### TERRIBLE FIRES IN WESTERN STATES

#### TOWNS WIPED OUT AND MANY LIVES LOST.

Marionette, Wis., May 19.—The best information obtainable is that the forest fire which is sweeping the country north of here, has reached Iron County, north of Dickinson. This week four counties which are suffering from fire. The area is 200 miles square. The country swept by the flames varies from pine timber land to prairie. Forest is iron mining country and the timber includes immense tracts of coniferous which have never been touched by the axe. In the narrow strips have taken up their

residences and it is for these that the greatest anxiety is felt. Information received at Marquette is that the village of Shafer on the Metropolitan branch of the Northwestern Railroad in Dickinson county, was wiped out. No word has been received as to the loss of life there, if any has occurred. Shafer is a lumber town owned by the Cleveland Cliff Company. The village consisted of a big mill and a couple of hotels, with warehouse and headquarters for the lumber camp.

The village of Saunders, in Iron County, a lumber town directly north of Florence (Wis.), has also been swept by the flames. Here, as at Shafer, many may have met death. The town consists of a few residences, four saloons, a couple of hotels and a big sawmill.

### IS JACK OF ALL TRADES

Darius Chute, Inventor, Farmer, Poultry Raiser, Falls to Dig, Well, Makes Water Run up Hill.

(Published by request.)

Inventor, practical farmer and jack of all trades are the variety of names by which Darius Chute, resident of Worcester for the past twenty years is known. Mr. Chute is now making his home on the lakeside side of Lake Quinsigamond, in a little house which he built with the labor of his hands and the honest sweat of his brow.

About eighteen years ago Mr. Chute became the possessor of an acre of land at the lake, and immediately began to clear it of the trees and underbrush with which it was overgrown. After clearing quite a space he started to build his home.

The house is a strongly built of heavy weathered timber, and instead of clapboards for the outside, sheet tin was used. Though the house is only thirty-six feet long and sixteen feet wide, it is very cosy inside, there being two rooms downstairs and two up.

When a reporter called on Mr. Chute a few days ago, he found him working in the garden at the rear of the house. He said he was very glad to meet a newspaper man once in a while and that he had always been a reader of the Telegram ever since he came to Worcester.

Mr. Chute then took the reporter over his property, showing him a great collection of angora rabbits, of which he is very proud. On one side of the yard there is a large inclosure in which are kept a stock of 150 hens. There are also on the farm a number of ducks. The reporter was then introduced to the horse and the watchdog, Jack. After a peep at the rabbits and other diversions, Mr. Chute then invited the reporter into the house.

The main room, which is the living room and well as dining room for Mr. and Mrs. Chute, is the largest and coolest room in the house. Just off this room is a tiny kitchen with spotless floor and shining range. Mr. Chute is proud of his little nest, he calls it, and said that though it is not a palace it is home.

After leaving the house, Mr. Chute then told of the greatest inconvenience about the whole place. He has been trying for the past thirteen years or more to sink well near the house, but, on account of quirkiness, he can get no further than forty feet. That there is plenty of water in the spot where he started his work, he is sure, for, according to him, his register showed thirty feet.

Mr. Chute abandoned the idea of the well last fall, and just before the winter started in, he invented a contrivance by which he could draw water from a well in a hollow nearly five rods away to within a few feet of the front door. Though he has not had it patented, he is not afraid that any one will steal his idea and make use of it, and he also claims to be one of the first men to make water run up hill.

Des Moines, Ia., May 26.—The debate over the proposed Presbyterian book of forms ended in the general assembly here late this afternoon in a compromise in which all the words "FRUIT-A-LIVES" were stricken from the resolutions and the text and title pages of the book. The resolution of opposition was adopted. It declares specifically that the book is unauthorized. The book of forms will be published under the title "The Book of Forms for the Presbyterian Church." By its action the assembly virtually rescinded the decision of those who were conducting the campaign to obtain their indisputable rights. She asserted that the cabinet ministers who opposed the movement were marked men, and suggested that her sisters break the windows of Mr. Asquith's home, adding that she would do so herself were it not for the fact that she was engaged in domestic work. ### English Women If Refused Votes Must Refuse to Pay Taxes

London, May 26.—Mrs. Dora Montefiore, one of the leading women suffragists, under whose leadership women have pledged themselves not to pay their taxes on the ground that taxation without representation is tyranny, harranged a great crowd of women suffragists from the second story of her house near London this morning. She denounced Chancellor of the Exchequer Asquith as an assassin because he stood in the way of the advance of the women's movement and the determination of Ireland, Bryce and Captain John Sinclair, secretary for Scotland, were also present.

Mrs. Montefiore informed her hearers that the women who were refusing to pay taxes were taking this course in order to advance the education of the cabinet ministers, and warned the latter of the determination of those who were conducting the campaign to obtain their indisputable rights. She asserted that the cabinet ministers who opposed the movement were marked men, and suggested that her sisters break the windows of Mr. Asquith's home, adding that she would do so herself were it not for the fact that she was engaged in domestic work. Friends of Mrs. Montefiore are supplying her with food.

# DOMINION EXHIBITION HALIFAX, September 22 - October 5

**Local and Special News.**  
Today is nomination day to fill the vacancy in the town council caused by the resignation of Joseph I. Lloyd. It is said that Karl Freeman will be the only candidate nominated.  
Commencing June let the S. S. Ferry Rupper of the Dominion Atlantic Railway will perform a daily service (Sunday excepted) between St. John and Digby, leaving St. John at 7.45 a. m., and Digby at 2 p. m.  
A special meeting of the town council was held last Friday evening. Councillors Chute, Longmire and DeWitt were appointed a committee to interview the owners of the land which will be wanted to carry out the proposed water extension and to get their rates.  
At the annual spring convocation of McGill University, the degrees of B. Sc., (ad eundem gradum), and M. Sc., were conferred on R. S. Bohner, of Paradise, Mr. Bohner, in company with a party of five, shortly leaves for a three months' prospecting, exploring and scientific trip in the northern parts of Ontario and Quebec.  
A special meeting will be held in the Salvation Army hall tonight led by Ensign Prince, of Moncton, N. B. Tomorrow night a nationality meeting will be given. Ensign Prince, Captains Wyld and McGillivray, Lieutenants Smith and Chief of Police Bowles, of Digby and others will take part, each wearing the national costume of the country they represent. Watch the street parade.  
"Empire Day" passed off very quietly in town. As far as weather conditions were concerned it was all that could be expected. Large numbers left town, some to Hampton and Port Lorne, and many tried their luck on the streams and lakes. The shoot for the Daniels' cup attracted many and resulted in a win for B. M. Williams with a score of 35.

Through the kindness of the Foresters their room over the Monitor office has been placed at his disposal and those interested in the movement are requested to meet there at eight o'clock. A silver collection will be taken.

It is expected that this committee will report today.
