While most of this work has been in the form of investigation and exploration, definite plans have been formulated for some of the chief for-est reserves. The Riding Mountain Reserve in Northern Manitoha is at present in the most advanced stage, its million odd acres being roughly mapped and explored. The plan will be to construct roads and trails thru the reserve connecting up the different ranger stations. Tel-ephone lines and lookout stations will insure the speedy detection of for-est fires. The work of the branch for the next three years will be chiefly along this line, 'making all parts of the reserves easily accessible in case of fires and interesting the settler in the cause of timber protection. Scientific forest management will follow and the aim of the branch wil be to perpetuate the stupply of wood products to the com-munities surrounding each reserves and will be turned into forest reserves and whether they are administered by the provinces or the federal government will be of little importance as long as public feeling is in favor of forest con-servation.
