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

Southern Product Sold at 15 to 17 Cents a Box and Will Be Dearer

Today.

The acute stage which the short-age of southern strawberries and lack of Canadian berries is bringing about was shown by the fact that while four

was shown by the fact that while four cars of berries from the south arrived here the day previously, only two cars came into Toronto yesterday.

Fifteen to seventeen cents a box was the wholesale price yesterday, but to-day will see them at from eighteen to twenty cents, a raise of two cents a box in one day.

The scarcity of the fruit is further emphasized when it is taken into consideration that more than twenty carloads arrive daily during the Canadian strawberry season. Yesterday's consignment of Canadian berries consisted of two crates, which McWilliam & Everist were lucky enough to secure. Altho the Canadian berry is not as full-flavored as the imported southern berry, on account of the novelty of the first fruit they command the same figure in the market. Fruit men all agree, however, that when the Canadian berry is fully matured it has the American fruit beaten both for immediate eating and measurement. American fruit beaten both for imme-

Probably the most expensive fruit now on the Toronto market are Callfornia cherries at \$2.75 a basket. formia cherries at \$2.75 a basket.

For such a well-known vegetable cabbages are remarkably dear, even for this time of the year. They are now selling for \$3 a crate, a raise in price of 25 cents in one day. Florida tomatoes are also very scarce, the crop being just about over, and are selling at \$4 to \$4.50 a crate. 

HOLLINGER DROPS AGAIN BELOW TEN DOLLAR MARK

Big Percupine Security at Lowest Price in Ten Months-General List Ignores the Decline and Holds Generally Firm.

World Office, Tuesday Evening, June 11. Hollinger sold below the ten-dollar mark to-day for the first time in ten months, the stock breaking to \$9.95, a net loss of 50 points for the day and a figure not hitherto attained since last August. Traders were somewhat at a loss to explain the material weakness in the issue, which has displayed the most remarkable instance of reaccionary tendency witnessed in the market

most remarkable instance of reaceionary tendency witnessed in the market in a long time. The general opinion, however, was that the speculative interest had almost entirely disappeared from the market, and that consequently the disposition of prices was ruled entirely by the volume of selling current from day to day.

A year ago Hollinger was selling within a small distance of the highest price ever on record, \$16.65, that quotation having been reached by reason of extreme speculative possibilities. The attainment of the production period by the company since that time has, in itself, removed a portion of the enthusiasm, which in common with customary mining ethics, has been more pronounced in the prospective period than in the time when an actual mine could be said to have been developed.

The lessuing of new stock by the company has also not been received with any enthusiasm by the street, the general idea being that the treasury was in such shape that it could take cae of the addition to the stamp mill.
