LONDON, Sept. 22.—Work has been resumed in the mills at Bolton, pending the result of an arbitration settlement expected about the end of October. At a meeting of the co-operative board at Manchester, it was resolved to invite Wendell Phillips to the Annual Co-operative Congress in London.

Destruction by Bush F'res.

We give below a lengthy list of property destroyed in the surrounding country by the bush fires that have been raging until last week, when the rain happily concluded their revages. The unusual dryness of the atmosphere and the consequent parched condition of the ground, aided in too large a measure, we fear, by want of judgment or inattention on the part of farmers who were clearing their land, has resulted in most serious loss. In many cases families have been rendered entirely homeless, and the crops gathered after the past season's hard labor, have been in many cases totally destroyed. The following are the losses as far as can be ascertained at present, from our country exchanges, to whom we are indebted for the following:—

The twenty-ninth Provincial Exhibition opened at Toronto on Mondey. The entries this year are about 5,500, and there is every prospect that there will be a successful show. He also made very able defence of the Government policy in regard to the Central Prison. A stupid objection made to this institution by the Opposition is that in employing criminal labor the value of free labor is depreciated. He showed how careful the Government were to avoid this in restricting their work to the construction of cars, and thereby coming as little as possible into serious contact with ordinary trades. Besides is it not to the advantage of the prisoners them selves to be employed in some useful labour instead of idling away their time in county gools and plotting mischief; and is it not also advantageous to the Province, in getting some remuneration from the labour of men whose maintenance would otherwise be only a burden on the people. Before the prison had been in operation four months, it had become self-sustaining. This is surely a gratifying proof of the benefits of such a prison, where men have to work for their living; where they do not cost the taxpayer a cent, and where they are compelled in some measure to restore what their crimes have cost the Province in the administration of justice. 
