In fat cattle there are about a dozen head of different grades, which could hardly be surpassed. It is noticeable that many of the bulls are entirely too fat, and no doubt the matter will be considered by the judges in making their awards. Galloways do not seem to increase in public favor. The herds shown are generally pure bred, but they seem to be kept more as fancy stock than for any practical excellencies. There are more Durhams than any other breed, but in consequence of lack of room, as noticed above, they are scattered in different parts of the grounds. About 27 superior bulls are shown, with a lot of other Durhams of medium quality. The interest in the examination and comparison of cattle by the many stock raisers present; is great and rapidly increasing.

Among the Durhams Messrs. F. W. Stone, W. B. Telfer, Filkington, J. & R. Hunter, do, J. & W. Watt, do; Wm. Altcheson, Guelph, Wm. Whitelaw, Guelph, J. S. Armstrong, Eramosa, Jas. Anderson, Puslinch, and others from this section are prominent exhibtors. As usual the breeders in Wellington make a spendid show in this class. Messrs. Snell, Miller, and Hon. Geo. Brown also show some very fine Durhams.

In Herefords, Mr. Stone, as in former years is the almost exclusive exhibitor, and shows 20 head of very fine animals. Mr. Geo. Hood, Guelph, exhibit is in this class a superior aged bull, a cow and a heifer, also a 3 year old fat steer, weighing about 2,200 lbs., and a bull calf.

Arrival of the Governor General in Toronto.

His Excellency the Earl of Dufferin, Governor-General of Canada, arrived at Toronto on Tuesday night by the ordinary train from the east, at 11 pm. Considerable preparations had been made for his reception. On the corner of Simcoe and King streets the Ontario Government had erected a triumphant arch. On each side of the arch were the words "Welcome to Ontario" on a transparency, and in the centre, on the west side were the arms of the Province, and on the east the arms of Lord Dufferin, the whole surmounted by a crown.

His Excellency travelled on the ordinary train, the car of Mr. C. J. Brydges, Managing Director of the Grand Trunk Railway, being placed at his disposal. The Governor-General was accompanied by Lady Dufferin, Sir Hastings Doyle, Commander-in-Chief, Col. Fletcher, Lady Harriet Fletcher, and Col. Colthurst. At Prescott, he was met by Hon. R. W. Scott, who accompanied him to Toronto. Lord Dufferin was met by the Lieut-Gevernor of Ontario, the Hon. Wm. Peirce Howland, Col. Cumberland, A. D. C., and Capt. Curtis, A. D. C. The band played the National Anthem on the arrival of the train and on the carsiage entering the grounds of the Government House.

He will leave for Toronto on Friday morning.


