INTRODUCTORY.

The Salon held yearly in Paris, is the most important annual exhibition of works of art. As in the British and American Academies, the Salon exhibitions are entirely controlled by artists, the rewards being bestowed by a jury elected by exhibitors. These rewards are:—Honorable Mention; Medals of a Third, Second and First Class; and a unique Medal of Honour. Artists are admitted by the Government, to the Legion of Honour, for professional distinction. Some exhibitors are exempted from criticism by the Salon jury of admission, and are entitled to have their works hung as a matter of right, these artists are indicated as Ex. H. C. (*Hors Concours*) indicates that the artist has received Salon honours, which remove him from competition for all but the Unique Medal of Honour. As with scarcely an exception the artists whose names are found in this Catalogue exhibit in the Salon or the Royal Academy Exhibitions, it has been thought unnecessary to indicate this in each case. R S A, Royal Scottish Academician.

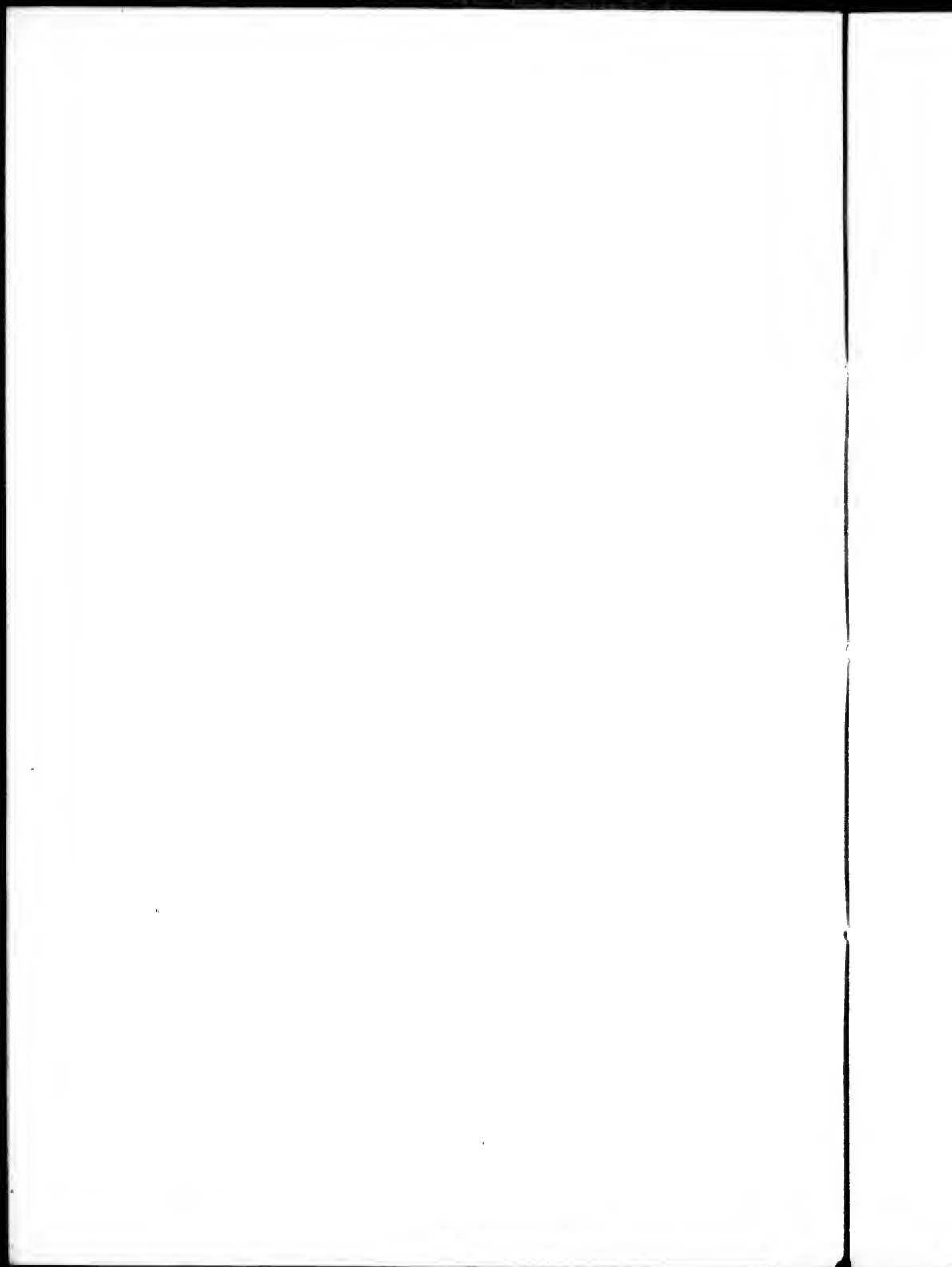

Born 1836, a native of Holland. First studied at Fine Arts Academy of Antwerp. Afterwards in studio of Baron Leys. Naturalized as an Englishman 1873. Royal Academician 1879. Is a frequent exhibitor at the Paris Salons, where he has received high awards. A member of all the principal Continental Academies, and Knight of many foreign orders.

Corot is a poet. Nature is subjective to his mental vision. He is no seer, is not profound, but is sensitive, and as it were clairvoyant, seeing the spirit more than the forms of things. There is a bewitching mystery and suggestiveness in his apprehension of a landscape, united to a pensive joyousness and absorption of self in the scene, that is very uncommon in his race.

Millais commenced his artistic career as a member of the pre-raphaelite brotherhood, in company with Holman Hunt and Dante Gabriel Rossetti. Of late years he has chiefly devoted his talents to painting portraits, but has occasionally produced landscapes of great merit. His "Chill October" was exhibited in the Universal Exhibition in Paris, 1878, with other works, all of which attracted universal attention.

In 1838 he visited Greece and Egypt, and in 1841 joined the government expedition to Lycia, making many valuable sketches, which after his death were sold, fetching very high prices, the competition to possess them being extreme. Muller is represented in the National Gallery by two fine paintings, and in the South Kensington Museum by eight Water-Colour Drawings.

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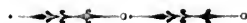
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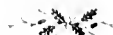
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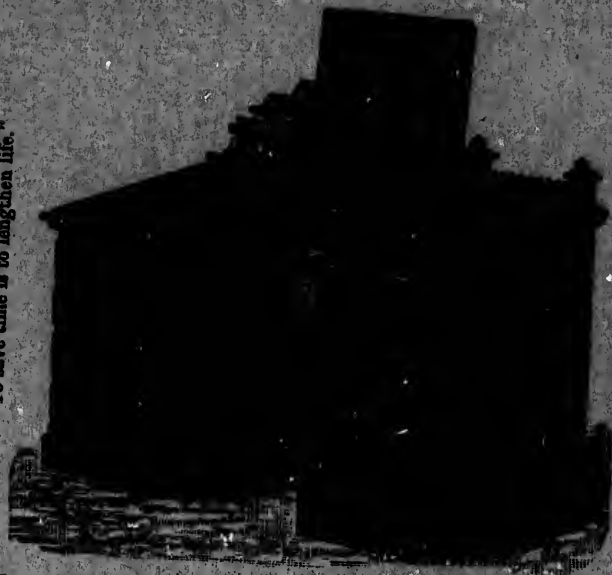


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
