to the works are situated the slaughter house for cattle, ice house, and building where the beef is cut up, saited and barrelled. The ice-house is capable of storing 500 tons of ice, which is used for summer curing, so that the heat is no impediment in carrying on the work all the year round. In winter, of course, this extra labour is not required, for then after the carcases have hung sufficient time, they are at once taken to the packing room, cut up and salted. Underneath this packing room is a capacious stone cellar 30 feet square, which will be used in winter for thawing out frozen hogs, and also for dry salting and curing hams and bacon for the English market.

On the opposite side of these buildings another range of houses are being put up, and are now nearly finished, for slaughtering, scalding, dressing and packing hogs. The arrangements are such that all these processes will be performed in the least possible time. The tank in which the carcases are sendent will as supplied with heavy of driving an engine of the horse power, which is now being made by Messars Robertson & Sons. In an adioining building the lard and tallow will be rendered by steam supplied by the same boiler, and barrelled up for the market. No part about the animals is wasted. The heads and horns of the cattle are rendered down for gressed and from the feet is made neats foot oil. The blood even is preserved, and carried fin a drain to a large tank, from whence it is taken and spread over the fields as manure. The offal too is also sold for pigs feed or for manure. The dairy is very fairly represented there being no less than fifty-two entries of butter—13 firkins of 56 lbs, each, and 30 crocks and tube—and forty-five entries of cheese. Mr. Benham is the only exhibitor from Wellingtom. The butter is of excellent quality, and highly praised by those well posted in such matters. The principal exhibitors reside in the immediate neighborhood of Kingston, and inafew of the surrounding counties. Of cheese there are twenty-three entries of factory and eighteen of dairy.
