When we went down to look at the wreck the next morning the rope was still there, all covered with ice, and the water was dashing up as much as ever. No one could get on board. The captain was still on the boat, and passed down some food he found on the forward table which had been set for the officers. There was a little piece of meat and some bread, all frozen, and it disappeared at once. He sent an axe and a dish down bread, all frozen, and it disappeared at once. At noon some canned salmon and flour drifted ashore, and that was all we had to eat on Friday and Saturday. 

Horticultural Societies. The New Act Comes Into Force February 1st, 1907. As the dates for the annual meetings of the Agricultural and Horticultural Societies are near at hand, our readers will doubt-less be interested in learning something of the laws that will govern the procedure of these accuration

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Regulations Affecting Agricultural and

the iaws that will govern the procedure of these organizations. The new laws come into force on Feb. 1st, 1907, but the next annual meetings of these organizations will be held on the dates fixed under the old act, viz., horti-oultural and township societies on January 9th, and district societies on January 16th, and the usual two weeks notice must be given in local newspaces force because with and the usual two weeks notice must be given in local newspapers together with bills posted in places of common resort. In future societies will no longer be known os "district" and "township" but every society in the township will be placed on the same basis in regard to the receipt of its government grant, and will receive auch grant in proportion to its expenditure for gericultural purposes during the next three

agricultural purposes during the past three years, as shown by their sworn annual statement to the department of agriculture. A deficition of what may be considered "ex-penditure for agricultural purposes" is given in the Act.

Societies will be known by the name and Societies will be known by the name and place where they held their last annual ex-hibition unless they prefer some other, then the new name must be determined by the members thereof, and approved by the minister of agriculture. Under the new law it will not be per-missable for horticultural societies to offer prizes for competition at exhibitions held under the augmines of agricultural societies

inder the aucpices of agricultural societies These last named organizations, however, may use their own funds for the offering of prizes for horticultural exhibits. Hereafter no prizes can be offered for

grade male stock. Spring stallion and cattle shows shall rsceive a special graut equal to one-half the sum expended, but such sum shall not exceed \$50. Where seed fairs are held the

maximum grant shall be \$25. Societies investing in horses, cattle, sheep or swine, for the improvement of stock, will receive a grant ringing from \$50 downward, for each registered male animal in these classes. No society shall be entitled to receive a

grant exceeding \$800.

Under the new Act restrictions in regard to the conducting of games of chance have been made more stringent. The annual meetings to be held in January



Fcance is rent with dissension between c urch and state. Socialism and unrest is guawing at the 1 eart strings of Germany, and the Kaiser knows not what moment his imperial head will fall in the basket. Riot and murder prevail in Russia, and the Czar is practically a prisoner in his own castle to avoid the bomb of an assasin. Austria is awaiting the death of its aged Emperor before inaugurating a civil war. Japan is loaded down with a war debt that is grinding the life out of the people. 

Detendant Acquitted at London Assizes.

The Adelaide horse shooting case, which caused a sensation in that neigh-borhood, came on for trial at London on Thursday of last week. The Free Press has the following report of the proceed-

ings : In the afternoon at the general sessions

ings : In the afternoon at the general sessions a case which brings to light the bitter feelings of a whole neighborhood in Ade-laide was taken up for hearing. Two next-door neighbors go into court over an injury to a horse, which only proved serious enough to disable it for a week, after which time it was as strong and able to work as ever. Another neigh-bor and his son, previously on bad terms with the complainant, patch up a tem-porary trace and join with him to prose-cute the defendant. The case is that of King vs. Harris. Joseph Harris is charged with unlawfully wounding a horse belonging to Peter Mo-Kinney by shooting. Both Harris and McKinney are farmers, living almost directly opposite each other, in Adelaide. McKinney testifies that on June 17th last while he was at his own home he hap-pened to notice his horse, which was on the road, stray into Harris' lane. He went into the house to get his coat be-fore going to drive it out, when he heard a shot fired and looking out of a window saw his horse jump, tura round and run out to the road and towards his house. Immediately afterward he saw a man runnung towards Harris' honse from the

Immediately afterward he saw a man running towards Harris' honse from the point in the latter's orchard, from which the shot had sounded. The upper part of the man's body could not be seen cwing to the intervening branches of an applo tree. On examination the horse

owing to the intervening branches of an apple tree. On examination the horse proved to be peppered with shot on the left side from the neck to the flank. The complainant states that when he questioned Harris afterwards as to whether he had shot the horse, Harris answered: "Yes, and by G-- I'll shoot him again if he comes on my place." McKinney remonstrated: "He didn't do any harm to your property." "That don't make any difference. I want you to keep him off my place, I will shoot any horse that comes on my place," was the way he put it. John McIntyre, a crown witness, also living opposite Harris, stated he had met Harris with a gun. Previous to the shoot.
