

### NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842.

Its objects are:

 A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to struggling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of churches and parsonages.

3. A Widows and Orphans' Fund for the clergy,

4. A pension Fund for aged and infirm clergy.

5. To provide bibles, prayer books, and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

6. To aid struggling congregations in maintaining schools

for their children.

7. To receive and transmit contributions towards the Missionary Diocese of Algonia, or towards missions to the heathen in foreign lands.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the clergy, the Church Wardens, and others elected by the Society.

(b.) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Education, the Depository, the Land and the Investment Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee which manages (a) the Episcopal Endowment Fund, (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the clergy reserves, and (c.) the endowment funds of the several missions and congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions composed of elergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the

Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of the Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries.

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### ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting was held on Wednesday, 7th of February, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, in the National School.

The Lord Bishop in the Chair.

The reports of Central Board, Diocesan Board and Clergy Trust Fund were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed.

A lengthy and interesting report was presented from the District Association of St. Francis which was received and ordered to be printed.

The valuable report of the position of the Sherbrooke Depository was ordered to be printed.

The Treasurers of the Society, the Diocesan Board and the Clergy Trust Fund presented their reports which were adopted and ordered to be printed.

The Vice Presidents with the addition of the name of Mr. Edwin A. Jones were re-elected.

The Rev. C. B. Washer, Messrs. R. R. Dobell, J. E. Price, and Mrs. G. B. Hall were elected Life members.

Fifty persons were elected members of the Corporation.

Twenty gentlemen were elected members of the Central Board.

The members of the Clergy Trust Committee and of the Diocesan Board were re-elected.

Mr. Wurtele's motion changing the hour of the annual meeting from ten in the forenoon until two in the afternoon was then considered and finally adopted.

The following alteration was made in the form of the Trust Deed of Endowments funds, viz: the insertion of the words "the entire revenue" instead of the words "said revenue of four hundred dollars per annum."

Votes of thanks were passed to the Honorary Counsel and Auditors of the Society.

The Lord Bishop closed the meeting with the Benediction.

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# ANNUAL REPORT OF CENTRAL BOARD FOR 1876.

PRESENTED TO THE SOCIETY, FEBRUARY 7, 1877.

It is with great thankfulness to Almighty God that the Central Board is able to report the satisfactory state of the Church in this Diocese.

The increase of life within our Communion has been observed by all, and, taking into consideration the long continued depression in trade, the receipts for the various funds under the management of the Church Society are more than we could have anticipated.

Our people, few in number as they are, are distributed over a large extent of country, and many of them unable to aid in any appreciable degree the operations of the Society; but from the generally healthy tone of Church feeling there is good reason to hope, that from year to year each parish will do more towards maintaining its own work: there are, how ever, some parishes whose Spiritual wants have been supplied with a generous hand, but are yet slow to learn the lesson that their own free-will offerings are looked for to aid the young and struggling Missions.

### GENERAL FUND.

There is a decrease of \$220 88 during the year. The Congregations of the Diocese are reminded that it is from this fund alone that grants are made for Church Purposes other than the payments of Clerical Stipends.

### WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

There has been a slight decrease, \$43.74. The fund, however, continues in a flourishing condition. An increase has been made during the year in the pensions to children from \$24 to \$40 each.

The following form of medical certificate to be used by clergymen seeking the benefits of the fund has been adopted by the society, viz: "This is to certify that I have this day thoroughly and carefully examined the Reverend

### BEQUESTS.

It is with deep gratitude that your Board records the receipt of the very handsome legacy of one thousand dollars from the executrix (Miss Hall) of the late Mr. John Hall, of Leeds, a gentleman noted for his steady and generous support of the church in his own locality: also the handsome

sum of eight hundred dollars (\$400 for the general fund and \$400 for the Widows' and Orphans' fund) from Messrs. Edward and C. Montizumbert, executors of the lute Miss Taylor.

The society begs to suggest to any friends who may by their will desire to bequeath money or property, that suitable "forms of bequests and devises by will" are to be found at the end of the annual report.

And the society respectfully ventures to point outthat into the discharge of the stewardship of money wherewith Christian people may have been intrusted, the dying disposition of some portion of such wealth—for charitable—purposes legitimately enters.

And although the church amongst ourselves has not hitherto derived benefit from this interpretation of Christian responsibility proportionate to the bequests made for like uses elsewhere, the society believes that this has arisen from inadvertence, and that the omission, being remarked, will be remedied.

### OBITUARY,

The hand of death has been busy amongst us during the past year.

One who served his Master faithfully and well in days gone by as missionary at Riviere du Loup, en bas, and Chicoutimi, has passed away. For some years he has been but little known, he having been confined to his room, a confirmed invalid from rheumatism; he spent his last days an inmate of the "Church Home," and all who had the privilege of seeing and knowing the late Reverend E. G. W. Ross will bear consentient testimony that he was a true specimen of what a Christian should be, meek, gentle, loving and patient.

The Society also with much sorrow refers to the loss sustained in the death of the late Miss Taylor, of Quebec City. It is not too much to say that this lamented lady had been a

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faithful and wise servant of her Lord and Heavenly Father—"a woman that feareth the Lord" says the Scripture "she

shall be praised."

Her whole life had been spent in the fear of the Lord. She was distinguished for quiet unobtrusive picty, and love of God. A kind friend to the poor and the orphan in their distress and ever generous in furthering the objects of the Church. She was truly a noble contributor to our funds, and one who never forgot the needs of the most difficult of our missions, viz, that on the coast of Labrador.

Our consolation is that her works do follow her.

In the death of Mr. John Hall, of the county of Megantic, the Church has lost a warm and generous supporter. He ever evinced a keen interest in the prosperity of the Mission of Leeds, and of the work of the Society in the Diocese.

In Mr. Chas. King, of Lyster, the Society has lost a Life member, and one who ever took an active interest in furthering the Missionary efforts of the Church in his own locality.

Another old supporter and Life member, Mr. G. B. Hall, who was an annual, and liberal subscriber to the Society's funds, has passed away from amongst us.

A loss has also been sustained in the death of Mr.W. Drum, a Life member of the Society.

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The chief feature to be noted in the above statement as compared with that for 1875 is the much smaller balance in hand with which to meet the drafts of the Clergy for the first two or three quarters of the year. A large portion of the revenue of your Board does not reach the hands of the Treasurer till the close of the year, hence the desirability of leaving a sufficient balance in hand at its commencement.

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Last Statement included a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund but none appears in the statement for 1876. The Treasurer could not positively affirm that a grant was needed to meet present expenditure; and your Board therefore, did not make application at the close of the year. Should however the money be actually needed during the course of 1877 your Board will claim such an amount as may be necessary to carry on its operations.

In the report for 1875, it was announced that owing to the depressed condition of trade throughout the country no attempt had been made to obtain any increase of assessment from the various congregations aided by the Board.

The hope, however, was at the same time expressed that matters would have so far improved as to hold out the prospect of a considerable increase for 1877.

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That hope it appears was not destined to be fulfilled so soon as anticipated. Your Board appointed deputations and took all the necessary steps to hold conferences with the congregations, but remontrances of so strong a character were offered by the Deanery of St. Francis against the expediency of such a course that, supported as they were by allegations of increased depression in business affecting all classes of the community, it was deemed advisable to postpone the matter till better times and reviving industries should justify our expectations.

Some years having passed since the Diocesan Board has confered by deputations with the congregations and explained to them any points in the details of its administration about which misconceptions may have arisen, it may not be without some good result, if an attempt is here made to explain very briefly the grounds upon which one or two of its rules are based.

The points about which any misunderstanding may have arisen are contained in the following rule.

"Whenever any congregation in a mission allows its

assessment to fall into arrear for three months the Treasurer is required to withhold from the Clergyman's Quarterly stipend a sum not less than the Quarter's contribution from such congregation, and the Clergyman is required at once to give out on two Sundays — or at his discretion on one Sunday only — the following notice publicly in the Church or place where the congregation meets for Divine service.

"Notice is hereby given that the contribution due from this congregation to the Diocesan Board not having been paid, the services will after Sunday next (or from this day) be suspended by order of the Bishop until the payment as agreed upon is made."

This rule it is intented so far to alter as to provide that the Clergyman shall in all cases hold divine service once after the notice is first given.

The attention of Clergy and Congregations is requested in limine to two points. 1st. That the Board cannot pay the stipends of the Clergy unless the assessments are paid. 2nd. That the duty of bringing congregations up to a self-supporting condition as soon as possible is being continually pressed upon the Board by the Society of the Propagation of the Gospel.

Bearing these two facts in mind, then, congregations must readily admit that when they fall into arrear in their assessment and break their agreement with the Board, it becomes a matter of necessity to close the mission, and give the services of the clergyman elsewhere. Believing, however, that, in many instances the failure to remit the assessments may have arisen, in so far as regards a large part of the congregations, from inadvertence, the Board deems it only fair to the members of the congregation, that before the mission is closed they should be told, in such manner as will most effectually convey the information to all, the exact state of the case; and only fair to the clergyman, that he should

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not be subjected to the inconvenience of removal until the facts of the case have been placed before the whole congregation.

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The duty of giving the notice of the suspension of services devolves upon the Clergyman. This is no doubt looked upon by many as a haudship but there does not appear to be any good reason for deeming it such, since the Clergyman in giving the notice is merely acting as the agent of the Diocesan Board which leaves him no discretion in the matter. Were he directed to hold or with hold the notice at his discretion, then a responsibility would be east upon his shoulders rendering his position a very hard one indeed but he is spared all the possible odium of the act by being deprived of any discretionary power.

The following resolution passed unanimously at a meeting of the Deanery of St. Francis has been received by the Board but not in time for due consideration before the report to the Church Society is presented.

"That in any case in which it may be necessary to give notice of suspension of services in any Congregation it is the sense of the Clergy of this Deanery that the Rural Dean or some other Clergyman appointed by the Rural Dean should be sent to give such notice, having first made such efforts as he can, to remove any difficulty which may exist."

Your Board having reason to fear that there may be among the clergy some few who are not so thoroughly in accord with its wishes and objects as to give it that hearty sympathy and assistance in their respective spheres of labour, so necessary to a successful discharge of its duties, would observe that the obvious benefits accruing to the clergy since the constitution of the Diocesan Board—in the regular quarterly payment of their stipends and their freedom from the vexation of collecting a portion of it from their congregations would seem to create a fair claim upon them for earnest co-operation. Nor should it be lost sight

of, that the aid of the clergy in fostering a spirit of self-support among their congregations, was one of the chief objects contemplated when the old system was superseded. Formerly it was impossible without mis-conception for the clergyman to urge his people to contribute more generously towards the maintenance of the Church's Ministrations since the increase went directly into his own pocket.

Now no direct benefit accrues to him and he can justly claim for his efforts that they are free from self-interest.

That the Board does receive most valuable aid from the great majority of the clergy is gratefully acknowledged and abundantly testified in many ways—for whilst no decrease—but on the contrary, a very considerable increase has been made of late years to the funds of the Church Society from the country parts, the assessments of the Diocesan Board amount to nearly \$8000 being at least \$6000 more than the elergy formerly received directly from their congregations. This result, which, considering the circumstances of the Diocese, emphatically evidences the success of the present system, could not have been attained had the efforts of the Diocesan Board been only feebly seconded by the clergy.

That no cause for discouragement exists in the present condition of missionary operations is upon the whole amply testified in the details of the work carried on furnished by the reports of the elergy, which are hereunto annexed.

It would be invidious to make special mention of any particular report when so many are full if interest. The careful and complete abstract of the reports of the clergy within the district of St. Francis prepared by the secretary of the Deanery is of more than ordinary value and gives at a glance a coneise view of the work accomplished during the past year in that important part of the Diocese.

But few permanent changes have taken place during the past year.

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In the month of May the Revd. E. A. W. King was appointed to the united mission of Magog and Georgeville.

In the month of August the Revd. A. W. H. Chowne was appointed to the mission of Rivière-du-Loup with the Quarantine Station, at Grosse Isle.

The resignation of the Revd. L. O. Armstrong has created a vacancy in the mission of Brompton and Windsor. Mr. Peter Roe, shortly to be ordained, has since the close of the year been appointed to this mission.

The mission of Shigawake is still umprovided with a resident clergyman.

The excellent and interesting report of the Revd. J. H. Sweet, however, will show that much has been done to supply the congregations of that large mission with the ministrations of the church.

# SAINT FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIATION OF THE CHURCH SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF QUEBEC.

### REPORT FOR 1876.

If there be but one feature in the aspect of the Church in this District which should give rise to our thankfulness to the giver of all good; and increase our faith in God's watchful care, it is, that in the midst of the cloudy atmosphere of our township progress the Church has not been forgotten, or its members backward to meet its wants.

The efforts which have been made during the past year to promote the objects of the Society have not been without

tokens of the Divine blessing.

The work of the year preceding that which is just drawing to a close, was a year fruitful in many great objects, especially in that of Church building, so that, if the reports of the Clergy are not so full of the evidences of devotion to God's work, it is not to be attributed to less zeal on their part, or less interest in the Church's welfare on the part of the laity.

The financial statements this year, show in the aggregate a less sum of \$1247.25 than last year; but if we deduct from last years total the sums raised under special circumstances for church building, which amount to \$3349.00 it will give an increase to the general contributions for church purposes of about \$703.00 this year. This under the pressure of the financial difficulties of the country, ought to be viewed as an index of the Church's prosperity.

Comparing the energies which have been put forth during the past year, we must acknowledge thankfully, that there has been blessing fully proportioned to the efforts made.

The reports of the Clergy will more fully exhibit this feeling from which some particulars are here submitted.

### ACTON.

The sum raised in this mission is less than last year by

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\$1141.22, but last year the large sum of \$1360 was raised for a Parsonage. The incumbent speaks in very encouraging terms of the future prospects of this Mission. An influx of English laborers has greatly increased the attendance at the House of God; and he confidently looks with fair hopes for the material prosperity of the Church in Acton.

### MISSION OF BURY.

The sum raised in this mission exceeds that of last year by \$1204.27, which sum comprises funds raised from the four Churches which constitute the mission. When the present missionary entered upon his work two of the Churches were closed, he now reports those two as among the most flourishing of the mission.

### MISSION OF COATICOOK.

The sum raised in Coaticook exceeds that of last year by \$248.10 notwitstanding the regret which the Incumbent feels at the removal from the Mission of many Church families and of others, who, although not members of our Communion used to attend the services regularly and contribute fairly towards the general expenditure of the mission.

The financial success of the mission is attributed (1) to a series of entertainments the proceeds of which were devoted to paying off the parsonage debt, (2) to the exertions of the Ladies Sewing Society.

### MISSION OF DANVILLE.

This mission shows an increase over last year of \$15.32. No report accompanies this fluancial statement.

### MISSION OF DRUMMONDVILLE.

This mission shows a loss sum than last year by \$387.83. Its missionary reports "Financially speaking this parish has been during the past year in a struggling condition and the meeting each quarters assessment has cost a vigorous effort," this is attributed to business failures and stagnation in the lumber trade.

The attendance at Divine Service and at the Lord's Supper has improved. The Mission has in view the building a Parsonage.

### MISSION OF EATON.

The Mission of Eaton shows a sum in excess of last year of \$388 55. The sum of \$451.00 is part of subscriptions running over three years and only accounted for in this years account. The work of the summer has been the erection of a tower to our beautiful little gothic stone church, and the purchase of a bell.

#### ISLAND BROOK.

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An offshoot of the Mission of Eaton had its church consecrated on the 19th of March. It still requires a bell, lights, and an alter cloth.

### MISSION OF HATLEY.

Hatley shows a decrease compared with last year of \$243.75. Very liberal contributions were made to several special objects last year.

Twice during the summer this mission was favoured with a visit from the Bishop of New-Hampshire, who in the absence of the Lord Bishop of Quebec, and under peculiar circumstances, administered the sacrament of Baptism and the rite of Confirmation.

#### MISSION OF HEREFORD.

No financial statement has reached your Secretary from this mission.

In financial matters the missionary reports "little progress has been made owing to the hard times. The Sunday Schools have suffered from the lack of teachers. The Church at Barford has been completed and with twenty one acres of land has been deeded to the Bishop. This edifice is to be consecrated on Sunday next. The experience of the missionary of Hereford is in favour of a division of our more extensive missions; his present sunday duties oblige him to travel 1300 miles annually, this added to pastoral visits, is a serious dray back to a missionary's usefulness.

### MISSION OF KINGSEY.

Kingsey shows a less sum than last year by \$664.10. This sum is qualified by \$700 which was raised last year towards the New Church. There are four Sunday Schools, numbering nearly 100 children with seven teachers.

### PARISH OF LENNOXVILLE.

Lennoxville shows an increase over the sum raised last year of \$30,30.

No report accompanies this financial statement.

### MISSION OF MAGOG.

No financial return was made from Magog last year. This

year the sum of \$225.10 is reported.

In a lengthy and interesting report the Missionary states that throughout the mission the number of Church going people does not bear a creditable proportion to the number of inhabitants. Very many make no profession and are unbaptized. Magog has a good church edifice, free from debt, the most pressing need in view of the permanency of the mission is a Parsonage, but the people seem indisposed, perhaps are not very well able just now to make any effort in addition to what they promise the Diocesan Board.

### GEORGEVILLE.

Is connected with the Mission of Magog. The financial statement from Georgeville shows a less sum than last year

by \$456.24.

A large amount viz \$450.00 was raised last year to pay off the debt on the Church, a debt which has been hanging over it for several years and now reduced to \$136.32, this has been so far successfully brought about by its late incumbent Mr. Smith and some ladies of the congregation, who have resolved to contribute and collect until the debt is removed. The church needs repairs to the amount of \$200 or \$300.00.

The Sunday Schools are in good working order with valuable assistant teachers.

### BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE.

The Reverend Professor Roe reports, the services at Milby, Moulton Hill, Mitchells, Ascot Corner and Sandhill are still kept up regularly from Bishop's College, ten of the Divinity Students being engaged in this work. At all the stations good service we hope is being done; and at all, we think we can see from time to time the cheering evidences of God's blessing.

The Church at Ascot Corner was consecrated on the Friday

before Whitsunday, the attendance was large and the service hearty the Rural Déan and seven of the clergy were present. On the morning of Whitsunday the Lord Bishop confirmed five persons at Accet Corner.

#### PARISH OF SHERBROOKE.

Sherbrooke has an increase over last year of \$56.25. The subscription list to the Church Society is largely increased, giving a sum of \$86.00 over last year. This increase the Co-Rector attributes to the energy of Lady collectors. Six Ladies in the congregation willingly undertook the trust and most efficiently discharged it, thus relieving the Clergyman from the extremely difficult and questionable work of canvassing so large a congregation personally. Forty new subscribers appear on this years list.

#### MISSION OF STANSTEAD.

\$243.79 appear as the increase over the sum raised in

this mission last year.

The prominent work of the mission is the erection, of a Church School house in which to hold the School under the auspices of the Church Society and the Colonial and continental Church Society which is already doing a good work in the mission.

#### MISSION OF DURHAM.

Durham reports the sum of \$443 38 under last year. In last years account we find a large building fund \$512 00 and a special gift of \$200.00. An endowment fund has been commenced amounting to \$660.00. During the year the Lord Bishop visited this mission twice, once to hold an ordination and once to hold a confirmation. Upon the first occasion the Rev A. Stevens and the Incumbent were admitted to priests orders, upon the second, eleven persons were Confirmed.

No reports from Compton, Dudswell, Melbourne, or

Brompton.

## ACTON.

Since last report no alteration has taken place in the management of this mission; Upton still remains in con

nection with it and claims one half of the clergyman's

Sunday duties.

The prospects of the mission are good, as there has been during the year quite an influx of English speaking, pepulation, most of whom are day labourers, who have obtained employment at the mines and quarry in the vicinity. It is pleasing to note the proportionate increase in the attendance at the house of the Lord, and many in the words of the prophet, now say, Come ye and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord to the house of the God of Jacob; and be will teach as his ways and we will walk in his paths" the remark, often made heretofore, that the church was built too large for the congregation, is no longer applicable, for often the building is now crowded.

One now looks with agreeable surprise on the number of worshippers present at the church services and wonders

from where they come.

At the present time about seventy five hands are employed at the upper mines and about fifty at the slate quarry and next spring the staff will be much increased.

Another privilege we have, is the regular running of the trains on the South Eastern Railroad branch between Acton

Vale and Sorel.

So we can confidently look with fair hopes for the material prosperity, of the Church. Our finances, it is true, are low. but gradually we are lifting our head above the troublesome waves of debt.

As we improve financially, may we not be backward in our spiritual progress, but may we "grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ." By our offertory we raised \$114.90.

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### BARFORD AND HERRFORD.

In reviewing the work of the past year there is much that seems encouraging.

Regular forthightly services have been held at the four stations, Dixville, Stanhope, Hereford and Perryboro.

Though many families have left the mission the congrega-

tions have not decreased.

In financial untters the mission has made but very little progress, but this is owing more to the "hard times" than to any unwillingness on the part of the people to contribute.

The various Sunday Schools have suffered from a lack of teachers and from the fact that they are held only once a fortuight. I have a Confirmation class in each of the four stations and several adults preparing for Baptism.

At Dixville, where I reside, the congregation has increased

and the responding improved.

The average attendance has been about forty. At the request of the Church Warden and leading members of the congregation collections have only been taken up on communion Sundays, that those who have nothing to give might not be ashamed to come.

The Church in Barford has been completed, and will be consecrated and opened for service on the 17th of December next. The Church with 21 acres of land has been deeded to the Bishop, in trust for the mission, by the family of the late Dr. Ward. When regular services are held here, tifty dollars a year will be added to the assessment.

At Stanhope and Norton many families have left owing to the shutting down of the Mills; and if they are not opened again (which I believe depends upon the result of the Presidential election) I fear we shall not be able to collect our present assessment for the Diocesan Board. The average attendance here has been twenty five.

At Hereford there seems to be more interest taken in regard to Church affairs and the congregation is increasing. The average attendance for the year has been about forty five.

At Perryboro the services are very fairly attended and the

responding and singing generally hearty.

On two occasions owing to the almost impassable state of the roads I was not able to reach there in time for service.

The number of professed communicants in the mission is as follows—Dixville 14; St. Lawrence Barford 14; Stanhope 5; Hereford 17; Perryboro 5; total 55.

The number of confirmation candidates is about 30.

A year's experience confirms my first impression that

Barford and Hereford can never be satisfactorily worked together. In order to keep up the fortnightly service at the two Hereford stations for a year, the missionary from Dixville has to travel 1300 miles, and when to this is added the distance passed over in visiting a scattered population and the necessary travel in visiting and keeping up the service in Barford, it forms an amount of labour which taxes the energy of both the missionary and his horse.

I wish to acknowledge my indebtedness to the Rev. Mr. Burrage of Hatley, and to the Rev. M. Smith of Island Pond, Vt., for assistance in administering the Holy Communion while I was in deacon's orders, and to Capt E. P. Lee of the U.S. Customs at Island Pond for valuable assistance as a

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR. (NO REPORT.)

CAPE COVE.

A peculiarly uneventful year having nearly reached its

close, I proceed as usual to furnish the Society with my

report, though the materials are of the scantiest.

I am thankful to say the services of the Church have been, as usual, regularly held and well attended. Our Cape Cove Sunday School, which was kept open as long as practicable, had an attendance during fine weather of about seventy children, and the zeal and assiduity of the teachers was most

praiseworthy.

The work upon our new church building was checked early in the year, in the first place through the earpenters being obliged to transfer their labours to the contractor's brigantine, which having unfortunately come ashore last fall, it was necessary to launch in spring: and in the second place to their subsequent employment for a considerable period in the erection of a steam grist-mill, also belonging to the contractor, the only mill of the kind on this coast. However, time was found to board in the frame and shingle the roof; and it is to be hoped that the work will proceed without interruption next season.

Three day-schools, under careful and efficient teachers, are now in operation in the mission; a fourth will I trust soon

be opened at Percé.

I regret to mention that the past year's fishery has been the most unsuccessful ever experienced here. In the face of real difficulties and the absolute want of money in the place, to have made frequent appeals would have been not only illtimed but useless; collections for several of the purposes contemplated by the Church Society, were, in consequence

left unattempted.

In my joint capacity of Rural Dean and School-Inspector I have the pleasure and advantage of meeting my Brethren of the Clergy throughout the district, twice every year. I would be less than grateful if 1 did not record the kindly and hospitable reception I invariably meet with; and the valuable assistance they ever cheerfully afford me in examining the schools within their respective missions. That their interest in education produces excellent results 1 have the best reason to know.

I have to notice very thankfully a handsome donation of seventy five dollars towards our new church from Robert

Hamilton, Esq.

## WILLIAM GORE LYSTER.

#### COATICOOK.

During the year, which is now drawing to its close, the work of the Church, in this mission, has been carried on pretty much as in former years.

Owing to the collapse of the "Tolley Manufacturing Company's" works, at North Coaticook, and the consequent removal of the operatives and overseers of the Company, the services at that Station are but thinly attended, and this must be the case until the works are revived.

I have to regret the removal from the mission of many church families, and of others, who although not members of our Communion, used to attend the services regularly, and contribute fairly towards the general expenditure of the mission.

During last winter several of the members of the two congregations in the mission organized, and most successfully carried through, a series of entertainments, from which upwards of five hundred dollars were realized towards paying off the debt on the Parsonage. We purpose having similar entertainments, for the same objects, this winter, though owing to the hard times we do not hope to realize so much money by them. The outside of St. Stephen's Church has been painted and repaired, and the inside tastefully tinted, two handsome chandeliers and matting for the aisles have also been added during the present year.

Remainder; having deducted amount necessary to make up assessment to Diocesan Board.

Towards defraying the expenses of these improvements, the Ladies' Sewing Society have contributed the sum of sixtyfive dollars.

A new shed, to replace the one which was blown down last spring, has been erected at Christ Church, North Coaticook, at a cost of about 25 dollars.

A balance of 35 dollars which was due on the Cabinet

Organ in this Church, has also been paid.

Three full Services, and two Sunday Schools, are held every Lord's Day. The Holy Communion is administered once a month, Parochial visiting is kept up as usual.

The Church School is very well attended, and is doing much good, under the very efficient management of Miss Sutton, who also takes an active part in the Sunday School.

My wardens have been most kind and efficient in the discharge of their duties, for which they have my warmest thanks.

#### COOKSHIRE-EATON.

The mission of Eaton shows a sum in excess of last year of \$388.55. The sum of \$451.00 is part of subscription running over three years and only accounted for in this year's report.

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This mission has been stirred up to a little activity during the past summer, the fruits of which appear in a tower which has been added to our beautiful little Gothic Stone Church. This tower it is hoped, will be completed with a spire next spring. A bell (purchased by the guild of St. Peter's and the proceeds of the Ladies' Sewing Society) is expected to be in the tower by Christmas Day. We have long been without the sound of our Church going bell, and all hearts seem gladdened by the prospect of having a bell of our own.

Island Brook. - An offshoot of the Mission of Eaton, had its neat little Church consecrated on the 19th of March. This Church is out of debt and was mainly built by outside subcriptions aided by a grant from the Church Society and one from the S.P.C.K.

Island Brook, twelve years ago, was a dense forest, and since ther many Church of England people have settled there. Several from my old mission of Valcartier whom I had baptized there thirty years ago now bring their children to Island Brook Church for Baptism. They all love their Church and are willing to do what they can for its progress, but many of them are just commencing anew a bush life and cannot do much.

We require for this church a bell, lamps and altar cloth, too much almost even to think of at present.

### DUDSWELL, WESTBURY & ADJACENT PARTS.

Regular ministrations have been maintained in every possible part of the mission during the year, with scarcely a

single failure from any cause.

The services at South Ham which have been regularly given since 1850 have been transferred to the Ham Road, a point five miles nearer home. The cause has already been specified, French colonization. The attendance at this new point is encouraging. This new station consists of only twelve families of Protestants and has already a mixture of French. The services in the new church at Westbury have been very well attended. The people evidently take a pride in their new church and exhibit a greater reverence than when worshipping in the Common School House. Indeed my experience goes to prove that to a large extent church services afforded in School Houses are a failure, and particularly the unseemliness is the more apparent when you attempt to administer the Holy Communion. Better by far, if nothing more can be done, to build a log house with such appointments at it could afford, than to occupy the best school houses in the country.

At two other points I have monthly services—Dudswell

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Corner and the River School House, the former four miles from Marbleton the latter six. So soon as circumstances will admit some more church building will be necessary at

or near these places.

I had for a long time indulged the hope that with the opening of the Quebec Central Railway and the development of the Lime Trade, we should have had a considerable addition to our English speaking population and a consequent increase of means for carrying on the work of the Church and Schools in this mission, but fear we shall profit little. A general and apparently pre concerted rush was made by the French, not only to monopolize the work at the Kilns, but to take possession of the village also. How we shall hold our own with this new element remains to seen. One thing is certain that with the new political views and claims of the French in this Province there is no more hope of working with them in anything than there is of mixing oil with water.

To summarize my Sunday work, I have morning and evening services at St. Paul's, Marbleton, every Sunday with an afternoon service at Westbury Church or some out station every afternoon; so that I have three full services every

Sunday with a fourth service every fourth Sunday.

My Sunday Schools have been kept going as well as circumstances admit of. The want of means and persons qualified

for the work is a great drawback.

The model school is doing a good work. The only fear I entertain with regard to it, is the result of French colonization upon our numbers. The standard of work is well maintained and I trust we shall continue to deserve the reputation given us in the report of the Government Committee of Protestant higher education.

The Marbleton Church has had a new timber roof put in,

and a re-painting of the exterior.

Through the munificent aid and encouragement of that untiring friend of the Church and Clergy, R. Hamilton, Esq., I succeeded in securing the endowment for the mission of Dudswell, and also by concerted effort with Revd. Prof. Roe an endowment for the prospective new mission of Westbury.

The continuance of hard times, with the continual east drain upon this comparatively weak mission for Railway tax, have neutralized to a large extent the improvement that was reasonably hoped for upon the opening of the Q.C. Railway through this township.

### DURHAM.

Since my last report to your society, the services have been kept up in this mission, nearly the same as then stated; that is to say, one has been given to each of the three churches every Sunday, and on the principal Holy days. Until the 1st Sept, alternate Friday night services were given to the Black River and Jamieson school houses, and an occasional week night service to the people of Lisgar in the waiting room of the Grand Trunk Railway station.

Since my admission to priest's orders, on Trinity Sunday last, Holy Communion was celebrated about once a month in each church.

The congregations throughout have been, generally speaking, good, those at Upper Durham and L'avenir extremely so. The latter would perhaps, this year, average higher than any of the others, as a marked improvement was observable there in the attendance during bad weather.

It is my intention to give weekly services, during the winter, at Lisgar station, and in that project I expect to be assisted by the Rev. I. M. Thompson, rector of Melbourne. Lisgar station is situated on the border of his parish, and many of his parishioners, who cannot conveniently attend St. John's, their nearest church, would be very glad to attend our services at Lisgar. A quarter of an acre of land, near the station, has been given to us as a site for a church, whenever we find it convenient to build, and a large room is, in

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the mean time, placed entirely at our disposal for church services or any other purpose to which we may choose to

apply it.

1 may here mention that Mr. George Blake, of Danby, who promised a piece of land for a church to my predecessor, Mr. King, has now regularly deeded half an acre to the Lord Bishop for that purpose.

We are still backward, here, in the matter of Sunday schools,

though some improvement is noticeable.

Two classes, composed of children living near the church at Upper Durham, were formed last winter, and very creditably kept up till spring, by Miss Fricker (who was temporarily residing here) and Miss Stevens. In the spring Mr. Philip Lyster took charge of the school, as superintendent, and conducted it through the summer; it is still going on, but the attendance is now not very good.

In South Durham, a good school was started in the early part of the summer, and is still conducted, with many marks of encouragement, by Mr. J. W. Hendry. The attendance has been better at this school than at any of the others, and a good deal of credit is due to the teachers for the measure of

success we have here met with,

In L'avenir, also, a school has been going on since the beginning of May, under the superintendance of Mr. George Atkinson; but it will probably be discontinued during the winter months.

The Lord Bishop visited us twice during theyear, once on Trinity Sunday, and again on the 2nd of July. On the first occasion, his Lordship held an ordination in the church of St. James, South Durham, at which the Revd. Albert Stevens and myself were admitted to Priest's orders; and on the second, eleven persons were confirmed at the church of the Holy Trinity, Upper Durham.

All our churches are now provided with altar vessels. The last set, a very handsome one, was ordered in the spring from New York, for St. Paul's church, L'avenir, the money for which, was raised during the incumbency of my prede-

cessor.

As you will see by the financial statement (appended below) an endowment fund has been established for a part of this mission. As a beginning, and by the assistance of your society, the S. P. G. grant, and Robt. Hamilton Esq., of Quebec, the sum of \$660 is now invested for the benefit of Upper Durham and L'avenir; to this sum we hope to add a little every year.

Some explanation will now be necessary respecting the financial statement above mentioned.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.—DUBITAM

The amount of \$133, for entertainments under the heading, Upper Durham, is the total of (1) our Dedication Festival (\$116) held on the 24th may last and (2) a social given last month, which realized \$17. In connection with the latter, our thanks are due to the Rev. E. A. W. King, who kindly gave us a short lecture on 6 The Centennial."

The amount of \$71.50 under the heading, South Durham, was the proceeds of a concert given in that place last winter, and applied to the payment of a promissory note held by Mr. Layton against the congregation.

For repairs and improvements, the amount of \$30 represents the cost of repairing and improving the chimneys of Trinity Church, Upper Durham; and that of \$148.50 the cost of a fence around St. James' Church, South Durham, and repairing the steps of the same. In connection with this I must notice that the lumber for the fence and steps was given by Messrs: Jas. Miller and J. W. Hinding, and that our thanks are due to Mr. Simon Armstrong for work done upon the steps, gratis. The gates and lamps for the fence were the gift of Mr. Charles Church.

The presentation to Miss White (\$12) was made by the congregation of L'avenir at Christmas for her services in that church as organist.

I have to record, this year, 3 mariages, 15 baptisms and 9 burials.

For events of special interest in our parochial history, I have but few to relate. A series of Mission services were held in March last with the able assistance of Revs. I. M. Thompson, G. H. Parker, and G. T. Harding. The success was good judging from attendance, demeanour, and the expressed opinion of the Parish; of abiding fruits I have nothing to write.

Attendance at Divine Service and at the Lord's supper has improved this year rather than otherwise. I have seen my way to increasing the frequency of celebrations, so that we now have the Lord's Supper twice a month, besides on chief testivals. I trust not to stop here.

We are trying to dispose of our old barrack of a parsonage; with the view of building a new one close to the Church.

The Bishop addressed the candidates on the nature of the privilege, as well as the responsibility thus assumed, after which his Lordship consecrated our neat little church, the Bishop again preaching one of his telling sermons, appropriate to the occasion. The day following we went to Standon where ten more were confirmed.

It is a difficult matter to tell exactly what you expend each year in a Mission, for the work of one year is so run into and blended with another year's work that you can scarcely judge to a fraction. The fairer way to come at this is to go a few years back, and in doing this let me present a view of this mission six years ago, and compare it with the present, and in doing this, in justice to myself, though I may be accused of egotism, I cannot do otherwise than state these facts:

Then the Church was unfinished, now it is comfortable; then there was no parsonage, barn or other out building, now all the necessary ones are supplied; then the glebe was averitable forest, now it is nearly all (some sixteen acres) cleared and, for new land, under a good state of cultivation. In short, the Parsonage, with the other buildings, and the glebe in its present state is worth fifty pounds yearly to any man who does not object to take a little of the rust out of his elbows for about two hours daily.

### GASPÉ.

The year 1876 has again been marked by a decrease in our numbers by removal of families to other more favored parts of Canada. Also by a great decrease in the prosperity of the place. In the first part of the year the people had a hard struggle to keep their small stock of eattle alive, some fulled in the attempt. Nearly one hundred tons of hay were brought into the place from a distance of over twenty miles.

Lumbering having failed here for the present there is no regular employment for the people in winter, which, when taken in combination with the falling off in salmon and mackerel fisheries, is a very serious drawback to the financial prosperity of this mission.

ST. PAUL'S CHURCH. The services have been held regularly, attendance continues good. During the season of navigation I have had a third service at 7 p. m. in this church marked by a better attendance from the vessels in port.

The new church has been slowly making progress. The outside painting and clapboarding and the inside walls, seats and painting yet remain to be done.

The expenditure will be greater than the first estimate, and has led to still greater exertions on the part of this small congregation, a bazaar held this fall having realized the handsome sum of \$330.

We hope for aid from the Church Society and have not applied earlier because we wished first to use our own exertions.

ST. JAMES'S CHURCH. Services have been held regularly; attendance has been very good.

The Church wardens have struggled hard to maintain the agreement with the Diocesan Board during these hard times, which for causes already mentioned have seriously decreased their ability.

There are five day schools in the mission, three of which are in a very good condition and a credit to the place. There are also five Sunday schools, one at each church, the others at the outlying school houses. Three of the day schools were, during the past summer, visited by the Governor General.

My work for the year has been a repetition of that described in former reports. The services at the church and out-stations have been regularly maintained, and with no abatement of attendance on the part of the worshippers. The communicants have increased in number, and this not merely from additions consequent upon the confirmation held last May. I am happy to note that a larger proportion than on former occasions of the newly confirmed came to the next communion after confirmation. The people concerned are still unable to agree as to the best site for a church edifice to accommodate those now attending the school house services, but I have reason to believe that the spiritual church is growing in dimensions and strength, that wanderers are being brought in, and the godly are being edified; and so we will take courage, and go forward.

#### IRELAND.

Uniform and constant kindness has been extended by the various members of the congregations towards the missionary during the year. And only one or two slight disputes have interrupted the fraternal unity among themselves.

A. J. Grier and Miss Sutton have taken the place of J. S. Bothwell and Miss Walsh in the Parish School. The School now has been further furnished and a porch built. Very material improvements and repairs have been made in the Parsonage, and a well sunk, and furnished with an iron

pump, affording a supply of water heretofore provided at great inconvenience.

Trinity Churc<sup>1</sup>, built in 1839, will soon have to be thorough repaired. I only wish I could lay hands on a hundred pounds for this purpose and the work would go heartly on.

The congregation at Christ Church have been very punctual in their payments to Diocesan Board and Church Society, and are beginning to talk seriously of the necessity of a new church.

Adderley, taken up last year, is fast becoming a settled congregation. A church is in the course of construction, and when completed will be very convenient and sightly.

Assisted by two of the Clergy of the Diocese and our School teachers we delivered fortnightly, during the winter, a course of lectures on subjects connected with church work, and held two missionary meetings.

Two social festivals for Sunday Schools and one for current expenses of Trinity Church were held by the ladies.

Special donations have been received during the year from kind friends, mostly resident in Quebec, for Adderley Church. Revd. A. W. Mountain, England, three volumes for my Library, also unknown friend in England Illustrated papers of various kinds.

#### KINGSEY.

I was inducted into the charge of this mission about a year ago by the Rural Dean, the Rev. C. P. Reid, who, in an admirable sermon pointing out with clearness and vigour the relative duties of Pastor and People, inculcated the doctrine of mutual forbearance, and thus cleared the way for a more patient attention to my own admonitions and labour in the vineyard of our Lord.

In entering upon my work, I was most kindly and hospitably received, and through the exertions of some members of the church my household goods were landed free of trouble and expense safely at the Parsonage, which I found to be in every respect a convenient and comfortable home.

The year has not been distinguished by any notable events from its companions in the past. The usual round of visitation and ministrations to the sick and dying, with the Sunday Services, have chiefly occupied my time.

In August we had a large and successful gathering of the four Sunday Schools, with their teachers, relatives, and friends, who enjoyed themselves heartily at the time and carried away pleasant reminiscences of a joyful and harmonious Sunday School Pic-Nic.

The order and number of Sunday ministrations have been as follows:

Sunday School and Bible or Confirmation Class at St. Paul, Sydenham, at 9.30 a.m. Divine Service, 10.30 a.m. Drive 8 miles to Holy Trinity Church at Denison's Mills. Divine Service at 3 p.m., if possible a public catechism before. Drive 5 miles to Spooner Pond School House, Service at 6.30 p.m., and then 5 miles home. The order of these services is varied on the first and second Sundays in each month.

During the Summer month's I have also celebrated Divine Service in Town's School House every Friday evening.

There are four Sunday Schools in this Mission; St. Pauls' is small. The School at the Holy Trinity numbers about 35, with four Teachers, at Town's School about 25 children with two Teachers complete the staff. The Sunday School at Spooner Pond numbers about 16 with one Teacher.

I am also organizing Confirmations Classes for the winter months at the Holy Trinity and St. Pauls. Holy Communion is celebrated twice a month at St. Paul's and once a

month at the Holy Trinity.

The attendance at the three Stations has been very good and regular, though here as elsewhere I have to lament a compa-

rative paneity of regular communicants.

The congregation of the Holy Trinity have paid off the balance of the debt on the Church, amounting to \$90, and purchased an excellent Harmonium at a cost of \$125, in the course of the past year.

#### LABRADOR.

The Revd. J. Hepburn, who has been four years as missionary on the Labrador Coast, was nominated during the summer to the mission of Shigawake and expected up by the schooner "Lady Young" last autumn. The schooner, however, was driven ashore during the gale of the 17th Oct. at Blane Sablon, which has compelled Mr. Hepburn and his sisters to remain for another season on the coast. Near the end of October he was enabled to forward letters by way of Nova Scotia, in one of which he says "we are terribly disappointed in not being able to return, but there is no use in complaining.

Such an event as cantious Capt. Blais being wrecked was never provided against by any. It was a fearful hurricane and I fear many lives were lost. One vessel foundered outside of Mutton Bay (St. Clement Mission Station), another came in wholly disabled. Fishing stages and houses were

swept away and much damage incurred to many.

I am thankful, we were all in harbour. It would have been a sad ending to our Labrador life, if we had been wrecked. We are well as we are, although as a matter of course we are taken at a great disadvantage, after selling and giving away to be obliged to go to market again and especially when navigation is over, things take a sudden rise, yet I expect good treatment at the hands of the Hudson Bay Co's agent for he has ever been very kind. Next spring (D. V.) we must hope to take our departure under favourable circumstances, leaving a successor in the work. Our people commiserate us in our disappointment, but they couple their sorrow with gladness at our detention for their sakes. They anticipated many evils without a elergyman and

now they feel secure.

I have had the best of health all summer and consequently

have laboured on uninterruptedly.

The mission boat has paid for her paint, having gone upwards of 1000 miles—the greater part of the mission twice, besides shorter cruises. My interest in this work is steadily increasing and I was truly reluctant to go, although it seemed a necessity.

#### LEEDS.

In this mission, one year's work is so much like that of every other, that there is very little to report that has not already been given in former years. The services have been held as usual, the sick and whole visited, and the ordinary round of duty performed, with about the ordinary results, some hear and heed, others refuse to do either. In some respects, progress may be reported; St. James Church, Leeds, has at last been put in thorough repair, and looks well both inside and out. In short it has been practicably made a new Church—and will stand for years. One of the last acts of the late Mr. John Hall was to give me \$25 to furnish Matting for the aisles of the church, and it was used for the first time on the day of his interment. He has also remembered the church in his will, having left \$1,000 in bank stock to the Diocesan Church society. He will be a great loss to the church here, for although he was unable to render personal service, he was always ready to give his full share when funds were required to be raised for any object in connexion with the church, and he also gave more in proportion to his income than any other in the mission, to the stipend fund. We have also to deplore the loss of his sister, Miss Hall, who was an invaluable helper to the clergyman in any good work, especially in the Sunday school, where for years she rendered good and efficient service. place will not soon be filled.

The church also at Kinnear's Mills, (St. Mark's Church) has been put into respectable order though, of course very much less has been done on it than on St. Jame's Church, still considering all things it is now tolerably comfortable. With regard to the spiritual standing of the mission, there is certainly much room for improvement, and I may add much need of it too, the one thing needful is not that which is set first, but the world takes the place that ought to be sacred to God alone, and religion is too often put aside, quietly let alone, as if only to be thought of just at the hour of death. I fear that some of the nominally church people are becoming

more careless.

In order to remedy, as far as might be permitted, this evil, I procured the valuable services of my good friend, the Rev. Thos. Richardson, and in the begining of Lent attempted to hold a mission at St. James' Church. But the weather turned out very unfavorable, and although I would not say that the attempt was altogether a failure, yet it was not productive of the amount of good which I had hoped would result

from it. The apparently such as the much period the sick life follow up, time to making a mind, and something it suits the

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from it. The congregations were small, but very attentive, and apparently very much interested, and had the weather been such as that the people could have attended, I doubt not but much permanent good would have ensued. Then I was on the sick list for some time immediately after, and could not follow up, what had been done by the services. I hope some time to make another trial in a similar way as I cannot help thinking such services to be a great help in stirring up the mind, and causing people to think and realize that there is something more in religion than just going to church (when it suits them) to hear and criticise a sermon.

The Church society's lists do not exhibit so large an amount as last year, but considering the hard times, I think it is fair. I am much indebted to the collectors, all of whom I am sure did their best, and they have hereby my sincere thanks.

I fear that the congregation will be small for some time to come in St James Church as the small-pox has made its appearance in Leeds, and some of the best church goers have it in their houses.

#### MAGDALENE ISLANDS

The Reverend J. Chambers, Missionary on the Magdalene Islands, under date of Nov. 8, 1876, writes as follows.

"Just a few words upon Mission work here ere navigation

closes for six months.

I am thankful that we have now two schools in full working order; one on Entry Island, and the other-on Grindstone Island, the latter is conducted altogether by me. Last winter I taught the children averaging five hours daily, and this winter the same.

There is yet much to do, another school has yet to be formed at Grosse Isle where we have the greatest number of inhabitants (Protestant), and I hope ere long to see a good school there also. However, as it is all up hill work and great tact is required here to move the people in a right direction, nothing remains but to work steadily in the strength of Him without whose help all labour is lost.

Our Mission can not be a flourishing one for some years to come, owing to the scattered state of the population; and until the number increases in the different islands, so that a greater weight can be felt in the assistance given by each, we must remain as we are. What I mean, is that the Protestant inhabitants of the different islands (Grosse Isle excepted) number too few to afford the necessary help. For instance: On Amherst island there are only five families, and next year they have to raise funds to paint the outside of their Church. On Entry there are only six families at present, and they have to support a schoolmaster.

On Grindstone Island there are twelve families and they have to get the outside of the Church painted next year. Whereas, if all were in one little group, it would be less difficult to keep the Mission in working order. Of course matters cannot be remedied until each community gets strong enough to render proper assistance. Hitherto Admiral Coffin has been very kind, for it is owing to his benevolence that the Mission has two neatly finished Churches; but that gentleman has now witdrawn all aid and the Mission is left alone

to do its best.

Of course I cannot say much of Missionary experience, for all Missionaries in Canada have a full share of hardships and danger. But I think there are few Missions which call the clergyman so often away from home. In visiting the different islands during the summer months a round sum of six hundred miles has been travelled and this is accomplished in an open whale boat. However, through the kindness of the

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Reverend C. W. Rawson and the Reverend C. C. Hamilton of Queboc, a sum of money has been collected sufficient to defray the expenses of a new mission boat, which has greatly added to my comfort.

I will give you a short description of a little boat work: On Saturday, the 28th Oct., I started in my boat for Grosse Isle. During the passage a heavy breeze sprang up but we arrived safely. As so on the return journey: for starting on Tuesday morning for Grindstone with a fair wind we reached but five miles before the wind bauled right ahead, and being very light we had the prospect of a long journey, for the distance is twenty five miles from island to island. To make matters worse, the boat struck on a bank of sand and after considerable efforts at poking and shoving with oars, which proved fruitless, further measures had to be resorted to, viz: that of throwing out ballast. I immediately stripped off clothing and jumped overboard and taking the ballast from the boat succeeded in getting her into deep water, and then replaced all the ballast, carrying it back to the boat.

On we went again and made considerable progress, but at about 8 o'clock at night we again run aground upon what is called the "flats." My companion was willing to strip off and get overboard to lighten the boat, but he had not been long from a bed of sickness, so I thought I could stand the bath better than he could; accordingly overboard I went, and after being in the water a full quarter of an hour succeeded in getting the boat into the channel. When the boat struck this last time I felt inclined to let go the anchor and get below in the little cabin which I have had built in the boat; but my companion was sure we were not very far from bad weather, and it proved true for very shortly after we got into deep water again, a heavy snow storm mixed with rain added to our unpleasant position; and we arrived home just at midnight, thoroughly drenched and cold, after being in the boat sixteen hours, without anything to eat or drink and bitterly cold. At day-break I started again for Entry island, only having four hours sleep; for I had to get the school on that island in working order, from which place I have-just returned in time for the expected arrival of the mail steamer, after the arrival of which I must proceed immediately to Amherst island and then to Grosse Isle again to finish the visiting until the ice forms.

As this will be in all probability the last opportunity of writing for six months, during which time we are entirely shut out from all communication, I must beg your prayers

that the God of all grace may manifest his presence and fill us with His abiding Spirit for Christ's sake.

#### MAGOGIAND GEORGEVILLE.

Appointed by the Bishop to this combined mission, with head quarters at Magog, July 1st. Formally inducted by the Reverend Rural Dean Roid July 9th, Magog vacant from Oct. previous through the resignation of Revd. A. Balfour, sent Georgeville just vacated by appointment of Revd. F. A. Smith to Nicolet and parts adjacent. Period embraced by this

report, five months.

I am sorry to say I find throughout the mission that the number of Church going people does not bear a creditable proportion to the number of inhabitants. Very many make no profession and are unbaptized. Still I trust there exists some spirit of enquiry and some desire, however latent and as yet undemonstrative, on the part of those to learn more of the privileges and claims of the Christian Religion, and also to respect, seek and value the ministrations offered by our reformed branch of Christ's Church.

But how many one meets every where who have not yet learnt that the Church of Christ is a Divine Institution and has a history which carries us back, not to some religious leader who lived but a few years or even a century or two ago and whose name we must bear like those who where reproved for saying "I am of Paul and I of Appollos and I of Cephas," but which carries us back through generations of Christians, successively enrolled by a continuous ministry of divine appointment, to Christ himself.

In each Church a service alternately morning and evening and a Sunday school always in the morning are maintained every Sunday, with an afternoon service in some School-

house or cottage when and where praticable.

In Magog Mrs. Merrick or Miss Sweeney and in Georgeville Mrs. McGowan or Miss Blaylock very efficiently lead the choir.

Visitation of the sick and "house to house" visits have not

been neglected.

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Heriot. During the vacancy of the mission Mr. Warren most generously had the Church opened and prepared, and gave his brethren the opportunity of saying with him the Church's prayers and of hearing God's Word and a printed sermon. For these gratuitous and valuable duties, although they be often but little appreciated, any one deserves the heartiest thanks and encouragement.

Here there is a good Church editice and free from debt, thanks to the exertions of Mr. Walter's incumberry. The site needs fencing, levelling, &c. Towards the object the visitors, Mrs. Woodward, Mrs. Aylwin and Mrs. Torrange, thoughtfully contributed \$13 as a free will offering. Free Church lacks a beli of its own, but in the mean time the school commissioners have kindly consented to allow the bell of the Academy (adjacent to the Church) to call the worshippers together.

The most pressing need in view of the permanent welfare of the mission is a parsonage, for which no site or other provision whatever has yet been made. The people seem indisposed and perhaps are not very well able, just now, to make any effort in addition to what they promise the Diocesan Board.

Georgeville. Is not so large a village as Magog but in the summer is much onlivened and benefitted by the presence of gentlemen and their fan ities who occupy their fine country seats for a month or two, and also by the presence of other visitors who come for shorter intervals to enjoy the beautiful scenery of Lake Memphremagog and its surroundings.

Many of these and notably Sir Hugh Allan and family attend the services most regulary and exercise, I trust, a powerful influence for good in the community. And yet the congregations have been but small, only averaging from 40 to 50 and later on 30 to 40.

In July and August Mr. Hector Maeduff, who is a Lay Reader licensed by the Bishop of Manchester, and a candidate for Holy orders, would not take the entire rest which his college vacation almost demanded, but in a true missionary spirit devoted his energies to conducting the Sunday School and a second service much to the satisfaction and benefit, as I believe, of the residents of the place and their children.

I am thankful to say that the good work of clearing off the Church debt, which Mr. Smith so successfully brought almost to its accomplishment, has been laudably carried on by Miss Eva Tuck and sister and others of their sex, it having been resolved, as I understand, by the ladies of the congregation that they would contribute and collect until the debt is removed. About the middle of November \$51 were got together and applied in this way. A statement then rendered shews \$136.32 of principal and interest still due. But unfortunately the Church imperatively needs at once a new foundation and other repairs and should also have a new coat of paint, all which will cost I fear from \$200 to \$300 at least.

I rejoice to report that the Sunday school, which was so well managed by Mrs. and Miss Smith, is still efficiently maintained by Miss Packard, assisted by Miss Blaylock and by Mrs. J. Taylor, who are relieved by Miss Eva Tuck and Miss

Clara Bullock when at home.

The people here deplore the loss of Mr. Smith and hope for a resident elergyman again ere long. To report the exact state of the case it must be confessed that there is unquestionably enough work for one man at either end of this large mission i. e. either in the village of Magog or of Georgeville, including of course the adjacent parts of

each

The general position of things can be better understood when it is said that one man is now expected to fill the place of two former Incumbents; that the field is well settled and is bounded by about 20 miles of the lake shore viz: 4 or 5 of the Magog, or "outlet", and with 5 miles to Olivers' Corners 5 more to Georgeville and 4 or 5 beyond to the boundary of Vermont. This field extends indefinitely outwards from the Lake, and includes the village of Fitch Bay, where no services of ours are held. My nearest clerical neighbours live in Sherbrooke, 16, and Hatley, 15 miles away, and in Stanstead 12 from Georgeville or 22 from head-quarters. Were the Church of older growth, and flourishing, and her work organized, how little could one man do even if well qualified, zealous and strong: how much less when as I have implied there is so much indifference and declared non-profession of religion and consequent difficulty and discouragement. Are there any other similarly half occupied fields in the Diocese?

May the "days of intercession" hasten the time when it shall no longer be asked "Where are the men and the

means?"

#### MALBAIE.

In again placing before the society the report of the affairs of this mission for the past year. I find in the retrospect, many things of an encourageng nature though I shall have to mention some of a less favourable aspect.

We have had to mourn but the loss of one young man and two infants during the year. The former died in the communion of the Catholic Church and in the confidence of a certain faith.

With a few exceptions the services have been as usual held regularly in the Parish Church, the congregations averaging about the same as in the previous year.

Owing however to the very stormy weather of last winter and the nature of the work, I have been unable to keep up my visits to the outlying stations with the regularity I should have wished.

The work of the Church at Barachois promises fair to become permaneut. A church school has been started by this time, by aid of grants from the Church Society and the Col. and Cont. Church Society.

To the latter Society the Schools of this Mission are endebted for much nourishing care, perhaps even for their very existence. In spring we hope to build a school-chapel, to be used for school during the week and for services on

Sunday. The land for a site and the materials for building

are already in a great measure promised.

At present there are five day schools in the Mission, in four of them the Church Catechism is taught and Bible lessons given to all the scholars, in the other school a few children have been withdrawn from religious instruction by their parents.

The Sunday Schools at Corner of Beach and Malbaie are now doing a good work. For about three months in summer the former was suspended on account of the removal of Mrs. Watson, the teacher. At Malbaie the attendance is not so good in winter, as it should be, some parents objecting to send their children, saying in excuse they are not suitably clothed. As a matter of fact, one of the greatest hindrances I meet with in my endeavours to get some of the people themselves to Church, is a false, and apparently almost unconquerable pride of dress.

An other hinderance to the growth of spiritual life is the increase of intemperance, a sad result of the facility with which the law is evaded and strong drink is sold by a number of unlicensed retailers.

Last Easter Mr. John LeGresly resigned the position of senior warden, which he had held for some years; during which he contributed much to the financial prosperity of

the Church in this Mission.

At the vestry meeting, the necessity of taking some practical steps to increase the endowment fund was strongly urged upon the people. The appeal was successful and those present agreed to devote the proceeds of the fish they caught on St. Peters' day to that object, each year, until the necessary amount was raised. This year the sum contributed was about ninety dollars (\$90.00) only about one half of what I expected, but still enough to encourages us to try again, for I am sorry to say, in this matter, we are far behind some other coast missions.

One reason that the amount was not larger was that many felt the effects of the previous hard winter and could not afford to give even one day; and others who were well able were unwilling to help, prefering that their neighbours should pay for the religious privileges they receive.

I trust next year that no churchman in the mission will show himself so mean as to allow others to sow, that he may reap the benefit. May all remember that "God loveth the

cheerful given."

With ordinary success, if all give a helping hand, in less than ten years this poor mission may be self supporting. If nothing is materially inative but this, and ropportunity

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nothing is done and the society withdraws its aid or even materially increases the assessment, there will be no alternative but to close the mission, I hope the people will see this, and make provision for the future whilst there is opportunity.

I must thank many of my parishioners for so generously coming forward and furnishing me with hay for my horse

during the great searcity of last winter.

To Mr. Richmond of Gaspé Basin also, my best thanks are due for his kindness, at much inconvenience to himself, in exchanging services with me, thus giving my people the opportunity of receiving the Holy Communion several times during the year:

#### NEW LIVERPOOL.

Two years ago, I reported that our church at New Liverpool sadly needed repairs, that need I am glad to say owing to the exertion and energy of our zealous church-warden, Mr. Henry Atkinson, has now been joinly taken in hand, and we hope in the spring will be finally completed. We, last autumn, strengthened and repaired the foundation, put on an

entirely new roof, and new ceiling, and gravelled and improved the churchyard path. In the spring we hope to paint the woodwork and colour the walls, and so make the little church worthy of the name of the House of God. What we have done has already cost more than four hundred dollars; and what we have to do, will cost at least a couple of hundred more.

I am sorry to say, I have to report the loss of several families from our Mission. Since I have been here, not five years, we have lost through removal from the place no less than eighteen families, and we have had only an addition of five, making a clear loss of thirteen; and this of course is a very serious loss, considering our small numbers at the best of times, and the way in which we are surrounded by French people. It seems that when one English family goes away two French families take their place.

In April last, the Diocesan Board reduced our assessment

from five hundred dollars a year to four hundred.

I have to thank several kind friends for sympathy and help during my very serious illness in the spring and especially to my brethren the clergy of Quebec for kindly supplying my place in church from Easter to Trinity Sunday.

I have also to thank Mr. Henry Atkinson, Messrs. Ritchie and Cull, and Mrs. Louis Hamilton, for their supply of fire

wood, for the Parsonage.

Our services in church have been kept up as usual, and as well attended (as with our reduced numbers) we can expect.

Our Sunday School, numbers about twenty children on the books, with an average attendance of about fifteen. In the autumn, through the kindness and hospitality of Mrs. Roberts, they all spent a very pleasant afternoon, and enjoyed a good hearty Tea, at Long Wood House, and each received a present of a Hymn book from the Incumbent, and after giving three good hearty cheers for there kind and generous hostess, went home highly pleased with their afternoon's entertainment.

Our financial statement for the year is as follows, and I think considering our reduced number, and the bad times we have had to go through, it is a statement that any one connected with the mission of New Liverpool, may well be proud of.

NEW CARLISLE, PASPEBIAC AND HOPETOWN.

In reviewing the doings of a year I suppose one generally experiences feelings of regret at the little good that seems to have been accomplished as well as a feeling of self-accusation at one's own negligence in being about our Father's business. Such indeed, I know, are my feelings as I sit down to write for the Society a report of our doing for another year. Perhaps such feelings are natural, for we cannot always see the good that has been done; and then we often begin a new year with plans for the future which are frequently beyond our powers to carry out. Much that I purposed to do at the commencement of this year has never been fulfilled, and that in many cases from sheer impossibility: the mission being large, and being more or less in a transition state has kept my hands and mind very busy, indeed, on looking back over the year it seems as if I have been perpetually running after work which it was impossible to overtake.

However, I trust the year's work has not been altogether without even the patent results which we so often pine after, but which are not always for our own good. The churches throughout the mission have been better and more regularly attended, the communicant list has been increased, the responses, left before to one or two, have been more heartily joined in, and in many cases the demeanour of the worshippers has been more devout: I could wish, however, this demeanour were more general, I am afraid to many, God's

House is not yet looked upon as the House of Prayer:

however, this may come in time.

In my last report I see I spoke of the baneful influence in St. Andrew's Church, New Carlisle, of the Pew System, and of the many who for want of available room had no seat in the Lord's House, and I also expressed a hope that an arrangement would soon be made by which this might in part be obviated. That arrangement I am glad to report has been accomplished. Early in the year I summoned a meeting of the Pew-holders, and laid before them a plan by which, by an internal alteration of the church, much more room might be obtained; and at the same time pointed out the advantage of such an arrangement should the church at any future time become a free seated one. The plan was approved by all, the only obstacle throwr in the way being the difficulty of raising funds sufficient to carry it out, and I had personally to promise to do what I could outside the mission before work was allowed to proceed. This I did; and here I would on behalf of myself and congregation most heartily thank the Rectors of St. Matthew's and St. Peter's, in the city of Quebec, who so kindly allowed me to plead my cause in their Pulpits last summer. In a few words the alteration may be explained. Instead of two rows of pews with an unnecessary large aisle between, we have now three rows of pews with two small, but sufficiently wide aisles. The advantage of this can scarely be over-stated, for by thus making the pews of smaller dimensions and so increasing their number, what has been rightly termed "the selfishness of the Pew System" is in part prevented, and pews held by families who only partially fill them are now, I am glad to say fewer and much further between. But even when this was done, and room for about sixty more worshippers obtained I had notwithstanding to tell many applicants that all our pews were appropriated, and that there was no room for them in God's House. This sad state of things induced me to make an effort which, under God, has not been altogether an unsuccessful one. Last July I commenced a second evening service at which all the pews are nominally free. This has worked well, but not altogether so well as I expected for two reasons, the reluctancy of people to enter pews supposed erroneously at the time, to belong to others, and the backwardness of the pew-holders to leave their own seats. Unless the people will work in this respect with their ministers, and make it a point of conscience never at a free service to sit in their accustomed seats the nominal free-service will be more or less a failure. However as these services have been well

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attended, and in many instances by several who scarcely before entered the church, I have decided to continue them, and they now form one of my routine duties every alternate Sunday.

But beside the re-arrangement of the Pews we have in another respect improved the inside of this church. The old-fashioned and unsightly monstrosity used hitherto as a Reading desk has given place to one of very handsome build, made by the Drum Manufacturing Co., and placed Prayerwise in the chancel, and also in addition an exceedingly pretty rosewood Lectern made in fret-work by a young Lady of the Congregation, who also presented me with means for the purchase of the Desk, but who in the true spirit of a Christian giver does not wish her name to be mentioned in this Report. These alterations, and with the Organ placed in a suitable position near the chancel steps with convenient choir pews, have greatly improved the internal appearance of the church. But even with these improvements one is inclined to feel desponding when we think of what is yet needed. The pews are not yet stained, the inside and outside walls of the church are almost destitute of paint, and consequently present a sorry appearance; we have no Font, no suitable covering for the Lord's Table, one falling about a foot over the sides of the table being at present an apology for an altar cloth. The fence around the church-yard, of which I spoke in my last report, still remains unfinished. However, I trust next year will see "something attempted," if not "something done." When the balance of the debt on our Organ has been paid, together with the balance of the expenses consequent upon the alteration of the pews, I hope to set to work to see what can be done. To raise funds here, however, is a difficult matter on account, first of all of the precariousness of the ability of so many to give, and also on account of so few understanding the principle of giving. So few take an interest in the Church; they do not feel that it belongs to them, and so the clergyman has " to serve tables," and thus neglect much of his own peculiar work. Much of the necessary house to house visiting has been neglected on account of having so incessantly to attend to the finances of the church.

St. Peter's Paspebiae, has this year undergone entire repainting on the outside, and this church both internally and externally does a great deal of credit to its congregation. Of course I am not unmindful that the firm of Charles Robin & Co., assist this church very considerably, and it is

owing to their generosity some years ago that it is now such

a pretty structure, and in such excellent repair.

The Sunday Schools of both churches have been going on well, and giving satisfaction, though they are by no means so largely and well attended as they should be. I find, however, that my new experiment of continuing them throughout the winter months has been highly successful. During the summer months by the kind permission of the late Thomas Pye, Esq., I was enabled to hold the St. Andrew's Sunday School in a room which suited us well, but when the winter began we were obliged again to remove to the church with its consequent inconveniences. In time I hope we may have here a regular Sunday School Room as we have at Paspebiae. In Angust we had a Pienie on "the commons" for both schools when all enjoyed the pleasant time which is generally experienced on such occasions. I hope this will become an annual institution with us.

I am happy to report that the Parsonage to which reference was made last year has been internally entirely finished, and when a few odd jobs have been done in the spring on the ontside it will be complete. It is in every respect a fine house, very well built, and very well finished, and will I think compare with advantage with any in the Diocese. In speaking of this I cannot help bearing witness to the depth of gratitude we owe to Messrs. LePerrelle and LeGrand of Paspebiac whose energy and disinterestedness in the cause has brought the Parsonage so far on towards completion. Had it not been for their exertions I am afraid I should not now be writing this report in the Parsonage. Would there were more such in every parish? There is I must report a considerable debt contracted in building the house, but I hope this will not remain long to hamper our movements in other directions. A few week ago we held a bazaar in Carlisle in its aid, and, thanks to the young ladies of both congregations, it proved successful beyond our expectations.

Of Hopetown, over which I wrote Ichabod last year, I am now able to speak more hopefully. I have regularly (except when prevented by storms) held services there every alternate Sunday evening, and the School-room has generally been full to overflowing; and by distributing cheap Prayer-Books with Hymns attached among the people more interest has been taken in the services, and I trust much good done.

I could have wished to have sent more and larger contributions to the several funds of the Church Society, but from what has been said it will be seen that such would have been

It will be seen by the above that I have made no mention of the finances in connection with the mission of Hopetown. I am sorry to omit these, but cannot help it, as the storms we have had along the coast the last few days have prevented me from holding any intercourse with the wardens.

I will now, following the precedent of my last report, add a word or two with reference to the mission of Shigawake. As the Society is aware this mission has again for another

long year been without a resident clergyman.

I have been doing as last year, what I could for it, generally giving a service every fourth Sunday throughout the mission including Shigawake, Port Daniel, and L'Anse au Gascon. During the summer vacation of Bishop's College, Rev. Professor Roc came and resided in the mission and two very suitable spires in Shigawake and Port Daniel are among the fruits of his labours for that short time. A Sunday

School, with a regular appointed staff of Teachers was also inaugurated, during his stay, at the two stations to which reference has just been made; and he will be pleased to hear that the School is going on well, both Teachers and Taught taking seemingly a deep interest in its welfare. The Rev. Professor Tambs also spent the Christmas vacation in the mission, and during his short stay of four weeks, worked very hard among the people, having visited, with one or two exceptions, every family included in the three places. I shall be very glad to hear of an appointment to the mission of Shigawake, as in many respects it is an important one and one giving promise of great things, but also one in which many will be lost to the Church unless a resident clergyman be soon provided for it.

#### PORTNEUF.

I wish I could give a more encouraging report for this Mission than I find myself able to. I have had to work against opposition, and false reports. Those who spread them may have believed them to be true, although I find it had to think so. However they seem to have been believed by some of the Halesboro' people, and so have been a great hindrance to my work amongst them, I think no one believes these reports to have been true now. I was supposed to wish to help one school -district to rob an other.

This adverse influence happily only influenced the congregation at Halesboro', but not that at the Village, where the services have continued to be well attended. I hope that hereafter the same may be said of the Congregation at the Church, although I fear that there will still be opposed to me the "vis inertie" of those who "will give in to no man."

I have made visits to St. Geneviève de Batiscan and held services there. When I go again they are going to make a subscription for me. If, as some think, a clergyman is entitled to what he can collect from people whose place of service is over 20 miles from his residence; then I shall he entitled to this. Their place of service is 33 miles from my residence.

Our offertory collections have been small but that at the village is more than double that at the Church, the latter between last Easter and the first sunday in Advent being only \$6.62 whilst the former was \$16.65.

### SANDY BEACH.

In undertaking to give you, once more, a report of the progress and prospects of this mission, I feel embarrassed, as to what first to present to your notice. Time has passed round with so little to mark its course, that there are no salient points particularly claiming attention.

I will lay before you, first, the temporal, secondly, the

spiritual aspect of our state.

It is with deep gratitude to our Heavenly Father that I record, that his goodness and mercy have manifestly followed us through all the days and hours of the year. No calamity has filled us with sadness; no disease has wasted us; no dissention filled us with bitterness; but the blessings of safety health and peace, have been, and are ours, and his hand has added plenty too, our barns are full of all manner of store. "Oh that men would praise the Lord for his goodness."

On the opening of the spring, dark clouds were threatening. The winter had been one of unusual severity, the snow from its great depth lingered on and on, fears were expressed of the perishing of the eattle from want of sustenance. But that gloom passed, "seed time" did not fail, the pastures of the wildnerness did spring: in due time the valleys were covered over with corn, and the glad smile of the Lord was resting on our land. Again the prospect clouded over; the salmon fishery was not equal to what it had been on previous years, and the take of Cod,—the main staple of these parts,—was so long delayed, than anxiety began to be felt, lest the most bitter destitution and suffering would be the result.

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Th prob **\$4**00 But that cloud was also dissipated, though late, the Cod came in rich abundance, and the plentifulness of the take, in the latter end, compensated for its scarcity in the beginning so that at the close, the usual amount has been secured. Thus the Lord was better to us than our desponding fears

presaged.

In spiritual things it is not always easy to mark progress; there is a realm which is known only to the spirit of God, and to our own consiousness. What passes there, passes between the human soul and "the Lord of life." It is very, real, yet, not open to observation. We know little of the victories there won; the dangers shunned, the griefs assuaged, or, the joys imparted and realized. Now most of the ministrations of Religion are meant to forward Christ's cause in this Realm: but the amount of success is not easily ascertained: all we know, in most cases, is that the hidden power is working: that the word of the Gospel, is not, cannot be spoken in vain; judging by outward tokens, we have reason to hope that that Power is working in our midst. The public services are well attended the Lord's Supper more frequently partaken of and all the means of grace, apparently, valued as much, if not more than ever.

There is still a list to come in from Peninsula, which will probably raise the gross amount to somewhat more than \$400.

During the year I have baptized 24; Married 4 Buried 2. I wish I could have made this Report, more interesting but here, accuracy alone is demanded, there is no place for

invention or ornamentation.

To the above, I may however add, that the Congregation at Peninsula is making great and landable exertions to complete their Church. When Mr. Mathers left the mission the skeleton, merely of the building was erected. Since, the windows have been glazed and put in, the floor laid, the walls lined with matched boarding, which is to be papered, stoves and stovespipes set in place, and the whole of the work so far advanced, as to make the building available for Divine service, so that latterly I have officiated there.

We were in hopes that the money which the Revd Mr. Mathers collected in Quebec for a Personage might be permitted to be expended in finishing the Church as thus laid out it would be of more service to the mission that in any otherway. I wrote respecting it, but received no answer\* I now direct the attention of the Diocesan Board to the matter, that if it be possible, it may be done. The Ladies, with their wonted zeal and energy are making self denying and vigourous preparations for a bazaar, the proceeds of which are to go towards the completion of said Church. All this respectfully submitted by your missionary.

#### STANSTEAD.

The work of this mission has been going on in a quiet and uneventful way during the past years. There is not much to report beyond the fact that regular services have been held not only in the village of Stanstead Plain, but also in three out-missions which will soon I hope be looked upon as regular appendages of the mission of Stanstead. Two of these out-missions viz: Libby's Mills and New Boston, I referred to in my last years report. At Libby's Mills I can hardly venture to think that much has yet been done. Still the services are fairly attended and the interest in them seems in several cases to be increasing. At new Boston there is more to encourage me. There seems to be a growing interest in Church work and one or two young persons have already presented themselves as candidates for confirmation. The third out mission, a thriving village called Boebe-Plain, sltuated on the Massawippi Valley Railway, has been taken up this year. I give it a fortmightly service. I have found

some few church people scattered about the neighbourhood and some who are not church people attend the services, I hope that in time a good work will be done there by the church.

Our congregations in Stanstead are keeping up very well

they are usually, very good in the evening.

By the kindness of certain generous churchmen in Quebee and especially of the Rev. Geo. Hamilton, who solicited subcription on our behalf, we have succeeded in raising funds for the erection of a church school-house. The proposal to begin a church day school had been for some time before us. Our great need was a room to hold it in. The School is now in operation and under the efficient care of Miss Tuck is 1 think doing good service among the children. We are indebted to the *Church Society* and the C. and C. Church S. Society for grants towards the teacher's salary.

I am indebted to the Rev. Prop. Roe M. A. and the Rev. Prop. Tambs M. A. for valuable services during the past summer, I am also indebted for kind and efficient help, to two students Messrs. Webster and Bothwell. The former gentleman spent a considerable portion of the Summer vaca-

tion in self denying labour for us.

My register shows a record for the past year of 21 baptisms and 12 burials. I am at present engaged in preparing a class of 9 or 10 candidates for confirmation. The number of communicants has not changed materially since my last

report.

Financially, I think our mission has done very well this year. Great depression in business has prevailed with us as elsewhere, and money has been very hard to get; yet our collections for Church purposes have been considerably larger than those of last year. This is very encouraging and we thank God for it, but it is I hope and trust only an expression of a truer advancement made in spiritual things.

#### STONEHAM AND LAKE BEAUPORT.

The Missionary is happy to be able to report hopefully of the condition and prospects of his mission.

At Lake Beauport, the Congregation evince a laudable desire to strengthen the hands of their pastor in the discharge of his duty. The attendance at Holy Communion is alike regular and devout. The Sunday School has been ably conducted by Miss Vial and her sister. On the occasion of Miss Vial's mariage in the summer to their former Incumbent the Revd J. H. S. Sweet, the people spontaneously expressed their appreciation of her kind services among them, by presenting her with a suitable memorial of their affectionate remembrance. At the Christmas tree held on Innocent's Day, due to the exertions of Miss Vial, forty children were present. A new shoolhouse has recently been erected at considerable expense in a more convenient part of the parish.

At Stoneham, with the sanction and hearty approval of the Bishop, a temperance Association has been established by the Incumbent in connection with the Church. The attendance at public worship gives encouraging signs of increasing regularity.

The congregation also meet for devotional exercises at the Parsonage every Sunday evening, and also on other evenings during Lent and Advent. The Children attending the Protestant Dissentient School are catechized every Friday afternoon.

# WEST FRAMPTON AND CLANBOURNE.

The only event of importance which has taken place during the past year in West Frampton and Cranbourne, is the visit of the Bishop for the purpose of Confirmation. A class of 17 was presented in Frampton; all partook of the Holy Communion from the same hands which had so recently been laid on their heads in token of God's good will toward them. In Cranbourne 7 candidates were presented, and one only was absent from the Lord's Table, sickness being the cause.

The earnest and pointed addresses of the Bishop to the young, as well as his Lordship's impressive and easy-to-beunderstood sermons to the congregation, were listened to with evident attention and pleasure. To say that our Bishop's visits are welcome and appreciated, is only to repeat what everyone knows—but it gives one pleasure to say it again.

During the winter we relieved the monotony by a mission ary meeting, and were under great obligation to the Incumbent of East Frampton for an interesting and able speech on Algoma. We were also cheered by one or two visits from our worthy Rural Dean, who ought to be called "The Storm King" for his determined battling with heavy weather.

We have lost two families from West Frampton and five from Cranbourne.

West Frampton, notwithstanding, has contributed more than double to special objects. I believe the people of this mission give cheerfully—to give largely is impossible.

Report says that this is the first winter that Christ Church has been free from smoke, for which we have to thank our Church Warden, Mr. John Bartholomew, who repaired the chimney free of charge. Other repairs inside the Church are owing to the same willing hands, without a pull at any one a purse-strings.

The following reports have been received from clergy not connected with the Diocesan Board:

#### BISHOP'S COLLEGE.

The services at Milby, Moulton Hill, Mitchell's, Ascot Corner and Sandhill are still kept up regularly from Bishop's College, ten of the divinity students being engaged in this work. At all the stations, good service we hope is being done; and at all, we think, we can see from time to time cheering evidence of God's blessing.

1. Mitchell's is a school house, little more than a mile and a half from the Village Church, there is therefore no service there, but a Sunday school only. This is carried on by the Messrs. C. and R. Browne, divinity students of the diocese of Quebec, whose services are much valued by the people of the neighbourhood. The Sunday school numbers 29 children, with an average attendance of 9. I am sorry to say they have no S. S. Library.

2. At Moulton Hill, the service and Sunday school are both fairly well attended; and the good which has been already done is thankfully acknowledged by the entire neighbourhood. Mr. Robert Colston having been obliged, owing to ill-health, to resign the charge for a time, his place has been supplied by Mr. Arthur Judge, assisted by Mr. E. Hoeper, all of them divinity students of the diocese of Quebec.

3. On the Friday before Whitsunday, the Bishop visited Ascot corner and consecrated the new church, by the name of the church of the Holy Comforter. The Rural Dean and

seven others of the elergy favoured us with their presence. The attendance was large and the service hearty. One person only belonging to the place presented himself as a communieant; however this was a beginning, and a cheering one. The communicant was an aged Englishman communicating for the first time in his life. After the service, an excellent lunch, prepared by the people of the place, for which Mr. John Winslow kindly threw open his house, was partaken of by the Bishop and clergy and many others from far and near. After lunch, addresses of hearty congratulation and encouragement were made by the Bishop and Rural Dean. The Church, which is acknowledged to be very pretty, is a wooden building, 40 feet by 25 (purposely made short with a view to easy future enlargement, with a Bell-turret, constructed to hold a good sized bell, which we hope some day to obtain. The building completed, cost \$1000, of which the people made themselves responsible for \$400, I engaging to obtain for them the remaining \$600. The furniture, which I also undertook, cost about \$200 more. Besides subscriptions, 1 have to acknowledge the following kind gifts:—The Rev. Rural Dean Reid, besides a liberal subscription to the building, gave money for the purchase of the Holy Table. A surplice and a beautiful set of embroidered altar linen were presented by Colonel and Mrs. Ready. The Reverend G. H. Parker gave a very pretty Font of Bath Stone; Mr. and Mrs. Parker are also giving a suitable service of Church Plate, which is expected from England shortly, this in addition to a handsome subscription to the building. The site was the gift of Mr. Alfred Stacey, who also paid \$50 towards the building, of which he was himself the builder.

On the morning of Whitsunday, the Bishop returned to Ascot Corner and confirmed five persons, of whom four have tately become communicants. The communicants in the Church of the Holy Comforter, all of them new communicants, now number eight. The Services and Sunday-School at this station are still conducted, when I am absent, by Mr. Radley Walters, who has lately been joined by Mr. Chambers, a Divinity Student of the Diocese of Montreal. Mr. Walter's unceasing efforts for the good of the mission, commended by a genial hearty manner, are much appreciated by the people at Ascot Corner. I must not omit to acknowledge their kind hospitality which never fails in offering us all a hearty welcome.

4. At Sandhill, Mr. R. J. Harvey, Divinity Student of the Diocese of Ontario, has worked with unflagging zeal ever

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since the service was opened. In the case of all new stations like this, after the novelty wears off, a good many, who came only from enriosity, gradually drop away. Nevertheless the attendance at Sandhill has maintained an average of 60. There are also 43 children on the Sunday-School roll with an average attendance of 25. Here too a well selected Sunday-School library would do good service.

In the middle of Lent, the Bishop visited Sandhill for the first time, and preached there; and on the afternoon of Whitsunday His Lordship visited it again. On this latter occasion the Bishop baptized six persons, -- 4 adults and 2 children, -and confirmed five. The schoolroom was crowded and the service deeply interesting. Of the six then baptized, four were members of one family, the children of a widewer. The admission of these young, innocent, motherless girls into the church was a touching scene; and it moistened many an eye to hear their sweet young voices making their vows. The second of the four, a child of eleven, I was at first disposed to think ought to be baptized as an infant; but she pleaded so earnestly to be admitted to answer for herself, and on examination showed so much intelligence and good sense, that I willingly accepted her. Of the remaining two whom the Bishop baptized, one was the wife of a substantial farmer in the neighbourhood and the mother of a large family. This excellent woman, whose baptism, from her evident depth of religious feeling, gave me much satisfaction, found time, notwithstanding her many household cares, to learn the Catechism by heart, and to say it to me from end to end with the simplicity of a child. The sixth was the younger brother of the young man at whose earnest solicitation this service was begun little more than a year ago: but this was not all his reward; immediately after this service, I was called in to baptize the same young man's mother on her dying bed. Thus seven in all were added to the church that day, and six out of the seven would, humanly speaking, never have found their way into the church were it not for the opening of this station.

On the whole, there is much ground for encouragement at Sandhill.

The question of providing for these two important stations during the midsummer vacation was solved by Mr. Harvey volunteering to remain and serve them both gratuitously. During the two months vacation Mr. Harvey did good service; and it is right I should add, that by real earnestness, an affectionate manner, and unfailing persistency, Mr. Harvey

has won for us general goodwill at Sandhill, and that, for his work there, he deserves well of the church in this Diocese.

#### SHERBROOKE.

I am very happy to be able to report an increase in the contributions to our Diocesan Church Society from this parish. This increase is owing to the kind exertions of our lady collectors. Hitherto the annual subscriptions to the Church Society have been collected here by the Clergy. Last year I felt that this was not a satisfactory arrangement, eitherfor the Clergy, the Parishioners, or the Church Society. Independently of other reasons, the growth of late years of this parish has rendered a complete canvass of it by one person extremely difficult. Last October, I secured the services of six ladies in my congregation, who willingly undertook what I asked, and have, as the result shows, most efficiently discharged the trust committed to them. Last year our annual subscriptions to the various funds of the Church Society amounted to \$173; this year they amount to \$259; thus showing a total increase on the subscription list of \$86. This increase is mainly owing to the accession of the names of new subscribers, as some of our old ones have this year reduced their subscriptions. About 40 new subscribers appear on our present subscription list.

As regards the general work of the parish I have nothing special to record. The services of the Church have been carried on regularly by the Rector, the Revd. C. P. Reid, and by myself. The Holy Communion is now celebrated regularly twice every month, besides on the great festivals of the Church. The celebration on the third Sunday in the month is at an earlier hour than the usual morning service. A week-day evening Service and Bible Class has been established which is very fairly attended. My present subjects are an exposition of the Epistle to the Hebrews, and a

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familiar rendering of the arguments on Church Principles contained in Bishop Kip's invaluable work, "The Double Witness of the Church." Most of the members of the Bible Class have recently purchased copies of this book.

From December 1st, 1875, to November 30th, 1876, there have been in this parish, and in connextion with St. Peter's Church, 47 Baptisms, 9 Marriages and 24 Burials.

I append below the financial statement for the year ending November 30th, 1876; it will compare favourably with that of last year, exhibiting an increase of about \$57 on the whole, of sums raised for Church purposes in and outside of the parish.

THREE RIVERS. No report.

#### TRAVELLING MISSIONARY.

I am glad to have the opportunity of making a brief report of the latter part of my work, and more especially of submitting a statement of travelling expenses incurred, and of contributions made towards the same.

No change worth recording took place in the general nature and order of the work as compared with that of the previous six months already spoken of in last report, except I should mention a visit throughout the greater part of the large mission of St. Giles and Cumberland Mills during the illness of its veteran Ineumbent, and a visit to the then vacant mission of Magog at Easter-tide. As connected with the facilities for locomotion it may be interesting, in its way, to record that the G. T. Railway from Quebec to Rivière du Loup and the I. C. Railway thence to Ste. Flavie (an aggregate distance of nearly 200 miles) were so "snowed in" that no trains could be run between these places for thirty successive days ending on Good Friday. Mail carrying and travelling had therefore to be done in the old fashioned way.

A memorable day for Rivière du Loup was that upon which were laid in their last resting place the remains of the late Reverend E. G. W. Ross M. A., who for more than 30 years had been the clergyman of that parish. The majority of the inhabitants of this large French village joined with his old parishioners and filled the church to overflowing, and all shewed by their reverently sympathetic demeanour how great was their respect for this good man of God. The services and the addresses were given both in English and in French by the Revd. C. W. Rawson and your missionary.

Before closing these few comments upon the work entrusted to me I must be permitted to declare the pleasure I took in it.

From the first indeed I could well understand a remark ascribed to the late Bishop Stuart who spoke of a similar

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itinerant commission as being "a great advancement" over a parochial one.

Especially do I desire to acknowledge the very great kind-

nes which I met with in all directions.

This I mention as an indication of how much the missionary, not on his own account but by virtue of his office, was welcomed everywhere.

But I must add that of all the attention and consideration which it was thus my privilege personally to receive. I shall

ever preserve a most grateful remembrance.

Other smaller sums not already reported were taken up here and elsewhere through the offertory. Rimouski continued to the end to contribute with systematic liberality through Messrs. Butchart and McWilliams.

Four Endow Mr. Mack, of Brompton, has very generously made an additional donation of \$9870 to the Brompton Endowment Fund.

Your committee would give expression to their great regret that although the S. P. G. generously extended the time in which we might claim their munificent offer of £500 stg. towards endowments, the period, viz., 31st December last has again clapsed without the Diocese having raised the stipulated sum of £2500 stg.

Through the liberality of individuals, aided by the grants of the Church Society and by the addition of the annual interest, and furthered by the energy of the Reverend H. Roo, whose name your committee cannot fail to associate with local endowments, some \$8900 have been provided for several endowments since the offer of the S. P. G. was originally made. Your committee understand that Acton and Ascot are only waiting a slight alteration in the Endowment Deed by your Society, in order to pay in their contribution and begin their Endowment Funds.

The comparatively small additional sum of \$2200 in the hands of the Church Society for Endowments on 31st Dec., last would have qualified the Church in the Diocese to claim the S. P. G. grant of £500 stg.; as it is your committee would hope that the S. P. G. might be induced to grant a further extension of the time, if immediate efforts were made to raise the limited sum of \$2200 now remaining of the amount required of us as the condition of their grant.

It can hardly be understood by the Clergy and the missions generally that by the small local effort of \$100 or \$200, as the case may be, they can secure such assistance from the Church Society and from a Layman of the Diocese as will enable each to start with the of nucleus endowment of \$550.

Four missions exerting themselves at once to start an Endowment Fund will put the Church Society in possession of the \$2200, without which it would be unreasonable to make any further representations to the S. P. G.

In the heading of the several accounts of Endowments the year in which they were established has been attached; it will be observed that some of the funds are rapidly increasing towards the required amount of \$3600 to entitle the Clergyman to receive \$200 per an: in consequence of the exertions of the missions themselves by donations from time to time.

Your committee recommend the Church Society to expunge the following words in the 22nd line of the 2nd page of the Trust Deed, viz: "said revenue of four hundred dollars per annum" and insert in lieu thereof the words "the entire revenue."

#### FORMS OF BEQUESTS AND DEVISES BY WILL.

 A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock, or Public Debentures, for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and bequeath to "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, the sum of (or Shares of Stock in the Bank of standing in my name in the Books of the said Bank, or of Debentures, describe them briefly,) upon trust to be by the said Church Society applied to and for the uses and purposes of the said society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation and none other.

II. A Bequest of a sum of money, or of Shares of Stock or Debentures for one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of Providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustentation Fund.

Or.

Towards the support of missionaries and elergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the elergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Towards the augmentation of the Fund for endowing the church in the mission of (or at ) held by the said Church Society, subject to the conditions of a Deed of Trust passed between the said Church Society of the Incumbent and church-wardens of the Church in the said mission, (or at )

Or,

As the commencement of an endowment for the church of St. in the mission of (or at ) and to provide for the future maintenance of divine worship in comformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or,

For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of Day schools and Sunday-schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or,

For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the United Church of England and Ireland within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

For and toward a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebee, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and the Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

As an aid towards the crection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and church-yards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

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III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and devise unto the "Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec," incorporated by a Statute of the province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, chapter 171, all and singular, &c. [describe the real estate clearly.] to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors, for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and now other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

[V] A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

Same as in No. 3—only instead of the words in Italics insert the specific purposes, as in No. 2.

V. A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.

Same as No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows;—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say: upon the trusts to hold the same forever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and Church-yard, and Burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the places adjacent to the said site and premises within the said Diocese of Quebec, according to the doctrine and discipline of the United Church of England and Ireland, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

#### NOTICE.

The Annual Sermons in aid of the various funds of the Church Society are appointed to be preached—

For General Purposes, on Quinquagesima Sunday.

For the Mission Fund on the Sunday nearest to Michaelmas.

FOR THE ALGOMA BISHOPRIC FUND, on the third Sunday in Advent.

FOR THE PENSION FUND, on Thanksgiving Day.

The attention of applicants for grants is particularly

directed to the following rules.

I. That no grant be made for any church, parsonage, glebe, or other property, which shall not have been duly vested in the authorities of the Church.

2. That grants be payable when the amount shall be sufficient to free the property from debt; or that the debt be a mortgage for an amount not exceeding twenty-five per cent, of the value of the property or building when finished.

3. That the Treasurer when transmitting the amount of any grant of money made by this Society to any parish or mission in the diocese shall require a receipt, signed jointly by the Incumbent of such parish or mission, and one or both of the church-wardens.

4. That in all cases where grants of money (other than personal) are made by the Church Society, it shall be the duty of the person to whom such grant shall be paid to furnish, within three months afterwards, regular vouchers of the expenditure of such sums, to be submitted to the Board.

5. That when the conditions on which any sum is voted are not complied with, and the money applied for within one year from the time it is voted, such grant shall be struck off the list.

6. That no grant shall be made towards the erection of any church or parsonage, unless the plans and site have been

approved of by the Bishop.

7. That no grant shall be made to any parish, mission or station, in which at least one sermon (in aid of the Pension Fund) shall not have been preached, and from which the subscription shall not have been sent in during the year.

8. That all applications for aid reach the hands of the Secretary in time to be submitted to the Finance Committee, who hold a meeting in the fortnight immediately proceding Mi

Of

each meeting of the Central Board.

9. That no application for aid in repairing either churches or parsonages be entertained for the future; as the Central Board conceive it to be the duty of congregations to keep all their Church property in good repair.

10. Clergymen desirons of participating in the benefits of the Widows' and Orphans' Fund are required to pay their annual contributions before the first of May in each year.

11. No school shall be assisted for a longer period than twelve months without being Inspected and reported to be

in a satisfactory condition.

12. That no application for grants in aid of churches, parsonages or buildings of any kind be entertained by the Central Board without a resolution from the Congregation approving of such application be sent at the same time to the Board.

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
