The Creston trouble is still unsettled, and any day may bring news of the outbreak of war between Greece and Turkey. The troops of both nations lie on the frontier, and the situation is dangerous to the peace of Europe.

The Dominion estimates for 1897-8 were brought down last week, and aggregate \$44,007,239, of which \$38,111,063 is on account of consolidated fund, and \$6,405,076 on capital account, a decrease of \$114,120 on consolidated fund and an increase of \$8,078,433 on capital account, when compared with the estimates of 1896-7.

By the death of Sunday of Mrs. Sophia Hoyt, widow of the late Alex. Dixon Hoyt of Weymouth, Digby county, has lost a resident. For years considerable interest was taken in the town, and she was a strong and seaworthy, and yet they have succumbed to the rocks of Nova Scotia.

The federation of the Australian colonies is a subject that has been mooted on different occasions during the past few years, but not until recently has the scheme assumed a definite shape.

The Democratic party of the United States are congratulating themselves on having scored a strong victory at the polls in the recent civil election of Chicago, where their candidate, Mr. Carter B. Harrison, was elected to the presidency.

In the British House of Commons last week the secretary of state for the colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain announced that a contract had been signed between Canada and the Dominion of Newfoundland, for a far-reaching service between Canada and Great Britain.

Mr. Quinn has introduced a bill in the Dominion Parliament to enact that no more than 8 per cent. per annum could be collected by process of law after maturity.
